

# BoMRA warns against use of unregistered herbal medicines

Botswana Medicines Regulatory Authority (BoMRA) has issued a warning against the unregulated sale and use of herbal medicines, particularly those sold on the streets and through social media platforms.

In an interview with the authority's public relations officer, Mr Israel Kgosidiile, said BoMRA acknowledged that some members of the public might resort to herbal or traditional remedies when conventional medicines were unavailable.

He stressed that such products must always meet standards of safety, quality and efficacy before being used.

"BoMRA recognises that limited access to conventional medicines may lead some patients to seek alternative options, including herbal remedies, however, reliance on unregulated products poses significant health risks and should not be viewed as a safe substitute for regulated medical treatment," said Mr Kgosidiile.

He noted that herbal medicines, while often regarded as natural, were not automatically safe, adding that products imported into Botswana must be registered

or authorised by BoMRA before they could be distributed or sold.

Mr Kgosidiile confirmed that BoMRA regulated herbal medicines under the Medicines and Related Substances Act of 2013 and its accompanying regulations of 2019.

He pointed out that the authority oversaw registration, licensing, product evaluation, labeling and post-market surveillance, adding that herbal products sold without authorisation were considered illegal.

"The sale of herbal medicines on the streets or through social media platforms without BoMRA authorisation is unlawful, medicines can only be sold through licensed and approved premises and by authorised persons," he said.

Mr Kgosidiile therefore, said BoMRA expressed concern over the proliferation of herbal products advertised on platforms such as Facebook, WhatsApp and Instagram, adding that many of those products, the authority warned, were of unknown origin, lacked proper labeling, and made unverified therapeutic claims.

"We strongly warn the public against purchasing medicines through social media, such products are often unsafe,

counterfeit or contaminated. Members of the public should only obtain medicines from licensed pharmacies and authorised outlets," Mr Kgosidiile warned.

He confirmed that the authority had put in place various enforcement measures to protect the public, including market surveillance, product sampling and the seizure of illegal items while sellers found in violation of the law might face closure of their premises, prosecution or other penalties.

While BoMRA's main mandate is regulation, it works closely with the Ministry of Health and other

partners to support medicine availability within the national health supply chain, reaffirming that patient safety remains a top priority.

"Natural does not mean safe, the public should only use medicines, whether herbal or conventional, that have been approved by BoMRA and obtained through legal channels," said Mr Kgosidiile.

He therefore, encouraged the public to report any suspected illegal sales of medicines and to always seek professional medical advice before using any herbal or traditional remedies. **BOPA**

# First Ladies support teenage mothers

During their joint visit to Lesirane Clinic in Mogoditshane on Friday for the unveiling of the MPEPU initiative, the two first ladies, Kaone Boko and Angeline Ndayishimiye Ndayubaha of Burundi, radiated a supportive, maternal vibe towards teenage mothers. They stood united, not only by protocol but by a shared purpose.

While many perceive teenage pregnancy as the end and not the beginning of something to look forward to, the two first ladies brought a message of hope and compassion to the young faces carrying a mix of fatigue and uncertainty, one that said, teenage pregnancy could in fact be the beginning of something new.

Both Ms Boko and Ms Ndayishimiye Ndayubaha are members of the Organisation of African First Ladies for Development (OAFLAD), which is committed to addressing among other things, adolescent sexual and reproductive health across the continent.

"Our mission in OAFLAD is to take care of adolescent sexual and reproductive health," said Ms Boko, and added that at the heart of the mission were teenage expectant mothers, young girls who too often faced stigma, silence and isolation at the very moment they needed support the most.

Ms Boko spoke candidly about the importance of early antenatal care, urging the young mothers to

register at health facilities as soon as possible, to allow healthcare providers to identify challenges in time and offer the necessary interventions to ensure safe pregnancies and deliveries.

"Accessing care on time helps us to get adequate support and to give birth safely," she said, reminding the girls that their health mattered, not only for

themselves, but for the children they carried.

Ms Boko noted that access to care was not always easy. She said as she travelled across villages, she often heard troubling stories from young people who were mocked or dismissed when seeking information about family planning or sexual and reproductive health.

"Some are discouraged

by parents, while others face judgment even from healthcare workers. When we condemn them, we block them from seeking help and the right information and that leads them into trouble or pregnancy," said Ms Boko.

She therefore, appealed to parents, leaders and communities to allow young people to access health services freely, without

shame or blame. She urged teenage mothers to not allow shame to steal their future.

"Do not be ashamed to go back to school, be bold, continue your life," she urged, and acknowledged the harsh judgments many young mothers faced, especially whispers, stares and rejection, but encouraged them not to dwell on those voices, but focus on rebuilding their lives, step by step.

Ms Ndayishimiye Ndayubaha reinforced the message of dignity and hope that resonated deeply among the young mothers.

"You are not alone, your current situation does not diminish your dignity, your personal worth or your potential," she said.

She spoke as a mother, an African woman and a first lady, acknowledging the fear, doubt and sadness that could accompany pregnancy at a young age, but reframed the experience as a possible turning point, a new chapter marked by resilience and determination.

"This experience does not define who you are, it can become the beginning of growth," she said.

Ms Ndayishimiye Ndayubaha also emphasised that education remained the key to the future, saying motherhood, should never become an obstacle to dreams and aspirations.

Both first ladies stressed that supporting young mothers was not the responsibility of governments alone instead, families, communities, faith leaders and institutions all had a role to play in creating environments where young girls were heard, respected and supported. As the event drew to a close, the first ladies presented MPEPU maternity gift bags to the teenage mothers, a symbolic gesture that acknowledged how demanding parenting could be and to remind the girls that they were not forgotten. **BOPA**

# ConCourt to address legal framework challenges

The President was speaking during a consultative meeting with Ntlo Ya Dikgosi at the Mass Media Complex in Gaborone on Friday. He said people had varying ideas over important constitutional matters and that the Constitutional Court could be an arbiter.

Whereas some interpret Section 106 of the constitution as preventing the right for election petitions to reach the Court of Appeal, the President said others still read a different interpretation, and such contentions could be mediated by the Constitutional Court.

Sections 77, 78 and 79 of the Constitution, which prescribe representation in Ntlo Ya Dikgosi has also been a bone of public contention, and such varying views could be ventilated over the review process and a solution mediated by a Constitutional Court.

The President also cited the example of Monnanyana versus the State case of 2002 where a court admitted that they had erred, raising the 'functus officio' principle (a body being unable to alter its own decision) thus unable to remedy the circumstances of a person who had stayed in jail longer than should have been

the case.

He said Section 3 to 16 of the constitution was a Bill of Rights that was sacrosanct as it involved fundamental human rights, but the establishment of the Constitutional Court and the review would focus on other aspects such as distribution of power, establishment of institutions and entrenching further rights.

President Boko said that it was important for the Constitutional Court to precede the comprehensive constitutional review exercise, as the latter was a complex process of examining and amending the country's

He acknowledged that it had been an oversight for the executive to not consult with the parliamentary advisory chamber before the Bill was gazetted.

President Boko offered an apology to members of Ntlo Ya Dikgosi for not consulting with them prior to the Constitutional Court Bill being tabled before the National Assembly late last year.

Nonetheless, the President said the consultative meeting, while commencing after the bill had passed through the committee stage of the National Assembly, was still important to bring Ntlo Ya Dikgosi on board with regards to the importance of the establishment of the Constitutional Court.

In discussing the President's submission, Kgosi Puso of Batlokwa said their request as members of Ntlo Ya Dikgosi was that before tabling a Bill on an important issue such as constitutional reforms, the Cabinet minister responsible should meet them privately to explain the motive and aspects of the Bill.

This would permit Ntlo Ya Dikgosi to debate complex matters of national importance from a more informed position in the best interest of the public they represented.

Kgosi Lotlaamoreng II of Barolong called for Ntlo Ya Dikgosi to be offered basic training on the law and the interpretation of statutes in order for them to discuss constitutional issues from a more informed position.

For her part, Kgosi Mosadi Seboko of Balete stressed the need for countrywide consultation and public education on constitutional matters, in order for the public to contribute meaningfully on any reform exercise.

Ntlo Ya Dikgosi chairperson, Kgosi Malope II of Bangwaketse said they had heeded the requests for the President to further explain the Constitutional Court, as they felt there had been a need for more dialogue.

The President promised Ntlo Ya Dikgosi representatives that he would soon meet them privately for further consultation and discussion on the matter. **BOPA**

## Ministry imposes ban on movement of cloven-hoofed animals in three districts

### GABORONE

The Ministry of Lands and Agriculture has imposed a ban on the movement of cloven-hoofed animals into, out of and within Zones 3b, 3c, 6b and 7 following a report of an outbreak of Foot-and-Mouth Disease (FMD) in Zimbabwe's Mangwe District in Matabeleland South Province.

A press statement from the ministry says movement will be allowed only in cases where animals are being moved for purposes of direct slaughter,

and that livestock from these zones are not eligible for export or slaughter for export.

Farmers and stakeholders, particularly in the Tutume, North-East and Bobirwa districts are therefore urged to remain vigilant as the Matabeleland South Province shares a border with their respective areas.

The three districts are advised to observe FMD preventative measures which include controlling movement of livestock by herding and kraaling especially at night, identifying all cattle by owners'


and zonal branding and BAITS ear tags, filing immediate reports to veterinary offices or the police for any suspected signs of FMD such as lameness, drooling and ulcers in the mouth, muzzle and hooves.

Moreover, the ministry urges farmers to report Zimbabwe cattle that have crossed into Botswana and Botswana livestock that have crossed into Zimbabwe or livestock suspected to have returned from the neighbouring country.

They are also encouraged to report acts of vandalism of the

disease control fence as well as those of illegal crossing at undesignated points, illegal importation from Zimbabwe of livestock or any risk materials such as raw meat and milk, or any activities that might put the country at risk of FMD.

The ministry urges communities along the border with Zimbabwe to support government disease prevention efforts such as maintaining cordon fences, removal of livestock from the border and combatting cross-border illegal activities. **BOPA**

# Police ramp up fight against crime

In a region where rivers flood roads, wildlife blocks access routes and some communities located hours away from the nearest police station, responding to crime on time becomes a challenge.

This is the reality that prompted government to launch the Botswana Police Service Air Unit in Maun, to serve the vast and complex North West region.

The air unit launched during a ceremony officiated by the Minister for State President, Defence and Security in Maun on Thursday, marks a strategic shift in how law enforcement will operate across Ngamiland and Chobe defined not only by distance, but by water channels, dense vegetation and protected wildlife zones that often make ground patrols slow or impossible.

Rather than being a symbolic unveiling of aircraft and equipment, the initiative is a deliberate response to long-standing operational gaps that have limited police reach, delayed emergency responses and constrained border and wildlife-related policing in the region.

Public security remains central to national development, peace and stability form the foundation upon which tourism, trade and community livelihoods depend, Minister for State President, Defence and Security, Mr Moei Mohwasa said during the launch.

He said the North West region, as a major contributor

to Botswana's economy through tourism and conservation, required policing solutions that matched its unique terrain.

While acknowledging the current economic pressures, he

said the air unit would begin operations with one aircraft, with plans to expand the fleet when fiscal conditions improved.

The long-term vision includes the integration of drone technology

and decentralisation of air policing services to other strategic parts of the country.

For the Botswana Police Service, the Maun air unit is not new ground, but an expansion of a journey that began in Gaborone in 2008 with limited resources and nationwide responsibility.

Commissioner of Police, Ms Dinah Marathe explained that centralising air operations in the capital had placed immense strain on personnel, equipment and response times, particularly for northern districts.

She noted that the opening of a Francistown-based air office in 2012 helped ease some pressure but still left the North West underserved due to distance and terrain.

The Maun unit, she said, directly addressed that gap by positioning aerial resources closer to areas where they were most needed.

Ms Marathe highlighted that crime trends in the North West had generally declined in recent years, particularly property-related offences.

However, she cautioned that stock theft, cross-border crime, illegal immigration, missing persons in forests and drowning incidents in major rivers continued to pose serious challenges that required faster detection and response capabilities.

"The ability to respond swiftly can make the difference between prevention and loss," she said, adding that air mobility would significantly strengthen surveillance, search-and-rescue operations and rapid deployment during emergencies.

Ms Marathe also underscored the importance of community involvement, reiterating that policing could not succeed in isolation.

She stressed the importance of partnerships with local communities, crime prevention committees and other security agencies, even with the improvement of technology and resources.

Mr Mohwasa further stressed that the introduction of air-based policing was part of a broader government commitment to bringing services closer to communities, improving emergency response times, strengthening border security and enhancing crime prevention efforts in areas previously constrained by geography.

For his part, Member of Parliament for Maun East, Mr Goretsetse Kekgongile, welcomed the development, describing it as a practical solution to the realities of policing in the Okavango and surrounding areas.

He said aerial transport would allow the police to reach places that were otherwise inaccessible, ensuring cases were handled promptly and reducing delays that often compromised investigations.

Mr Kekgongile said the unit would not only strengthen law enforcement but also reassure communities that government was actively responding to their security concerns.

Beyond crime prevention, the launch of the air unit also comes amid renewed calls for collective action against persistent social challenges, including gender-based violence, drug abuse and fraud targeting the elderly, particularly pensioners.

Communities have been urged to support law enforcement efforts while also addressing these issues at household and community level.

As Botswana continues to explore technology and innovation to diversify its economy and improve service delivery, the Maun air unit represents a broader shift in thinking, one that recognises that geography should not determine access to safety. BOPA

He also expressed gratitude to FNBB for the partnership which he described as a testament of PEP stores enduring legacy of being one of the most leading school shops.


"This campaign is an investment in Botswana's future."

## Vendors push for bus rank transformation

### MOLEPOLOLE

**Small businesses have joined efforts to turn Molepolole Bus Rank into a business and service hub. After lying ideal for almost a decade, the Molepolole Bus Rank was reopened for use in December 2025.**

However, small businesses and the local transport

operators are still in doubt that the infrastructure will boost their businesses due to a number of shortcomings, primarily shortage of customers.

Their fear is that the bus rank was located in isolation, far from the village centre where people flock to source household amenities and other services from government departments.

In an effort to push for government to establish offices at the bus rank offering daily services, some hawkers are on the verge of registering an association; the Molepolole Bus Rank Association,

primarily to advocate for the bus rank to be turned into a business and essential services hub.

The chairperson of the proposed association, Mr Godfrey Ramokhaneng, a cobbler operating from one of the stalls, is among the few small business owner who, despite challenges, have remained at the bus rank since its establishment.

“Eight days after the bus rank was reopened we met as bus rank vendors to form an association that will serve as a mouthpiece for all vendors around the bus rank,” said Mr Ramokhaneng.

He said the association would serve as a mouth piece for the small businesses, public transport operators and all others including government offices doing business at the bus rank.

Mr Ramokhaneng said the aim of forming an association was to revive commercial activity at the bus rank, which had previously been forced to shut down after businesses and public transport operators abandoned it due to low patronage linked to its isolation location.

He said apart from a small number of commuters to nearby areas, there were no businesses or services in its surrounding to attract movement of people that could ultimately turn into customers for their businesses.

**Angola launches Chinese-invested electrolytic aluminum plant**

**LUANDA** - Angola President Joao Lourenco has inaugurated an electrolytic aluminum plant in Barra do Dande Free Trade Zone, Bengo province, a project to boost regional industrialisation and diversify the national economy.

The project is the result of a partnership with China's Hebei Huatong Wire and Cables Group and is planned to be developed in five phases.

The first phase involves an investment of US\$250 million, expected to produce 120 000 tonnes of electrolytic aluminum annually and create about 1 200 jobs.

At a press conference on Thursday, Lourenco said that Angola needs private investment across all sectors of the economy, not only to ensure more jobs for young people, but above all to expand the range of products and services that benefited the economy and the population. **Xinhua**

**Changi Airport to add 600 extra flights**

**SINGAPORE** - Singapore's Changi Airport will work with multiple Chinese airlines to operate more than 600 supplementary flights to 15 cities in China from February 1 to March 8, more than double the number added during the same period in 2025, amid an anticipated increase in travel demand over the coming Chinese New Year holiday, Changi Airport Group said on Monday.

China is Singapore's largest visitor source market, it said, adding that the Chinese New Year period had long been a key travel window for Chinese visitors, supported by the continued implementation of the China-Singapore mutual visa-free policy and the overlap with winter school holidays. **Xinhua**

**Constructive dialogue takes centre stage at 2026 World Economic Forum**

**DAVOS** - The 2026 annual meeting of the World Economic Forum (WEF) which started yesterday in the Swiss Alpine town of Davos, called for constructive dialogue in a complex global landscape.

A series of publications released by the WEF in the lead-up to the meeting indicated rising risks and downward pressure on the global economy in an increasingly contested and fragmented world. The latest Chief Economists' Outlook pointed out that while the global economic outlook has improved modestly, uncertainty remains. Factors such as shifting asset valuations, rising debt, geoeconomic realignment and the rapid deployment of artificial intelligence are expected to continue impacting the world economy. Under the theme “A Spirit of Dialogue,” the five-day event has drawn nearly 3 000 leaders and experts worldwide. **Xinhua**

Mr Ramokhaneng said the only way to inject life at the bus rank was to associate, join hands as businesses, collaborate with all other private, government and council

stakeholders.

He said businesses that were currently operational at the bus rank, included street vendors and public transport operators.

He said the association would also be a burden reliever to the council in terms of cost sharing especially on matters that included the maintenance of the premises and other billings.

Mr Ramokhaneng said the association would encourage businesses at the bus rank to play a part in its maintenance adding that the Public Private Partnership model must be engaged to establish businesses such as a shopping mall to boost life at the bus rank.

He said through an association it would be easy to convince and lure service providers to establish offices or hold public activities at the bus rank.

He added that working together would also assist businesses in sharing ideas and business experiences that would help them sustain and grow.

One of the vendors at the bus rank, Ms Tinge Kgosiese was equally convinced that the bus rank in its current status was not conducive to sustain small businesses.

“For a small business to thrive it must be strategically located along side major businesses such as a shopping complex, where it would easily be located by customers.”

Kgosiese said her stall had been operating at the bus rank since 2018, but at one point was forced to relocate to where the makeshift bus rank was located in pursuit of customers.

However, she was hopeful that the association would bring life to the bus rank. Ms Agnes Seroojane said the initial opening of the bus rank had brought hope to their businesses as some government department

such as bye-law and transport had relocated some of their services to the bus rank.

However, Ms Seroojane said their stay was short lived as they abandoned the bus rank, derailing efforts of turning the bus rank into a business and service hub. Mr Eric Sefanyetso, one of the long distance public transporters in the Takatokwane-Molepolole road said the Molepolole bus rank was in isolate location and mostly used by long distances buses.

“We cannot refuse to utilise the facility. We are appealing to government to provide services and other social amenities that will attract the local people to take public transport to the rank. The only transport currently utilising bus rank are long distance transporters,” he said.

Mr Sefanyetso said local taxis were limited at the bus rank as they only target the few passengers who were arriving at the bus rank.

He said the movement at the bus rank was only of the few that were travelling to various destinations, while the locals had no business of going to the bus rank as all the

services and other businesses of their daily interest were located far from the bus rank.

Meanwhile, Kweneng District Council Chairman, Mr Ontefetse Rankhibidu said efforts were ongoing to resuscitate life at the bus rank. Mr Rankhibidu said negotiations with some council and government departments and other service providers were ongoing and they promised that they would provide service points at the bus rank.

He added that the idea was for other offices to permanently establish at the bus rank, a move that would sustain small businesses and other activities. **BOPA**

## EU considers hitting US with €93 billion worth of tariffs

BRUSSELS - The European Union is considering hitting Washington with €93 billion (USD107.68 billion) worth of tariffs or restricting American companies from the bloc's market, in response to US President Donald Trump's tariff threats over Greenland, according to Financial Times.

Citing officials involved in the preparations, the Financial Times said the retaliatory measures were being drafted to give European leaders leverage ahead of pivotal meetings with Trump at the World Economic Forum in Davos.

The report said the EU had drawn up the tariff list since last year but kept it suspended until February 6 to avert a trade war.

However, amid the escalation of the transatlantic rift over Greenland, representatives of EU members discussed reactivating it on Sunday, alongside talks about using the Anti-Coercion Instrument, which could curb US firms' access to the

bloc's market. The report came after the eight countries directly targeted by the US proposed tariffs, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, and the United Kingdom, issued a joint statement on Sunday declaring "full solidarity" with Denmark and Greenland.

In a social media post on Saturday, Trump said the United States would levy a 10-percent tariff from February 1 on goods from the mentioned eight countries.

He warned the rate would rise to 25 percent on June 1 and remain in place until a deal was reached for the "complete and total purchase" of Greenland.

Trump, due to attend the World Economic Forum on Wednesday and Thursday, is expected to hold private talks with European leaders, including European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, and to join a meeting of Western countries backing Ukraine. **Xinhua**



# Journo relives back-to-school days

Back-to-school season is never a quiet affair, especially in primary schools.

For teachers, it signals the beginning of long days, limitless patience and the responsibility of shaping young minds.

During a visit to a primary school on the first day of classes on Tuesday, the frenzy was immediate and unmistakable.

For some pupils, it was an exciting return to friends, playtime and new discoveries. For others, it was a daunting leap into unfamiliar routines, new teachers and bigger expectations.

The

environment was messy, loud and downright chaotic, leaving me wondering whether teachers were fully prepared for the mayhem.

Barely an hour into the school day, several standard two learners already had untucked shirts and dusty shoes from running around playing tag.

One little girl had opened her lunchbox too early, sending red juice spewing into the air and splashing all over her face.

Then came the moment I knew I would not leave without witnessing: children crying after their mothers as they were left "alone" at school.

It reminded me of my own first day in standard one. Walking hand in hand with my father across the road to my new school, I had cried uncontrollably.

Having completed two years of preschool, I must have believed that school life was over and

that I was headed for a future of freedom and endless Sesame Street, especially my favorites, Cookie Monster and Elmo's World.

I was wrong. Looking back now, I realise it was never school I feared, but the transition to a bigger, unfamiliar place - a feeling I would experience again years later when starting secondary school and university.

Whether excited, anxious, shy or tearful, it is clear that teachers always have their hands full. I watched one young teacher calmly soothe a crying child, reprimand another for leaving the school premises to buy sweets, and attend to several pupils

demanding attention all at once.

"I am losing my mind," she told me. "It is only day one, and I feel like I have already lost it."

With no words of comfort to offer, I thought of retired primary school teacher Ms Rosemary Mongwa, whose wisdom from decades in the classroom might hold the answers teachers seek today.

At 90 years, with over four decades of teaching experience, Ms Mongwa still spoke of the classroom with a spark in her eyes. She taught in some of Botswana's most remote areas, served as a headmaster whose school achieved a pass rate ranging from 70 to 90 per cent, and taught pupils who would later become national leaders, including Minister of Justice and Correctional Services Mr Nelson Ramaotwana.

For her, patience, informed judgement and exemplary behaviour were the foundations of successful teaching.

"No matter how misbehaved a child is, a teacher must always be fair and never lose warmth," she said, adding that she has always opposed corporal punishment.

She believes teachers must look beyond bad behaviour and understand a child's background before making decisions and assume the position of second parent, treating children as though they were their own.

While concerned that education quality is declining in Botswana, Ms Mongwa encouraged current teachers to revisit older teaching guides and seek wisdom from veteran educators like herself.

"I hope that today's teachers can be the type of exemplary figures that their students will have a hard time forgetting," she said. **BOPA**

Mr Gare acknowledged the importance of the Manyana-Moshupa road, which was reported to be experiencing some delays.


"We believe that all challenges have





# Family calls off search for missing man

The family of 27-year-old Mr Tlwaelo Elias, who went missing at Chobe River on January 9, has called off a search operation that had been launched to find him.

The decision was made after the family expressed satisfaction with the search efforts made at the Chobe/Zambezi river confluence.

The search team, which had deployed an airboat to aid the operation, ruled out all possibilities of Mr Elias being found at the river.

However, the family's representative, Mr Ernest Lefatshe explained that they would continue to explore spiritual means to locate him.

Mr Lefatshe said the forensic results of Mr Elias' clothes found at the river on January 10 were still pending.

Kasane Police Station commander, Superintendent James Maabong stated that despite the search being called off, the police would leave the investigation open and would continue to conduct minor searches in the bid to locate him.

Supt Maabong assured the family that the police would

keep investigating, pending DNA results on the clothes found near the river.

He also explained that the pathology report indicated that the bones found during the search were not human bones.

Moreover, Supt Maabong expressed his respect for the family's spiritual approach urging the public to be careful around Chobe River because of the wildlife around that area.

The station commander implored the public to desist from going to the river because it was infested with dangerous animals that posed a risk to their lives. **BOPA**

# AU and IGAD congratulate Museveni for winning election

## ADDIS ABABA

African Union (AU) and the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD), an East African bloc, congratulated Ugandan President Yoweri Museveni on his re-election.

On Saturday, Uganda's Electoral Commission announced that the country's incumbent President Museveni won the presidential election, securing a seventh five-year term in office after garnering more than 7.9 million votes out of about 11.3 million valid ballots cast.

In a statement issued late Saturday, AU Commission Chairperson Mahmoud Ali Youssouf congratulated Museveni on his re-election, commending the conduct of the elections.

Youssouf applauded the people of Uganda for their commitment to consolidating democratic gains, peace, security and development.

He also commended former Nigeria's President Goodluck Jonathan for his 'sterling leadership' of the joint AU, IGAD

and the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa election observation mission to Uganda.

In a separate statement issued Saturday, the IGAD also congratulated Museveni on his re-election. IGAD Executive Secretary Workneh Gebeyehu reaffirmed IGAD's support for efforts aimed at strengthening democratic governance, peace, stability and inclusive development in Uganda.

Museveni's closest challenger, Robert Kyagulanyi, a pop-star turned-politician, also known as Bobi Wine, received over 2.7 million votes, while the remaining votes were shared among six other presidential candidates, according to the Electoral Commission. However, Kyagulanyi rejected the final election results announced by the Electoral Commission, describing them as fraudulent.

In a statement posted on his X account on Saturday, he said there were instances of military intimidation and ballot stuffing, among other irregularities. *Xinhua*

# Costa vows to defend any form of coercion against EU

## BRUSSELS

European Council president Antonio Costa said Sunday on X that the European Union (EU) is "ready to defend itself against any form of coercion" in response to US president Donald Trump's tariff threats over Greenland.

Costa said his consultations with member states on the latest tensions over Greenland had reaffirmed that the bloc remained "in support of and solidarity with Denmark and Greenland."

Recognising that tariffs would undermine transatlantic relations and are 'incompatible with the EU-US trade agreement,' he underscored that the EU was ready to defend itself against any form of coercion.

In this regard, he added that he would convene an extraordinary meeting of the European Council in the coming days to further coordinate. In a social media post on Saturday, Trump said the United States would levy a 10-per cent tariff from February 1, on goods from eight European countries.

He warned the rate would rise to 25 per cent on June 1 and remain in place until a deal is reached for the 'complete and total purchase' of Greenland.

Also on Sunday, the Financial Times reported that the EU was considering hitting Washington with €93 billion (US\$107.68 billion) worth of tariffs or restricting American companies from the bloc's market. *Xinhua*

## Intense rains push Mozambique to maximum flood alert

### MAPUTO

**S**outhern Mozambique has been placed on maximum flood alert following persistent heavy rainfall and increased water discharges from major dams, local authorities said on Wednesday.

In Gaza Province, the situation is particularly severe after heightened releases from the Massingir Dam.

Authorities warned that the large volumes of discharged water have significantly increased the risk of flooding along the Limpopo Valley and its tributaries. Minister of Public Works, Housing, and Water Resources Fernando

Rafael said the dam had reached its maximum storage capacity, making the opening of emergency spillway gates unavoidable.

He warned of a high flood risk in both low-lying and urban areas and urged residents in vulnerable zones to evacuate immediately.

Margarida Mapanzene Chongo, governor of Gaza Province, said it remained difficult to determine the number of people affected, as several communities have been cut off by overflowing rivers, hampering rescue and assessment efforts.

According to the National Emergency Operations Center,

authorities deployed multi-sectoral teams to reinforce evacuation and humanitarian assistance operations.

Flood risks have also intensified in Maputo Province, where movement across the Umbeluzi River bridge in Boane District has been restricted due to rising water levels linked to heavy rains and dam discharges. In Inhambane Province, communities along the Save River remain on high alert amid warnings of unpredictable water flows.

Authorities cautioned that the combination of persistent rainfall and upstream discharges could further worsen flooding risks in the coming days. **Xinhua**

## China donates medical supplies to Burundi

**C**hinese Embassy in Burundi on Thursday donated medical supplies to the Burundian government to help the East African nation achieve sustainable development goals as well as its development vision.

The handover ceremony was held at Prince Regent Charles Hospital in Bujumbura, Burundi's economic capital, with the facility being one of three beneficiaries. The other two include Gitega Regional Hospital in Gitega Province, central Burundi, and Mpanda General Hospital in Bujumbura Province, western Burundi.

"This donation of medical equipment comes at the right time. It will strengthen the technical capacity of the three health facilities," Pierre Sinarinzi, permanent secretary of the Ministry of Public Health, said, noting that the donated equipment was worth over 319 million Burundi francs (about 108,000 U.S. dollars).

Sinarinzi said that the medical

equipment would reduce the burden of Burundian citizens who have been facing challenges related to the insufficiency of adequate medical equipment.

"On behalf of the Burundian government, I would like to express my deep gratitude towards China for continuous and multifaceted support to Burundian development, particularly in the health sector. This offer testifies excellent relations of friendship and solidarity uniting both nations and peoples," he said.

Fang Guoqing, charge d'affaires at the Chinese Embassy in Burundi, said the donation was made up of 244 categories of medicines and 288 categories of medical equipment, to improve the healthcare of Burundian people and to help the three hospitals better respond to local medical needs.

Since 1987, 544 Chinese medical doctors have come to Burundi, said Fang, adding that China will continue to deepen and extend cooperation with Burundi in the health sector and in other priority sectors. **Xinhua**

## Revitalised TAZARA to forge 'belt of prosperity' beyond transport corridor

### LUSAKA

**T**he revitalisation of the Tanzania-Zambia Railway (TAZARA) should be viewed not merely as the rehabilitation of a transport corridor, but as a blueprint for creating a "belt of prosperity," given the wide-ranging economic benefits expected to follow, a Zambian expert has said.

Frederick Mutesa, a development expert and secretary general of the Zambia-China Friendship Association, told Xinhua on Thursday that the revival of TAZARA was crucial for promoting regional connectivity, stimulating economic activity along its route, and advancing Zambia's broader development objectives. He noted that the project goes beyond improving links between Zambia and Tanzania, as the railway was also expected to integrate with other regional transport corridors and complement existing routes.

According to Mutesa, a modernized TAZARA would attract investment into activities beyond transport; fostering economic growth in communities along the line. The development of dry ports, logistics hubs, and more efficient transport systems, he said, would boost sectors such as agriculture by improving farmers' access to markets.

"This will go a long way toward creating employment and boosting incomes, thereby reducing poverty levels," he said, adding that higher earnings would enhance the welfare of people working in the

agricultural sector. Mutesa also said improved rail connectivity would enhance Zambia's trade efficiency, particularly for bulk commodities.


Much of the country's copper exports, destined for global markets, including China, are currently transported by road, which increases costs and transit times. A revitalised TAZARA railway, he said, would cut logistics costs and speed up deliveries, strengthening Zambia's competitiveness in international trade.

It would also deepen the country's trade links with the Far East and further anchor it within the Belt and Road Initiative.

Mutesa expressed confidence in the project's success, citing strong political commitment and the concession of the railway to China Civil Engineering Construction Corporation, which has been contracted to rehabilitate and operate the line for several years.

He added that the firm was expected to build local capacity so Zambian staff could eventually manage the railway on a sustainable and profitable basis. In September 2025, China, Zambia, and Tanzania signed a landmark 1.4-billion-U.S.-dollar agreement to revive the TAZARA railway, covering track rehabilitation and the procurement of new locomotives, coaches, and wagons.

The 1,860-km railway, connecting Zambia's New Kapiri Mposhi to Tanzania's port city of Dar es Salaam, was originally built by China in the 1970s to facilitate regional trade. **Xinhua**

## Tanzania president reaffirms commitment to multilateralism and economic growth

### DAR ES SALAAM

Tanzanian President Samia Suluhu Hassan has reaffirmed Tanzania's commitment to multilateralism and economic development, calling for stronger international cooperation to address shared global challenges.

Speaking at a diplomatic reception Thursday in Dodoma, Hassan said economic diplomacy will remain central to Tanzania's foreign policy, with priority on attracting investment, expanding public-private partnerships, and promoting key sectors such as manufacturing, logistics, digital transformation, the blue and green economies, and extractive industries.

She said Tanzania remained among Africa's fastest-growing economies, with gross domestic product growth at 5.9 per cent in 2025 and inflation at 3.3 per cent, while public debt remainede

sustainable. Market capitalization on Dar es Salaam Stock Exchange rose more than 34 per cent in 2025.

According to the president, Tanzania registered 927 new investment projects worth over US\$11 billion in 2025, expected to generate nearly 163 000 jobs. Looking ahead, Hassan highlighted Tanzania Development Vision 2050, which aims to achieve double-digit growth through productivity gains, industrial value addition, and major infrastructure development, including the liquefied natural gas project.

On global affairs, she reiterated Tanzania's strong support for the United Nations and multilateralism, warning against unilateralism and advocating a more equitable global financial system for developing countries. "Tanzania will continue to build bridges, not blocs," she said. **Xinhua**

## Mpox hit 367 cases since 2024 in Zambia

### LUSAKA

The number of confirmed mpox cases in Zambia has climbed to 367 since the disease outbreak in October 2024, health authorities said on Friday. Minister of Health Elijah Muchima said the cases were recorded from more than 2 000 suspected cases identified in 46 districts across nine of the country's 10 provinces.

"While the World Health Organization has declared an end to mpox as a public health emergency of international concern, the disease has not disappeared, and response activities continue," he told reporters during a press briefing.

Zambia recorded its first mpox

case in October 2024, and so far, the southern African nation has reported three mpox-related deaths. Meanwhile, cumulative cholera cases had reached 639 since fresh outbreaks were reported in August 2025. Ten people have died, while 614 others recovered, the minister said, adding that 17 people remained hospitalised in Lusaka, the country's capital, as preventive measures are being intensified.

Muchima said the disease had been reported in 17 districts across seven provinces, with most cases coming from the northern part of the country.

Zambia experienced its worst cholera outbreak between October 2023 and July 2024, recording over 23 000 cases and more than 700 deaths. **Xinhua**

## China super-large market creates global opportunities with record imports

### BEIJING

China's total goods imports reached a historic high of ¥18.48 trillion yuan (about US\$2.64 trillion) in 2025, cementing the country's status as the world's second-largest import market for 17 consecutive years, the latest official data has revealed.

In 2025, China's imports from over 130 countries and regions registered growth, seven more than in 2024, turning the advantages of its super-large domestic market into opportunities for global industry players, according to data from the General Administration of Customs (GAC).

With a population of over 1.4 billion, China's super-large market and ever-growing consumption strengths will continue to unleash enormous import demand and potential, providing broad opportunities for more countries and regions, analysts have noted.

China's foreign trade partners continued to grow, Wang Jun, deputy head of the GAC, said at a recent press conference, citing the latest international data showing that China had become a major trading partner of more than 160 countries and regions, an increase of over 20 compared with 2020. In 2025, China's goods imports alone accounted for about 10 per cent of the global total, according to Wang.

In particular, China's imports from the least developed countries rose by 9 per cent as it implemented zero-tariff treatment on 100 per cent of tariff items for products from such countries that established diplomatic ties with it.

By commodity, China's annual imports of mechanical and electrical products reached 7.41 trillion yuan, up 5.7 per cent, while the imports of consumer

goods, including fresh and dried fruits and edible vegetable oil, rose by 5.6 per cent and 16.6 per cent, respectively.

The entry of more overseas products into China's domestic market comes as the country takes concrete measures to expand imports.

For instance, in 2025, customs authorities approved the import of 190 types of agricultural and food products from 65 countries. Beyond goods trade, China's service sector provides further evidence of its commitment to sharing opportunities with the world, a facet often overlooked.

Ministry of Commerce data shows that in the first 11 months of 2025, China's service trade deficit reached ¥806.35 billion, driven by steady imports of quality services to meet domestic demand.

International data indicates that in the first three quarters last year, China became the main export destination for 79 countries and regions. "It should be noted that some countries politicised economic and trade issues and restricted high-tech product exports to China under various pretexts; otherwise, China's imports would have been even higher."

The record imports came as China's total foreign trade in goods surpassed the thresholds of ¥45 trillion in 2025, with a year-on-year growth of 3.8 per cent.

The hard-won growth was achieved amid a slowing global economic recovery, rising trade protectionism, and increased geopolitical uncertainties, demonstrating the resilience and sound momentum of China's foreign trade sector, said Yu Xinding, a professor at the University of International Business and Economics.

Wang underlined that China's

intermediate goods trade achieved rapid growth last year, becoming the main driver of exports and providing strong support for global industrial cooperation.

Also highlighting the increases in key intermediate goods imports such as electronic components and computer parts, Yu said this trend indicated that China's demand for key components and technological elements was increasing amid manufacturing upgrades. Wang added that quality "Made-in-China" products are widely popular worldwide, playing an important role in safeguarding the stability of global industrial and supply chains, and injecting certainty and new opportunities into global trade development.

While reaffirming that Chinese market will remain an oasis of certainty, Wang noted that the driving force for global trade growth was still insufficient, citing a report by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, which predicted that global trade growth will be even weaker in 2026.

Earlier in October 2025, the World Trade Organisation had sharply lowered its forecast for global goods trade growth in 2026 to 0.5 per cent, due to weak global economic recovery and rising uncertain factors.

Despite a complex global trade situation for 2026, China's foreign trade sector is poised to maintain sound operation underpinned by its super-large market, complete industrial system, high-standard opening up and ever-improving trade environment, according to Yu.

She also added that China's foreign trade sector continued to play an underpinning role in connecting the domestic and international dual circulation. **Xinhua**

# Market walk catches on among young consumers

When Jin Lulu returned from studying abroad, she opened a cafe, snot in a glossy mall or office tower, but at the entrance of the 30-year-old Gudang market in east China's Zhejiang Province.

## BEIJING

Now I am back opening a cafe here, and it feels so warm and nostalgic," Jin said.

Located in western Hangzhou, the provincial capital, Gudang market has recently become a popular spot.

Many young visitors, even when pressed for time, pull their suitcases along just to stop by for a stroll. "About 20 per cent of our vendors were born in the 1990s and 2000s, and their presence has brought fresh energy," said Yu Hongmei, director of Gudang market.

She added that the goal is to turn the traditional market into a community hub where people of all ages can find a sense of belonging.

After a nine-month renovation starting in 2024, the market emerged refreshed, modern and digital, yet it retains its nostalgic charm. Inside striking old architecture, the space is bright and spotless, with patterned floor tiles complementing the colors of geometric stained-glass windows.

At its entrance, a large screen scrolls real-time information, including the number of stalls, prices, sales, top-selling booths, and food safety test results.

Each stall is equipped to show prices, QR codes for payment, and vendor details at a glance. And it is not just happening in Hangzhou.

Across China, traditional wet

markets are being renovated and upgraded, seamlessly weaving into modern community life, with many becoming 'internet-famous' spots, fueling the nationwide trend for the 'market walk'.

While strolling through these markets, visitors can also browse bookstores, sip coffee, enjoy light meals, and explore creative handicrafts, meeting both material needs and emotional desires at the same time.

In 2024, an action plan jointly issued by nine government departments, including the Ministry of Commerce, called for supporting the standardised renovation of traditional markets, enriching community services and business formats, and improving facilities and the overall environment.

In Hengyang, central China's Hunan Province, a traditional market has been upgraded into a 'smart' market and introduced 'vegetable doctors' who test produce for pesticide residues every morning.

In south China's Shenzhen, the Dongmen market is one of the city's oldest fresh-food and meat markets, nestled in the city centre among high-rises and busy streets.

It not only meets the daily needs of local residents but also draws shoppers from Hong Kong. "Exploring a local market is one of the best ways to get to know a city.

It is bustling, full of life, and rich in human connection," shared some netizens.

Describing their habit of casually strolling through markets, they said they might wander to a nearby market after work as a simple way to relax and unwind.

On social platforms popular among young Chinese, the trend is gaining huge traction.

The topic "market walk guide" has drawn nearly 120 million views on lifestyle-sharing platform Rednote, with more than 300 000 related posts.

In the past, such markets in China were once labelled, dirty and chaotic, with wet floors, scattered vegetable leaves, and constant shouting from vendors.

Yet in both urban and rural China, markets have a long history.

Over time, these market gatherings became the seeds around which cities gradually grew.

For a long time, wet markets served as the backbone of urban food distribution and a magnet for city life in China.

Before supermarkets appeared, they were widespread and thriving. In recent years, however, the rise of neighbourhood shops and online grocery platforms has put some traditional markets under pressure.

Industry estimates suggest there are tens of thousands of wet markets across the country, with Chengdu, Shanghai and Chongqing hosting

the largest numbers.

"Traditional markets must change, or they would not survive," said Guan Jingjing, a professor at Zhejiang Gongshang University.

She noted that, faced with pressure from supermarkets and online platforms, as well as the demands of urban renewal, traditional markets are increasingly losing foot traffic.

Upgrading through spatial redesign, visual refreshes, and diversified business offerings has become key to their transformation, Guan added. Hong Yumeng, a graduate of the China Academy of Art, put this idea into practice in her thesis, developing a, market renovation plan that reflects the younger generation's vision for the aesthetics of traditional market spaces.

In her proposal, renovated markets feature more logical functional zones, more engaging circulation paths, and thoughtful connections to surrounding environments -- completely overturning the old stereotype of dim, noisy and chaotic markets.

Hong said that young people are growing tired of standardised consumer spaces, and that markets redesigned with both local character and a strong sense of aesthetics are meeting their desire for social sharing and immersive experiences.

"Wet markets becoming a new favorite among young people is,

at its core, a reshaping of their consumption habits and lifestyles," said Wang Peng, an associate researcher at the Beijing Academy of Social Sciences, in a media interview.

He added that these markets allow young people to enjoy a more engaging, hands-on experience at a low cost.

At the same time, the everyday bustle of wet markets, together with the lively chatter in local dialects and memories shared across generations, has become an emotional anchor for many adults, Wang said.

These changes in markets and consumption patterns align with China's wider social and economic development goals.

During the 15<sup>th</sup> Five-Year Plan period (2026-2030), China is making meeting the people's ever-growing needs for a better life its fundamental goal.

A high-level Party meeting last year also stressed the importance to boost consumption while protecting and improving people's well-being.

While pursuing aesthetic upgrades and new business formats, markets must not lose their roots, Guan said, emphasising that no matter how much they change, fresh produce, affordable prices, and convenient shopping remain the foundation for retaining longtime vendors and serving local residents. **Xinhua**

## Kung fu takes root in schools and promotes body strength

A quiet winter breeze sweeps across the playground of Zhujiazhuang Primary School in Boshan District, in east China's Shandong Province. But when the bell rings for break, the playground comes alive as learners rush out to practice Jiugong Bagua Zhanxue Quan (Nine-Palace Eight-Trigrams Slashing Fist), a form of traditional Chinese martial arts. Their kicks, punches, turns and jumps are sharp and synchronised, showcasing the unique charm of kung fu. At this school, every learner learns kung fu. Martial arts are a core part of physical education, and practicing the slashing fist routine during breaks has become a daily habit.

Fifth-grader Ding Xinrui said traditional culture once felt distant, but training has changed that as she realised the cultural significance behind each movement of kung fu.

"As we chant and move together, discipline and persistence have made us more coordinated. I feel more spirited and focused."

Principal Li Jian said the routine embodies both distinctive martial skills and deep cultural heritage. "Learners are expected to build stronger bodies while experiencing traditional culture," Li said, adding that it helps nurture patriotism and national pride.

To achieve this, the school invited an inheritor of the routine and designed individualised training plans for learners.

Every morning and evening, the playground fills with learners practicing their forms to rhythmic shouts.

Martial arts have become part of daily campus life rather than just another PE class.

"I have seen learners' clear improvements in fitness, and their growing confidence in themselves and traditional culture," said martial arts coach Yin Wenhui.

As martial arts gained popularity, learners have gone on to win prizes in national and provincial competitions, turning martial arts into a hallmark of the school's development.

"The achievement results from the collective effort of our teachers and learners. We will continue to deepen martial arts education and carry this cultural treasure forward," Li said.

At nearby Boshan Middle School, the gym is just as lively. Learners are practicing Wubu Quan (Five-Step Fist) in neat formations, displaying power and discipline.

Gao Yuan, director of the school's sports and arts office, said that martial arts had been incorporated into regular PE classes, and learners were encouraged to engage in relevant clubs, competitions and performance.

Considering learners' physical and psychological needs, teachers adapt lessons to strengthen learners' capabilities of routines and boost their awareness of teamwork, self-protection, and healthy habits.

"Bringing kung fu into schools helps improve learners' health and, more importantly, it fosters the roots" said Kan Fangli, head of the Boshan Sports Development Center. He added that local government would further enrich course offerings and organise more competitions to promote martial arts education.

## Camping carnival turns up winter rural tourism heat

Driving over 3 000 kilometers from the subtropical warmth of south China's Guangdong Province, Zhu Yongyu, a camping enthusiast, finally reached the country's frozen northeast and pitched his tent on a patch of snow-blanketed grassland.

For Zhu, a night spent camping at minus 30 degrees Celsius, a stark contrast to the lush, green campsites he was accustomed to, unlocked an exhilarating new level of challenge and adventure. "I have tried all kinds of camping scenarios in Guangdong, but the snow is something we just don't have. I drove for six days only for this moment," said Zhu, while adjusting a gas stove inside his tent, which had raised the indoor temperature to a comfortable level, defying the extreme cold outside.

Zhu is among thousands of enthusiasts who have flocked to Hala village in the Meilisi

Daur Ethnic District of Qiqihar, northeast China's Heilongjiang Province, for the 4<sup>th</sup> Northeast Camping Carnival. Running from January 12 to 18, the event has this year seen the number of pitched tents exceed 1 000 for the first time, transforming the quiet, ice-sealed ethnic village into a vibrant hub for outdoor enthusiasts.

The view of such a vast array of tents blossoming like spring buds across the silver plains showcases a significant shift in China's winter tourism.

What was once a season for locals to 'hibernate,' has become a golden period for economic vitality, driven by the integration of ice-and-snow sports, culture and outdoor leisure.

The surging popularity of winter camping has, notably, created new opportunities for domestic outdoor equipment manufacturers, who are also present at the carnival, which is a golden chance for them to engage with users and test products

in such extreme conditions. Han Wei, founder of the outdoor brand Yeying based in southwest China's Sichuan Province, sees the northern market as a new frontier.

"As a brand from the south, we initially found the northern environment challenging. Last year, we were unprepared for the cold, but this year we brought equipment featuring tech fabrics designed specifically to prevent condensation inside the tents, which is often considered a major headache for winter campers," Han said.

Han noted that listening to user feedback at such events allowed his company to rapidly upgrade its products, adding that the unique ice-and-snow activities in the north offer experiences unavailable in the south, making this market vital for their future growth.

"The extreme cold used to be a challenge, but now it is the main attraction," Han exclaimed.

Wang Kai, a veteran camper from neighboring Jilin Province, also in China's northeast, believed the appeal of winter camping lies in modern people's pressing need to unwind. Impressed by the sight of crowds of adults slipping, sliding and laughing heartily during ice games and snowball fights at the carnival, Wang noted: "After being cooped up in cities for too long, we need to let loose in the snow and rediscover this raw, rugged kind of joy."

Beyond equipment and scenery, the event has highlighted the deep integration of tourism with local culture. During the carnival, Daur villagers hosted 'village feasts,' treating visitors to steaming dumplings and a traditional soup.

Their warm hospitality bridged gaps between strangers, turning the campsite into a community.

Wang Fang, director of the culture and tourism bureau of Meilisi Daur Ethnic District, said the event served as a prime example of how the district was expanding the scope of a single camping event into a multifaceted experience.

By combining camping with Daur folk customs, ice sports and local culinary traditions, the district has created a distinctive cultural tourism brand, Wang explained.

This approach not only attracts tourists but also boosts local employment and income.

The success of the camping carnival in this ethnic village serves as a microcosm of China's booming winter tourism market.

According to China Tourism Academy, the number of ice-and-snow leisure trips is expected to reach 360 million during the 2025-2026 winter season, with revenue projected to hit about US\$62.6 billion.



The last rider to ascend the podium was Toshia Schareina, who has been the talk of the rally due to his spectacular form throughout the marathon.

Senegal started brightly and nearly went ahead in the fourth minute when Gueye's header at the back post was parried by Yassine Bounou, who then stuck out a leg to deny Iliman Ndiaye

Florian Wirtz scored again for Liverpool, but Burnley goalkeeper Martin Dubravka kept the home side at bay as Marcus Edwards struck to earn the Premier League struggler a point.

Enzo Le Fee and Brian Brobbey helped Sunderland return to winning ways with a 2-1 home win over Crystal Palace, while Lukas Nmecha's low strike in the 91<sup>st</sup> minute gave Leeds United a 1-0 home win over Fulham. Callum Wilson scored in the 93<sup>rd</sup> minute as West Ham won 2-1 away to Tottenham to boost its survival hopes, increasing the pressure on Spurs coach Thomas Frank. **Xinhua**
