'Road project progress satisfactory'

GOODHOPE - The works completed on the district's road infrastructure project have been reported as satisfactory by Good Hope/Mmathethe council chairperson, Mr Daniel Nkwane.

Addressing the full council session on Monday, Mr Nkwane

He noted that the project was currently on schedule, with overall progress at 92 per cent.

He said that amongst outstanding works construction of failed sections at Leporung and Dikhukhung, drainage works at Tshidilamolomo and building of Mabule/Banyana farms culvert, while the Good Hope-Kgoro-Gathwane Road was complete and opened to traffic.

The chairperson also said that OPRC package 2 lot 2 awarded

to Tau grading and building construction at the sum of P653, 650,481.10 and commenced on April 8 2024 was currently behind schedule at 41 per cent compared to the envisaged 49 per cent. It is scheduled to run over

Mr Nkwane said construction of lot 2 which covered over 57.7 kilometers of road across various villages in the district, with the amount of work already done, the contractor would deliver the project on time and on budget.

Mr Nkwane pointed out that

works Sheepfarm Road had already started while Gamajaalela road was almost finished with a substantial section already open to the public.

On other projects, he said construction of Metlojane, Hebron, Borobadilepe Mokatako road was yet to commence, adding that the currently contractor was constructing detour road while awaiting the approval of the impact assessment for the proposed burrow pits. BOPA

Councillors approve Senonnori as name for new school

MAUN - North West District Council has officially approved the name Senonnori for the new primary school currently under construction in Senonnori ward, Maun.

The decision was made during a special full council session, where councillors unanimously endorsed the name confirmation that the proper procedures outlined in national guidelines had been followed.

According to the council, the process adhered to Section 8.0 of the National Guideline on Naming of Streets, Roads, Public Facilities, and Localities.

This section stipulates that authorities must designate names for public streets, roads, local government facilities, open spaces, and cemeteries through formal council resolutions.

Councillors also learnt that also learnt that a kgotla meeting with the community, village leadership, Ward Development Committee (WDC) for naming proposal was held on the March 13 and the name, Senonnori was approved through voting out of the four suggested names of Balusi Mhaladi, Mpho Motsamai and Masake Jobe.

It was also informed that the application was presented to Physical Planning Committee on their sitting July 3 and they resolved to approve the name Senonnori Primary School as it was selected by the majority.

councillors However, appreciated the decision by residents and agreed upon the name even though some questioned the meaning of Senonnori but they were advised to engaged the ward leadership on the history of the ward.

Meanwhile, recently, the council chairman, Mr Itumeleng Kelebetseng told media that the construction of new primary school was almost complete as currently the contractor was attending to the defects and tidying up the site in preparation for handover.

The project, he said was 98 per cent complete and the contractor was completing storm water drainage and steel tanks.

The school is being constructed into two packages with package one comprising of construction of academic facilities which has been awarded to LERS Electrical at a total cost of P56, 874, 127.61 and expenditure to date is P51, 456, 752.43.

The project started on the January 8 2024 and was due for completion on July 13 this yaear but experienced delay.

Package two which comprise of construction of staff housing facilities has been awarded to Black Rubbie Properties at a total cost of P25, 000, 000.00 and expenditure to date is P11, 105, 973.85 while the project is 65 per cent complete.

The project commenced on January 22 2024 and is scheduled to be completed on the September

The school is expected to reduce the long distance that learners have been traveling to access education.

On other issues, councillors formed a council company which will serve as an investment wing aimed to generate revenue for the council.

The council chairman, Mr Kelebetseng stated that the formation of the company followed a directive from the minster of Local Government and Traditional Affairs urging local authorities to establish business wings to generate income and become less dependent on government subsidies.

He said the initiative would indeed help to boost sources of revenue for the council considering the fact that the council has not been able to adequately undertake some developmental projects due to strained budget and the Revenue Support Grant that has been declining with every financial

"We need to seek alternative revenue sources to overcome financial challenges and fund development projects aimed to benefit our communities," he

Councillors also endorsed changes in the standing order. They also elected new council committees.

However, councillor for Chanoga/Samedupi ward, Mr Nico Folae proposed that sitting allowances for councillors be suspended for the next 12 months since the council was currently faced with financial constraints.

By so doing, he said the council could be able to save money and channel it towards pressing issues. **BOPA**

Rise in sexual offences against children worrisome

GOOD HOPE - Good Hope Mmathethe District is facing a disturbing trend of high numbers of sexual offences against children, says council chairperson Mr Daniel Nkwane during a full council session on Monday.

Mr Nkwane said that the social and community development recorded 59 cases of sexual abuse against children in the recent quarter.

The breakdown includes 15 cases of rape, one attempted rape, and 43 cases of defilement.

In response, the district has taken a step by convening its firstever conference involving key stakeholders in child welfare.

The meeting brought together social workers, police officers, and legal professionals collaborate on strategies combat and address these violations.

Council officials emphasised the importance of a united approach to safeguard children and prevent further incidents of abuse.

"The purpose of the conference was to update each other on case status in the district, share experiences and challenges and map the way forward towards improving case management",

said Mr Nkwane. The chairperson said that just like the rest of the country, the district was struggling with the scourge of gender-based violence.

He urged councillors and the district leadership to rally constituents to unite and stand against GBV..

Mr Nkwane said gender office in partnership with Minister's Fraternal also launched a week of prayer against GBV across schools and government departments.

Govt finalises National **Artificial Intelligence Policy**

GABORONE - Government is working on finalising a National Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy, Assistant Minister of Communications and Innovation Mr Shawn Ntlhaile has said.

Speaking at a two-day Botswana Tech Summit held under the theme: Technology. Development, Ntlhaile said this came after an AI Readiness Foundation initiative together with UNESCO, which verified Botswana's readiness to AI technologies in terms of methods, inclusivity, security, and alignment with the national development aspirations.

"Artificial intelligence has joined the ranks of great human inventions that have reshaped society. So, as a country, we are keen to harness the full potential of AI while safeguarding against its risks," said Mr Ntlhaile adding that government was supportive to home grown AI solutions tailored to Botswana's challenges, from livestock technology, climate modelling to indigenous language processing.

He further said government was actively shaping AI governance frameworks, promoting ethical use of data and drafting new policies on cyber security and digital services.

The assistant minister also said government was exploring the integration of AI in agriculture to predict cross-fields and manage foothills, piloting AI for health diagnostics in remote periods, and that soon more public services would be digitised; licensing to social welfare, with machine learning driving efficiency and responsiveness.

"We are fostering cross-sector collaboration between academia, industry, and government to unlock new discoveries and scale innovation, and recognise that with great technology comes responsibility.

Aligned with international standards, Mr Ntlhaile said committed Botswana was

to being a regional voice on responsible AI, collaborating with global partners to ensure that progress did not leave the values of Batswana behind.

He said the summit aligned with the vision and action pillars of the Transformation Agenda, directly supporting Botswana's push to reduce, organise and diversify into policy-based sectors.

He also said the summit acted as a catalyst for foreign direct investment and local private sector development.

Mr Ntlhaile further said the launch of Botswana Satellite recently in US was a symbol of the nation's aspiration to become Southern Africa's digital hub.

He said the Satellite launch was a declaration that Botswana was open to global innovators, researchers, and pioneers; that Botswana was building digital infrastructure necessary host data centres, cloud service providers, and AI-driven enterprises that would shape the

"Technology is no longer an accessory to the economy, it is an engine. We are actively courting foreign direct investment in artificial intelligence, fintech, and cloud services. We are building an ecosystem where global innovators will find not only opportunity, but infrastructure, talent, and policy support," he

Vice President Ndaba Gaolathe said the future of Botswana was on online, "in the cloud, in the ambitions of young people, in the brilliance of our coders, our creators, our innovators."

He said the future of Botswana was in her capability to turn her digital potential into a national asset.

"We must now pivot, from sparkle to spectrum. From the limited brilliance of a single gem to the infinite possibilities of an interconnected, diversified economy driven by knowledge and innovation," he said.

As Botswana moves from

to a productive and technology diversification, he said Botswana Tech Summit gave a unique opportunity to explore how digital tools, data and innovation could be used to achieve the transformation.

Mr Gaolathe said government was forging a Botswana that was greener, healthier, and digitally empowered and a nation in full alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Moreover, he said Botswana should localise and scale on lessons and aspirations from countries such as Estonia, Rwanda, Kenya and India who used technology to transform their economies, even under difficult circumstances Botswana.

Nevertheless, he said through SmartBots programme, Botswana was already taking steps.

"Through this programme, government was deploying highspeed internet infrastructure to cover more than 80 per cent of our population. But access alone is not enough, we must ensure that every Motswana, regardless of where they live, can use that access to create value," Mr Gaolathe said.

He said government's vision was to build an inclusive digital economy that created opportunity, enhances efficiency, and reduced inequality; with policies geared toward attracting investment into fintech, agritech, clean energy, health tech and creative industries.

To achieve this, he said, government was seeking strategic and transformative values-aligned partnerships with companies such as Microsoft, Huawei, AfriLabs, Y-Combinator, and the African Fintech Network to support startup ecosystem; whilst engaging 'our SADC neighbours and regional institutions to develop shared digital policies, common protection data standards and collaborative innovation programmes.' 

GABORONE - Ministry of Health has resorted to adopting strategic steps, such as reprioritising to redirect funds where possible to allow provision of medical commodities.

Answering a question in Parliament, Minister Dr Stephen Modise therefore called for community involvement and participation on how they would equitably distribute health care services across the entire country.

"I wish to reiterate once again my plea that we put our collective efforts towards finding a solution to this crisis of medicinal shortage," he pleaded.


Addressing health care services challenges in Kgatleng East constituency, Dr Modise said the constituency's drug availability was at 69.7 per cent while the Central Medical Stores (CMS) was at 55 per cent against a national target of 97 per cent.

He said shortage of drugs was attributed to low stock levels at CMS, mainly due to financial constraints.

Dr Modise further said Kgatleng East had a total number of nine health facilities, comprising of three clinics and six health posts.

He said there was one 24-hour facility at Oodi with maternity and staff complement of about 21 nurses, while other clinics had at least five to seven nurses and the health posts had at least two nurses each and two resident doctors based in Mathubudukwane and Oodi.

The minister noted that those health workers were part of the personnel transferred from the

Government to upgrade Maun to city

GABORONE - Following requests from other councils to upgrade certain villages to towns, government has acceded to the request to upgrade Maun to a city.

This was revealed by Minister of Local Government and Traditional Affairs, Mr Ketlhalefile Motshegwa when responding to a question in Parliament on Tuesday.

He said the upgrading exercise commenced with consultations by the local authority on May to pave way for inclusive consultations with all stakeholders and members of the community.

The minister said the initial projected timelines were to complete the consultation phase, which formed the baseline expected by August, but would be subjected to review due to other overlapping activities.

He said the upgrading of a village to a town or city was work in progress whose speed would be determined by the availability of all the needed resources during the planning processes.

Mr Motshegwa further explained that for Maun to attain full international city recognition, more resources would be needed, therefore it would also be important to take into consideration the current fiscal situation.

Highlighting why government acceded to the request, he said the current level of infrastructure development in Maun qualified it to be a city as per the Botswana National Spatial Plan (NSP) 2036 and owing to its unique ecological attributes.

He said the Maun Development Plan 2023-2043, which was aligned to the NSP 2036, would promote and capitalise on the local tourism potential and called for a deliberate intention to plan and govern it as a full tourism destination.

He said the spatial plans emphasised on the uniqueness of Maun and assigned it to high level of national urban status in the form of a tourism city as opposed to the current city model of Gaborone and Francistown.

He further said the National Spatial Plan envisioned Maun as the capital of the western part of the country as it was strategically located to form part of the green preserve and serve as a basis for thriving sustainable world class tourism-based economy.

Member of Parliament for Maun North and also the Leader of Opposition, Mr Dumelang Saleshando had asked the minister to state if decisions to turn Maun into a city had been made and if the answer was in the affirmative, he should state the timeline within which, this would be achieved.

Mr Saleshando also asked if the infrastructure and resources required for this development would be achieved within the set timeline and if the city would be in any way modelled differently from the two other existing cities. *BOPA*

Fifteen security companies face licence cancellation

GABORONE - Fifteen security companies face licence cancellations due to failure to pay wages despite issuance of settlements and default agreements.

Minister for State President, Mr Moeti Mohwasa, who was responding to a parliamentary question on Tuesday, said P821,144.99 was owed to 171 employees.

Reasons for failure to pay wages, Mr Mohwasa said included under quoting for services tendering and win due to the least cost model of selection, following which they would be unable to sustain the wage bill. He also said companies had experienced delayed payments by procuring entities.

He further said there was mismanagement of finances among some of the security companies as they still failed to pay employees even upon payments by procuring entities.

"This cannot be acceptable and my ministry would continue to take serious action where the law has been broken," he said.

He noted that the ministry had facilitated payments for employees by getting companies to commit to payment plans, which had assisted employees. Where the directors failed to honour their obligations as per the payment plans, he said the process to suspend and cessation of the licence would be imposed.

However, he cautioned that

cancellation of a private security service licence did not dissolve the affected companies. He said security companies as legal entities, still existed and were accountable for the accrued debts even upon their cancellation of their operational licences.

The minister further alluded that labour disputes such as payment disputes were resolved through existing disputes resolution mechanism such as negotiations, mediation and the labour courts.

The minister highlighted that the Private Security Services Act did not interfere with the process of the Industrial Court, thus proving that affected companies were duty bound to pay employees even upon their license cancellations.

Tati East legislator, Mi

Tlhabologo Furniture had asked the minister to state the number of security companies whose licenses were cancelled due to failure to pay wages, coupled with reasons for the failure to pay wages by the companies.

He also asked about the total number of employees affected by the cancellation and the total amount of monies owned.

Mr Furniture further asked how the ministry intended to assist the affected employees after closing the companies to recover their wage benefits since the companies do not exist.

He also asked why the ministry did not allow the Industrial Court to apply its process of attaching and selling the companies properties to pay employees. *BOPA*

'Management, promotion of digital services to be enhanced'

GABORONE - The Digital Service Bill, 2025, (Bill No. 23 of 2025) is expected to provide for the regulation of digital services, enhance the management and promotion of digital services and processes.

It will also establish the Digital Services Authority in Botswana to accelerate the country's digital transformation agenda.

The Minister of Communications and Innovation, Mr David Tshere presented the Bill before Parliament on Tuesday under a certificate of urgency.

Presenting the Bill for the second reading, Mr Tshere said once the Digital Services Authority was established, it would be responsible for the coordination and implementation of the country's digital transformation agenda

He said the authority would also facilitate the development of quality standards, enforcement of interoperability of infrastructure and systems and universal access to digital services by citizens of Botswana.

The minister said Part one of the Bill, published on August 8, provided the definition of terms used in the law. "This law will apply both for public and private bodies that provides digital services and that carries out their businesses into, or from Botswana, irrespective of their physical location from which their activity was carried out," he said.

He said the part also provided that the law shall not apply to the provision of digital services by, and on behalf of the state to the extent necessary, where it involved national security, defence or public safety. Minister Tshere said the Second part of the Bill provided for a guiding principle for the provision of digital services, which included the need to focus digital services on the need of the public and businesses in the delivery of services.

He said it was also for the need to drive digital transformation through the development and utilisation of innovative design and integrated business processes, which were streamlined, collaborative and public-focused for enhancing service delivery.

The minister said Part three provided for the establishment of Digital Services Authority, as a public office governed by the laws regulating the public service.

Once established, he said the authority would be headed by the Digital Services Director General, who shall be responsible for the supervision of day-to-day affairs and the administration of the authority, enhancing the authority or ensuring that the authority carries out the functions and duties placed unto it in terms of this Act.

Furthermore, in Part four, the minister said the Bill provided for how digital services were to be regulated in terms of the law, as well as for the obligation on public and private bodies to develop accessible digital platforms for the provision of digital services.

Mr Tshere said it was also for the establishment of national standards, architecture blueprint and interoperability protocols for each infrastructure element for use by public and private bodies to enhance secure communication online, verify identities online and ensure data integrity.

"The part further places an obligation on the ministry responsible for national registration to develop a digital platform to enable the verification of identities online, by passing a unique identifiable number to natural persons," he said.

He said the part further provided that where any law required a payment to be made, or received, the requirement of the law was fulfilled if payment was made or received by secure electronic

Part five, he said provided for the authority to develop and coordinate national open data policy and for the public body to publish such data assets as a machine-readable and electronic formats.

He said the part further provided that the authority shall develop and maintain an enterprise data inventory in order to develop a clear, comprehensive understanding of the data assets in the possession of the body

In Part six, Minister Tshere said the Bill provided that a public and private body shall ensure that the security measures and safeguards were embedded and adhered to in the provision of digital services in line with the relevant laws and policies.

He also noted that Part seven of the Bill provided for miscellaneous provisions, including a clause, which empowered the authority to conduct periodical audits on public and private bodies to ensure compliance with standards set up by the authority.

"The part further provides for the offenses and penalties, for any contravention of the provisions of this law, and a transitional arrangement that provides for a grace period of 24 months for public and private bodies to meet the requirement set by the law," he added. *BOPA*

Bill shift in government stance on cannabis

GABORONE - The tabling of the Cannabis Bill, 2025 (Bill No. 25 of 2025) before Parliament is a landmark move set to reshape Botswana's regulatory approach to cannabis

Presenting the Bill in Parliament on Tuesday, the acting Minister of Lands and Agriculture, Dr Edwin Dikoloti said the bill, which aimed to tightly govern the cultivation, production, storage, distribution, import and export of cannabis strictly for medicinal, scientific, research and industrial purposes, marked a significant policy shift in the country's drug control landscape.

Dr Dikoloti emphasised the government's commitment to creating a structured and secure framework that aligned with international drug control standards while unlocking potential economic and scientific benefits.

At the heart of the bill, he said, was the creation of the National Cannabis Control Authority, a new statutory body that would oversee licensing, compliance and regulation of all cannabis-related activities.

He said the authority would serve as the central node for monitoring and enforcing security measures surrounding the industry, ensuring that cannabis use remained confined to legal and regulated contexts.

"The authority will ensure transparency and accountability in the issuance of licenses for cultivation and use of cannabis for specified purposes, while also putting in place stringent controls to prevent abuse or diversion into illicit channels," Dr Dikoloti said.

He said the Cannabis Bill also aimed to domesticate Botswana's obligations under the Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs, 1961, a key international treaty that regulated narcotic drugs and aimed to prevent their misuse.

Dr Dikoloti said by incorporating those standards into domestic law, Botswana sought to position itself as a responsible player on the global stage, ensuring that any cannabisrelated activity remained aligned with the international framework.

Among its provisions, Dr Dikoloti said the Bill outlined robust security protocols for all entities engaged in the cannabis value chain, including background checks, secure facilities, transport controls and stringent reporting requirements.

He explained that only licensed individuals or institutions would be allowed to handle cannabis and any breach of the conditions set forth by the authority could result in heavy penalties, including revocation of licenses and potential criminal prosecution.

The acting minister therefore

called for the Bill to be adopted saying, it would pave the way for a controlled but potentially lucrative medicinal and industrial cannabis sector in Botswana.

He said the Bill signaled a clear shift in the government's stance on cannabis, prioritising regulation and innovation while maintaining strict public safety and international compliance.

Dr Dikoloti added that the Bill spoke to regulatory framework board of authority that would be the governing body to address crop development and production, agricultural research, law, pharmaceutical industry, medicine, economics, business, human resources management and information and communication technology.

While some lawmakers have welcomed the Bill as a progressive move with economic and scientific benefits, others have called for cautious deliberation, citing concerns over potential social and regulatory challenges.

Tswapong South MP, Dr Kesitegile Gobotswang, expressed concern about lack of transparency on the stance, describing it as alarming that the government continued to avoid discussing the issue of cannabis in public forums.

He noted that many Batswana misunderstood the subject, often assuming cannabis would be freely and irresponsibly available.

Dr Gobotswang emphasised the need for widespread public education, saying the matter should be openly discussed so that citizens could understand government's intentions.

He stated that the cannabis programme should be presented as a high-value initiative, similar to diamonds that were not meant for everyone.

Dr Gobotswang also added that instead of focusing on industrial hemp and cannabis, the minister should prioritise horticulture and food production for the country, suggesting other high-value crops such as sunflower and cotton to be considered as well.

Ghanzi South MP, Mr Motsamai Motsamai supported the Bill, stating that as leaders, they were in a difficult situation marked by high unemployment.

He argued that the initiative could bring in much-needed revenue to help the country sustain itself.

Mr Motsamai said the cannabis industry could address unemployment and the shortage of medicine by creating production facilities that hire locals.

He noted that Botswana was lagging behind countries like Lesotho and Malawi, which were already ahead in that space.

Mr Motsamai highlighted the multiple uses of hemp, including in the production of clothing, lotions, and other product. *BOPA*

Lobatse tannery project on track

LOBATSE - In line with the Lobatse Town Council vision of rendering effective governance for improved and sustainable community livelihoods, Lobatse town mayor, Mr Aron Ganakgomo says the Lobatse tannery revitalisation project is progressing well and is expected to be complete by December, to open up employment opportunities.

Presenting a strategic roadmap during a Botswana Television district council's interview on Monday, Mayor Ganakgomo said in order to boost the Lobatse's economy and create employment opportunities, the council promoted a private sector led economy.

He said the Botswana Meat Commission (BMC) was in the process of revitalising and operationalising the Lobatse tannery project, which included the refurbishment of the tannery to process hides and an effluent treatment plant expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Mr Ganakgomo said BMC diversified to broaden its product portfolio through construction of a new meat value addition and processing plant, to include other value chains anticipated to be operational by June next year.

He said land servicing remained a challenge which caused slow land allocation as well as attracting investors.

Nonetheless, Mr Ganakgomo underscored that Lobatse had great potential to develop as it was strategically positioned on key economic routes; Al Road and A2 Road along the Trans Kalahari Corridor and it was closer to two commercial borders; Pioneer Border Gate and Ramatlabama border, which placed it in a better position for facilitation of robust economic trade.

The mayor said currently, Lobatse was not economically vibrant hence the need to revitalise it, to create employment opportunities in the manufacturing sector especially for the youth.

"We want to position Lobatse as a cultural heritage tourism destination through operationalisation of our monuments and we do so through partnerships. We have already started and are in partnership with the Ukraine Embassy and Sweden," he said.

He explained that heritage tourism would serve to attract visitors and generate revenue for development of the local economy.

Additionally, he said Lobatse played a meaningful role in the liberation struggle during the apartheid regime by bringing political stability in the Southern African region where icons such as the late South Africa president Nelson Mandela, and former president of Mozambique Samora Machel had sought refuge during such times.

He underscored that Lobatse was a town of many firsts hence

the need to develop its heritage sites to attract domestic and foreign investment.

The mayor noted that Lobatse was designated as a meat Special Economic Zone, with the vision of turning it into a meat and leather city and therefore, plans were underway to realise this critical element which was anticipated to economically transform Lobatse.

Additionally, he said the council should identify strategic industry development partners to work with as well as foster local economic participation and promote inclusivity.

Mr Ganakgomo said that there were numerous opportunities in different sectors which presented opportunities for the youth to participate, adding that the youth and the business community could harness the value chains of the tannery and other upcoming projects.

Meanwhile, he said the environment for doing business was not so conducive as some companies folded due to low profit though the council continued to find ways of facilitating businesses, to ensure that they were profitable and remained anchored at Lobatse.

On other issues he said, akin to any other town, they faced challenges of taking services to the people due to resource constraints as such they have resorted to forming formidable business partnerships, encourage shared responsibility and have taken a decision to hold a round table with the business community to discuss challenges faced and how they could collectively deal with them.

He said they have drawn a three-year roadmap in line with Ministry of Local Government and Traditional Affairs Decentralisation Policy to seamlessly facilitate the community, adding that the council shall employ robust revenue maximisation strategy for financial sustainability,

Lack of employment, according to Mr Ganakgomo remained a challenge hence the need to create job opportunities adding that the council was committed to serving the people through prioritising their needs and expectations into government plans. *BOPA*

Kenya central bank cuts rate to spur economic activity

NAIROBI - The Central Bank of Kenya (CBK) on Tuesday reduced its benchmark lending rate to 9.5 per cent from 9.75 per cent to stimulate economic activity and boost private-sector lending in the

The bank's Governor Kamau Thugge, who chaired the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) meeting, said there was room for further monetary easing to reinforce earlier measures aimed at expanding bank credit to the private sector and supporting growth, while keeping inflation expectations anchored and the exchange rate stable.

"Growth in credit to key sectors of the economy, particularly manufacturing, trade, building and construction, and consumer durables, improved in June and July," Thugge said in a statement released in Nairobi, Kenya's capital.

The MPC noted that central banks in major economies were also lowering interest rates, albeit at a more cautious and uneven pace, depending on inflation and growth prospects.

Kenya's overall inflation rose to 4.1 per cent in July from 3.8 per cent in June, remaining below the 5.0 per cent mid-point of the target range, Thugge said.

The apex bank said that it would closely monitor the impact of the rate cut and developments in the global and domestic economy, and stood ready to take further action in line with its mandate. *Xinhua*

Court convicts cash-in-transit robbers

GABORONE - Four men charged with robbing a G4S Security cash-in-transit van at Turnrite Mall and stealing P2.3 million have been found guilty. Thapelo Mothusi Matomela, Lekobe, Mzwandile Mazibuko, and Ntholephi Elliot Ntshalintshali were convicted by Magistrate Goabaone Lesedi-Rammapudi of the Broadhurst Magistrate Court on Tuesday.

They will appear before the same magistrate on August 28 for mitigation.

During mitigation, Magistrate Lesedi-Rammapudi said the court would grant them an opportunity to address the court on exceptional extenuating circumstances, considering the seriousness of the offense.

"On the day of mitigation, you are informed that you have the right to address the court on exceptional extenuating circumstances," Magistrate Lesedi-Rammapudi said.

The magistrate also ordered the investigating officer to present the four convicts persons to the police for fingerprinting to assist the court in determining any previous convictions.

She also ordered the prosecution to serve the defence team with a copy of the case record within three days of receipt and further ordered that the four be remanded in custody.

firearms, unlawful possession of ammunition, possession of goods stolen outside the country, as well as illegal entry into the country which only affected Mazibuko and Ntshalintshali.

"The state has proven its case beyond reasonable doubt and the court returns a verdict of guilty on each of the five counts," she said, noting that the court rejected the alibis raised by each convict.

The first accused, Matomela, stated in his defense that he was arrested near Lamila Lodge in Mogoditshane, claiming he was being assisted by his friend, Tebogo Tsekane, to tow his vehicle from area near Julia Molefhe Clinic to Solomon Dihutso Primary School, adding that he had no involvement in the Turnrite Mall crime.

Lekobe also claimed he was mistakenly arrested, adding that he was apprehended shortly after getting off a combi in Mogoditshane to search for a car part, having travelled from Mmadinare to Gaborone for the part. His friend, Emmanuel Ikanyeng supported Lekobe's version, telling the court that Lekobe was arrested in front of him near Lamila Lodge and further said they had spoken throughout the day.

Mazibuko and Ntshalintshali also denied any involvement in the crime, telling the court that they were arrested while waiting for a taxi after consulting a traditional doctor in Mogoditshane, on behalf of their ill grandfather back in South Africa.

The duo further claimed that they had entered the country legally and their passports were seized by the police during arrest. **BOPA**

Attorney calls for prompt assessments

MAUN - A defence attorney says prolonged psychological causing assessments are psychological stress on his client.

Therefore, Mr Joseph Carter pleaded with court to promptly conclude assessments and reports be shared with the defence to facilitate the adjournment of the matter of his client, 23-year-old Gontlemang Segolodi of Maun.

Segolodi, who appeared before Magistrate Gofaone Mosweu of Maun Magistrate Court for a status hearing, faces terrorism-related charges.

"My client has been subjected to these assessments for over six months and it is now complicating his daily living. Everything should be completed as soon as possible and all reports be shared by the next hearing," he said.

He questioned the detainment of his client without a charge arguing that suspects should only be detained after being formally charged hence the request for a detailed report outlining events from the onset.

For his part, Assistant director of public prosecution and head of international cooperation and cybercrime unit, Ms Merapelo Mokgosi pleaded with court to consolidate the case files, which was originally registered under case number 47, however due to miscommunication the file was mistakenly registered as a new

matter under a different number.

"Information contained in file number 47 will assist the matter as it is captured in the previous file since the psychological reports were submitted under the new file which is a continuation from the previous proceedings, "she said.

The prosecution also highlighted in response to the defence that section 15 of Botswana's terrorism laws allowed for the arrest of suspects without formal charges in cases involving serious offenses.

She stressed the importance of a proper investigation in cases like the one where the matter carried heavy sentences like life imprisonment or even a death sentence.

"This matter carries a potential

life or death sentence, so court should allow all due process to ensure that justice is served," she said.

Ms Mokgosi notified court that the case would be committed to the high court once investigations were complete.

Magistrate Mosweu informed both parties that the two files on the matter before court had been consolidated and the new file was withdrawn.


Segolodi was arrested in connection with alleged terrorismrelated activities last year stemming from his controversial post on X in November 2024.

BDP initiates reconciliation efforts

GABORONE - The Botswana Democratic Party (BDP) has launched a reconciliation initiative, which on August 23 will see a delegation meet with Kgosi Khama IV, his uncles, and village elders in Serowe.

This follows the successful response to the party's request for a meeting.

During a press conference on Tuesday in Gaborone, BDP Secretary General, Mr Kentse Rammidi clarified that the meeting would take place at the Institute of Health Sciences hall to ensure legal compliance.

He said the move to hold discussions at a different place other than the Kgotla without party regalia was to respect traditional customs and government protocols.

Mr Rammidi explained that the decision came after new party leadership reflected on past events and recognised that certain actions had not been handled appropriately.

He recounted that when tensions arose between the government and Kgosi Khama IV, Bangwato sought to convene a meeting at the Kgotla to resolve the issues. However, their request was denied.

He stressed that the Kgotla was a cornerstone of democracy, serving as a forum for resolving disputes and fostering reconciliation.

Furthermore, he stated that the party had chosen to apologise to Kgosi Khama IV, noting that he had not pursued legal action regarding the matter.

While some cases are already before the courts, Mr Rammidi remained confident that justice would be served.

He added that BDP president Mr Mpho Balopi has already met with the Matsheka family and Kgosi Mosadi of Gamalete to extend apologies.

Addressing other concerns, Mr Rammidi urged the media to verify their reports, warning against spreading unfounded stories that could be exaggerated and harm individuals and their families. He cautioned that such misinformation had, in some countries, led to mob justice.

Mr Rammidi also clarified that the forensic audit was not targeted solely at BDP members but was intended to identify and assess corruption across government departments.

He urged the public to refrain from finger-pointing and accusations, stressing that justice must take its course, and that BDP remained adamant that the audit was conducted professionally. BOPA

"As the world embraces digitalisation, this timely intervention prepares our learners for the 21st century and a future where examinations will be computerised," she added.

Ms Sephiri also acknowledged the steady improvement in the school's academic performance over the years, attributing it to the dedication of teachers, learners, and the unwavering support of parents.

BoFiNet acting Chief Executive Officer Mr Keabetswe Segole said the donation was part of the company's efforts to bridge the digital divide between urban and rural schools.

"We learned that the school did not have a functioning computer lab, which deprived learners of vital ICT skills. Digital skills are no longer a privilege but a basic necessity to thrive in today's world," Mr Segole said.

He explained that BoFiNet,

which contributed to the Universal Access and Service Fund (UASF) through a levy imposed by the Botswana Communications Regulatory Authority (BOCRA), was collaborating with both BOCRA and UASF to ensure the school's internet connectivity met its needs.

"The donation follows a needs assessment that began six months ago, when the Ministry of Communications and Innovation selected Hukuntsi as host for the World Telecommunications & Information Society Day commemorations.

This initiative helped identify Maitshoko Primary as one of the most school in need of ICT support," he said.

Mr Segole stressed the importance of providing learners in Maake with the same quality of education as their urban counterparts.

"Children in Maake and surrounding areas deserve the chance to become computer engineers, AI specialists, and digital entrepreneurs," he said.

He also praised the school's history of academic excellence.

Reaffirming BoFiNet's commitment to connect every Motswana to reliable and affordable ICT services, Mr Segole highlighted the company's achievement of nearly 90 per cent national broadband coverage, with a goal of reaching 100 per cent by 2028.

Providing further insight into the school's progress, Deputy School Head Mr Gaolatlhe Phuthego shared that Maitshoko primary currently had an enrollment of 123 students.

He noted that since the school's establishment in 1998, performance, particularly in the Primary School Leaving Examination (PSLE), had been below expectations but had steadily improved in recent years.

"In 2021, the school achieved a pass rate of 46.67 per cent, followed by 31.33 per cent in 2022. However, the performance then significantly improved to 69.23 per cent in 2023 and remained steady at 69 per ncent in 2024," Mr Phuthego said. *BOPA*

Police investigate fire at Home Affairs office in Germiston

The office of South Africa's Department of Home Affairs in Germiston, Ekurhuleni, was set ablaze on Tuesday morning. The City of Ekurhuleni said the blaze broke out while officials were carrying out an eviction operation at nearby low-cost houses that were reportedly occupied illegally.

Ekurhuleni's Disaster and Emergency Management Service contained the blaze on the second floor of the two-story building and extinguished it before it could spread.

"Firefighters were forced to make entry to locked areas to secure the premises. No injuries have been reported at this time," said Phakamile Mbengashe, head of communication, marketing, and tourism at the City of Ekurhuleni. He said the cause of the fire remained undetected for now, though arson was suspected.

Mbengashe urged people to remain calm. Since the fire is suspected to have been started by protesters evicted from a nearby complex, he emphasised that people with complaints must channel them through peaceful and lawful channels.

Minister of Home Affairs Leon Schreiber later confirmed the fire on the social media platform X. He said authorities are working with the police to gather evidence to ensure the arrest and conviction of suspects. *Xinhua*

Acrobats carry legacy across generations

DAR ES SALAAM - In the heart of Ilala Mchikichini, a bustling neighbourhood in Tanzania's port city of Dar es Salaam, the sound of spinning hoops and synchronised flips rings through the warm afternoon

At the centre of the action, nineyear-old Aisha Juma, a fourthgrader at Ilala Boma Primary School, twirls hula hoops with remarkable precision.

"I like acrobatics because it makes me healthy and sharpens my mind," she said with a smile.

Since beginning her training two years ago, Aisha has not only built strength and flexibility but also noticed better results in the classroom.

Her story is the latest episode in a tradition that began nearly six decades ago, when 20 young Tanzanians were sent to China to study acrobatics, a milestone in the history of Sino-Tanzanian cultural exchange.

The programme took shape after a Chinese acrobatic troupe performed in Tanzania, impressing national leaders and inspiring the idea of sending young talents for formal training in China.

In the winter of 1965, Hamis Adam Nyota and 19 others, 14 boys and five girls, aged between nine and 18, arrived in Wuhan, central China's Hubei Province.

"Life in China was tough at first," Nyota, born in 1954, recalled.

"Most of us fell ill, except for one."

Despite the challenges, they trained diligently at the Wuhan Acrobatic Institute.

Their dedication led to a historic meeting in 1968 with Chairman Mao Zedong, during a visit by Tanzania's founding President Julius Nyerere.

"We met Mao face to face, spoke with him, and took photos together. It was a tremendous honour," said Nyota.

Returning home in 1969, the group established the National

Acrobatics Troupe, the first of its kind in Africa.

Under government direction, they toured extensively within Tanzania and abroad, performing in Kenya, Uganda, Zambia, the Comoros and Malawi.

Nyota stayed with the troupe until 1977, when the government decentralised acrobatics training.

Posted to the Mtwara region, he continued to teach even as many of his peers left the profession.

Along with colleague Rajab Zubwa, he later founded Bantu International Acrobatic to revive

"In time, every performing arts troupe wanted to include acrobatics," Nyota said.

"That's how the art grew, both locally and internationally."

One of his proteges, Saidi Ramadhani Yusuph, now serves as an instructor at Happy Center Acrobatic Talent.

Inspired by visiting Chinese performers, Yusuph training with Nyota at the age of

"He taught me for five years before I entered the profession," Yusuph recalled.

Since becoming a teacher in 2008, Yusuph has trained over 70 learners, focusing on balance skills and team activities.

Despite limited facilities and modest institutional support, he remains committed to his work.

"Teaching is my passion and acrobatics is a talent within me," he said.

"Acrobatics brings benefits. Physically and mentally, it builds strength. Financially, it can provide a livelihood. We have had job opportunities through

hotels, weddings, and various events, both in Tanzania and overseas," Yusuph explained.

He added that public perception has shifted.

Once viewed as simple entertainment, acrobatics is now recognised as a legitimate career

"Some artistes have secured abroad, contracts earning between US\$1,500 and US\$2,000 a month, a significant income in Tanzanian terms," he said.

Happy Center Acrobatic Talent, a registered institution, now boasts over 200 members.

Alumni include internationally known acts such as the Ramadhani Brothers, who competed on America's Got Talent, a popular US television talent show.

Nyota believed the Tanzania-China bond remains strong.

'Comparing the China we visited to the China of today shows a dramatic transformation. They have progressed impressively."

From the icy streets of Wuhan to the sunlit training grounds of Dar es Salaam, the story of Tanzanian acrobatics continues to unfold.

As young Aisha spins her hoops with poise and joy, she carries forward a tradition that bridges continents and generations. Xinhua



Ncube said that while Botswana


dancers possessed talent, there was a need to continue honing their craft. She encouraged dancers to showcase originality and creativity beyond trending TikTok dances.
