Mathoothe cautions against illicit brews

HUKUNTSI - Assistant
Minister of Trade and
Entrepreneurship, Mr Baratiwa
Mathoothe, has cautioned
against the production of illicit
brews, saying such drinks were
not safe for consumption and
posed serious health risks to
communities.

Speaking during a consultative kgotla meeting on the Liquor Amendment Bill, 2025, Mr Mathoothe said the Ministry was currently reviewing the Liquor Act of 2003 and its regulations to ensure inclusivity of all locally brewed beverages.

He cited examples of illegal concoctions known by names such as Malatlha in Ghanzi, Motwane wa Nurse and Motse o teng legodimong in Lobatse, which are often disguised to avoid detection by law enforcement.

"These are not the kinds of brews we want. We need legitimate, well-prepared traditional beers that can be regulated through dikgosi," he said.

He warned that some brewers were in the habit of adding harmful ingredients, and announced that provisions would be made for the testing of brews to ensure safety, with noncompliant products banned from brewing permanently.

The assistant minister has also called on residents of Kgalagadi North to document all their traditional homemade beer for recognition purposes under the ongoing review of the Liquor Act.

He explained that previous reviews of the Act did not comprehensively capture traditional brews, leaving them unregulated and unrecognised.

"The new Act seeks to

address these gaps by ensuring that traditional beers across the country are registered and legitimised," he said.

Mr Mathoothe further pointed out that although the Traditional Beer Regulations of 2011 were introduced to regulate homebrewed beers and curb illicit brews, challenges persisted.

For instance, he said Chibuku powder currently being sold in retail outlets was not approved for brewing and selling as a traditional beer.

"While this product has proven safe for consumption, it was not categorised under home-brewed traditional beer during the enactment of the regulations," he

He also noted that the current Act prohibits the sale of Chibuku from residential premises, allowing only commercial outlets, saying the issue could also be revisited.

Mr Mathoothe explained that the objective of the ongoing review was to close regulatory gaps in the current law and strengthen penalties for noncompliance to better manage the liquor industry.

He said the current Liquor Act provided for reduced trading hours and required outlets to be at least 500 metres away from schools, highways, major roads, or churches to minimise the proliferation of liquor outlets.

"In some areas, there have been calls to review this distance down to 250 metres, hence the need to re-examine whether these measures are still relevant," he added.

Mr Mathoothe acknowledged persistent challenges in the enforcement of the current Act, including noise pollution, continued non-compliance by outlets and consumers, and lenient penalties.

He added that concerns such as over-regulation and fronting in the liquor sector would also be addressed during the review

Kgosi Merapelo Tshweneyagae of Hukuntsi welcomed the

ongoing review of the Liquor Act, describing it as both timely and necessary to address the growing social ills linked to alcohol abuse in local communities.

Kgosi Tshweneyagae said alcohol had become a leading contributor to family dysfunction and social problems in the district

He attributed the abuse of alcohol to high unemployment rate, which he said had driven many people to seek comfort in consuming alcohol consumption.

Kgosi Tshweneyagae also raised concerns over the sale of a local homebrew known as Sejobajoba, which is prohibited to be brewed under the current law but continues to be sold in some retail outlets.

Beyond the liquor issue, the traditional leader highlighted other challenges hindering economic growth in Kgalagadi North.

He cited poor road infrastructure, particularly the Hukuntsi-Ncojane and Tshane-Tsabong roads, which he said were essential trade corridors that could unlock economic potential for the district and the nation at large. **BOPA**

Mining show targets ordinary Batswana

GABORONE - The upcoming inaugural Botswana Mining Show slated for October 21 to 23 in Gaborone, Ditshupo Hall, aims to open the mining sector to ordinary Batswana.

The show organiser and Progressive Institute chief executive officer, Mr Mmoloki Mmolotsi, stated on Tuesday during the Botswana Mining Show stakeholders and media breakfast meeting.

Progressive Institute chief operations officer, Mr Willard Machado, explained that the show would transform the journey for Botswana's mining landscape.



Official urges Botswana to accede to human rights treaties

GABORONE -The United Nations resident coordinator in Botswana, Ms Wenyan Yang, has called on Botswana to accede to critical international human rights treaties of the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR) and the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness.

Speaking at consultation held in Gaborone on Tuesday, Ms Yang, emphasised the importance of embedding these treaties into Botswana's national development strategies to ensure that, "no one is left behind."

"These actions will reaffirm Botswana's values of equality, justice and shared humanity, they will also strengthen its standing as a regional leader in human rights," said Ms Yang.

She highlighted that accession to the ICESCR would reinforce international Botswana's credibility, improve monitoring and reporting mechanisms and unlock access to global partnerships and technical support.

"Acceding to the ICESCR is not just a legal step, it is a strategic

investment in Botswana's future, it will promote prosperity for all by embedding rights-based accountability into national plans such as Vision 2036 and the broader economic transformation agenda," she said.

She said the ICESCR ensured equal attention to fundamental economic, social and cultural rights, including education, healthcare, decent work, housing and an adequate standard of living.

These rights, Ms Yang noted, were essential for dignity and were key to reducing poverty, inequality and social exclusion.

She pointed out that so far, 173 countries had ratified the ICESCR, adding that in Southern Africa, Botswana, Comoros and Mozambique remained the only countries yet to do so.

Further, Ms Yang called on government to also accede to the 1961 Convention on the Reduction Statelessness, describing statelessness as a 'fundamental human rights crisis' that left millions of people worldwide invisible and vulnerable.

"Stateless individuals often face relentless isolation, poverty and stigma because they are not recognised as nationals by any state, legal identity is not just a technical issue, it is central to dignity, access to services and national development," she said.

She commended Botswana for aligning its national legislation with international norms and for previously acceding to the 1954 Convention relating to the Status of Stateless Persons.

However, she stressed that it was now time to take the next step by joining the 1961 Convention and implementing the Draft National Action Plan to end and prevent statelessness.

Ms Yang pledged support of the United Nations in Botswana through technical assistance, capacity building and policy dialogue to help translate

treaty commitments into real improvements in people's lives.

Ministry for International Relations permanent secretary, Mr Thuso Ramodimoosi reaffirmed Botswana's commitment international cooperation human rights.

"Botswana remains dedicated to upholding human rights obligations fostering partnerships," he said. BOPA

Nata to benefit from auction proceeds

GABORONE - A necklace named 'Sebaga Sa Metsi', designed in Botswana which also carries a life changing mission was launched in Gaborone on Tuesday.

Manufactured and designed by Diamond College of Botswana, the first prototype necklace will be auctioned and the proceeds will be used to drill nine boreholes in Nata

Speaking at the launch, the Minister of Minerals and Energy, Bogolo Kenewendo said the prototype necklace was a symbol of modesty and a powerful emblem of Botswana story.

Over a last couple of months, she said, they traversed across the world to share the Botswana diamond story.

She said they shared with the world the soul of Botswana's diamond and the impact that they create, adding that the Sebaga Sa Metsi necklace carries a deep cultural meaning.

Minister Kenewedo said its design was inspired by the iconic African Calabash reflecting the values of substance, unity and community that had long defined who Batswana were.

"Today as we gather here it is not merely to unveil the necklace, but to celebrate a vision that is woven from the threads of our heritage, culture and unweaving commitment to the transformation of Botswana's economy and society," she said.

Furthermore, Ms Kenewendo said Sebaga Sa Metsi which translates as 'the jewel of water' and its symbolism carried a similar life changing mission.

She said the necklace, once brought to life, will be auctioned to help and drill boreholes, in an area that continues to face daily hardships of limited access to clean drinking water.

"In this way the necklace becomes a thread that connects nine boreholes, nine villages in Nata," she said.

Diamond College of Botswana, founder and Director Tsholo Mr Molapisi said one evening as he was scrolling on social media he came across Member of Parliament for Nata/Gweta and assistant minister of health decrying that his area had no water.

He said as a Motswana in the diamond industry he realised that he had to do something given that water was a basic necessity of life.

Sebaga sa metsi necklace, he said was not merely a work of art but a story, a testament, and a symbol of hope.

At the heart of the prototype necklace, he said lies a rare blue diamond, a gem which was scarce as a most precious resource it represent-water. Mr Molapisi said in Botswana water was the most limited a vital resource, adding that it shapes the was Batswana live, thrive and survive

"The blue diamond is more than a centre piece, but a reminder of the urgency and importance of water security," he said.

Mr Molapisi said hence the portion of the profits from the sale of the necklace would be dedicated to drilling boreholes in Kgalagadi and Nata/Gweta areas where water scarcity was a daily challenge.

Abotle Juices to create employment

GABORONE Abotle Beverages, a Botswana citizen owned, 100 per cent fruit juice producing company, is projected to employ over 1 000 once fully operational.

The company's CEO, Mr Joseph Gabalebatse said the plan was to outsource services as logistics for the Southern Africa target market.

We are talking mass production with some working in the factory like cleaners, administrators, then there will be those indirectly employed like logistics, Mr Gabalebatse said.

He said they employed young people of ages ranging from 18 to 29 as agents, earning between P12,000 to P15,000.

We realised that employing them on a fixed salary would kill their creativity, marketing skills and business acumen, Mr Gabalebatse explained.


"We are big on youth

empowerment. These are the youth that once we get settled, we will absorb. This is an interim arrangement and looking at them, it is like they prefer it the way it is. We have paid for some of them at LEA to enroll for some business management courses," he said.

With a two-year shelf life, a standard that sets Abotle Beverages apart from other produce, Mr Gabalebatse attributed the quality to the ingredients they used.

"We use only one ingredient which is the fruit. We do not add any sugar. We do not add any water. We do not add any colourants. We do not add anything," he said, and explained that they used an American selfpreservation technology, which was by means of pumping gas into the can.

The technology is patented and therefore, could not disclose the name of the gas except to explain that, once the gas is infused into the juice, it does not temper with

its natural state, leaving the taste as it were on the mother fruit.

Mr Gabalebatse said they had gone through all the tests and complied with National Agricultural Research and Development Institute and Botswana Bureau of Standards specifications.

The juice is packaged in Vietnam but remains a Botswana product because the recipe originates in Botswana by Abotle Beverages.

"We find ourselves in an unfortunate situation because we do not have enough fruits to make this kind of juice. A can of Abotle orange juices needs around 12 oranges to make. Therefore, a container carries 3 000 cases. So, if you multiply 12 by the number for one container, you need more than 800 000 oranges. We do not have that," he said.

So, to achieve the objective of producing pure juice without compromising the standards, Mr Gabalebatse said they looked for a contract manufacturer and found one in Vietnam.

Contract manufacturers have factories but use recipe of the company that conceived the idea.

Vietnam has organic soils because of the tropical climate conditions, abundant fruits and big manufacturing plants, Mr Gabalebatse said.

The CEO said they wanted the juice packaged in Botswana and were in talks with Botswana Investment and Trade Centre, to bulk break, which meant of cases in a container, it means importing in large containers to be locally packaged.

He said manufacturers were also keen on partnering with Abotle Beverages and carried out skills transfer.

Mr Gabalebatse also said they were in talks with Special Economic Zones Authority to have the juice packaged in Botswana, to reduce costs while at the same time creating employment.

He said production started in June, and had sold over 2 000 cases.

We used a bottom up approach by selling to individuals, tuck shops, fuel stations, guest houses and hotels rather than chain stores, to launch and introduction the product, as well as create demand, Mr Gabalebatse said.

South Africa diversifies export after US tariffs disrupt trade

diversification and resilience in its export base as the 30 per cent import tariff imposed by the United States in August has disrupted the country's trade, a South African official has said Tuesday.

"We gather today at one of the most pivotal moments in our nation's economic trajectory. The recent imposition of a 30 per cent tariff by the United States has threatened approximately 30 000 jobs and disrupted trade relationships built over decades," said Zuko Godlimpi, deputy minister of trade, industry and competition.

Speaking at the Export Symposium and Expo in Midrand, Johannesburg, where

JOHANNESBURG - 140 exhibitors from various South Africa should strengthen sectors have gathered for a Africa government officials three-day event to explore new business and market opportunities, Godlimpi said the recent developments underscored the need for diversification and resilience in South Africa's export base.

"This is our wake-up call, a moment demanding that we fundamentally reimagine our approach to international trade, market diversification, economic resilience," he said.

He said BRICS markets, emerging economies in the Gulf region and deeper intra-African trade through the African Continental Free Trade Area presented key opportunities alongside traditional European markets.

However, no announcement has yet been made regarding the outcome of those discussions.

With exports, particularly in the agriculture and automotive sectors, valued in the billions of dollars, it is widely expected that the tariffs, if not reversed, will have the greatest impact on these key industries.

According to Godlimpi, South Africa's exports totaled R184.3 billion (about US\$10.66 billion) in July, up from R170.7 billion in June. And we recorded a trade surplus of nearly R4 billion in August," he added. *Xinhua*

Zimbabwe reaffirms gender equality advancement

Zimbabwe's participation in the Global Leaders' Meeting on Women is a testament to its unwavering commitment to advancing gender equality and women's empowerment, a senior government official said Tuesday.

Mavis Sibanda, permanent secretary in the Ministry of Women Affairs, Community, Small and Medium Enterprises Development, told Xinhua in an interview that 'the forum provides a platform for knowledge exchange, enabling Zimbabwe to learn from global best practices in advancing gender equality and women's empowerment, as well as to share its own experiences and innovations'.

According to Sibanda, the meeting also presented Zimbabwe with an opportunity to further strengthen bilateral and multilateral partnerships in promoting gender equality and women's empowerment.

"This renewed dialogue provides a platform for nations to reaffirm their dedication to implementing the Beijing Declaration and to advancing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, particularly Goal 5: Achieve

gender equality and empower all women and girls," she said.

Zimbabwe is represented at the meeting by Minister of Women Affairs, Community, Small and Medium Enterprises Development Monica Mutsvangwa.

Sibanda said the minister highlighted the progress Zimbabwe had made over the years, from establishing genderresponsive institutions and policies that promoted women's participation in leadership decision-making, to investing in women's economic empowerment.

Measures such as expanding education and training opportunities for girls and young women, and promoting womenowned enterprises through dedicated funding mechanisms and entrepreneurial support programs, were also mentioned, she added.

"These measures demonstrate Zimbabwe's commitment to global development frameworks such as the Beijing Platform for Action and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, particularly Goal 5," Sibanda said.

Since the adoption of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, Zimbabwe has made substantial progress in implementing its provisions through policy reforms, institutional frameworks, and gender-sensitive programming, she added.

The global meeting, Sibanda noted, underscored the urgent need for collective international action to close persistent gender gaps and ensured that women were placed at the centre of sustainable development efforts.

"It further highlights the importance of international cooperation in formulating and implementing policies that empower women politically, socially and economically across all regions," she said.

Sibanda added that the global meeting held profound significance as it marked the 30th anniversary of the landmark 1995 Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing.

The conference, she said, laid the groundwork for the global advancement of gender equality and women's rights through the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, which continues to serve as a key guiding framework for gender equality initiatives worldwide. Xinhua

Team doctor key to fight doping

GABORONE - The need to have a dedicated team doctor in every sporting code in efforts to fight doping among sportspersons cannot be overstated.

In an interview, Botswana Netball Association (BONA) team doctor, Dr Ariisa Babugura said a significant number of doping cases in Botswana were a direct result of sporting codes lacking dedicated doctors.

Dr Babugura indicated that doctors' specialised knowledge was critical for curbing doping, especially because it continued to be a persistent threat in Botswana sport, with cases frequently registered at crucial times before major competitions.

"Without this specialised guidance, athletes are often mistakenly given medication that contain substances prohibited in competition. This simple error could cost an athlete a fortune, or worse, their career. Therefore, it is essential that more doctors show interest in sport to help curb this trend," he said.

On other issues, Dr Babugura said BONA was looking into incorporating sport science into netball. "This initiative focuses on key areas like players lifestyle and diet," he said. He was confident that embracing science would transform players into a high-performing team that was capable of consistently winning medals and titles for the country.

He noted that Botswana already possessed great talent, with some players being among the best and successfully attracting interest from other teams.

He further said the aim was to perform comprehensive medicals for the netball team and use the resulting data to optimise the team for better performance.

Dr Babugura also highlighted that, elite athletes were unique and should not be treated like the general population, given their distinct physiology and needs.

"The few assessments I have done, have already revealed that players were suffering from a condition that is rarely diagnosed by a normal doctor who doesn't understand the needs of an elite athlete," he said. He gave an example of a netball player who might try to lose weight, yet their specific body weight could actually be beneficial in helping them avoid injuries.

Thus, he cautioned netballers against pursuing an idealised body that was not optimal for their position.

"In their attempt to lose weight, they often resort to dieting. This practice is detrimental because the intense demands of training and national team camps can lead to low energy availability (LEA)," he said. He added that LEA can negatively affect an athlete's menstrual cycle, mood, bone density and immunity and in turn make them susceptible to various illnesses and injuries.

"The best way to prevent this and maintain a healthy weight for performance is not through dieting, but by ensuring the athletes eat more when they are in training," he said.

On the other hand, the National Anti-Doping Coordinating Office (NADCO) anti-doping coordinator, Fred Seno pointed out that the rise in doping cases was a result of a convergence of factors.

Seno said such factors included limited education and awareness and general lack of knowledge among athletes, coaches and support staff, including doctors, about what constituted doping and its health or career consequences.

He added that the increasing number of cases could also be attributed to inadequate antidoping education programmes.

He also noted misconceptions, as some athletes believed doping necessary to compete internationally while others succumbed to the pressure to achieve success and highperformance expectations from family, coaches, sponsors and the nation. Furthermore, he said economic and social factors such as poverty and unemployment may push athletes to seek shortcuts to success. Seno also highlighted that limited enforcement capacity, few resources for education, testing, investigations, and results management, also contributed to the doping challenges

Ultimately, he highlighted that collaboration was at the core of anti-doping and every stakeholder, including athletes, had a vital role to play in combating it.

Nevertheless, he said the recently Anti-Doping Bill, passed in Parliament in August was a significant development in the country's sport sector because it would assist in the establishment of a dedicated National Anti-Doping Organisation (NADO), which would be the principal regulatory instrument for anti-doping in the country.

Meanwhile, the Bill was proposed in response to a rise in positive doping cases in sport as well as align the country's anti-doping framework with international best practices.

It would also ensure functional separation between implementing agencies like the Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) and Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNOC),

which focused on sport development and the anti-doping regulatory authority, in line with the World Anti-Doping Code (WADC), to avoid conflicts of interest. The legislation would further provide a strong legal

foundation for anti-doping activities, including testing, investigations, enforcement and education. It would also strengthen the country's efforts to ensure clean sport and safeguard athletes health. *BOPA*
