

Prostate health screening essential - official

LOTLHAKANE EAST -Principal registered nurse at Dilolwe Clinic in Kanye, Mr Matshelo Sethaile, has urged men in Lotlhakane East to undergo prostate examinations.

Mr Sethaile made the appeal during a gender-based violence (GBV) Awareness Day held in Lotlhakane East on Friday.

He emphasised that regular examinations of the prostate gland could aid in early detection of prostate cancer.

He pointed out that an enlarged prostate could lead to various issues for men, including erectile dysfunction, low self-esteem and depression, which could sometimes contribute to violence against their partners.

He encouraged men to seek prostate examinations, noting that an enlarged prostate may become difficult to treat if not addressed promptly.

In his remarks, chairperson of Kanye Men's Sector, Mr Eddy Kgomotso highlighted that statistics show that women were more frequently affected by gender-based violence than men.

However, he asserted that this does not mean men were immune to abuse, as many choose to remain silent and do not report their cases.

Mr Kgomotso underscored that GBV could manifest in various forms, including economic abuse, which primarily impacted men.

He urged men to speak out and report any instances of abuse they encountered.

Councillor for Lotlhakane West Mr Themba Stimela expressed concern regarding the rising cases of GBV in the Kanye District.

He stated that 236 cases of abuse against young people were reported in the district, alongside 38 cases involving children in conflict with the law.

He also noted 15 reported cases of abuse among children in relationships.

He called on men to take the lead in combating gender-based violence and advocated for amendments to legislation aimed at enhancing the fight against these issues.

In her address, Sergeant Michelle Gaoakanye of the Lotlhakane East police expressed alarm over cases of defilement and rape in the area, reporting three cases of defilement and one case of rape recorded in Lotlhakane East in 2023.

Earlier, in her welcome remarks, Kgosi Naledi Ramotswaiso of Lotlhakane East highlighted the importance of addressing issues regarding men being abused by women, encouraging them to speak up and report any cases of abuse they experience. *BOPA*

MoU strengthens professional development

GABORONE - The signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between Botswana Institute of Chartered Accounts (BICA) and Botswana Institute of Banking and Finance (BIBF) has been described as a leap toward strengthening professional development initiatives within Botswana's financial sector.

GABORONE - Motor Vehicle Accident (MVA) Fund has donated specialised training wheelchairs worth P241 200 to the Spinalis Unit at Princess Marina Hospital to strengthen trauma care and rehabilitation services.

Speaking during the handingover ceremony on Monday in Gaborone, MVA Fund chief executive officer, Mr Michael Tlhagwane highlighted the fund's continued efforts to restore dignity and hope to survivors of road traffic crashes.

Mr Tlhagwane said the was aimed at improving the quality of lives of injured people, to give them dignity and hope.

He explained that the donation represented more than a financial contribution.

"It is a symbol of compassion and partnership, each designed to empower newly-injured spinal cord patients to regain independence, confidence and dignity.

He said the donation follows closely after the World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic commemorated Victims, Sunday.

While acknowledging ongoing efforts to promote road safety, Mr Tlhagwane expressed concern over continued preventable road crashes.

"Despite our concerted efforts to educate road users, we still register preventable road crashes, which is regrettable as this leads to loss of lives and serious injuries," he said.

He said Botswana continues to grapple with human cost of road accidents, adding that the latest national statistics indicate that 260 people lost their lives on the roads between January 1 and November 16 this year compared to 270 in the same period in 2024.

"In the week leading up to November 16, four fatalities were recorded, following three fatalities the week prior to the event," he

Mr Tlhagwane said annually around 70 per cent of road traffic victims were men.

"Each statistic represents more than a number, it represents lost fathers, mothers, children, friends, workmates," he said, adding that for every survivor, there was a burden to live with physical, emotional and financial that must be helped lighten.'

Mr Tlhagwane called for collective action, urging all stakeholders to recommit to the responsibilities of delivering quality care to severely injured road crash survivors, advocate for safer roads and responsible driving as well as working tirelessly to reduce the number of families affected by road tragedies.

He expressed gratitude to the Ministry of Health, Princess Marina Hospital, and the Spinalis Unit for their continued partnership in rehabilitating MVA Fund claimants. "Together, we can make a difference, not only in the lives of our claimants but in the health and safety of our nation," said Mr Tlhagwane. BOPA



Plans underway to improve land services

GABORONE - Minister of Water and Human Settlement, Mr Onneetse Ramogapi says government is committed to improving land services by putting in place plans for more efficient service delivery to the people.

Responding to a parliamentary on Monday, Minister Ramogapi said government had commenced to improve land services adding that where it was practical, developments were already being put in place. In order to reach enhanced or optimal status, the Ministry of Lands and Agriculture would require further financial investment, Mr Ramogapi said.

He said in the short term and in seeking to facilitate efficient and a more rapid issuance of secure land tittles, the ministry had taken a decision that land delivery processes that were not catered for in the electronic Land Information System (LIS) be carried out manually. Such processes, he noted included conveyancing, registration of land tittles, all land uses allocations, land transactions and printing of secure Land Tittle amongst others.

The minister, who was responding on behalf of acting Minister of Lands and Agriculture, Dr Edwin Dikoloti, explained that the decision was taken on the background that there were critical process gaps, which were overlooked during the implementation of the LIS development process.

Therefore, he said the problems now manifested as operational challenges that hindered timely customer facilitation.

Furthermore, Mr Ramogapi told Parliament that new forms of land transactions continued to emerge, which carried underlying challenges and in order to deal with them in the short term, both the system and manual processes were used concurrently to ensure seamless service delivery.

He said some legal bottlenecks were being addressed, noting that the review of the Deeds Registry Act was currently at an advanced

One of the key amendments to the Deeds Registry Act, he said, was to remove the requirement for outside figures in the old built up areas on the tribal land. Thus he said once passed, it was expected to unlock Secure Land Tittles in the old built up areas.

Mr Ramogapi highlighted that the review was expected to be tabled during the current Parliament sitting. To prepare for this development, he said land boards had been directed to ensure that their Land Administration Committees met at least twice a month, to speed up consents and

Mr Mmolotsi said the act did not stipulate that the members appointment should be from major tourism districts but rather, on experience and competencies relevant to the sector.

The criteria for appointment of BTO board members was guided by the BTO Act of 2009 and consultations were done internally within government approved structures, Mr Mmolotsi said, further explaining that the main focus was on people with the skills and knowledge to drive the growth of the tourism sector, as well as ensure that BTO governance structures were in compliance with

international standards of similar organisations.

"This is complaint to the standard practice in government, for appointment of board members to serve in parastatals," said Mr Mmolotsi.

He therefore, informed Parliament that the ministry was not intending to review the board structure at the moment.

Mr Mapulanga wanted to know why there was no inclusion of representatives from major tourism districts, namely Chobe, Ngamiland, and Okavango in the new board appointments and the criteria and consultation process that was used in the selection of the members

Answering a parliamentary question from Boteti West MP, Mr Sam Digwa on Thursday, Minister of Local Government and Traditional Affairs, Mr Ketlhalefile Motshegwa said while the ministry continued to experience shortages of key personnel following the relocation of Primary Health Care services in April, measures were under way to rationalise the distribution of existing staff.

Minister Motshegwa said the ministry was also revising its

training plan to address Primary Health Care needs, strengthening public private partnership, human resource development, and exploring international exchange programmes for specialised training.

Recruitment for newly created key positions is in progress, said Minister Motshegwa.

He also said that the ministry continued to capitalise on its proximity to communities to, ensure that health services were brought closer to the people.

Minister Motshegwa said currently, there were 48, 24-hour clinics across the country.

However, these remain inadequate and the ministry is

committed to upgrading five facilities annually, to enhance access, Minister Motshegwa said, adding that the initiative would contribute towards achieving the Universal Health Coverage index target of 75 in the next five years.

He said as the demand for primary health care services increased, the ministry continued to review priorities for establishing health facilities.

He said there were currently 615 primary health care facilities and 1 300 health mobile stops.

While efforts to construct new health facilities continued, he said, the ministry was also strengthening non-institutional health services through the Community Health Worker Programme under the Integrated Community-Based Health Services approach.

The minister said the revitalisation of primary health care required efficient and responsive emergency health care services, particularly in districts characterised by vast distances, scattered settlements, and difficult terrain that delayed access to care.

The current national ambulance fleet, though operational in some districts, remains inadequate to ensure equitable and timely emergency response across the country, Mr Motshegwa said.

Referral services continue to follow established pathways according to levels of care, he added.

Mr Motshegwa said the ministry had proposed a dedicated budget for the procurement of additional ambulances in the next financial year and that was expected to significantly improve service delivery.

That however, the minister said was subject to approval.

Mr Digwa had asked the minister to apprise the House on the specific measures the ministry was undertaking to improve equitable access to healthcare services in rural and remote areas, availability of essential medical personnel and specialists.

He also wanted to know the provision of 24-hour health care in rural areas and settlements, adequacy of primary healthcare facilities and equipment as well as provision of emergency and referral services for critically ill patients. *BOPA*

'Land shortage delayed weigh bridge in Ngoma'

GABORONE - Efforts were made in 1998 to construct a weigh bridge in Ngoma, during the construction of Ngoma-Kasane

While the weigh scale itself was successfully installed, attempts to secure adequate land for office accommodation and staff housing were not successful since the identified area fell within a wildlife management zone, Minister of Transport and Infrastructure said when responding to a question in Parliament on Monday.

ministry was advised to apply for alternative land in Muchenje village, located approximately 10km away from the border but due to delays, the project could not be completed as initially planned and in the process, the weighing scale was vandalised, and later repaired and taken to support the upgrading of Kazungula weigh scale.

The minister said they would continue to observe vehicle traffic volumes at Ngoma border post and if the situation changed, construction of a weigh bridge would be considered.

Currently traffic volumes have declined with movements comprising small volumes of second-hand vehicles and a limited range of other goods, Mr Salakae said. He said in the past, the route experienced substantial heavy vehicle traffic, particularly trucks transporting sugar and other products from Zimbabwe to Namibia. Drugs shortage intervention needs concerted efforts

GABORONE - Drugs shortage could have been averted if the government had heeded the call of technocrats in the Ministry of Health, says Ngami legislator, Mr Phillimon Aaron.

The MP made the remarks on Thursday when responding to President Advocate Duma Boko's State-of-the-Nation Address (SONA).

He said the previous government did not act when alerted to the expiry of some critical drugs, and the Umbrella for Democratic Change government also failed to heed the advice, leading the country to a dire drug shortage situation.

As such, he said some deaths and complications of some chronic illnesses could have been avoided. Also, Mr Aaron said areas such as the Okavango were hard hit by the situation as they did not have private pharmaceuticals where patients could buy drugs as medicines were not available in government facilities.

He said the time had come for the country to start producing some drugs, noting that there were trained Batswana in the pharmaceutical space.

Mr Aaron pointed to the shortage of personnel as another reason that contributed to patients not getting treatment and surgeries on time.

On other issues, Mr Aaron said that the Botswana Meat Commission bought cattle for P16 per kilogram in Okavango, while the price was higher elsewhere, a situation that caused disparities between Batswana.

Also, the government should be proactive in helping communities that want to invest in the tourism sector, as this benefits communities, not individuals, Mr Aaron said.

Specially elected MP and

Minister of Child Welfare and Basic Education, Ms Nono Kgafela-Mokoka, said the SONA captured the current economic climate and how the government was responding to the challenges it faced. She said government was steadily fulfilling its promises to the people despite having inherited a strained fiscal situation, where employees, suppliers, and farmers were owed.

Ms Kgafela-Mokoka said that increases in the old age pension and TVET students' allowances, water bills amnesty, and reduction of electricity price were some of the achievements of the ruling party. Also, she said while diamonds were not doing well, the government was looking to other sectors, such as the cultivation of industrial hemp, among others.

She said the National Development Plan 12 was the country's roadmap, while the Botswana Economic Transformation Plan was the blueprint that would lead the country to high-income status.

She stated that amid challenges in the ministry, the new curriculum, which was STEM-driven, had been completed, and targeted children from early childhood until Form 5.

The ministry has secured a loan to address challenges in the sector, such as dilapidated buildings and retooling of teachers, it would also assist in the refurbishment and expansion of schools as well as rollout of digitisation.

Takatokwane MP and Minister of Sport and Arts, Mr Jacob Kelebeng when debating said the government was committed to growing sports and the creative industry.

He said the government had set aside P200 million for the creative industry and was working on the laws and regulations for better management of the sector, while work on the Sport and Recreation Bill is advanced.

Since Botswana will be hosting the World Relays next year, Mr Kelebeng said the ministry has devised a hosting strategy, to position the country as a regional events hub He said the ministry was reviewing the national incentive policy and partnering with the private sector to enhance sports.

'Govt on course to improve citizen lives'

GABORONE - Since assuming the reigns of state power in 2024 the Umbrella for Democratic Change (UDC) government has been working toward improving systems of governance for the benefit of the nation.

This was said by the Minister of Local Government and Traditional Affairs, Mmadinare legislator, Mr Ketlhalefile Motshegwa when contributing to the State-of-the-Nation Address (SONA) debate on Monday.

Already, Mr Motshegwa said the government would lead a comprehensive review of the constitution in order to improve the country's legal framework, ensure checks and balances, and that all were offered unalienable rights.

He further said government would also work on legislation to strengthen the role and independence of oversight institutions such as Parliament, Ombudsman and the Directorate on Corruption of Economic Crime in order for them to provide necessary checks and balances.

The government has also been working on the restoration of trust in the judicial system, and in better accountability and proper management of public finances, he said.

Mr Motshegwa further said the government was keen to implement social protection measures, including increasing the old age pension allowance to P1 800, introducing a P300 child grant, as well as the construction of 100 000 affordable housing units through the Bonno National Housing Programme.

He also said a Community Based Natural Resource Management policy was being drafted, as well as a community empowerment programme to improve rural livelihoods.

The minister added that there would also be a review of the destitute policy and the Remote Area Development Programme as well as the reformation of Village Development Committee guidelines to make them more efficient.

Government has mobilised funds to finance investment projects that will create jobs and increase the nation's revenue streams through the Botswana Economic Transformation Programme and National Development Plan (NDP)

For his part, Tonota MP, Mr Gaefele Sedombo, said he was pleased his constituency would have a new stadium as well as a proposed primary school in Tonota West.

He lamented that Shashe River School was not in a good state and called on education authorities to work on refurbishing it, and for the board of governors structure to be reinstituted in schools to assist in addressing such issues.

Mr Sedombo said Semotswane and Mandunyane also required a new school, which would also ensure better proximity for learners.

While lauding the government for introducing the Bonno National Housing Programme, Mr Sedombo called for the speedy allocation of plots to permit people to qualify.

Mr Sedombo also called for better internal roads, storm water drainage systems and better provision of potable water in the Tonota constituency. He stressed the need for a new primary hospital to be constructed in Tonota.

Major General Pius Mokgware, for his part said, the proposed introduction of a 24-hour government would lead to better service delivery and job creation, which would stimulate the modernisation of Botswana's economy.

Maj. Gen. Mokgware, who is the Minister of Labour and Home Affairs and a specially elected MP, said the proposal pitched to the nation by President Advocate Duma Boko was a progressive measure.

He said the introduction of the 24-hour economy would entail people working the same job on three, eight hour shifts, which would lead to more people being employed, and greater productivity as workers would not be tired of serving long overtime hours.

This would also afford citizens better service delivery, as paying levies, acquiring or renewing licenses and other basic services would be availed timeously at different hours of the day.

Already, he said the Government Accounting and Budgeting System had been operating more consistently and more efficiently.

He also noted that there had been greater civil liberties since the UDC assumed power, saying there was greater freedom of speech since President Boko assumed the presidency.

He however, cautioned that the rise in stock theft posed a national security threat, and the state security organs should work toward addressing the issue and root out the criminal element within society. **BOPA**

Routine maintenance in Kgatleng schools priority

GABORONE - Government through the Ministry of Local Government and Traditional Affairs, is committed to executing a high priority and real time intervention concerning maintenance of schools' infrastructures in Kgatleng East constituency.

Local government minister, Mr Ketlhalefile Motshegwa, explained to Parliament that, the ministry was aware of the persistent infestation of bats in classrooms and teachers' quarters in some of the schools found in the constituency.

To address the situation, he said ceilings were being removed in affected facilities for cleaning, disposal and intensive sealing of all bats entry points to prevent immediate recurrences and immediate disinfection.

Mr Motshegwa said the critical works were done in-house using council personnel and Ipelegeng labour to maintain fiscal prudence.

A comprehensive and long-term intervention and rehabilitations will be fully executed once funds permit, he said, adding that the ministry would continue to engage with relevant authorities to establish a joint collaboration.

He said the joint collaboration would not only manage and control bat populations but would also facilitate discussions to determine the need to commission research concerning the risks of zoonotic transmissions from such infestations. Furthermore, he said the discussions would inform the development of safe, sustainable and comprehensive guidelines for long term remedies.

He said the ministry continued to engage with the Kgatleng District Council, to mitigate maintenance issues and achieve a fair state of operational readiness.

"To address these urgent national needs, the ministry has submitted a development maintenance budget proposal for consideration under National Development Plan 12 and Botswana Economic Transformation Programme, across the country," he said.

He promised visible improvements in the learning environment resulting from active short-term interventions designed to ensure facilities are habitable.

Kgatleng East MP, Mr Mabuse Pule had asked the minister whether the ministry was actively addressing the poor infrastructure and maintenance challenges in schools within Kgatleng East constituency.

He further asked the minister to state whether the ministry was aware of the persistent infestation of bats in classrooms and teachers' quarters in several schools, a situation he said posed serious health, safety and hygiene risks to learners and educators.

The legislator also asked what real time interventions were being actively pursued to eradicate bat infestations and prevent recurrences in affected facilities. In light of global pandemics such as COVID-19 suspected to have zoonotic origins,

Mr Pule wanted to know if the ministry intended to commission research into the risks of such transmissions and also to develop guidelines for safe remediation.

In addition, Mr Pule asked whether the ministry had engaged with Kgatleng District Council to facilitate routine inspections and timely interventions of maintenance in schools and teachers' quarters and when the constituents should expect visible and measurable improvements in their learning centres. *BOPA*

Precision farming challenge to operators

LOTLHAKANE EAST -Lack of knowledge on the use of precision farming implements such as the technologically advanced planters by self-taught operators has been identified as one of the primary challenges for local farmers.

Mr Philip Keosentse, a farmer at Mmasenyetse fields shared the concern during the precision planter demonstration to farmers held recently at Go-Moeng fields courtesy of John Deere-Agri Equipment.

Mr Keosentse said many of the local tractor operators were self-trained, riding on their basic vehicle driving experiences, therefore limiting their understanding in operating some pertinent ploughing implements.

He said the challenge affected mostly subsistence farmers as some cannot afford to acquire such training.

"If the tractor dealership could at least partner with farmers in training the owner or the operator within the warranty period it would encourage farmers to welcome the technological developments," he said.

Mr Keosentse said proper training was highly recommended as operator demonstrations were not enough.

Mr Moarabi Itumeleng, a farmer at Maisane, shared the same sentiments that it will take time to venture into precision farming.

He said he was still hooked to using the usual traditional planter, as it was manually operated and less complex.

Meanwhile, the technical marketer at John Deere agric equipment, Mr Zein Mopati has during the precision planter illustration explained to farmers that the planter was designed such that it was able to place seeds in the soil at a specific depth spacing and position as compared to the common traditional planters.

Mr Mopati said traditional planters were without much control and that precision planters were technologically advanced with software's and sensors to ensure optimal seed planting and have high chances of increased yield.

He said the planter could offer adjustable row spacing to suit specific crop types and field conditions.

Mr Mopati further highlighted that the planter's accuracy in dropping seeds or fertilisers was crucial in maximising crop germination and crop potential.

However, he warned farmers of the use of ungraded seeds and the importance of understanding viable seeds in order to maximise germination. *BOPA*

Botswana, South Africa need to collaborate

KANYE - Botswana's recent decision to reopen its market to South African agricultural produce should be met with reciprocal measures, as both countries stand to benefit from deeper cooperation in agricultural value chains.

This was said by Ministry of Trade and Entrepreneurship's Chief Negotiator, Mr Phazha Butale who emphasised the importance of sustained engagement between the neighbouring countries to strengthen agriculture and agroprocessing industries.

He noted that the two nations

should develop joint mechanisms to address instances of bumper harvests that may leave producers with unsold stock. In such cases, he said, temporary or partial restrictions could be introduced, supported by a clear communication system to ensure traders are not negatively affected. He said that Botswana's import restrictions were designed to build competitive capacity of local farmers, enabling them to eventually compete on equal footing with foreign producers.

This strategy, he said was complemented by various government initiatives aimed at boosting the agricultural sector.

Mr Butale said that regional farmers if prices fell below the

trade works best when it flowed in both directions, as countries must sell what they produce in order to generate revenue to purchase what they do not have. According to him, lifting the import ban had already yielded benefits for consumers by improving supply, lowering prices, and expanding the variety of available vegetables.

He warned, however, that extended protectionism may lead to complacency among producers, resulting in reduced quality and increased prices. While increased imports generally push prices downward, Mr Butale cautioned that excessive price drops could disadvantage local

cost of production, potentially forcing some out of business.

He said that lifting of the ban could therefore be good for consumers because increase in supply would normally drive prices downward.

CTOC Farms' Ms Chedza Siwawa said that lifting the ban had benefited both consumers and retailers through improved supply, quality, and affordability.

However, she emphasised that Botswana's horticulture sector still needed some level of protection, as local producers struggled to compete with the scale, pricing, and quality of South Africa's large horticultural enterprises. *BOPA*

...Good night, The Godfather!

BOBONONG - Endowed with relentless wit for pictorial communication, the prolific and multiple awards winner, Godfrey Mpuse has just retired his camera and transitioned to join his ancestors, leaving behind a trail of heavy, broken and harrowed hearts of family, friends, colleagues and fans of his art.

Goddy as Godfrey was affectionately called by colleagues, bore exceptional talent in photography. Unmatched. Many of his awards locally and even beyond the borders of Botswana are testimonials enough.

As this reporter gather strength and put on all his might, it dawns on him that the multiple awards conveyor belt for both the department and himself has suddenly come to a screeching stop. The man whom we got accustomed to greeting each other with a strong shout of "Khuwa khuwa" has reportedly succumbed to his ailments and all I'm left with is the memories we created together.

This is the first photographer I attended an Arts & Culture event with while a newbie at *BOPA*.

I was some days old when Goddy, Mmopi and I were assigned to cover an event at Duma Grounds dubbed Summer Splash sometimes in December of 2008.

We hardly knew each other and because he could really bend his elbows he tested if I were part of the team. I passed with undoubtedly flying colours. So, before the event, on a Saturday evening, we went into some drinking hole and guzzled some holy waters while awaiting the driver to pick us up. Morale booster of some kind. It worked magic for colleagues who barely knew each other.

Fast-forward to midnight when the even started, many artists performed under the drizzling rains. He was hard at work painting memories with his lens. I had my notebook which barely was of any use since my excitement hit sky high.

When Deben Natale and his team of Kalakuta Records hit the stage, Goddy snapped a few pictures before delving into the unexpected. Yes, unexpected by I, the greenhorn. With his gumboots, Goddy stomped the waterlogged grass and led a choir that eventually bunged in numbers as everyone followed suit. At this point he retired his lens and hung his camera on his huge shoulders.

Sometimes I suspect he even surprised himself, too. But we nearly fell into trouble. He was late to submit the photos while I, too, was late to file the article on Sunday morning. It earned us the ire of the then Chief press officer the late Mr. Koziba Batungamile. But owing to Goddy's experience and abilities to negotiate tough terrains, we prevailed over the fuming CPO. Our then assignment editor, Rebaone Tswiio, immensely backed us up with evidence of the article and photographs. We defeated the CPO and got our overtime claims, my first, authorised albeit with conditions.

The Summer Splash event opened doors to our closeness.

Goddy would always consult with me on the angle of the story I intended to take so that he could work on pictures that augured well. He loathed a picture and article that we're seemingly at war.

Since then, Goddy earned my respect. Not just as an experienced photographer, but as a brother.

He knew how to cajole a younger colleague into negotiating for holy waters at events we were invited to, especially when the conveyer belt seemed to have lost power.

At one point, at Gaborone Sunthe now Avani, Goddy played his cards on me. He told me that one of the waitresses was smiling at me.

I checked her out and indeed she was. And so, Goddy thought I should use the opportunity to divert her attention to our table frequently. To cut a long story short, we had mad fun that night.

Goddy and I have enjoyed a cordial working relationship whenever we found ourselves attending various government activities together.

At some point we covered the launch of Nyeletso Lehuma at Struizendam where he found me to be a nuisance after I bended my elbow a multiple times that

evening. For every mistake, intended or honest, Goddy would call it a "foul," a term synonymous with sport, especially football. He used this term on everyone who committed a mistake or error of judgement. He would do so in a provocative laughter to ensure that the next person knows about. But when it comes to himself, Goddy would crack in laughter of self-pity.

That night at Struizendam, he was afraid I was going to pull off so many successful 'fouls' that him and Thato Mosinyi avoided me greatly. However, I was the lucky guy that night.

Details are withheld.

Then there was Rural Development Council event at Dikhukhung in Borolong. Goddy, Thato and I, graced the occasion together with one Aaron Moreeng. What a night we had under the spell of bonfire and holy waters that flew endlessly. We planned ahead for the nights as that one. Fearing that the then deputy permanent secretary, Mr. Mogomotsi Kaboeamodimo may want to check on us and read our script, Goddy and Thato devised an anti-Kaboeamodimo plan: we put our holy bottles inside a litter bin provided for us at the campsite and laced them with ice.

Water and Kaboeamodimo-tight plan. But the bin 'sweat profusely' which nearly got us caught. That night of stories and laughter, Goddy got stung by an insect we called anaconda. He had to hide in his tent and burst in laughter to every hilarious piece from there.

These and many more stories we shared with Goddy, The Godfather of pictorial communication.

This is one guy who would, without a word, inspire one to put effort and be creative in their work so as to garner recognition and awards.

Now that his lens has retired, the shutter of his camera beat him to life, I can only look back and marvel at the towering photo journalist Mr Godfrey Mpuse was. I send my heartfelt condolences to his wife and children, family, relatives, colleagues friends and fans alike. Good night, The Godfather! *BOPA*



GABORONE - "I fear the white man's liquor more than I fear the assegai of the Matebele," the historic quote by Khama III (1837–1923), could easily have been attributed to Jwaneng Galaxy spokesperson Tankiso Morake after this weekend's round of fixtures.

This sentiment would have reflected the relief of seeing his side withstand an early onslaught from Matebele FC, absorbing wave after wave of attacks, remaining composed despite trailing early, and ultimately emerging the stronger side with a 3-2 triumph over the Kgatleng outfit.

The three vital points reduced the gap at the top of the FNB Premiership log to a single point, with Galaxy now on 25 points one behind leaders, Gaborone United but crucially, with a game in hand.
