Diarrhoea outbreak under control

GABORONE - Botswana health authorities announced that diarrhoea situation was at the moment under control as fewer cases have reported for the past three weeks.

In an interview with BOPA, the Ministry of Health spokesperson, Dr Christopher Nyanga, however said cases were still being reported across all the District Health Management Teams (DHMT).

Dr Nyanga said Botswana had been experiencing a surge in diarrhoea cases since the

beginning of the year. However, he said an increase in cases started in August.

“The country recorded close to 300 cases per week, for the past two months, most of these cases were mild, seen and discharged home,” he said. He added that around the same time an average of three deaths per week was recorded.

He said all district have been affected, citing Okavango, North West, Bobirwa and Tutume were some of the most affected.

Dr Nyanga said the ministry implemented a range of measures to address and

manage the ongoing diarrhoea outbreaks, with a focus on both healthcare facility responses and community-level interventions.

He said those measures were aimed at reducing the prevalence of diarrhoea and preventing fatalities, particularly among vulnerable populations such as children under five, among them he mentioned that since the peak of diarrhoea cases, Rapid Response Teams (RRTs) have been deployed to various districts to contain the situation and provide immediate assistance.

Further, he said the teams were crucial for early detection, timely

intervention and the prevention of further spread.

He also said at health facilities, several measures have been put in place to improve the management of diarrhoea cases, adding that there was sensitisation of healthcare workers, saying medical staff have been trained to manage diarrhoea cases according to the Integrated Management of Childhood Illness (IMCI) protocols.

He said that ensures that all cases were treated with best practices, reducing complications and fatalities, particularly among children.

Moreover, Dr Nyanga said availability of Oral Rehydration Solutions (ORS) and Zinc Sulphate has been intensified, adding that “health facilities have been adequately stocked with ORS and Zinc Sulphate, essential for the management of diarrhoea.”

He said the supplies were critical for rehydration and reducing the duration and severity of diarrhoea.

He said the enhanced distribution of ORS and Zinc Sulphate, in addition to ensuring adequate stocks at health facilities, the distribution of ORS and Zinc to caregivers has been intensified.

He further said caregivers were trained to administer those treatments as soon as diarrhoea symptoms appear, while simultaneously seeking medical attention at health facilities.

Additionally he said, there was capacity building for health education personnel, saying that health education assistants and officers have been trained and mobilised to reach communities with key messages on diarrhoea prevention and management.

“Their role is vital in disseminating information and ensuring that caregivers are equipped with the knowledge to manage diarrhoea at home,” Dr Nyanga said.

At community level, Dr Nyanga urged citizens to maintain high standards of hygiene, preventive behaviours, and early health-seeking practices.

He said it was important to have good hygiene, particularly hand washing with soap and water after using the toilet, as well as boiling water before consumption, adding that those practices were essential to prevent diarrhoea, especially in areas with poor sanitation.

Threfore, he encouraged caregivers to monitor children closely and seek early medical attention if diarrhoea was observed.

He advised that parents should always be quick to visit the nearest health facility when their children show symptoms or were unwell. **BOPA**

Boko vows to meet nation expectations

GABORONE - President Advocate Duma Boko has vowed

to serve the nation in a way that would satisfy its expectations.

He was responding to media questions during a joint press

conference with former president Dr Mokgweetsi Masisi, which followed the administrative handover of government and its

instruments yesterday. Asked if he was going to retain the current senior public servants, President Boko stressed the importance of according himself time to appreciate the lay of the land.

He also emphasised the need to have an agile government that was quick to respond and one that was compassionate.

President Boko said he was still to engage with the top brass and promised to take reasonable, appropriate, respectful and ethical steps to ensure that the government machinery continued to function and serve the nation accordingly.

He added that holding people accountable would be based on full understanding of what one was doing.

Adv. Boko said having an open and transparent system enabling one to check and verify to their satisfaction was deemed accountable.

He also stressed the need to have robust oversight institutions that would address any failures and shortcomings in case anything 'slipped'.

"I believe we will enhance what is available and do the very best in that regard," said President Boko.

In relation to the question relating to automatic power succession and if it was not by any chance in violation of democratic principles, President Boko said the question confined him a bit as the current scenario was not in any way related to such an arrangement considering that the shifting of power was pursuant to the popular decision of the electorate.

He said automatic transfer of power only applied within a political party.

President Boko said once a credible decision was communicated based on the outcome of an election as it was the case with what recently transpired, power was vest by reason of the outcome of the election, which was a democratic undertaking.

"The people have spoken, their will must be held, enforced and be respected," he said.

On relating with the press, President Boko said he was standing to reason that his government needed the media.

"We need a vibrant and ethical, a probing, sometimes unpleasantly, press. That press must also be enabled by an environment conducive to them doing their work effectively," he said. President Boko said one of the issues to debate was the freedom of information legislation that would aid the press by availing information so that they could operate from the vantage point of accurate information and not peddle fake news.

He said the press was part of the constitutionally entrenched principles of freedom being freedom of thought, of

conscience and speech.

President Boko said the most important right was the right to free speech, adding that the press must be partners in shaping the landscape.

On youth participation, Adv. Boko said his government would encourage and do everything in its power to assist them, opining that somehow there had to be some form of affirmative action in favour of the youth.

"We have to respond and make the youth visible in some of these critical spaces so that others may get inspired."

On the other hand, Dr Masisi said BDP had taken the back seat among the opposition parties and would be looking for opportunities to demonstrate that its ideas would have worked better.

In thanking the media personnel, Dr Masisi said they must not underestimate their role in governance.

"The media has an extremely important attribute of democracy. When we free you, you will report things as they are as you are doing today. I urge you too, to be contributors to the strengthening and solidifying of our democracy. I look forward to my days when I am an ordinary citizen," he said. Dr Masisi said looking at Botswana's credit rating and rate of inflation, among others, the fundamentals of the economy were in place.

He said the diamond sales had been below expectation, which state of affair was not unique to Botswana.

"I can confidently confirm that I speak often with those who used to be my colleagues who are diamond producers," he said.

He said the situation had happened before and when it did happen as it was the case now, it was advisable to kick in austerity measures.

"The first time we kicked in austerity measures was in August and then the beginning of last month where you reduce spending so that you do not deplete your reserves completely and threaten the stability of the economy," he said, allaying any fears regarding the fundamentals of the economy.

On the process of automatic succession when the term of the sitting president comes to an end, Dr Masisi was of the view that since the process was embedded in the Constitution of Botswana and such a provision was arrived at through a procedure that was acceptable and democratic, then the process would not by any chance be a violation of democracy.

Dr Masisi added that BDP would provide a vibrant and informed opposition even though they were not used to, adding that likewise UDC, as a party that was used to opposing, would equally be learning how to govern. **BOPA**

Masisi hands over reins to Boko

GABORONE - Following Umbrella for Democratic Change's general elections historic win, another defining moment was registered yesterday as the former president Dr Mokgweetsi Masisi handed over the leadership reins to his successor, President Advocate Duma Boko.

During a short ceremony, which was attended by senior government officials at the Office of the President, Advocate Boko announced that Mr Ndaba Gaolathe was the Vice President designate.

Mr Gaolathe, who is the leader of the Alliance for Progressives, won the Gaborone Bonnington South Parliamentary seat under the Umbrella for Democratic Change coalition.

The handover ceremony was duly followed by a joint press conference by President Boko and Dr Masisi.

President Boko vowed to continue to respect his predecessor, whom he said he admired.

He said he was humbled to be handed over the honourable responsibility of leading the government and was accepting it with humility.

Adv. Boko said he was well aware that this was a mammoth task with high expectations, however assuring senior government official that he was ready to work with them in a

transparent and open manner, urging them to also play open cards.

President Boko reminded government officials that together, they were faced with a mammoth task, demanding them to work together, recognising that the public service was endowed with experienced and decorated professionals.

"Let us do our very best for this country," he said.

He said the smooth handover process was testimony that the country's democracy was mature, adding that it was rare to observe a moment where power was moving from one regime to the other without contention, further proving that the accolades of a shining example of democracy that it had been receiving from the world were well deserved.

For his part, Dr Masisi described the occasion as a moment where he was administratively handing over government and its instruments to the new President.

"I am a firm believer in democracy," Dr Masisi told the journalists, adding that the people of Botswana too were true democrats.

He acknowledged that the people had spoken 'in their numbers through a process that had been tested, was impartial, transparent and evidence-based'.

"Democracy for us is not just an abstract concept, we peel through it with intention and peeling through it means walking

every step of the way," he said.

He said he was now looking forward to the inauguration of the new President.

Of the pre-election campaign, Dr Masisi said, "I knew I had a responsibility to make sure that we set a standard since we never had a change of government, where a different party was taking over. I can confirm to you that I meant every word of what I said."

He also added that he had wanted his handover of government administration to be made public, adding that in the absence of his predecessor, he had told the senior civil servants as per the provision of the Constitution, that President Boko was their new leader as well as the armed forces that he was their Commander in Chief.

"I have happily handed over and have instructed all to pay allegiance to the government of the day. We have an apolitical public service and they take instructions to follow and deliver government programmes for the government of the day," he said.

He urged that President Boko must be respected and get the much needed support.

Dr Masisi reminded the nation that other general elections would be held in five years' time and that if what had happened to him and his party was to be repeated, people must understand that power was only borrowed and causing havoc did not pay.

13th Parliament members-elect

GABORONE - The general elections, which are held after every five years, saw the opposition Umbrella For Democratic Change (UDC) winning the majority of both parliamentary and council seats, emerging the ultimate government of the day for the next five years and its leader, Advocate Duma Boko the President of Botswana.

The UDC takes over government after 58 years of Botswana Democratic Party (BDP) rule, which has been winning elections since the country attained independence in 1966.

UDC won 36 parliamentary seats, Botswana Congress Party won 15 seats while Botswana Patriotic Front and BDP won 5 and 4 seats respectively. Dr Edwin Dikoloti is the only Independent MP. The following is a summary of the elections; legislators and their constituencies.

Kenya benefits from Bamboo farming

NAIROBI - For decades, Francis Mayobo's farm, located along the Nzoia River in western Kenya, was repeatedly inundated by floods that destroyed his crops and pushed him to the brink of poverty.

A retired public works official, Mayobo's farmland is near the river, which originates in Kenya's northwestern highlands and drains into Lake Victoria, Africa's largest freshwater body.

Four years ago, Mayobo took a proactive step by planting hundreds of bamboo trees on his farm after learning about the tree's flood-mitigating potential. "I was motivated to venture into bamboo farming after training and research on how it could protect my farm from floods," Mayobo told *Xinhua* in a recent interview.

Today, the bamboo trees not only shield his farm from seasonal floods but have also rejuvenated the soil, allowing him to grow crops such as maize, legumes, bananas, and millet. Mayobo is one of many smallholder farmers in western Kenya's flood-prone areas set to benefit from a bamboo agroforestry initiative funded by the Chinese Academy of Sciences through its Sino-Africa Joint Research Center.

The project is implemented by the United Nations Environment Program's affiliated International Ecosystem Management Partnership (UNEP-IEMP), in collaboration with local partners. Dubbed, 'Ecosystem Restoration for Enhancing Livelihoods and Addressing Climate Change: China-Kenya Cooperation on Bamboo Technology Transfer', the project promises flood protection, income generation, and improved resilience for local farmers and fishermen.

Under this initiative, Mayobo and other farmers have received training on bamboo cultivation, helping them establish nurseries and secure seedlings for replanting in flood-prone zones. Samuel Juma Magoba, an elderly farmer involved in the project, has cultivated bamboo on his one-acre farm and found new income opportunities by selling bamboo for furniture, ornaments, utensils, and compost.

He recalled the severe flood damage he witnessed in his youth in his village near the Nzoia River basin, a devastation that has notably decreased since local farmers started planting bamboo along the riverbanks.

According to Dennis Otieno Ochuodho, a senior researcher at Jaramogi Oginga Odinga University of Science and Technology in Kenya, a project partner, the bamboo agroforestry project offered an effective, nature-based solution to climate-induced flooding.

Ochuodho said the project aimed to expand research, training, and technology transfer in bamboo farming, restore the degraded Nzoia River basin, and enhance food security through mixed cropping systems.

A large-scale bamboo plantation, he added, would protect native species, serve as a carbon sink, and supply raw materials for herbal medicine,

supplements, and roofing. Despite her advanced age, Alice Makhulo's passion for cultivating bamboo on her seven-acre farm near a swamp remains undiminished, thanks to the economic and environmental benefits she has reaped from the trees.

"Even my children and grandchildren appreciate the cool breeze from the mature bamboo trees.

I have also been selling the bamboo stems to local furniture

makers," Makhulo said. As part of the China-funded bamboo agroforestry initiative, more than 200 farmers will receive training in sustainable bamboo cultivation, which also includes a 25-hectare demonstration site to showcase ecological restoration through the planting of this iconic tree species.

Guoqin Wang, programme manager at UNEP-IEMP, emphasised that by stabilising the

Nzoia River banks, the project not only curtailed flooding but also enhanced local livelihoods by combining food crops with bamboo and creating natural products for sale.

Leveraging Chinese bamboo technology and expertise, the initiative aims to regenerate degraded landscapes, conserve water sources, and improve climate resilience for river communities, Wang added.

Symprose Anyango, coordinator of Eco Green Kenya, a conservation lobby, noted that communities along the Nzoia River have embraced the project, particularly women, saying that "bamboo has in particular been of huge benefit to women who suffer most from climate change.

They are using bamboo to revive traditional weaving and earn an additional income." *Xinhua*

Guterres calls for youth empowerment

NEW YORK - UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Thursday highlighted the role of young people in driving climate action and shaping urban futures, and called for empowering them

to accelerate global sustainable development progress.

In his message to mark World Cities Day, which is observed annually on October 31, Guterres said, "We recognise the role

of young people in driving climate action and shaping urban futures."

He underscored that with more than half of the world's population and 70 per cent of

global greenhouse gas emissions, cities were at the forefront of the climate crisis.

And they need the energy and vision of youth leading the charge for change.

"From grassroots movements to innovation labs, young people are pushing for ambitious climate action," Guterres noted, adding that they were championing renewable energy integration, green jobs, clean public transportation, and climate adaptation measures, contributing to shape sustainable cities where everyone could thrive.

He called for nations to amplify voices of youth, invest in their ideas, and promote their meaningful participation in urban decision-making, stressing, "By empowering young people, we can accelerate climate action and drive global progress for the Sustainable Development Goals."

"As we mark World Cities Day, let us celebrate the power of youth to build green, resilient and inclusive cities that meet the needs and aspirations of future generations," the UN chief said.

The World Cities Day was proposed by the Chinese government in the Shanghai Declaration of the World Expo 2010.

The UN General Assembly later designated October 31 as World Cities Day to raise awareness of the imperative to make cities more sustainable, accessible, and livable. *Xinhua*

CIIE key trade platform for Africa

JOHANNESBURG - The China International Import Expo (CIIE) is an important platform for Africa to showcase its products and enhance trade with China, said a South African expert.

"China has an important and attractive market, and the CIIE is incredibly big and diverse. It's a wonderful opportunity

for African businesses to tap into the Chinese market and understand what's happening in the global market," said Mr Philip Myburgh, group head of trade at Standard Bank Business and Commercial Banking, in an interview with Xinhua ahead of the 7th CIIE due from Tuesday to Sunday in Shanghai.

Given that Africa sometimes

takes a backseat or gets overshadowed by larger economies at global events, Mr Myburgh said they expect more exposure to and attention from the international community.

"We are certainly getting a stronger presence at the CIIE, with the Africa pavilion bringing all made-in-Africa products together," he said,

adding that it's encouraging to see more emphasis on Africa.

Standard Bank, which has participated in the CIIE since its inception, has hosted many promotional events to strengthen the connection between Africa and China, said the expert.

"We are seeing more diversity and stronger demand for African products showcased in the CIIE, and we are expecting more transactions, more interest, and more deals being signed this year," he added.

During the 2024 Summit of the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) held in September in Beijing, China committed to further opening its market to African agricultural products, with two protocols signed for the export of greasy wool and dairy products from South Africa to China.

In Mr Myburgh's opinion, the FOCAC marks a highlight of the China-Africa relationship as many infrastructure and funding projects were announced, and more partnership agreements signed.

Meanwhile, the CIIE is a practical showcase of the

theoretical and political commitments made at the FOCAC.

Myburgh said China's efforts to promote high-level opening-up are welcomed by African countries and will boost Africa's economic recovery and growth.

China plays an important role in helping African countries diversify their economies and boost growth, and has become a key off-taker for African products and a provider of critical technologies for the industrialisation and sustainable development of the continent, he said.

Noting that Africa could benefit from more foreign exchange, Mr Myburgh said exports to China could be a critical contributor to Africa's economic growth.

It's also crucial for African countries to learn from China when it comes to renewable energy and technologies to save water and conserve energy, said Myburgh, adding that the CIIE has offered a platform for Africans to learn from and collaborate with more important stakeholders. *Xinhua*

Egypt, IMF discuss economic reform amid regional crises

CAIRO - Egyptian President Abdel-Fattah al-Sisi met on Sunday with Managing Director of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) Kristalina Georgieva in Cairo, where they discussed the country's economic reform programme amid the ongoing regional crises.

During the talks, Sisi expressed Egypt's aspiration to continue cooperation with the IMF in implementing the economic reform programme to enhance the country's economic stability and reduce inflation, the Egyptian presidency said in a statement.

Sisi stressed that Egypt's priority is to combat inflation, attract investment, and empower the private sector to increase employment and growth rates, according to the statement.

For her part, the IMF chief expressed "full understanding" of the major challenges facing Egypt in light of regional and international developments, noting the Fund's endeavour, in partnership with the Egyptian government, to reach the best reform paths for the North African country. Georgieva voiced appreciation for Egypt's efforts to implement the reform

programme while maintaining social protection for the most vulnerable citizens, praising the progress of the country's macroeconomic indicators, as reflected in the positive outlook of international credit rating institutions for Egypt's economy.

In a joint press conference with Georgieva following the meeting, Egyptian Prime Minister Mostafa Madbouly said that the IMF will start on Tuesday its fourth review of the latest 46-month IMF loan programme that was approved in 2022 and expanded to US\$8 billion this year. *Xinhua*

Namibia trade within Africa gains momentum under AfCFTA

WINDHOEK - Namibia's intra-Africa trade under the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) in September 2024 saw exports valued at 4.7 billion Namibian dollars (about US\$267 million) and imports worth 7.7 billion Namibian dollars (about US\$437 million) from other African countries, the Namibia Statistics Agency (NSA) said Friday.

The AfCFTA agreement is one of the African Union's flagship projects under Agenda 2063, with a primary mandate to eliminate trade barriers and boost intra-Africa trade.

NSA Statistician General Alex Shimuafeni said in the Trade Statistics Bulletin for September that Namibia's intra-Africa exports of 4.7 billion Namibian dollars represented 52.3 per cent of the country's total exports worldwide, while intra-Africa imports of 7.7 billion Namibian dollars accounted for 51.8 per cent of its world total.

According to Shimuafeni, Namibia's exports within Africa are largely directed to countries such as South Africa, Botswana, Zambia, the Democratic Republic

of the Congo and Angola.

Imports came primarily from the same countries, excluding Morocco and Togo. In terms of international trade, Shimuafeni said that South Africa is Namibia's largest export partner, accounting for 20.4 per cent of total exports.

Botswana follows with 19.2 per cent, while China ranks third at 16.5 per cent. Zambia and France are fourth and fifth, contributing 7.6 and 6.5 per cent, respectively.

Among Namibia's top import sources, South Africa leads with 37.6 per cent of total imports, followed by China at 10.6 per cent and Brazil at 6.4 per cent.

Chile and Morocco hold fourth and fifth positions, each contributing 3.7 per cent of total imports.

Namibia's exports in September were primarily driven by mineral products, including diamonds, uranium, gold and petroleum oils, with fish being the only non-mineral product among the top five exports.

Imports were dominated by petroleum oils, precious metal ores, fertilizers, copper ores and commercial vehicles. *Xinhua*

Alamein landmark tower reaches peak

CAIRO - The landmark tower of the Alamein Downtown Towers Project is breaking the record in Egypt's New Alamein City, Egypt Minister of Housing Sherif El-Sherbiny has said.

The topping-out ceremony held Thursday was attended by China Minister of Housing and Urban-Rural Development Ni Hong, China Consul General in Alexandria Yang Yi, and Wen Bing, president of China State Construction Engineering Corporation (CSCEC), the contractor of the project.

Mr El-Sherbiny said the topping-out of the main structure of the landmark tower was the result of concerted efforts by Egypt and China.

He hoped that the two sides would continue to deepen cooperation and jointly promote project construction to assist Egypt in achieving its "Vision 2030."

Mr Yang said the smooth progress of the project demonstrated that the two countries have further deepened cooperation on urban construction, sustainable urban development, and living environment improvement.

Mr Wen said CSCEC will strengthen the application of scientific and technological innovation achievements and fully advance subsequent construction work.

The New Alamein City, located on the Mediterranean coast in northern Egypt, is an important strategic city in the country's "Vision 2030" plan.

The Alamein Downtown Towers Project, a pivotal part of the construction of New Alamein City, includes four high-rise residential buildings and one landmark tower.

The four residential buildings have all been topped out since January this year.

INFORMATION ON THE BOTSWANA STOCK EXCHANGE (BSE) INVESTOR COMPENSATION FUND

1. INTRODUCTION

- Section 57 of the Securities Act the Non – Bank Financial Institutions Regulatory Authority (NBFIRA) provides that NBFIRA shall make Investor Compensation requirements by which an Investor Compensation Fund shall be established.
- NBFIRA delegated the function of developing the Investor Compensation Fund Rules (the Rules) and managing the Investor Compensation Fund (Compensation Fund) to the Botswana Stock Exchange Limited (BSE).
- The BSE duly created the Rules which were approved by NBFIRA in April 2022.
- The Rules took effect on the 7th April 2022.

2. WHAT IS A COMPENSATION FUND?

- A Compensation Fund in relation to a financial market, is a rescue fund for securities investors, established to grant securities investors compensation for financial losses suffered as a result of a Participant's failing to meet their contractual obligations.

3. KEY DEFINITIONS

- **Claimant** - means all securities investors, with eligible claims in terms of the rules, excluding institutional investors, who have suffered loss as a result of a participant's failure to meet their contractual obligation.
- **Participants** - means the BSE, the Central Securities Depository Company of Botswana (CSDB), Securities Brokers who are Members of the Exchange, Special Members of the Exchange, CSD Participants and any other entity as the BSE may determine from time to time.

4. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE COMPENSATION FUND?

- To grant compensation to clients for losses suffered as a result of non-fulfilment of contractual obligations due to:
 - (a) Dishonesty, insolvency, default, or liquidation of a Participant;
 - (b) Dishonesty of an employee of a Participant, among other reasons.
- To protect securities investors' investment interests.
- To ensure financial integrity in the securities market in Botswana.
- To enhance investors' confidence in the securities market of Botswana.

5. WHAT IS THE SCOPE OF INVESTOR COMPENSATION FUND?

- The Compensation Fund covers transactions and dealings of Securities traded on the exchange.
- Coverage: losses suffered by a Claimant for recovery of losses where:
 - (a) the claimant gives money or other property or authority over property, to a Member to facilitate a transaction;
 - (b) the claimant suffers loss because:
 - i if the claimant provided money or other property to the Member resulting in the defalcation or fraudulent misuse of the money or other property by the Member; or
 - ii if the claimant gave the Member authority over property resulting in the fraudulent misuse of that authority by the Member.
- Where a claimant suffers loss arising from a contractual or statutory obligation placed on any other participant besides a Member as defined under the Rules.
- **NB:** The Compensation Fund **DOES NOT COVER** default obligations, shortfalls, deficiencies and or any other defaults during clearing and settlement of trade transactions by CSDB. This type of protection is provided for by the Settlement Guarantee Fund Rules.

6. WHO CONTRIBUTES TO THE COMPENSATION FUND?

- All Participants of the Fund being, the BSE, the Central Securities Depository Company of Botswana (CSDB), Securities Brokers who are Members of the Exchange, Special Members of the Exchange, CSD Participants and any other entity as the BSE may determine from time to time.
- Each Participant is required to contribute a sum of **BWP 5, 000.00** (Five Thousand Pula), towards the Compensation Fund per annum.

7. WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO CLAIM FROM THE INVESTOR COMPENSATION FUND?

- All securities investors, with eligible claims in terms of the Rules, **excluding institutional investors**, who have suffered loss as a result of a Participant's failure to meet their contractual obligations.
- A retail investor who can prove they have a legitimate claim.

8. WHAT IS A LEGITIMATE CLAIM

- A Claim that proves:
 - (a) that the claimant has suffered loss and the loss was a direct result of malpractice, negligence, error, on the part of the Participant;
 - (b) that the claimant has suffered loss and the loss was a direct result of insolvency on the part of the Participant;
 - (c) that the claimant gave money or property or authority to a Participant or a person who the claimant believed was a Participant or acting on behalf of the Participant;
 - (d) Proof that the money or property or authority was given to the Participant in connection with effecting a transaction covered by the provisions of the Members Rules, the Equity Listings Requirements, Automated Trading System Debt Trading Requirements and other applicable Rules and Requirements relating to transactions effected through the Exchange.

9. HOW TO MAKE A CLAIM FROM THE INVESTOR COMPESNATION FUND

- Make an application addressed to the **Chief Executive Officer of the BSE** through the prescribed application form **within 3 years** from the date of default.
- Ensure the application contains the following:
 - ✓ the names of the parties involved;
 - ✓ addresses of the parties involved;
 - ✓ the details of the transaction (s) or proposed transaction (s) for which the money or property or authority over property was given, including the date, time, place and type of contract(s) or securities traded or proposed to be traded;
 - steps the claimant has taken to exhaust any remedies available to him in respect of the loss and the results of any such steps;
 - the amount of the actual pecuniary loss suffered in BWP;
 - Proof that applicant has a legitimate claim.
- If an investor is successful, their claim will be paid within 6 months from the date of application.

10. WHAT ARE THE GROUNDS FOR REJECTING A CLAIM?

- If the investor has contributed in any way to the financial difficulties of the Participant in default;
- If the application is found to contain any inaccuracy or omission, unless this is clearly immaterial or is shown by the investor to be wholly innocent; or
- Where the investor has so conducted himself in his dealings with a Participant in default, as to be in breach of applicable law or regulations, including these Rules.

11. LIMITATION OF CLAIMS

- The amount that a claimant is entitled to claim as compensation from the Compensation Fund, shall not:

exceed 5% of the Compensation Fund or BWP 500, 000.00 (Five Hundred Thousand Pula) whichever is lower, provided that the total compensation paid from the Compensation Fund in any one year shall not exceed 50% of the balance available in the Compensation Fund.

12. WHAT HAPPENS IF THE COMPENSATION FUND IS INSUFFICIENT

- If at any time the amount of the Compensation Fund is insufficient to pay all amounts that, at that time, are required to be paid, the Board of Trustees may determine that a levy of a specified amount be paid equally among all the Participants.

13. WHAT HAPPENS IF THE COMPENSATION FUND IS LIQUIDATED

- The assets in the Compensation fund shall be disbursed to the BSE, and Participants according to the proportions of their contributions should the Fund remain sufficient.

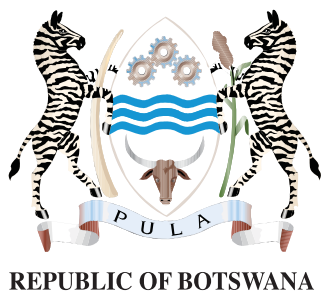

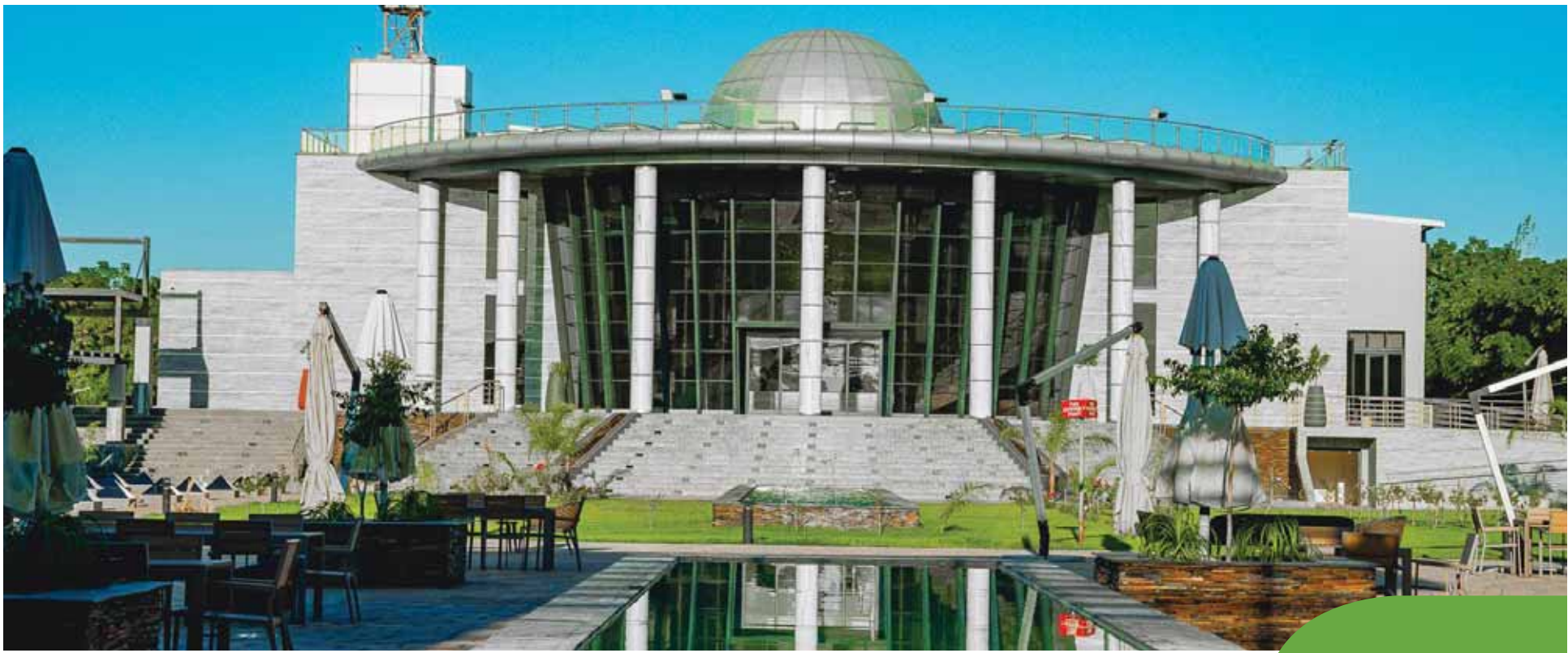

Young Chinese sip cocktail of knowledge

BEIJING - When Lin Si'an, 27, attended a lecture in a pub in Beijing, an unexpected venue for such academic events, she never imagined it would ignite her passion for the history and culture of Central Asia.

It was a lively setting where a well-dressed audience sipped cocktails and watched large screens as the speaker, who has rich experience in field research in Central Asia, shared his findings amid the dim lighting and the sound of clinking shakers.

Lin, who works in the automotive industry, noticed that many attendees appeared to be college students.

Their engaged expressions evoked her memories of campus life. "It was an amazing experience to engage in a cultural discussion that scholars brought from the classroom to this venue," said Lin, praising the speaker for weaving interesting stories with professional insights.

She actively participated in the session and had the opportunity to pose questions to the speaker.

This lecture is part of the growing trend known as "academic

pubs," where experts from various fields, particularly the humanities and social sciences, are invited to deliver lectures and engage in discussions with the audience, a format that already exists in countries like the United States.

The concept began gaining traction in China this June, and as these pubs continue to emerge in large cities like Beijing, Shanghai and Guangzhou, they have become a popular choice for many young Chinese in their free time.

On the Chinese lifestyle-sharing platform Xiaohongshu, the hashtag "academic pub" has garnered over 2.6 million views, with some trending posts receiving thousands of comments.

Many came to know of these pubs through social media recommendations.

"I was really curious to find out how academic discussions unfold in a bar setting," said Zhang Yunkai, a postgraduate student in Beijing. Caidao (pseudonym) is the co-founder of "Universe Lounge," an academic pub based in Beijing that aims to blend contrasting elements.

Unlike typical establishments, the pub's walls are adorned with posters promoting lectures from nearby universities, while chairs and stools are arranged to face screens displaying PowerPoint slides. The shelves are filled with hundreds of carefully selected books, and stone or metal statues of historic figures are thoughtfully placed throughout the space.

Caidao explained that the interior decor is designed to foster an environment conducive to exchanging knowledge and ideas in his academic pub, which has seen a growing number of customers.

"Without the lectures, we could sell about 40 glasses of cocktails on a weekend night, but the figure has doubled since we began hosting such academic events," he said.

To date, 13 lectures have been held in this academic pub, covering a wide range of topics from the evolution of Chinese-American immigration history and literature to the ethical risks of embedding artificial intelligence in medical diagnostics, with the venue packed with visitors each time.

The reasons young people are drawn to academic pubs vary. For many, the combination of studying and relaxation is appealing. "This place allows me to leave all my work stress behind and gain new perspectives in a carefree manner," said a 24-year-old college graduate surnamed Lyu.

For Zhao Yuancheng, who works at an internet giant, the charm of academic pubs lies in their ability to foster in-depth conversations and bring people

Ramoreboli said in an interview that they have tried to keep the team given that it has been performing well, and also has brought in individuals that have been performing in their respective clubs.

The coach said they have done their part in terms of profiling the opponents, adding that what was remaining was for them to play and win the match.

Ramoreboli said the Lions of Chingueti are a very physical, direct and energetic team, which he said were also characteristics of the Batswana players.

“Botswana players don’t mind

running, and combating so I don’t think the qualities that our opponents have will be a threat to us because it is our strength; it is what we are good at,” he said.

Ramoreboli said Mauritania has the front three players who can run and cause havoc, and a midfielder who joins late to help them.

“So they have about four players who are very effective in the game and they have five or six players who help them defensively, and you don’t see their full back moving too much forward, but you see their wingers very effective,” he said.

Canada clinches three more golds at ISU Short Track World Tour Montreal

MONTREAL - The ISU Short Track Speed Skating World Tour Montreal leg ended on Sunday, with Canadian skaters emerging as the biggest winners by claiming three out of five gold medals on the final competition day.

Local hero William Dandjinou, who won the 1500m on Saturday and took silver in the 500m, added a 1000m gold in 1:24.863 before joining his teammates at the top of the podium in both the men’s 5000m relay and the mixed team relay.

“I’m giving myself a 10 out of 10 this weekend,” Dandjinou said. “Even that silver felt like gold. With Steven winning, it was almost perfect. But maybe I should say nine and a half, because there has to be room for improvement.”

The men’s 500m gold was claimed by his teammate Steven Dubois. Jang Sung-woo of South

Korea took silver, and Jordan Pierre-Gilles of Canada finished third. Dandjinou and Pierre-Gilles then combined to help Canada win the men’s 5000m relay, ahead of South Korea and Italy.

The host team also took gold in the mixed relay, finishing ahead of the Netherlands and Japan.

The Chinese short track team made the final B of both the men’s relay and the mixed relay, finishing second in both events.

The bronze medal in the women’s 3000m relay on Saturday was China’s only medal in the Montreal leg. In the women’s 500m, Xandra Velzeboer of the Netherlands fought off a challenge from South Korean skaters Choi Minjeong and Kim Gilli to cross the line first in 42.087 seconds, with Choi and Kim taking silver and bronze, respectively. “My start has really improved this year.

It’s really consistent and that gives me a lot of confidence at the line,” Velzeboer said. “You feel all these people next to you, but when I get to the first corner I think ‘now let’s go, now it is showtime.’”

I’m so happy, but really tired.” Belgium also bagged a gold medal as Hanne Desmet overtook Kim Gilli to win her first gold on the Short Track World Tour in the women’s 1500m with a time of 2:27.149.

In the fierce race, Choi collided with Kristen Santos-Griswold of the United States, and both were injured. Kim ended up with silver, while Choi finished last. Corinne Stoddard of the United States slid past the casualties to collect bronze. The World Tour will move east as the Asian legs take place in Beijing, China from December 6 to 8, and Seoul, South Korea from December 13 to 15. **Xinhua**

FIFA president hopes China takes leading role in global football

SHANGHAI - FIFA president Gianni Infantino has expressed his hope that China will take a leading role in the future of global football.

“There is a lot of talent in China,” Infantino said in an interview with Xinhua during his visit to China recently. “We need to find and grow that talent to make sure China can compete at the highest level of men’s football, women’s football, club and national team football.”

Infantino emphasised that football is much more than a sport; it’s a unifying social phenomenon.

“It brings people together,” he explained. “Whether in stadiums or watching from home, we all focus on the same match and share the same emotions.”

According to FIFA’s Qatar 2022 World Cup Report, around five billion people engaged with the tournament, with 1.5 billion tuning in for the final between Argentina and France.

Infantino highlighted the growing role of technology in football, especially artificial intelligence (AI).

“AI and technology are having a big impact on football. They help players become stronger and healthier, and they also make the fan’s experience better,” he said.

“We embraced technology and introduced video assistant technology to football very early on. That is why we are working with Chinese companies to explore new AI technologies to help people experience football games in a comprehensive way.”

The Video Assistant Referee (VAR) system made its World Cup debut in 2018, and the upgraded semi-automatic version - with AI-powered tracking chips embedded in the ball - was introduced at the 2022 World Cup.

Now the latest VAR iteration uses 10 cameras to track players’ movements, feeding data 50 times per second to provide real-time analysis.

Despite decades of struggle for World Cup qualification, China’s involvement in global football remains significant, according to the FIFA chief.

“China is a very important country in the world, and whatever China does, it does it at the top. I want to work with China to bring China to the top of the world,” said Infantino.

While acknowledging the challenges, he emphasised the importance of perseverance.

“There is no shortcut and no secret. The only formula that works is to work and work hard. This is something we can do in China,” Infantino stated.

China has a large population of football enthusiasts.

“We need to start with the development of youth and talent. So we have to find the talent and grow that talent, making sure that China can compete at the highest level.”

Infantino also outlined FIFA’s support for China’s football initiatives.

“We can send coaches,

instructors and refereeing experts, and we can also make courses. We’ll do anything we can to help the development of Chinese football.

“We need to invest in the youth, and we need to make sure that China plays a crucial role at the top-level competition. We encourage the Chinese Football Association and FIFA to strengthen their cooperation and establish a solid relationship. Football is all about collaboration. As long as there is cooperation, investment, and a spirit of dedication, I believe Chinese football will shine brightly,” he said.

In line with his vision, Infantino was in Shanghai this week to celebrate a partnership with Hisense, China’s leading home appliance brand, which recently became the first official global sponsor of the 2025 Club World Cup.

“We have an excellent history of cooperation with many Chinese companies. Today’s Chinese companies are globalised companies, and we can work together to promote the development of football,” Infantino said.

Infantino spoke about FIFA’s mission to globalise football, highlighting the upcoming 2025 Club World Cup in the United States.

Running from June 15 to July 13, the tournament will feature 32 championship teams, including European powerhouses like Real Madrid, Manchester City, Bayern Munich, Chelsea, and Juventus.

The format mirrors the World Cup, except with club teams, and the event will be held every four years.

“We hope that Chinese football clubs will participate in the Club World Cup and have the opportunity to host this important event,” Infantino said.

“China is a reliable and important potential host country, whether for the men’s or women’s World Cup, the Youth World Cup or the Club World Cup.”

Infantino noted that club fans are generally more organised and engaged than national team fans. “Compared to national team fans, club fans are much more organised. They travel together, they go to matches together, they experience together, they sing together,” he said. “The Club World Cup will make fans fully experience the competition and help promote the globalisation of football.”

Looking to the future, Infantino said, “We will have more global competitions. We want every country in the world to have the opportunity to participate in football events.

We have made some changes, increasing the number of participants in the World Cup, including women’s and men’s, as well as youth competitions.”

Starting in 2025, FIFA will host the U17 World Cup annually rather than every two years. **Xinhua**
