## UK imposes visa on Botswana



GABORONE - Botswana nationals will require an entry visa to visit the United Kingdom (UK) with effect from October 14.

According to the press statement from the Ministry for International Relations, the announcement comes in response to the ongoing illegal and irregular migration

of Batswana to the UK, including the significant number of asylum applications from Batswana since 2022.

Therefore, the UK government has revoked the 'visa free status' and introduced a visitor visa requirement for Batswana planning to visit the UK.

Furthermore, Batswana transiting through the UK, will also require a direct airside transit visa, which similarly comes into effect October 14.

The statement reveals that a six-week transition period that concludes on November 25, will be put in place to facilitate Batswana who hold an Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) and have already booked their travel to the UK prior to the introduction of the visa requirement.

Nonetheless, the government of Botswana wishes to assure the public that through diplomatic channels, it will continue to engage the UK government on the matter to explore durable solutions mutually beneficial for both countries and their citizens.

The statement urges Batswana travelling to the UK or visiting other countries to continue to adhere to immigration laws and regulations of those countries. **BOPA**

### Over 500 ex-mine workers qualify for provident fund

MOLEPOLOLE - Some 560 Batswana ex-miners who have worked in the South Africa mines are eligible to get a share from the R74 million in the Mine Workers Provident Fund (MWPF).

The fund in collaboration with the Ministry of Labour and Home Affairs has disbursed officers who were currently engaging with the community across the country to identity eligible beneficiaries of the funds.

The claims only applies to exminers who worked in the Coal, Platinum and Gold mines from 1989 to date and were members of the fund.

On Saturday and Monday, ex-mine workers and their beneficiaries gathered Molepolole College of Education (MCE) and Molepolole Sports Complex respectively to confirm their claims with the fund.

Speaking in an interview on Monday, the Principal Executive Officer of the fund, Mr France Phagadi said they were expecting to assist 560 beneficiaries in

Mr Phagadi said team had so far identified beneficiaries in Good Hope, Kanye and Molepolole where hundreds of people gathered to enquire about the fund.

Mr Phagadi said it was unfortunate that many were not in their data base, since they have worked for different mines, which were not part of the fund.

Mr Phagadi said the Provident Fund came into effect in 1989 covering specific, hence some were not in the data base either having worked before the fund was launched or for a mine that was not under the fund.

He said the team was working hard for all the members of the fund or their beneficiaries to receive their dues.

"Our data base show that we have about 180 people to assist in Molepolole but more than 2000 people showed up, and we cannot turn them away, we must assist all of them to put their cases to rest,"

Mr Phagadi said the fund to come to Botswana to assist its members after noting that it would be costly and tedious for them to travel to South Africa and the risks associated with processing a monetary claim.

He added tthey were happy that the Fund members were still alive saying they would invest their money.

However, Mr Phagadi said it was sad that some of their members had died. But, he said the beneficiaries would be receive the money.

He said all the eligible members of the fund would start to receive their benefits in the coming two weeks. He said the Fund has dispatched two teams of officials who were currently travelling the country, identifying fund members, adding that the process would conclude in Gaborone on Saturday.

One of the members who preferred to remain anonymous, said he had worked for the mines from 1989 and left his work in 1996, and was happy to have joined the pensions fund as it was now bearing fruits.

Another ex-miner who spoke thanked the fund for coming to Botswana as he almost gave up after experiencing challenges travelling to South Africa to process their claims. BOPA

### Voters demand concrete transformation from winner

TSABONG - Kgalagadi South is gearing for a by-election, but voter sentiment across the vast, arid district suggests a dissatisfaction with the status quo, demanding concrete, transformative action from whoever wins the parliamentary

The by-election comes after the passing on of the then sitting Member of Parliament and Minister of Lands and Agriculture, Dr Micus Chimbombi, leaving a vacancy that has galvanised public focus on persistent local challenges.

President, Advocate Duma Boko had issued a Writ for the Kgalagadi South Constituency by-election, directing that nomination of candidates should be received on October 23 and that the poll shall be on November 15.

Therefore, pitting Mr Tokyo Modise of the Umbrella for (UDC) Change Democratic against Mr Tshephang Brooks of the Botswana Congress Party (BCP) and Ms Diana Kaartze of the Botswana Democratic Party

(BDP).

However, the development had sparked mixed reactions; Tsabong business mogul, Mr Tshipietsile Mothelesi, expressed worry about the short notice, lamenting that residents were not given adequate time to decide.

"My biggest expectation is for the candidate to consider building a hospital. Tsabong is a big village that deserves to have a big hospital," Mothelesi said, noting that most patients were referred to Gaborone, a journey that is both far and expensive for local families.

He said a local hospital would spare residents time and the burden of travelling long distances to seek for medical services elsewhere as well as easing congestions in cities and town hospitals.

Furthermore. travelling long distances may lead to complications for an issue that could have been otherwise easily resolved at an early stage.

In addition, he said there was an urgent need to open the longawaited small stock abattoir and focus on developing the local stadium, airstrip, and roads

### Minister warns against sale of alcohol to underage

MAUN - The sale of alcohol to underage persons is a criminal activity and residents of Maun have been implored to report such incidents to relevant authorities.

The call was made by the Minister of Trade and Entrepreneurship, Mr Tiroeaone Ntsima on Monday when responding to concerns raised by residents during a consultative meeting on the Liquor Amendment Bill.

"I equally agree with you that stringent measures should be taken upon such traders who sell drugs and alcohol to children and I also urge vou to report any illegal activities to the law enforcement authority to ensure your children are not exposed to such environments," Mr Ntsima said.

The minister revealed that the law exists to safeguard the health and welfare of children, hence selling alcohol to them was prohibited and there was a restriction barring the location of liquor outlets close to schools.

He said it was disturbing that some people traded illegally while some among the licenced were not compliant to the law, resulting in children having easy access to alcohol in their communities.

Mr Ntsima also urged members of the public to intervene and help address the problem of drug and substance abuse, and advised liquor outlets to fully comply with the regulations governing trading in alcohol as stipulated in their licenses. He highlighted that the envisaged liquor bill proposes to increase penalties in order to increase compliance with the Act.

"It was clear that with the current law, people keep on violating it because the fines are easily affordable and we believe that increased penalties can be effective at increasing compliance.'

Residents also learnt that the new bill also seeks to reduce the distance of 500 metres to 250 metres between alcohol outlets and schools as well as to ensure outlets playing music were sound proof to avoid noise pollution.

Mr Ntsima also revealed that

alcohol advertising on bill boards adjacent to schools. Some residents had complained

the envisaged bill would prohibit

that liquor consumption by minors was a serious concern calling on the government to take stiff action against business owners who sell alcohol and other habit-forming substances like drugs to children.

They said it was disturbing as youngsters were initiated into drugs and alcohol at an early age leading to risky behaviour and compromised decision-making.

While they appreciated that some people were making a living through the sale of alcohol including traditional beer, they expressed displeasure that some have now turned their yards into taverns or shebeens and were operating illegally, therefore creating a noisy and chaotic environment within the community.

A concerned parent, Ms Tshepho Mokhawa complained that shebeens operating within the community without following any regulations were a significant part of the problem.

She said it was heart-breaking to see how easily children could get hold of alcohol and drugs calling on effective solutions to curb the menace.

"We need stricter measures to protect our kids because some parents even give their children drugs to sell to their peers at school," she lamented.

Mr Otshotswe Thabare also expressed his distress over the ease with which minors could access alcohol citing that in other countries, alcohol outlets were placed far from residences to avoid noise pollution and exposure of children to alcohol use. BOPA

### Borrowing reveals banks, microlenders preferences

GABORONE - Household borrowing patterns reveal distinct preferences between financial institutions Commercial banks predominantly lend to public service employees, while microlenders tend to extend credit to private sector employees.

This was revealed by the Bank of Botswana's household indebtedness survey report for the year 2024/25, released recently.

According to the report, which estimates household debt to be at P68.6 billion, having increased from P61 billion from the previous year, P59.6 billion is owed to commercial banks, P8.5 billion to micro-lender loans, and P509 million to hire purchase loans.

The bank says the distribution of household loans by microlenders and banks shows a complex interplay of employment sector, demography and borrower

"The survey shows that public servants continue to dominate commercial bank credit, supported by scheme loans and deductionfrom-source arrangements," the report states.

The report notes that microloans are concentrated in private sector employees at 82 per cent, while most bank loans tend to be towards government sector employees at 64 per cent.

"For micro-lenders, it is found that they lend mostly to private sector employees with generally lower average loans by income and gender compared to banks."

This, the report states, could be underlaid by the existing deduction-from-source mechanism, which found that the majority of household loans scheme loans, suggesting some level of secure repayment

Additionally, the public sector is a relatively more formalised structure that easily meets the lending requirements for commercial banks.

The Bank of Botswana says that these employment dynamics, combined with gender patterns where males dominate micro-lender credit compared to a relatively gender-balanced bank credit, highlight distinct borrower patterns and varying borrower access.

It says the higher male representation among microlenders suggests that males are more inclined to seek micro-lender loans, possibly due to less strict credit standards, while banks serve a broader, more gender-balanced government sector clientele with generally similar employment dynamics.

With regard to the use or purpose of household loans, the 2024/25 survey results show that 56 per cent of unsecured loans are channeled towards what households classify as other personal uses.

This includes, but is not limited to, motor vehicle maintenance, house renovations marriage and funeral expenses, acquisition of residential plots and second-hand cars, as well as debt reconciliation.

Additionally, it was found that 18 per cent of unsecured loans go towards consumer goods, including furniture and other household items, while 15 per cent and 11 per cent are used on farming projects and education and health expenses, respectively.

Despite the increase in household indebtedness, the Bank of Botswana states that the local proportions remain significantly lower than regional counterparts, with the latest data from South Africa and Mauritius showing ratios of 33.7 per cent in December 2024 and 37.7 per cent in June 2024, respectively. "This partnership exemplifies our shared responsibility to prepare professionals who are not only qualified on paper but who are also capable, ethical and ready to serve society," he said.

He added that professional bodies such as the LSB, were

indispensable and played a critical role in setting and upholding the standards of their professions.

"They promote best practices, ensure ethical conduct and hold members accountable. Their involvement is vital to building a qualifications system that is credible and trusted by both the public and industry," he said.

He indicated that the collaboration would focus on several key areas including aligning regulatory frameworks with professional realities.

"The Law Society's insight into the needs of the legal profession will help ensure that qualifications in the legal field are relevant, future-focused, and responsive to both national and global trends," he said.

Again, he said professional standards and codes of practice would inform curriculum design, assessment practices and professional competencies as well as strengthen BQA's systems with both academic rigor and

professional relevance.

Furthermore, he said collaboration with the LSB in offering training, certification and continuous professional development would ensure that legal practitioners remained competent and current to create structured pathways for lifelong learning.

"Alignment of efforts enhances transparency, accountability and credibility in the qualifications landscape, providing the public with assurance that professionals, especially in critical fields like law, meet high standards of competence and ethics," he said.

He also said the MoU symbolised the power of collaboration, adding that working together fostered a qualifications system that was coherent, inclusive, dynamic and innovative.

"Professional bodies are drivers of innovation and excellence and enable stakeholders to collectively address challenges and harness opportunities for the economy and society," he said.

For his part, LSB chairperson, Mr Lesedi Moahi, described the MoU as a milestone since the parties had been working independently despite needing to be hand-in-hand to ensure that

only deserving people practiced

"As the law society, we play the legislative role of lawyers and we need to ensure that the people who petition for admission are deserving, not half-baked. This starts with the educational background and quality assurance of their schooling," Mr Moahi

He emphasised the LSB's role in being roped in early when an institution planned to offer a law programme in Botswana.

"This involvement allows the LSB to have direct input into the curriculum to establish if it meets the needs of the market, ultimately benefiting the public whom these lawyers will serve," he added.

BQA board secretary, Ms Thato Outlule said some of the key areas of the MoU included aligning legal qualifications with the National Credit and Qualifications Framework (NCQF), joint efforts in quality assurance audits and validation processes, collaboration in research and policy development for legal education, regular data sharing and information for planning and decision-making as well as mutual efforts to benchmark local qualifications and standards with regional and international best practices.

Ms Outlule added that the MoU's obligations reflected a mutual commitment to quality assurance.

"For the Law Society of Botswana, this includes high maintaining ethical governance standards, participating in national reviews, and upholding standards of entry, training, and ongoing professional development. For BQA, we commit to recognizing and supporting the Law Society of Botswana as a valued partner, offering technical support, sharing policy insights, and ensuring that legal qualifications reflect both national relevance and global competitiveness," Ms Outlule

She added that the partnership was a shared vision for professional excellence, public trust and national development, with BQA viewing professional bodies not merely as stakeholders but as co-creators of quality.

"By formalising this partnership, we reaffirm our belief that quality assurance is most effective when it is collaborative, inclusive and anchored in industry realities," she said. *BOPA*

## Residents decry shortage of medical supplies

SEROWE - While government has been working round the clock to address critical shortage of medical supplies countrywide, some Batswana still experience shortage of supplies.

In a kgotla meeting addressed by Member of Parliament for Serowe West, Mr Onalepelo Kedikilwe in Marobela Ward in Serowe recently, Metsimasweu Village Development Committee chairperson, Mr Moses Monthe also decried the shortage saying most clinics were without medication.

As a result, he said patients resources, which he linked to were compelled to buy supplies critical resource shortages across for themselves, with some prices the board and postponed project

being exorbitantly high, adding that those who did not have the means, would be affected.

He also requested for Sekgoma Clinic to operate on weekends, saying that would ease the burden on the already strained Sekgoma Memorial Hospital emergency unit.

For his part, Mr Kedikilwe, expressed regret that the nation was experiencing such difficult times, noting that government strived to provide medication to meet all patients' requirements, but was confronted with the significant challenge of tough economic conditions, with limited financial resources, which he linked to critical resource shortages across the board and postponed project

completions.

He however assured the residents that things would normalise once the economy recovered.

Mr Kedikilwe also urged the residents to acquaint themselves with the newly enacted laws.

He also encouraged them to familiarise themselves with forestry regulations, since people frequently neglect these issues out of ignorance, emphasising that the laws existed to protect both the community and their resources.

"We have regulations regarding the introduction of foreign tree species into our nation to safeguard our natural resources. You cannot simply bring seeds or seedlings from other countries and plant them without first consulting forestry experts to prevent the consequences of introducing invasive tree species that could disrupt the ecosystem.

There was an instance where an individual sowed a seed of an exotic variety, only to discover that it was an invasive species; relentless in every way, it destroyed all vegetation nearby, and regardless of how much they attempted to cut it down or burn it, it would proliferate in even larger quantities," he said.

He also noted that regulations, like requiring a permit to harvest mophane worm, were established to protect the country's resources, saying without appropriate laws and guidance, individuals might become greedy and excessively harvest the delicate worm, resulting in its eventual extinction.

The MP urged the citizens to comply with the laws and protect their country's resources so that future generations could also gain from them. *BOPA*

# BMC buys live cattle from farmers

MAUN - The Botswana Meat Commission (BMC) is implementing a new system to directly purchase live cattle from Ngamiland farmers at P16 per kilogramme and assume full responsibility for the quarantine process.

This was revealed by BMC chief executive officer, Ms Kesolofetse Tibe in an interview following a meeting with farmers' association representatives in Maun recently. tThis, she said aimed at addressing long-standing concerns about the current quarantine system.

Ms Tibe said, effective immediately, the BMC would buy live-weight cattle and handle all aspects of the quarantine until slaughter.

"This means farmers will no longer incur costs for caring for the animals during the quarantine period. Farmers will receive their payment within three days.

"The BMC will collect animals

from designated collection points and transport them to the quarantine facility. This expands on a measure introduced in 2022, when the abattoir began covering transport costs to relieve farmers of that financial burden," she said.

She added that the new system, including the introduction of an e-wallet card capable of receiving up to P500 000, was scheduled to be officially launched on October 24 at the Makalamabedi quarantine facility, with an actual demonstration for farmers on October 25. She said BMC livestock procurement staff would visit the district to inform and sensitise the farming community about the change.

Ms Tibe said she was hopeful that the arrangement would bring positive results by incentivising supply to the BMC and allow the Maun abattoir to slaughter seven days a week and match the Lobatse schedule.

"The shift comes as a direct response to farmers' pleas. They had previously complained that the existing quarantine system was unworkable, presented significant challenges in caring for the animals, and could lead to cattle loss for the BMC. Farmers had explicitly proposed that the abattoir buy animals directly and manage the quarantine requirements," she added.

She further indicated that the quarantine system was originally implemented in Ngamiland to facilitate the Commodity Based Trade approach, with the intention of managing cattle at the facility

until they were ready for slaughter. Nonetheless, she said BMC was actively working to secure lucrative

new markets.

Currently, she said a significant portion of Ngamiland beef was sold locally, with the international

market being less active.

Ms Tibe did, however, appreciated that the abattoir had received a new order from Lebanon.

She indicated that efforts were also underway to tap into more profitable markets, including ongoing discussions with the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Furthermore, she said BMC was also in the process of ensuring the Maun abattoir was accredited for Halal slaughter.

"This is to target the United Arab Emirates (UAE) market, which requires a pneumatic slaughter system. The necessary machine has been installed and is awaiting audit to ensure compliance and certification," she said.

For his part, Maun plat manager, Mr Ishmael Ramorula underscore the urgency of the change owing to the plant's recent performance.

Mr Ramorula stated that this year, the plant had performed dismally poor in terms of procuring animals compared to last year, where BMC slaughtered only 595 cattle, which translated to 113.05 tonnes of beef.

He noted that the majority of farmers were reluctant to sell cattle, citing that the quarantine system was not working for them and had requested the abattoir to buy live cattle directly and take responsibility for the quarantine processes. *BOPA* 

### Farmers divided over BMC price

GABORONE - Farmers in Ngamiland have expressed mixed feelings over the Botswana Meat Commission (BMC) Direct Cattle Purchase programme.

In an interview on Monday following BMC's announcement of the plan, some argued that the P16 per kg price was too low while others said it would motivate farmers to sell more cattle to the abattoir.

Those against the P16 per kg said it would paralyse the beef industry and called for a better price.

"We appreciate the efforts made to buy live cattle from us but the rate is too low because we thought the price will remain the same as buying Cold Dressed Mass (CDM) at P38 per kg. BMC has been unlawfully buying cattle from farmers. The abattoir has been paying for the carcass only while other products such as intestines were not catered for hence we called for buying of live weight cattle so that we reap good returns," said Mr Simon Bojosi.

He said they expected the BMC to engage farmers before setting the price instead of imposing their price on the farming community

BMC is mandated to promote the interests of the livestock producing industry, by buying and slaughtering cattle as per the BMC act but that is not the case as the abattoir rope farmers by purchasing carcass, Mr Bojosi said.

He said buying live weight cattle at P16 per kg, would not address their concerns because doing so would still render cattle farming less profitable.

Instead, he said BMC could have consulted farmers, to allow them to come up with suggestions regarding the pricing.

He said pastoral farming was an important vehicle of economic growth for the Ngamiland region and as such their hope was on on BMC to ensure cattle access to rewarding markets.

He also called for implementation of the Control of Livestock Industry Act which regulated the purchase, sale and trade of livestock through licensing and permits system.

Another farmer, Mr Gilson Saleshando said he did not accept the rate because it failed to reflect BMC's role of protecting the interests of the livestock producing industry.

Mr Saleshando was concerned that the majority of the farmers were not familiar with the BMC Act hence the commission's management was making some decisions without their input.

This, he said showed that the commission was not neccessarily targeting to enhance the beef industry.

On the other hand, some farmers welcomed the new purchase approach, saying farmers would have options to sell live weight or sell through the CDM model as it was the case.

Mr Killer Ledimo hailed the model of buying live weight cattle it would ensure adequate supply of animals to the abattoir.

"BMC is the only entity that supports cattle producers and if it shuts down due to shortage of supply, that will be a draw back because there will be no market for us. We do accept the new rate even though some deem too low but we should appreciate that the abattoir has relieved us of the financial burden of transporting the animals and caring for them while at the quarantine facility," he said. *BOPA*





### Lebone La Tsosoloso serves as blueprint

TLHARESELEELE - Member of Parliament for Good Hope/ Mmathethe Dr Edwin Dikoloti has implored Basotho to serve as ambassadors of peace and represent the values that Basotho identifies with.

Dr Dikoloti made a plea during Lebone La Tsosoloso cultural event celebration held at Tlhareseleele in Good Hope District on Friday.

Batswana and Basotho he said, were united by various aspects, citing language as one particular aspect as much as the torch event that distinguished them from other nations

The aim of the event was to revive and restore the culture of Basotho in Botswana and Lesotho and to also celebrate 200 years of the existence of Basotho tribe.

### Kike festival highlights history of Ntlhantlhe

NTLHANTLHE - The forefathers of Balete and Bangwaketse have established a foundation of a long-standing relationship between the two communities.

Kgosi Mosadi of Balete said this at the inaugural Kike Cultural Migration Festival on Friday, and highlighted how Kike was originally part of the Bangwaketse territory under Kgosi Bathoen I.

The festival was held under the theme: Modi wa ko re go tswang and highlighted the history of Ntlhantlhe community in the Southern Region of Ngwaketse.

She revealed that the two dikgosi, Balete and Bangwaketse, agreed following negotiations to designate Kike as a grazing area for Balete, thereby moving Bangwaketse further west to Ntlhantlhe.

Kgosi Mosadi emphasised that celebrations like Kike Migration Cultural Festival promoted community cohesion and fostered positive relationships between tribes.

She further urged that the cultural festival should go an extra mile and incorporate cultural exchanges of both Balete and Bangwaketse.

Chief Executive Officer at Botswana Tourism Organisation (BTO) Keitumetse Setlang in relating the festival to tourism, said tourism does not refer only to the fauna rather to anything that could be done or placed for people to behold. Setlang said as tourism was being diversified world-wide and locally, it had come to attention that culture had been left behind.

"As we communed to find out what could be lacking in the aspect of culture", she said and added that United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) research findings reflected that

music, native foods, dress, dance, culture, arts and others generated billions of dollars in the tourism sector world-wide.

Setlang said when BTO looked amongst the local tourism activities, it had been found that such activities were worth millions of Pula. She said it implied that the local tourism activities were viable.

Regarding the southern region, especially the migration of Bangwaketse from Kike to Ntlhantlhe, she said, the

community settled in a location encompassed by abundance of natural resources such as hills.

She encouraged Ntlhantlhe residents to maximise the hills on hiking activities as well as available water springs.

"Empower the heritage guides and monetise the resources within the environment," she advised. On the same note, Setlang advised them to monetise their resources which she said could be through establishing a trust.

She said with trusts, the community selected their board to manage and it was often headed by the district commissioner.

She said BTO worked with various community trusts nationwide and that trusts like the one at Goo Moremi, managed the gorge on their behalf, adding the trust had also established 14 accommodation structures.

She said it had six self-catering rooms and some executive tents suits. Moreover, she commended their management and cited them worth to be emulated.

Kgosi Malepa Orekeng of Ntlhantlhe highlighted that Kike Migration Cultural Festival commemorates a pivotal moment when residents of Ntlhantlhe migrated from Kike to Ntlhantlhe in the 1950s after negotiations between the Bangwaketse and Balete tribal leaders to designate Kike as a grazing area. *BOPA*

# Tebogo, Kebinatshipi qualify for new meet

GABORONE - Olympic 200m champion, Letsile Tebogo and 400m World Athletics champion, Collen Kebinatshipi have qualified for the newly introduced meet dubbed the World Athletics Ultimate Championship.

The inaugural event, which will be held in Budapest, Hungary from September 11-13, 2026, will offer a recordsetting prize pot of US\$10 million, the largest ever offered in a single track and field event.

According to World Athletics, every athlete lining up in Budapest will be financially rewarded for their performance, with the ultimate champion in each event taking home the top prize of US\$150

World Athletics also anticipates that new partnerships and enhanced promotional rights will unlock greater financial opportunities for the stars and the sport.

According to World Athletics, the fast-paced three-day competition will feature only top-ranked or only the 'best of the best' athletes.

Automatic qualifiers will include 26 Olympic champions from Paris 2024, 26 World Champions from this year's World Athletics Championships in Tokyo and 25 Diamond League winners from the 2026 season.

Other athletes will qualify based on their performance in 2026 via the World Rankings qualification system.

In an interview, Botswana

Athletics Association acting president, Oabona Theetso said the introduction of the World Athletics Ultimate Championship was a step in the right direction for the sport.

Theetso commended World Athletics for being athleticcentric, noting that such focus was demonstrated by the large injection of money into the prize pool.

He added that the competition was a challenge for the local athletes given that it was a new meet


"It is new. It is the best of the best, so when you compete against the best, it is a new challenge to our athletes," he said.

He said while only Tebogo and Kebinatshipi were the only runners who had qualified so far, he was optimistic that other local athletes would qualify for Ultimate Championship since the World Rankings qualification system based on the best performers of 2026 also provided another path for qualification.

The World Relays scheduled for Gaborone in May next year will also be a key qualification event for the relays.

However, Theetso said he was disappointed that the 4x400 metres relays were not included in the World Athletics Ultimate Championship's three-day schedule.

"We would have loved for our 4x400m relay team to be a part of it. However, we take solace in that the Mixed 4x100m relay and Mixed 4x400m relay events are part of the programme," Theetso said. *BOPA*
