Phane harvesting: Lucrative yet demanding endeavour

Hundreds of harvesters have ventured into the bush, eager to collect and sell the prized phane worm in local and regional markets.

Found primarily in the big-leaved mopane trees of central, eastern, and northeastern Botswana, phane harvesting is proving to be a profitable endeavour for many.

Ms Marriam Mafoko, a seasoned phane entrepreneur, emphasised the low entry barrier of the business. "It requires minimal expenses, just labour and time," she shared during an interview at a bustling phane harvesting camp in Rasetokwane lands, near Tshimoyapula in the Central District. Alongside her business partner Ms Gotshweremang

Rasejo, Ms Mafoko buys phane from local harvesters and resells it in markets as far as Zambia and the Democratic Republic of Congo, where demand is high.

She also noted the commercial value of phane in South Africa, where it was packaged and sold to farmers as livestock feed after undergoing value addition.

Ms Mafoko, a resident of Serowe, pointed out that phane business has led them to various districts across Botswana, including North East, Boteti, and regions within the gammangwato territory.

Gaolathe engages AfDB on BETP assistance

Vice President Ndaba Gaolathe bilateral engagements with African Development Bank (AfDB) president, Dr Sidi Ould Tah will focus on extending the bank's technical support and capacity building assistance to accelerate the Botswana Economic Transformation Programme.

Mr Ndaba, who is also Minister of Finance is in Abidjan, Côte d'Ivoire where he is attending the inaugural Strategic Dialogues of the African Development Bank Group and later undertake a working visit to Georgia.

According to a press release from Ministry of Finance, the duo's engagements will also explore innovative financing solutions that can be deployed at scale to support Botswana's development priorities.

Further the release states that the meeting will consider collaboration with the AfDB on the possible establishment of a Southern African Customs Union (SACU) Industrialisation Fund.

The ministers of finance for both Botswana and South Africa have been tasked to engage the bank of the initiative.

Meanwhile, the release states that following his engagements in Abidjan, Vice President Gaolathe will undertake a working visit to Georgia from January 12 to 15.

He is expected to engage with ministers and senior government officials on the design and implementation of Georgia's funding systems, with a view to informing Botswana's ongoing efforts to restructure and strengthen its financing architecture in support of private sector growth and job creation.

Georgia has been identified as a country with an effective funding architecture, particularly in supporting small and medium-sized enterprises, innovation and productive sectors.

Vice President Gaolathe is expected back home on January 16. **BOPA**

Constitutional Court consultations welcome development

A resident of Matsiloje, Mr Nlebeswa Shabgwa has welcomed the scheduled consultation process on the establishment of the Constitutional Court to be conducted from January 16 to February 9.

Speaking in an interview after a kgotla meeting addressed by Tati East MP, Mr Thabologo Furniture in Matsiloje on Monday, Mr Shabgwa said the consultation process would give Batswana a chance to understand the court's importance.

He said anything affecting the people should be taken to the people for consultation.

He said it was ill-thought for government to have wanted to get Members of Parliament to approve the Constitution Amendment Bill without adequate consultation.

Mr Shabgwa also touched on the fate of the death penalty, saying it was also a matter that Batswana ought to have a say on.

He emphasised that although the current regime hinged on human rights, the issue of the death penalty should be decided by the people, and not by government alone, adding that the death penalty was still a legal punishment for murder under aggravated circumstances, with executions carried out by hanging.

He argued that Botswana's constitution guaranteed the right to life, but also allowed the death penalty in certain circumstances.

Another resident, Mr Lawrence Chabane shared similar sentiments, saying the constitutional court's establishment required a referendum for all Batswana to participate.

Both residents also welcomed the Francistown-Matsiloje Road

reconstruction but suggested it should pass through other areas, including that from Matshelagabedi, the road should go to Mahatane, Pobepobe and then Matsiloje, to improve transport accessibility.

Earlier on, MP Furniture had

informed the residents of the impending consultation process on the constitution's review, with the objective of providing for the establishment of a constitutional court.

He had also informed the residents that the Francistown-Matsiloje Road was set to undergo reconstruction with a budget of P150 million allocated under the National Development Plan (NDP)12.

Mr Furniture stated that the project was currently at tendering stage following numerous court battles pertaining to the award of the tender.

Reacting to residents' disappointment that the proposed road from Robelela, passing through Patayamatebele and Matopi settlements to Matsiloje, was not included in NDP 12 as initially agreed, Mr Furniture said NDP12 prioritised the upgrading of the Mmadinare-Tonota road to bitumen standard.

The MP also informed the residents that in keeping with government's commitment to ensure decent jobs and welfare

of workers, a decision had been made to review the Public Service outsourcing programme.

This review he said, was with regard to outsourced services such as security, cleaning, gardening and other services within the public service.

In his welcoming remarks, Kgosi Solomon Segopa expressed concern over female learners at Matsiloje Junior Secondary School engaging in cross border sexual relationships, urging parents to take responsibility for their children's education.

He also highlighted ongoing issues including illegal gold mining and pending payments owed to former Mupane Gold mine employees.

For their part, some residents voiced concern about lack of potable water and also decried the absence of employment opportunities.

Others complained of poor internal roads and also pleaded for government to ensure that the village enjoyed equitable distribution and reticulation of electricity. **BOPA**

Moswaane appeals for Constitutional Court support

Francistown West legislator has appealed to the nation to support government in the establishment

of a Constitutional Court.

Addressing Gerald Estates residents in Francistown on Monday, Mr Ignatius Moswaane highlighted the importance of having a Constitutional Court,

saying it would among other things, protect citizens' rights, promote justice and fairness in government decisions affecting communities.

Mr Moswaane further said a countrywide consultation on the introduction of the Constitutional Court would soon start to allow citizens to provide their input.

On other matters, Mr Moswaane informed the residents about the revised Village Development Committee guidelines, saying elections of new members would be held in due course.

Therefore, he encouraged residents to elect leaders based on merit, leadership ability and potential to deliver development.

“You must elect representatives based on merit and their ability to deliver results. Ask those who want to represent you what they will bring and how they will improve your lives,” he said.

He also encouraged the spirit of self-reliance among the residents, while at the same time urged the youth to enroll in schemes such as the National internship Programme and the Botswaa National Service programme,

among others.

Also, he discouraged the excessive use of alcohol and drug abuse, urging residents to be responsible citizens and good role models for young people.

For his part, Moselewapula Ward councillor, Mr Thatayaone Keoletile said residents faced several challenges, including storm-water drainage, which caused flooding in many yards during the rainy season.

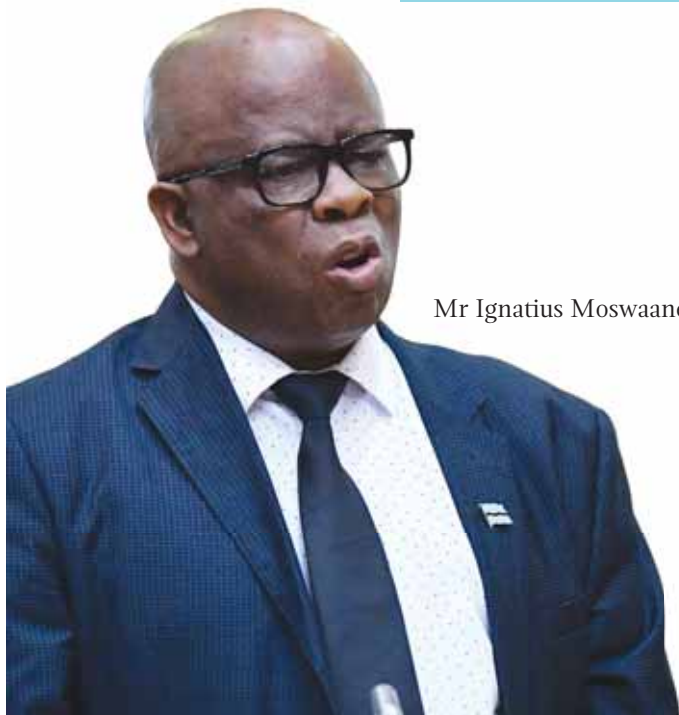
He said although the storm-water drainage system for Moselewapula had long been designed, lack of funding continued to delay its implementation.

Mr Keoletile also noted that theft of electrical cables had left some streets without lighting, posing a security risk.

He added that Gerald Primary School faced a shortage of furniture, while unemployment in the area continued to rise.

Some residents also raised concerns about cable theft, urging the area MP to intervene.

They also complained about persistent littering, which had contributed to the uncleanness of the area. **BOPA**

Road project to be implemented through public works

of road network in Bobirwa, through public works, would facilitate trade, tourism and ease of movement around Bobirwa and across the border into South Africa and Zimbabwe.

The government, the acting President explained, was heeding concerns of the communities and business people, some of whom expressly considered closing shop due to poor roads infrastructure.

The Ministry for State President, Defence and Security, Ministry of infrastructure and Transport as well as Ministry of Trade and Entrepreneurship, facilitated by SPEDU, undertook a tour of the road infrastructure in Bobirwa to appreciate the challenges the communities faced and it was agreed that there was need for new roads network that would benefit a significant number of people, according to Mr Mohwasa.

However, Bobirwa District Council chairperson, Mr Johannes Gaosikelwe expressed, although without advancing reasons, his fears for utilising public works to deliver roads infrastructure in the district.

"I differ with the in-house approach of constructing 189km worth of roads network. I do not think it will work for us," he said and suggested that government should have stuck to the initial 30km road from Mathathane to Platjan border post project.

He argued that the benefits of the 30km road would have been felt and as significant as the 189km roads to be constructed across the district. **BOPA**

Following cancellation of tender for construction of a 30km Mathathane-Platjan border post road , due to significant changes in scope and procurement needs, government has decided the project will be carried out and delivered through public works.

The cancellation of the construction of the initial 30km road funded by European Union will now see public works, led by Botswana Defence Force with Department of Roads providing expertise, construct a 189km road networks in Bobirwa, acting President and Minister for State President, Defence and Security, Mr Moeti Mohwasa said.

The 189km road network in Bobirwa comprises of the 153km stretch from Talana Farms to Sherwood, 16km from Lekkerpoet road to Motlhabaneng, 13km from Mabolwe to Mabolwe border post

and seven kilometres from the Talana-Sherwood road to Platjan border post.

To deliver this road network successfully, prudently and commensurate with the needs of the people, Mr Mohwasa, during the district development committee meeting, said government would pool together its resources and personnel from various ministries and departments to deliver the project.

Bobirwa District Council, Ministry of Lands and Agriculture in addition to the BDF and Department of Roads will boost the public works to deliver the roads infrastructure that seek to facilitate ease of movement and improve livelihoods of the people, according to the acting President.

While the initial Mathathane-Platjan 30km road was to be constructed at P357 million, with P50 million of the total sum channeled towards compensation for those affected by the road's construction, Mr Mohwasa said the compensation funds would now bolster the coffers for construction of more roads.

"We took this issue to cabinet where we found that we already had a right-of-way servitude by way of a gravel road from Lekkerpoet Junction to Platjan border post... We then thought it financially prudent to take this route than construct a completely new road under prevailing financial doldrums," he said.

Construction of the roads would, amongst other things, boost Bobirwa as a tourist destination and corridor through which movement of people and goods from Zimbabwe to South Africa and vice versa would be eased, according to the acting President.

When Platjan border post finally becomes a commercial border, farmers and other business people in the Tuli area would move easily between Botswana and South Africa.

“Farmers and businesspeople on this side have presented to us their transportation challenges during rains especially when Martin’s Drift border is closed due to flooding. They are forced to drive to as far as Tlokweng border (about 335km away) in order to cross into South Africa,” the acting President said while outlining the challenges of poor road networks and the need to

commercialise Platjan border post, about 150km from Martin's Drift border gate.

Despite boasting the state-of-the-art bridge across Limpopo River, Platjan border is reportedly largely unutilised and hardly records significant number of users due to poor roads.

“It shows that with tarred roads, numbers of people using the borders will likely swell... this is a year of delivery,” said Mr Mohwasa who added that government was in race to improve the livelihoods of its people.

Govt mitigates FMD risk in southern region

Government is doing all in its power to ensure that the county's green zones maintain their status.

This follows reports of the Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak in South Africa's North West province, which forms the southern boundary of Botswana.

With Botswana being a significant beef exporter to the EU market, the Ministry of Lands and Agriculture, has made a clarion call for Botswana to jealously protect the beef and livestock industry from the dreadful disease, by observing the laid disease control protocols.

The situation in the neighboring South Africa could ruin lives should the disease make its way into Botswana, the ministry of agriculture permanent secretary, Mr Kabelo Ebineng cautioned.

during a recent tour of the livestock disease control cordon fence along Molopo River.

He warned farmers to look after their cattle and ensure no contact with those of their neighbours in South Africa.

Control measures will include destroying of animals from Botswana that cross over to South Africa where the disease has been detected.

Animal disease control legislation empowers authorised persons to destroy animal infected or suspected of being infected or any animal which has been in contact with a diseased animal.

Farmers whose livestock will be destroyed will receive P700 compensation per cow and P200 for a goat while repeat offenders will only be entitled to P200 compensation for a cow and P25 per goat, Mr Ebineng stated.

Government erected a

veterinary cordon fence along Molopo River between 2023 and 2024 in response to the FMD scare in South Africa's North West Province and to protect Botswana's cattle industry.

It also drilled boreholes along the frontier to keep livestock away from the river and surface water sources close to the border.

Mr Ebineng explained that any outbreak of FMD within a 10 kilometre radius from the export abattoir could cause cessation of operations at Botswana Meat Commission.

He also explained that the disease also posed a threat to the imported bulls and semen at Ramatlabama Artificial Insemination Ranch.

Meanwhile, there were reports of some farmers who continued to vandalise the fence and water their cattle in the river hence risking contact with South Africa livestock. **BOPA**

Back-to-School rush on

With Christmas decorations carefully packed away and festive outfits returning to the back of closets, parents are now focusing on the next big task on the calendar: preparing their children for the upcoming school year.

One week, malls adorned with red decorations and baubles are a sight to behold, featuring Christmas jumpers folded neatly beside novelty socks. The next week, the sparkle is gone, replaced by orderly displays of grey trousers, white shirts, school shoes, and navy blazers.

Just weeks after shopping for Christmas ornaments, lights, and holiday attire, families are filling store aisles once again, this time for school uniforms, textbooks, and stationery.

This swift transition is a familiar

change, as the end of the festive holiday season blends seamlessly into back-to-school preparations.

"In December, it is all about celebrations," said Gaborone resident Ms. Kitso Chepete while browsing a uniform shop. "But once the holidays are over, reality sets in; children need uniforms that fit, books for the new term, and daily supplies."

Retailers report a noticeable shift in buying habits immediately after Christmas. Shop windows that once glittered with ornaments and festive decorations now proudly

display backpacks, notebooks, and school shoes, marking the official arrival of the back-to-school season.

Ms Sibochiwe Ningi, branch manager at West Gate Mall's Pep Stores, noted that the change was expected: "It becomes a different season that has to be embraced right after Christmas and New Year celebrations."

She added that the demand for school-related items rises sharply during this period, as many children transition from preschool to primary and junior secondary to high school.

Pep Stores promptly removes Christmas decorations after the festive season, making way for back-to-school merchandise—a practice they describe as standard. Within two weeks, preparations for Valentine's merchandise will begin.

"We prominently display seasonal merchandise in the front of the store to respond quickly to customer demand," Ms Ningi explained. "Parents appreciate the convenience of easily locating what they need, contributing to increased sales."

The shopping mood shifts as well; December is all about browsing and gift-buying, while January brings lists, sizes, and practicality. "Parents measure sleeves with a practiced eye, and children try shoes for comfort rather than style," Ms. Ningi added.

However, some parents find the timing tight. Ms Chawa Nfila expressed that balancing post-holiday budgets with ensuring children are ready for school can be challenging. "I find it easier to manage costs by reusing last year's supplies, handing down uniforms between siblings, and mainly buying essentials like socks," she shared.

Students, too, acknowledge the shift from holiday excitement to school readiness. Twelve-year-old Anaya Kgotla, clutching a new backpack, said, "while the excitement of gifts and gatherings fades, choosing a new uniform or fresh set of books brings a different kind of anticipation. It makes it feel like a new beginning, even though school is work; it is nice to start with new things."

His twin sister, Rashidah, echoed similar sentiments, "I am mostly excited about choosing a new backpack," she said, emphasising that new school wear ignites excitement and signals a fresh start.

The visual changes in stores serve as a reminder that early mornings and homework are just around the corner, reflecting the mental reset many experience as the new term approaches.

Another customer, Ms Lorraine Dire, stated that school preparations extend beyond shopping.

"Parents are re-establishing routines: setting bedtimes, organising study spaces, and helping children smoothly transition from holiday mode to classroom focus," she noted.

"School fees, uniforms, lunch boxes, and transport arrangements all become a reality at this time," Ms Dire remarked, adding that while the holiday sparkle may be shelved for another year, the move toward back-to-school season carries a different kind of optimism.

"It is less about glitter and more about possibilities: new lessons, new friendships, and new routines," she said, recognising that the transition serves as a gentle reminder that seasons change quickly, yet each presents opportunities to prepare and reset.

Imported bulls and heifers in good condition

The bulls and heifers purchased by the government from the United States and Australia over two years ago are in good condition at the Ramatlabama National Artificial Insemination Laboratory and Training Centre.

A total of 140 bulls and 21 heifers were imported from Texas, along with an additional 23 bulls and 68 heifers from Australia, all aimed at enhancing the genetic makeup of the local herd. However, some losses have been reported.

Mr Tirelo Leisi, the principal scientific officer at the Ministry of Lands and Agriculture, noted a mortality rate of three per cent among the bulls from Texas, translating to eight animals, along with four from Australia and one heifer.

On a positive note, the laboratory has seen the successful birth of 37 calves from various breeds of heifers through artificial insemination. Mr Leisi emphasised the importance of inseminating the heifers first to ensure their fertility rate, even though they were initially intended for embryo transfer for accelerated genetic progress.

Another development, he mentioned was the small stock laboratory, designed for semen and embryo transfer, has been completed at Ramatlabama.

"We just need more staff that will be dedicated to working with small stock," Mr Leisi said, indicating that some bucks from Lobu small stock farm in Middlepits will be utilised for semen collection.

Additionally, 66 bulls have been selected for training and semen tapping, with the Brahman breed identified as particularly challenging to train.

However, space has become a concern, as Mr Leisi explained that the 624-hectare farm is currently home to 305 live cattle, along with some small stock. **BOPA**

Phane harvesting: Lucrative yet demanding endeavour

They often engage in a bartering system, trading phane for food, drinks, and clothing.

While many celebrate the economic opportunities within phane harvesting, challenges persist.

Fellow harvesters, Ms Gobotsa Tsietsanang and Mr William Dingake, echoed the sentiment that the business was lucrative and involved unskilled labour, thereby presenting great profit potential.

However, Ms Tsietsanang, who hails from Moralane in the Mahalapye District, raised concerns about the darker side of the venture.

She described encounters with unscrupulous individuals who, under the guise of providing transportation, absconded with their harvested phane.

She reported that a team of 15 harvesters sought police assistance after falling victim to such deceit.

Access to essential resources also poses significant obstacles.

“We struggle with a lack of potable water and suitable transport,” she explained.

Medical emergencies can become dire due to the remote harvesting locations, where accessing help is a challenge.

Moreover, the absence of sanitation facilities raises environmental concerns, and the risk of getting lost or encountering

dangerous wildlife, such as snakes, adds another layer of danger,” she said.

Mr Dingake from Selebi Phikwe advocated for policy changes that would allow unemployed Batswana to harvest phane without requiring permits to alleviate poverty.

“Those struggling to feed their families often cannot afford the P115 permit fee,” he said, underscoring that many could benefit from the lucrative phane business.

Recently, over 400 individuals were engaged in harvesting phane at Rasetokwane lands, with another 600 at Mmakhumo cattleposts near Serule.

Despite the challenges, the potential for profit and a better life lingers as a bright prospect in the heart of Botswana’s harvesting season.

Even though phane harvesting is a profitable business, some farmers decry influx of harvestors at their farming areas.

A farmer in Tjikale cattlepost has voiced concerns over the surge of phane harvesters in the area, warning of potential environmental challenges and increased risks of animal health diseases.

The area, situated near the Serule-Mabeleapodi road, has recently become a popular camping spot for many phane harvesters.

Mr Benjamin Phole, speaking from his farm recently, acknowledged the economic advantages of phane harvesting but warned of its detrimental effects, particularly on cattle health.

Mr Phole, who observed an influx of harvesters from various regions, including some travelling from as far as Venda in South Africa, highlighted the issue of waste disposal, noting that harvesters had left litter scattered throughout the area, which could expose cattle to diseases such as measles.

Renminbi weakens against US Dollar

The central parity rate of the Chinese currency renminbi, or the yuan, weakened 14 pips to 7.0187 against the US Dollar Wednesday, according to the China Foreign Exchange Trade System.

In China's spot foreign exchange market, the renminbi/yuan is allowed to rise or fall by 2 percent from the central parity rate each trading day.

The central parity rate of the yuan against the US dollar is based on a weighted average of prices offered by market makers before the opening of the interbank market each business day.

China foreign exchange reserves rise in December 2025

China’s foreign exchange reserves totaled US\$3.3579 trillion at the end of December 2025, marking an increase of US\$11.5 billion, or 0.34 per cent, from the end of November, official data showed on Wednesday. The State Administration of Foreign Exchange stated that the US dollar index declined and global financial asset prices saw mixed movements last month, influenced by factors such as macro economic data and monetary policies in major economies.

Launched in 2022 by 33-year-old Bonolo Motlhale and her partner, 45-year-old Mokganedi Kelesitse, the grassroots venture has emerged as a model of village-level entrepreneurship. What began as a simple vision to create a community gathering space has evolved into a popular one-stop destination that supports local employment and keeps economic benefits circulating within the village.

Visitors are welcomed by the sight of cars gleaming in the sun at the community car wash, where seven local employees work diligently to restore vehicles to pristine condition.

Nearby, stalls overflow with gently used clothing from warm winter coats to trendy sneakers, attracting bargain-hunters in search of quality and affordability.

At the heart of the centre is the food court, where the enticing aromas of authentic Tswana dishes draw steady crowds.

In an interview with BOPA, Ms Motlhale said careful market research guided their decision to focus on popular favourites such as dikgobe, ledompi, bogobe jwa lerotse and the much-loved seswaa (slow-cooked pounded beef).

The menu also includes modern offerings such as juicy burgers, crispy chips and hearty platters, striking a balance between tradition and contemporary tastes.

“The food court is the heartbeat of our centre,” Ms Motlhale said. “It is filled with the comforting scents of home-cooked meals and the vibrant energy of a street-food market—a place where everyone benefits.”

The Irish Shopping Centre currently employs 15 people, including the founders.

He expressed concern over the dangers of plastics and gloves left behind, which might be ingested by livestock.

Additionally, the farmer pointed out that the presence of phane harvesters had led to vandalism of fences along the Serule-Tshimoyapula-Mabeleapodi road, allowing animals to stray and creating hazards for motorists.

In light of these developments, Mr Phole urged local authorities to monitor the situation.

He expressed fears that the area could become a breeding ground for illegal activities, including the

sale of illicit drugs. Seven staff members work at the car wash, while dedicated teams manage the clothing stalls and kitchen operations under the guidance of experienced supervisors.

Ms Motlhale attributed the centre’s success to discipline, passion and professionalism.

“We maintain strict kitchen hygiene, conduct daily financial reconciliations and keep meticulous records.

We have also invested heavily in staff training on customer service, food safety and operational skills,” she said.

To boost growth, the business has expanded into external catering for events, a move that has significantly increased revenue and strengthened confidence.

“That was a turning point for us,” she noted.

Despite competition from larger retailers nearby, the centre continues to thrive by building strong personal connections within the community.

Families often arrive for a car wash, stay for a meal, browse the clothing stalls and leave having met several everyday needs in one visit, while supporting local livelihoods.

“It’s more than just a business,” Ms Motlhale reflected.

“When the community collaborates together, we all benefit economically, socially and emotionally.”

At a time when village economies are seeking revitalisation, the Irish Shopping Centre is doing more than serving meals and polishing vehicles.

It is inspiring ambition and proving that meaningful success can grow from humble beginnings, one satisfied customer and one shiny car at a time. **BOPA**

He recommended that officials collaborate with the Tshimoyapula Conservation Trust, an organisation dedicated to preserving natural resources in the region, to address these issues.

Furthermore, Mr Phole suggested establishing designated camping sites for phane harvesters with proper refuse disposal facilities and toilets to reduce environmental contamination.

He raised suspicions that some foreigners may be harvesting phane illegally and selling it abroad, potentially costing Botswana significant revenue. **BOPA**

BNPC and SEZA partner to address productivity challenges

The Botswana National Productivity Centre (BNPC) and the Special Economic Zones Authority (SEZA) have partnered to enhance productivity across SEZA-supported investor projects, starting with a diagnostic review at the Selebi Phikwe Citrus (SPC) project.

The collaboration follows SEZA inspections that identified productivity gaps, particularly in skills among local workers. Already, Selebi Phikwe Citrus project is bedeviled with a challenge of unskilled fruit pickers, which reportedly cost the project P9 million. In an interview, SEZA acting deputy chief executive officer, Ms Tapiwa Masie emphasised the need for skilled labour to help investors meet international contractual obligations and achieve targets for investment and profitability.

She noted that SEZA’s licensing prioritises employment creation for Batswana, making productivity issues a key concern.

Ms Masie further explained that SEZA and BNPC partnership aimed to build requisite skills, not only at SPC, but across all SEZA

investors to support production and export goals.

For her part, BNPC’s acting executive director, Ms Matlho Seitshiro described the centre’s mandate to champion productivity at individual, firm, and sectoral levels. She highlighted consultancy services, policy advisory roles and productivity measurements, including upcoming launches of agricultural productivity statistics in January 2026 and a five-year national productivity data with projections in February 2026.

Ms Seitshiro acknowledged national challenges, citing a drop in labour productivity from 2.2 per cent in 2023 to 0.4 per cent in 2024, and total factor productivity

declining from -2 percent to -3.6 percent. She attributed labour productivity challenges to work ethic issues, worker motivation and performance management application as seen in the citrus project where there were observable differences in output between local and foreign worker and broader societal factors.

To address this, she said BNPC had launched a nationwide campaign to sensitise citizens on productivity’s importance. Ms Seitshiro noted Botswana ranked 68 out of 69 middle-income countries in worker motivation, stressing the urgency for improved self-motivation and competitiveness. **BOPA**

The Central Bank has reduced the rate at which Botswana buys foreign currency from commercial banks, lowering it from 7.5 per cent to 3 per cent from the central parity.

This adjustment remains largely unchanged from previous revisions made in July and is expected to enable local exporters to earn more Pula per unit of foreign currency.

It is also anticipated to strengthen the incentive for converting export proceeds into Pula and increase the supply of foreign currency.

According to the Ministry of Finance, the bank has maintained the current downward rate of crawl at 2.7 percent, reflecting the updated focused inflation differential between Botswana and its trading partner countries.

By keeping the sell rate at 7.5 percent, the government aims to encourage active interbank trading and limit reliance on the central bank for foreign exchange. This is expected to support the preservation and potential

accumulation of foreign exchange reserves.

Finance ministry statement highlights that these measures are designed to preserve domestic industry competitiveness in external markets and against imports, while supporting price stability and maintaining inflation within the 3-6 percent objective range. Moreover, the adjustments are intended to enhance local industry competitiveness, strengthen external sustainability, and safeguard the official foreign reserves.

This will reinforce the resilience of the exchange rate regime and preserve policy discretion.

The government reviews its exchange rate twice a year, making adjustments upwards or downwards through a crawling band exchange rate regime.

Under this framework, the Pula is pegged to a basket of currencies, including the South African rand. The next review of the Pula’s exchange rate is scheduled for June 2026. **BOPA**

Residents divided on proposed bill

Residents have voiced a spectrum of opinions regarding the proposed Economic Citizenship Bill, debated during the recent parliamentary session.

The Bill aims to offer citizenship and national identity cards to select foreign investors, a strategy intended to attract investment and diversify Botswana's economy.

At a recent kgotla meeting, presided over by Francistown West Member of Parliament, Mr Wynter Mmolotsi, local sentiments ranged from skepticism to optimism.

The highlighted the importance of civic engagement as residents navigated the complexities of the proposed legislation in search of a balance between investment and the safeguarding of national interests.

Mr Noah Majube, a resident of Somerset, expressed reservations about the Bill.

He fears that granting citizenship to foreign investors could lead to the appropriation of Batswana-owned properties.

"Botswana are a trusting and vulnerable nation that could easily be deceived into losing their land and other valuable assets.

If investors gain citizenship, we could end up being servants in our own land," he said.

Majube emphasised the importance of ensuring that any investment was distributed evenly across the country, particularly in the North West and North East regions, rather than concentrating solely on Gaborone and the southern areas.

Conversely, younger residents like Mr Kediretse Kediretse view the Bill favourably, highlighting its potential to alleviate unemployment among youth.

"It would be a wise move for investors to come and set up businesses here, as this will promote development and create jobs," he stated.

Support for the Bill was echoed by Ms Galenkgope Ludick, who believes it could provide much-needed revitalization for Botswana's struggling economy.

"Attracting foreign investors can help revive economic growth and stimulate development," she remarked.

During the meeting, Mr Mmolotsi presented the Economic Citizenship Bill, also known as Citizenship by Investment, outlining its goal to attract multi-billion pula investors to diversify key sectors such as tourism, agriculture, infrastructure, and mining.

He assured residents that only investors with substantial capital and a clean criminal record would be considered for citizenship.

Additionally, Mr Mmolotsi announced the rebranding of the Ipelegeng programme to Ikageng, with a renewed focus on skills development.

Participants will undergo training in various skills and receive a monthly allowance of P2,500.

Lemang Dijo uptake low in Mogwalale - Dikoloti

The uptake of Lemang Dijo programme in Mogwalale lands is falling short of the Member of Parliament for Good Hope/Mmathethe, Dr Edwin Dikoloti's expectations.

Launched last year, the initiative aims to support less resourced farmers with up to one hectare of land, yet only seven has been utilised out of registered 68 hectares.

During an address to the residents of Mogwalale on

Tuesday, Dr Dikoloti, who also serves as the Assistant Minister of Lands and Agriculture, expressed concern over the limited utilisation of the programme. He noted that it was worrying to see so few farmers showing interest in an initiative designed to bolster their livelihoods through agriculture.

"Farming has been a crucial means of livelihood for many Batswana and it is worrying that only a small portion of farmers in Mogwalale have taken advantage of the opportunity," Dr Dikoloti stated. He urged lfarmers to engage with the programme

and benefit from the available resources.

In a separate meeting held in Gamokoto, residents voiced their frustrations over the delays in the allocation of residential plots and ploughing fields. One resident, Mr Alfred Class, shared his experience, revealing that he had applied for a residential plot two decades ago and was still waiting for an allocation.

Responding to the concerns, Rolong Landboard chairperson Ms Gloria Segokgo assured the community that efforts were being made to expedite the land allocation process. **BOPA**

Koma burial tomorrow

When the opposition forces that coalesced into the Umbrella for Democratic Change (UDC) eventually transformed the Botswana political landscape with a historic electoral victory over the Botswana Democratic Party (BDP) in the October 2024 elections, it was after nigh on six decades of work. That foundational work the proverbial 'mofufutso wa phatlha' (the brow of the sweat) of opposition politics, was done by veterans, among them Lenyeletse Koma who passed away on New Year's Eve.

The 86 year-old political stalwart dedicated his earlier adult years to developing the politics of one of the components of the UDC, the Botswana National Front (BNF) and thus helped shape an alternative to the Botswana Democratic Party (BDP) during the country's nascent years of party politics. His younger brother, Mr Olekotse Koma, said in an interview that his elder brother, a nephew of BNF party founder and chief ideologue, the late Dr Kenneth Koma, was the first of the eight children of Mr Ramherong Koma, whose family originated at Ditlharapa Ward, Serowe, but settled in Mahalapye.

"Lenyeletse studied at Moeng College alongside the likes of former president Dr Festus Mogae and former cabinet minister and real estate businessman, Mr David Magang. My brother later proceeded to study at university

level, up to post graduate masters studies in Soviet Russia, earning qualifications in economics and accounts," Mr Koma details.

The 1960s saw the centre-right BDP, a moderate political organisation built on conservatism, the principles of democracy and development, and the consultation (therisanyo) of the kgotla system, national cohesion (kagisano) defeating the more radical, Pan-Africanist and African socialist based Botswana People's Party (BPP).

Dr Koma, who returned from studies in Moscow to witness the BDP victory in the March 1965 general elections, founded the BNF, as a mass democratic united front of different class interest groups, with their minimum programme, seeking to unseat the BDP in pursuit of a "national democratic revolution," social justice and labour rights.

"Lenyeletse was one of the early BNF stalwarts, alongside the likes of his uncle Dr Koma, Mareledi Giddie, Klaas Motshidisi, Obonetse Menyatso and others. He worked with them to teach the BNF doctrine in party study groups, and went around campaigning to build the movement," said Mr Koma.

Lenyeletse Koma further became one of the founders of Mahalapye Secondary School, which gave an opportunity to pupils from different backgrounds, including those who could not be absorbed into government schools.

"Lenyeletse taught at

Mahalapye secondary, which drew learners from as far afield as Maun, some of whom were not placed into secondary schools after their primary school leaving examinations. But Mahalapye secondary worked on building the academic potential of these students as well as their vocational training," Mr Koma added.

He later founded a construction company, which among its project got involved in the building of a primary school in Marapong.

Former Lobatse mayor, Mr David Maswabi added that Lenyeletse was one of the activists who inspired them and guided his generation's activism within the BNF.

"We were coming from Kanye and Lobatse, and we had some of these party elders from Mahalapye and Palapye and we often engaged, as they guided us steadily into party policy," Mr Maswabi revealed.

After disagreements within the BNF, Lenyeletse founded the Botswana Labour Party, which struggled to gain political traction in the 1990s.

In recent years, he focused on Christian evangelism, as a bishop of a church in Lobatse.

In particular, he preached against the perils of alcohol abuse and how it derails the future of young people.

He will be laid to rest Saturday in Lobatse, where he had settled over the years. **BOPA**

Where clean water flows, disease recedes

ZANZIBAR

With a gentle turn of the tap, clean water gushes out—a sight that villagers in Chaani had long thought impossible.

Located in Zanzibar’s North Region on Unguja Island, Chaani struggled for decades with unsafe water sources. That reality began to change in 2025.

“For many years, water was our biggest problem,” said 53-year-old Haji Makame Omari, a father of eight and resident of Chaani.

“We fetched water from rivers and that is where we got infected with schistosomiasis. Now we no longer go there.

We feel safe,” he said, crediting a China-aided schistosomiasis control project jointly implemented with the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Zanzibar government in Tanzania.

In Chaani, one of the project’s beneficiaries, clean water now flows morning, noon and night, a simple change that has transformed daily life and helped curb one of the region’s most persistent diseases, schistosomiasis.

By combining safe water supply systems with disease treatment, snail control and health education, the project has significantly reduced infection rates while improving livelihoods.

Schistosomiasis, a waterborne parasitic disease, has long burdened Zanzibar, particularly rural areas, where residents relied on rivers and unsafe wells, exposing themselves to infection.

Mothers like 30-year-old Mwanaisha Abdallah, also a Chaani villager, recall frequent hospital visits for their children due to water-related illnesses.

For women, who bore much of the burden of fetching water and caring for children, the change has been transformative.

“Before, we struggled a lot,” Abdallah said. “Now I just take my bucket, walk a short distance, and come back. I can grow vegetables, keep chickens, and wash clothes easily. Happiness in my family has increased.”

Behind the visible changes lies a decade-long cooperation effort. According to Wang Wei, team leader of the five-member Chinese expert group and a professor at China’s Jiangsu Institute of Parasitic Diseases, the cooperation began after Zanzibar sought international assistance in 2014, when schistosomiasis prevalence remained high despite earlier control efforts.

“China’s experience in schistosomiasis control had already proven effective and scalable,” Wang said.

Based on shared commitment, China, the WHO, and the Zanzibar government signed a memorandum of understanding and the project was officially launched in 2016.

According to project data, Phase I of the project, implemented on Pemba Island from 2017 to 2020, reduced infection rates in demonstration areas from 8.92 percent to 0.64 percent, meeting WHO standards for eliminating schistosomiasis as a public health problem.

Phase II, launched in 2023, expanded coverage to Unguja Island.

The results have been striking. Baseline surveys showed an

infection rate of about 1.23 percent. After two and a half years, the latest data indicate a drop to just 0.15 percent, well below the WHO threshold of one percent.

A key innovation in Phase II has been the construction of safe water supply systems. Five projects—four in Pemba Island and one in Unguja Island—now serve about 30,000 people in total.

In Unguja alone, 18,000 residents benefit from clean, accessible water, cutting off disease transmission at its source while also reducing other water-related illnesses such as intestinal

infections and cholera.

“This is a genuine livelihood project,” Wang said. “It not only controls disease but also improves daily life.”

Rashid Kassim Juma, project coordinator from Zanzibar’s Ministry of Water, Energy, and Minerals, described the initiative as “a big help from China.”

“Before, people fetched water from ponds and unsafe wells. Now they have fresh water. We are very thankful to China and hope to see more projects like this,” Juma said.

Beyond infrastructure, the project has focused on

sustainability. Community hospitals and volunteers were trained, health education bases and demonstration schools were established, and monitoring was gradually integrated into Zanzibar’s health information systems.

The next milestone is set for January 2026, when a fully digital schistosomiasis surveillance and response system goes live.

Once cases are detected at the community level, reports can be sent instantly via computer or mobile phone, triggering rapid responses and preventing outbreaks.

“This will be one of the first schistosomiasis information systems in Africa,” Wang said. “It has the potential to be replicated in other Belt and Road partner countries.”

Back in Chaani, the impact is already visible. Small vegetable gardens have sprung up around homes, made possible by nearby water sources.

The small square where the water tap stands has become one of the liveliest areas in the village.

“We are truly grateful. This water has protected our health and changed our lives,” Omari said. *Xinhua*

This unit will have twenty (20) Tanzanian top bee hives placed under shades of trees. Bee keeping workshop housing the honey processing plant.

Separatist fighters killed in Cameroon ambush

A soldier was injured in the operation and is receiving treatment, the source said. Cameroon's English-speaking regions of Northwest and Southwest have been gripped by an armed conflict since 2017, as separatist groups seek to establish an independent state in the two regions. Xinhua

Thousands flee Kordofan region - UN

NEW YORK

Escalating violence in Sudan, particularly across the Kordofan region, continues to put civilians at extreme risk and drive new waves of displacement, a UN spokesperson said on Tuesday.

Between October 25 and December 30, 2026, some 65,000 individuals were displaced from multiple locations across the Kordofan region, Stephane Dujarric, spokesperson for the UN secretary-general, told a daily briefing, citing the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs.

In South Kordofan state, the displacement has increased sharply in recent days, he said, pointing to estimates by the International Organization for Migration that between December

31, 2025 and January 4 this year, violence drove nearly 1,000 people to flee in Quoz locality, Kadugli town and Berdab village.

On Monday, another 2,000 people were uprooted from Um Dam Haj Ahmed locality in North Kordofan state, said the spokesperson, adding that UN humanitarian in the country reported a drone attack on Tuesday in the state's capital, El Obeid, which allegedly claimed the lives of 13 civilians, including children.

"Once again, the UN reiterates its urgent call for an immediate cessation of hostilities and the protection of civilians," said Dujarric, adding that the United Nations also reiterates the need for rapid, safe and sustained humanitarian access so aid can reach those in need Xinhua .

UN believes in territorial integrity sanctity

NEW YORK

The United Nations - UN - believes in the sanctity of the territorial integrity of its member states and that is a position of principle the world body would continue to defend.

Responding to a question on Greenland from Xinhua during a daily briefing on Tuesday, the spokesperson for the UN secretary-general, Stephane Dujarric said the UN has noted with concern the rhetoric around Greenland.

"But I can tell you that our position is one of principle and one that we will continue to defend, that the secretary

general will continue to push both publicly and privately and is that we believe in the sanctity of the territorial integrity of member states," Dujarric said.

Unites States (US) President Donald Trump said in a telephone interview on Sunday with The Atlantic that the US "absolutely" needs Greenland "for defense."

Since taking office again in January 2025, Trump has repeatedly expressed interest in gaining control of Greenland, saying that he would not rule out using "military or economic coercion" to achieve that goal. Xinhua

Prefect killed in Niger

Seven people, including Torodi Prefect Captain Chaibou Mali and his family, were killed in a terrorist attack in western Niger, national television Tele Sahel reported on Tuesday.

The Defense and Security Forces responded swiftly to the overnight attack on Sunday, killing one terrorist on the spot and several others as they attempted to flee after a targeted airstrike.

An air-ground operation has been launched to "dismantle terrorist cells operating in the area, neutralize their local networks and sustainably degrade their operational capabilities," the report said.

Troops recovered a motorcycle registered in a neighboring country, a weapon and a communications radio.

The motorcycle provided "tangible evidence" that the attack was part of "a structured, cross-border terrorist dynamic benefiting not only from local complicity but also from logistical, informational and operational support amounting to a genuine strategic sponsor," it said. Xinhua

South Africa rejects US military action

South African President Cyril Ramaphosa on Tuesday expressed deep concern over the recent U.S military action in Venezuela and called for the immediate release of Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro and his wife.

Speaking at the 31st annual commemoration of Joe Slovo held at Avalon Cemetery in Soweto, a suburb of Johannesburg, Ramaphosa described Washington's action as a violation of Venezuela's sovereignty and territorial integrity.

"We reject utterly the actions that the United States has embarked upon and stand with the people of Venezuela, and we demand the release of President Maduro and his wife as well," he said. Ramaphosa also urged the UN Security Council to act decisively to uphold international law and maintain international peace and security. Xinhua

Mohurutshe ready to rule entrepreneurial space

A strong commitment to his community in Thamaga, coupled with a bold entrepreneurial vision, are the forces that drive Thuso ‘Varaam’ Mohurutshe’s dream of cementing his position as a force to reckon with in the local entrepreneurial space.

His sights firmly set on growing his array of budding businesses, Mohurutshe is committed to do all it takes to ensure his ventures pass the test of time.

His legacy in the business space leads back to the COVID-19 era - a period during which he founded Food Hub, a food joint located in Gaborone’s Block 5 area.

“During COVID-19, everyone had ample time to think of ideas to make money, and I implemented this idea of an eatery; buying a braai stand, a fryer and some benches for the seating area,” explained Mohurutshe, recounting how the business came into being.

The streetside food joint was a response to a fierce fire that had been burning in his mind; a fire that had seen him dabble in the entertainment scene from his boyhood.

It is the same fire that also saw him later try his hand in logistics.

Mohurutshe, one of the new Gen Zs in Botswana’s entrepreneurship sphere, is resolute in his desire to see his efforts evolve into sustainable wealth.

His journey, before and post-COVID-19, offers remarkable lessons on strategic diversification, brand discipline and visionary leadership.

Growing up in Thamaga, Mohurutshe’s life was characteristic of that of any other boy, but along the way he developed an interest in dance.

“I had a passion for Sbhujwa dancing, which introduced me to the entertainment industry,” he said, outlining how this step in his journey of life saw him later work his way up

the local entertainment ladder.

He cut his teeth at Kings Bar Thamaga, and then moved to Riverside Bar under the management of JJ Soloko, after which he proceeded to Groove Lounge, where he continued to make his presence felt.

Working at these bars launched his name in the entertainment industry as a promoter, leading to him later working with Gaabo Motho Music Festival during its second annual gig.

“During the early stages of my work with Gaabo Motho Music Festival in 2019, I developed a concept called Thamaga Food Festival which later transformed to Food Hub Sundays. In 2022, I then came up with something fresh, Into Africa Picnic festival,” he said.

For every project that Mohurutshe puts his mind on, he produces a diverse brand outlook, be it the vibrant pulse of Into Africa Picnic, the calm ambiance of Food Hub or the sense of reliability of his much-loved school transport venture, his crafts share one core value; community connection.

Consistency in his projects, particularly the Into Africa catalogue has over the years increased his presence in the entertainment industry and solidified his status as an inarguably reputable promoter.

The brand has recognised the need to provide a stage for local creativity to thrive, and is setting itself apart

as a platform that will undoubtedly nudge local creatives towards them finally being able to reach greater heights.

He has also provided a vast market for the local creative crafts, further growing his community’s creativity across a wider audience.

Although Into Africa Picnic festival has been doing well for the past four years, the persistent lack of sponsors is weighing Mohurutshe down. He has been curating the event with zero sponsorship since start, and in the entertainment space, such a move is unsustainable, especially for an event that took off on the wings of self-sponsorship.

“Doing this event without sponsors is exhausting and to say I would do it again this year with zero sponsorship would be a lie,” Mohurutshe said, explaining how discouraging it was to be approaching potential sponsors year in and year out with no positive outcome.

Despite this hiccup, his establishments give him a sense of pride. To him they are more than just businesses; they are social spaces where people come together, celebrate, and experience local culture.

Their focus on fostering human connection has made them relatable and authentic, a key ingredient in modern marketing.

His success story is tied to his commitment to his community where he also does charity work.

“I am a giver, and it is easy for me to give back to my community and share with them the little that I make out of what I do,” he said, noting that he never hesitates to assist as he strongly believes in giving without expecting anything in return.

“I do not do it for the spotlight, but for the good of my community and what I feel is right at that moment.”

It is because of the sense of pride that comes with being able to positively impact his community that he is determined to push ahead with his combination of showbiz and entrepreneurship even in the face of challenges. **BOPA**

Louis Dingalo, known to fans by his musical alter ego, Louis Collimore, has released his debut single, War Cry, which dropped recently under the German label, Electric Friends Music.

By 2020, he had climbed to the No. 1 spot on the ReverbNation UK Electronic Dance chart and continued to build international credibility.

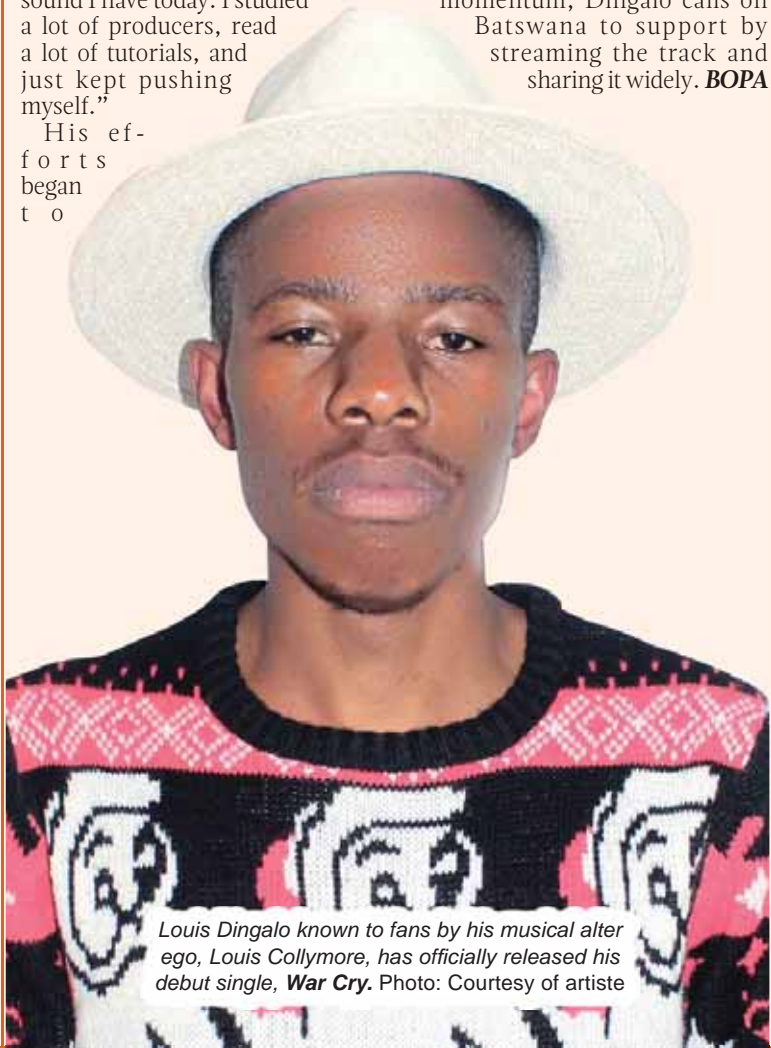

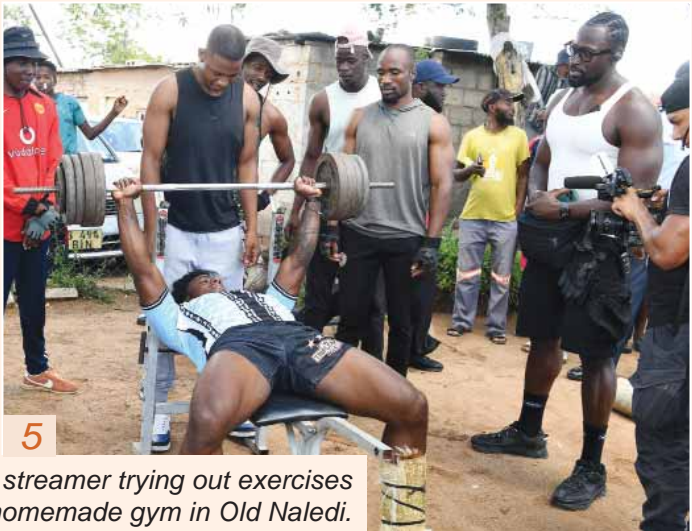

Botswana will from today (January 9) host the 2026 International Tennis Federation (ITF) / Confederation of African Tennis (CAT) Southern Africa Junior Championships, which will run until January 17 in Gaborone. The zonal tournament features Under-14 and Under-16 players competing in both individual and team events, bringing together some of the region's most promising young tennis talent. Botswana Tennis Association (BTA) vice president Nonofu Othusitse has said the championship was expected to attract about 150 players and coaches from across Southern Africa. Participating countries that have confirmed their attendance include Angola, eSwatini, Lesotho, Madagascar, Malawi, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Othusitse said Botswana, as the host nation, was allowed

to register up to six players per age group and gender, while other participating countries are limited to three players each. He added that Botswana would be represented in both the Under-14 and Under-16 team competitions for boys and girls. “In preparation for the championship, our players attended training camps held from December 15 to 19, and from January 5 to 8,” he said. Othusitse noted that hosting the tournament aligned with the Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) 2028 strategy and the BTA's strategic objective of attracting and hosting high-profile sporting events. He said the championship provided an opportunity for Botswana to demonstrate its commitment to youth development and sporting

excellence, while also boosting tourism and international visibility as families, coaches and officials travel to support the athletes. Othusitse also said the event was also expected to inspire local players through exposure to high-level competition and strengthen regional ties. “It will further enhance Botswana's reputation as a capable and welcoming host of international sporting events,” he said. Sabalenka, Rybakina through to quarterfinals

World No. 1 Aryna Sabalenka and fifth-ranked Elena Rybakina reached the quarterfinals at the Brisbane International by winning in straight sets at the Australian Open warm-up event on Thursday. Sabalenka, the defending champion in Brisbane, triumphed 6-3, 6-3 in one hour and 19 minutes against Sorana Cirstea in their round of 16 match. After breaking Cirstea's serve three times in the opening set, Sabalenka required six break points across two games in the

second set before converting to take a decisive lead. Speaking on court after the match, Sabalenka said that Cirstea had pushed her hard. “Especially in the second set, it was a really great level from her. I'm super happy I was able to close this match in straight sets,” she said. Sabalenka has now won 35 matches and lost two in Australia since the start of 2023, a run that has included two Australian Open titles, with the only defeats coming in finals at the Brisbane International in 2024 and Australian Open in 2025. Rybakina, who ended 2025 by defeating Sabalenka to win the title

at the WTA Finals, beat world No. 25 Paula Badosa 6-3, 6-2 in one hour and 25 minutes on Thursday to extend her winning streak to 13 matches. The Kazakh fell behind 0-2 in the first set, but won 12 of the next 15 games, hitting 24 winners for the match. “It was not easy, I started a little bit slow and was struggling on my serve too, but I'm happy that I managed to win,” she said. Sabalenka will play either Diana Shnaider or reigning Australian Open champion Madison Keys in the quarterfinals, while Rybakina will face Ekaterina Alexandrova or Karolina Muchova. Xinhua



Branch seeks redemption in Dakar Rally

After a difficult outing in last year's edition of the world's toughest off-road race, the FIA/FIM Dakar World Rally-Raid Championship (W2RC), local biking sensation Ross Branch has returned to the 2026 Dakar Rally determined to redeem himself.

The rally, which got underway on January 3 in Yanbu, Saudi Arabia, marks Branch's seventh appearance at the iconic event. Ahead of the race, Branch dismissed last season's setbacks, saying they would not define his performance this year.

He expressed confidence in his Hero 450 Rally bike, powered by a 449.5cc single-cylinder engine, which has been extensively refined by the Hero Motorsports Team Rally.

Branch said the improved machine would enable him to tackle the rally's demanding terrain, ranging from towering sand dunes and craggy mountains to vast open plains.

Nicknamed the "Ferrari of the Kalahari" by his fans,

Branch praised his team for their meticulous preparation and vowed to mount a strong challenge as he seeks to reclaim the W2RC Championship crown he won in 2024.

"The team definitely deserves a good result. That is what we are going to do. We are going to give it everything we have got," said Branch.

The former multiple winner of the Toyota 1000 Desert Race, popularly known as Mantshwabisi, finished seventh in both stages two and three.

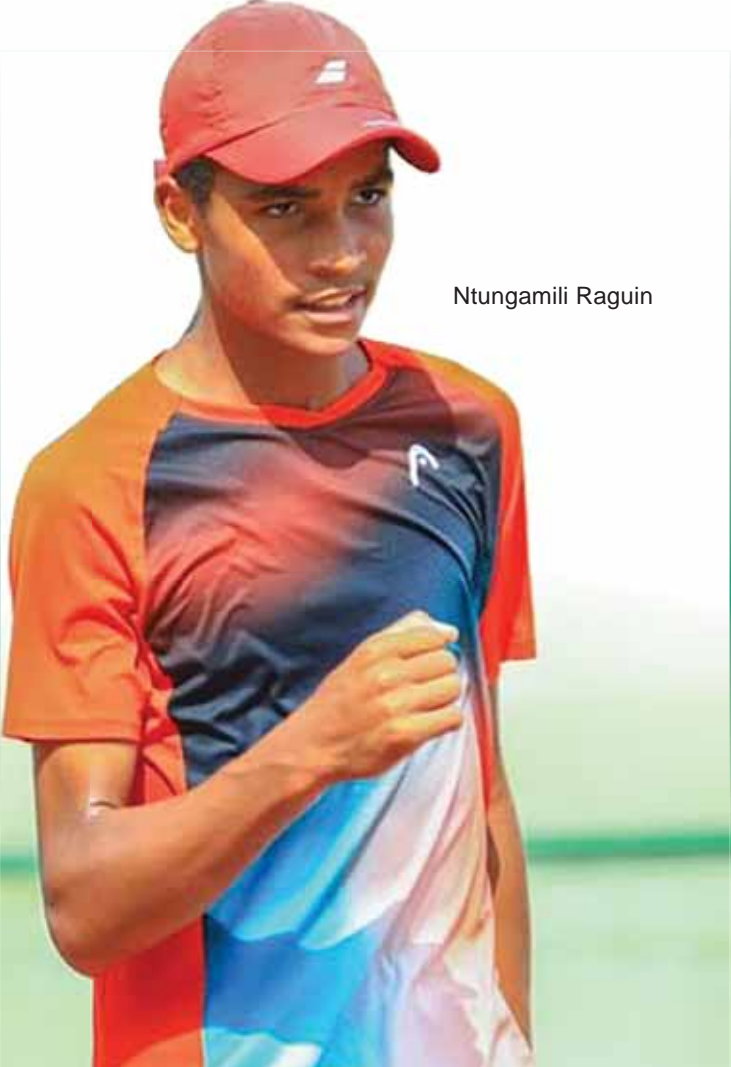
However, by Wednesday, he began to build momentum, mixing it up with the leading riders in the competition.

In stage four, Branch finished fourth on his Hero bike, trailing three Monster Energy Honda HRC riders led by Spain's Tosha Schareina, followed by American Ricky Brabec, who edged out compatriot Skyler Howes amid heavy dust conditions.

Stage four also marked Monster Energy Honda HRC's first podium sweep of the 2026 Dakar Rally. **BOPA**

Raguin makes history

Ntungamili Raguin has etched his name into Botswana's sporting history books after becoming the first Motswana tennis player to qualify for the Australian Open Junior Championships qualifiers.

The prestigious qualifiers will be held from January 12 to 15 at Melbourne Park in Australia. Ntungamili earned his spot following an impressive run on the International Tennis Federation (ITF) junior circuit.

He made his intentions clear last year by winning the J100 Nairobi tournament in Kenya, as well as the J60 and J100 tournaments hosted in Botswana.

His strong performances enabled him to break into the ITF World Junior Top 100, qualifying him for the Australian Open junior qualifiers. According to the latest ITF rankings released on Monday, Ntungamili is ranked 93rd in the world with 519 points, after winning five World Junior singles titles in 2025.

Botswana Tennis Association (BTA) president Oaitse Thipe said the achievement was historic, noting that Botswana had never before had a junior player compete at the Australian Open.

Thipe said they are extremely happy because this is history in the making. With Ntungamili's hard work, resilience and focus, they are confident he would produce positive results.

He also highlighted progress in wheelchair tennis, revealing that Botswana's wheelchair tennis player Omphile Botlhasitse is currently ranked number one in Africa in the ITF Junior rankings and 14th in the world in the girls' category.

"She needs to compete in about nine more tournaments to push for a Top 10 world ranking, which would qualify her for Grand Slam events such as the Junior Australian Open next year," he said.

However, Thipe noted that wheelchair tennis was an expensive sport due to specialised equipment and travel requirements.

He therefore appealed for sponsorship and support to help Botlhasitse realise her dreams. **BOPA**
