Moshupa District drug availability at 51 per cent

As the 2025/26 financial year nears its end, Moshupa District Council's Vital, Essential, and Necessary (VEN) drug stocks is at 51 per cent a 13 per cent drop from last quarter's 64 per cent.

Council chairperson Mr Peter Sethibe gave an update during Tuesday's full council session, saying that shortages threatened patient care across clinics and health posts.

He said the council had an emergency meeting with Primary Health Care Services and had formally escalated the matter to the Ministry of Health.

Mr Sethibe said called for the restoration of micro-procurement powers or rock-solid guarantees of uninterrupted supplies from Central Medical Stores.

To bridge the gap, he said officials had launched a rapid redistribution drive, shifting surplus stock from better-supplied facilities to those with shortages.

"This is not a solution, it is a palliative measure. While we fight for the cure, we must manage the pain," Mr Sethibe said.

He said new measures included weekly drug availability monitoring at every site, citing that the local authority would no longer wait for

quarterly reports to uncover disasters. The council has also approached local pharmacy on contract to explore short-term credit for essentials.

"I cannot promise success, but I can promise that no stone will be left unturned," he said.

Furthermore, Mr Sethibe said Assistant Minister of Local Government and Traditional Affairs, Mr Ignatious Moswaane, paid an unannounced visit to local clinics and the medical store warehouse on January 27 to assess drug stocks and to show support to frontline staff.

On other issues, Councillor Kabo Ramatsipele of Magotlhwane/Kgomokasitwa hailed the impending opening of Moshupa Primary Hospital in April as a game-changer for district health services.

Councillor Omphile Motlhajoe of Ralekgetho Ward voiced frustration over neglected roads, blaming delayed and inadequate Rural Support Grants (RSG) from the Ministry of Local Government and Traditional Affairs for stalling service delivery. **BOPA**



Waloka urges districts to align plans with NDP 12

Districts have been advised to align their draft development plans with the National Development Plan 12 (NDP12) to ensure timely completion and effective implementation of national priorities.

North West District Commissioner, Mr Thabang Waloka made the remarks during the District Development Committee (DDC) meeting aimed at engaging members on the alignment of the District Development Plan (DDP 9) with the recently approved National Development Plan (NDP 12).

He emphasised the importance of coherence and consistency in planning, saying public servants were agents of change and must adopt a results-oriented approach.

"The government has entrusted us with the responsibility to make a difference when challenges arise instead of merely reporting challenges," he said.

DDC members were urged to contribute to the planning process and make sound inputs to ensure the success of the exercise.

Further, he said the draft plans should include new ministries' names, key performance indicators and project proposals with the core priorities of NDP12, with particular emphasis placed on integrating the True North Pillars, the Botswana Economic Transformation Plan, and the strategic outcomes and key performance indicators as outlined in the NDP 12.

While the NDP 12, guided by Vision 2036, aims to transform from mere planning to measurable progress with emphasis on evidence-based, result-oriented implementation, Mr Waloka said public servants were seen as agents of change for government priorities, hence they must adopt a culture of planning and result-oriented action.

For instance, he said North-West district, with its unique challenges

and opportunities, was singled out for special attention, with plans to upgrade Maun into a 'green city'.

The model, he said, sought to position Maun as a sustainable urban-area that utilised natural processes and vegetation to provide diverse ecosystem services, contributing to the overall sustainability and resilience of communities.

"In an area that houses the Okavango Delta World Heritage Site, buzzing with tourism, mining and farming activities, we will have to identify what is necessary to improve the quality of life for our people and how best we can improve sectors such as mining, agriculture, and tourism to thrive and benefit communities," Mr

FMD tests in Good Hope come out negative

Good Hope District Council has announced that 116 samples taken from 2364 cattle in the district have tested negative for Foot and Mouth disease.

Addressing a full council session in Good Hope on Tuesday, Council Chairperson Mr Gofaone Nkwane said the district had been on high alert since November 2025 when reports emerged from neighbouring South Africa of a Foot and Mouth outbreak.

"The department of veterinary services conducted a passive surveillance in high-risk areas, particularly villages along the border and farms within a 10km radius," Mr Nkwane

said.

The samples were sent to the national laboratory and all came out negative.

To ensure the district remain disease-free, the council has joined forces with the Ministry of Lands and Agriculture, Botswana Police Service, and the Botswana Defense Force to patrol the cordon fence along the border.

Meanwhile, Mr Nkwane warned of a potential diarrhea outbreak in the district, with 79 cases reported in December 2025 and 17 cases reported in January 2026.

The affected areas are Good Hope, Magoriapitse, and Metlobo.

He urged councilors and stakeholders have been urged to strengthen preventative measures to curb the situation. **BOPA**

President acknowledges emotional toll of policing

Nestled at the foothills of the iconic Lentswe La Baratani hill, men and women in uniform gathered at the Botswana Police College as President Advocate Duma Boko steered their spirit, strengthened their trust and emphasised the importance of integrity in daily policing.

President Boko spoke with a heavy heart, expressing a sombre mood in his opening address about the death saturated environment police face, subjected to distressing situations including among others suicide-murder incidents, fatal car accidents and violent crimes which took a heavy toll on their mental wellbeing.

He acknowledged that the work environment was filled with upsetting situations but took a bow to the immense resilience shown by the men and women in uniform to navigate their responsibility effectively.

Despite these harsh realities, the President praised officers for resilience, discipline and continued commitment to protecting the nation.

“We know and acknowledge all these calamities, I assure you that we shall prevail against all odds. Let us seek new and innovative interventions of addressing these persistent problems in your line of duty. We applaud your strengthened resolve to discharge your duties diligently in the midst of all these,” added President Boko.

Speaking during the 52nd Botswana Police Service (BPS) senior officers annual conference President Boko told the officers that they should be motivated by the positive milestones achieved throughout the years despite the challenging setbacks. The conference, held under the theme: Policing with purpose, inspiring confidence through resilience and innovation, repeatedly erupted into applause as the

President recognised the sacrifices officers make in difficult and often dangerous circumstances.

Turning to the future of law enforcement, President Boko urged the service to modernise rapidly in order to confront organised and technologically sophisticated criminal networks. He emphasised that the success of both Botswana and its police service depended heavily on the speed and depth with which institutions embrace innovation.

“Our success as the Republic of Botswana and as BPS is dependent on the level, scope and pace of innovation. We must review, revise and reform all procedures, processes and techniques we deploy to make our job easy,” he said.

President Boko said the police must embrace technological responsiveness to augment human capability and extend the desired reach. He added that they must be digitally advanced to curb emerging crime trends which were a threat to public safety and investor confidence.

He warned that failure to adapt could allow emerging crime trends to threaten public safety while simultaneously weakening investor confidence.

“We are now forced to diversify the economy under pressure of calamity. The global economy now turns out to be the most unequal in history. The difference between the haves and have nots is enormous,” he said. The BPS of today has evolved from three forces namely the Bechuanaland Mounted Police of 1884, the 1885 Bechuanaland Border Police and Bechuanaland Protectorate Force of 1902.

President Boko further linked policing challenges to broader national development concerns, noting that crime, drug and alcohol abuse and persistent road fatalities were imposing a heavy economic burden.

He said these social problems were undermining efforts to revive the economy at a time when Botswana was already navigating global inequality and structural economic pressures.

“All these have an alarming cost to the economy. The costs run into millions of pula. We are now forced to diversify the economy under pressure of calamity. The global economy has turned out to be the most unequal in history, with an enormous gap between the haves and the have-nots,” he said. The modern Botswana Police Service traces its origins to three early colonial formations: the Bechuanaland Mounted Police (1884), the Bechuanaland Border Police (1885) and the Bechuanaland Protectorate Force (1902).

Following independence in 1966, the institution became the Botswana Police Force before undergoing a

major organisational transformation and rebranding in 1997 to become the Botswana Police Service.

From its early structure of just two divisions, North and South the service has expanded to five divisions and developed specialised operational branches including forensic science, cybercrime investigation and aviation support. The Air Support Branch, introduced in 2009, significantly strengthened aerial patrol capacity, particularly in remote and difficult terrain.

Operational campaigns have also played a central role in policing strategy. The long-running festive-season 60 Days of Action on Crime and Road Safety initiative was rebranded Operation Pabalesego in 2024 and launched by President Boko in Mogoditshane.

Similarly, the anti-livestock theft KgomoKhumo operation introduced in 2018 has delivered sustained enforcement success, resulting in numerous arrests and prosecutions nationwide.

Specialised policing capabilities include the well-known K9 section a fully-fledged dog unit operating under the Special Support Group,

the service’s paramilitary wing responsible for high-risk support operations and anti-poaching duties.

The service also marked a gender milestone in 1971 with the recruitment of its first eight female officers.

A further structural transformation came in 2009 when the Botswana Police Service merged with Botswana Local Police, creating an integrated national policing system. **BOPA**

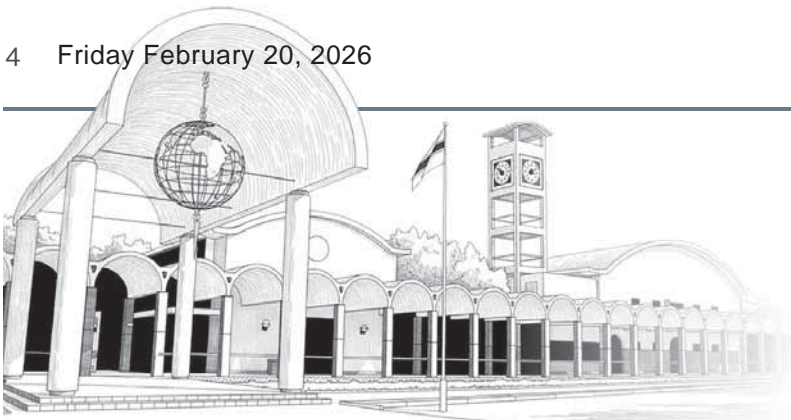

Govt suspends corporal punishment pending law review

The Minister of Child Welfare and Basic Education says the use of corporal punishment in all schools has been suspended pending a review of all relevant laws.

Answering a question in Parliament on Wednesday, Minister Nono Kgafela-Mokoka, said the decision was made in the best interests of the child.

She noted that the move aligned Botswana with international conventions, including the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, to which the country was a signatory.

The minister emphasised that the suspension was not merely an attempt to dismiss culture or faith.

Instead, she explained, it was about examining whether certain practices continued to serve the child's best interests within a modern constitutional and human rights framework. According to the minister, the issue had been debated extensively. She noted that key stakeholders, including teacher trade unions, supported the abolition of corporal punishment.

"These unions have also advocated for strengthening educational psychological care and support systems for both teaching and

learning," she said.

Addressing concerns about classroom management, Ms Kgafela-Mokoka said teachers and learners were already aware of alternative discipline methods.

She added that a formal assessment of the school environment, comparing conditions before and after the suspension, was currently ongoing.

Acknowledging that societies undergo significant social transitions, the minister stressed that legal reform must be accompanied by public education campaigns, parental training on positive discipline and active engagement with traditional and religious leaders.

The minister was responding to a question from Serowe South MP, Mr Leepetswe Lesedi, who wanted to know why government had moved against Batswana cultural norms and biblical principles that encouraged corporal discipline.

Mr Lesedi had also raised concerns regarding a perceived lack of consultation and asked how government planned to protect staff from unruly learners who may feel emboldened by the new restrictions.

Ministry opts for low cost maintenance solution

The Ministry of Child Welfare and Basic Education has adopted possible methods that will be affordable to provide adequate maintenance to government facilities owing to the current fiscal constraints faced

by government, Parliament heard Wednesday.

Answering a parliamentary question, Minister Nono Kgafela-Mokoka said the state of schools, especially boarding schools, across the country including in the Serowe West Constituency were in a dire state.

Ms Kgafela-Mokoka said Mmashoro Junior Secondary School was the hardest hit and therefore, the ministry had devised ways through which it could rehabilitated it to make it conducive for learners.

"Currently there is a company attending to the plumbing works at both boys and girls' hostels," she said.

She added that the new Ikageng Public Works Programme would come handy to address maintenance issues.

Serowe West MP, Mr Onalepelo Kedikilwe had asked the minister if she was aware that all schools in his constituency were not conducive for learning.

Mr Kedikilwe also asked if the ministry would consider engaging Serowe brigade to undertake the necessary renovations on the facilities to reduce costs and align it with the new national policy announced by government to utilise the new Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) for students to acquire skills. Gakuto-Kopong-Bokaa under routine maintenance

Minister of Transport and Infrastructure, Mr Noah Salakae, has informed Parliament that the Gakuto-Kopong-Bokaa Road remains a gravel road under the ministry's care and continues to receive routine maintenance.

Mr Salakae was responding to a parliamentary question posed by Lentsweletau/Lephephe MP, Mr Tshenolo Bogatsu, on Wednesday.

The minister explained that the Gakuto-Kopong-Bokaa Road was maintained through quarterly dry grading to ensure that it remained accessible to motorists.

He noted that the most recent grading works were carried out between December 2025 and January this year.

However, Mr Salakae clarified that the Kopong-Gaborone North road did

not fall under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Transport and Infrastructure, but was instead the responsibility of the Ministry of Local Government and Traditional Affairs.

Mr Bogatsu had sought an update on the status of the Gakuto-Kopong-Bokaa Road and the Kopong-Gaborone North road.

He had also wanted to know how the two roads would be maintained to ensure that they remained navigable, particularly given that they were not catered for under National Development Plan 12 (NDP 12).

The minister's response comes amid ongoing concerns from residents in the Lentsweletau/Lephephe constituency over the condition of road infrastructure and its impact on daily travel, especially during adverse weather conditions. BOPA

Mohwasa outlines government successes amid challenges

Government has, despite ongoing economic challenges, successfully steered the national economy, as evidenced by a suite of newly initiated social and developmental programmes.

This was said by Minister for State President, Defence and Security, Mr Moeti Mohwasa, during his contribution to the 2026/27 budget debate on Wednesday.

Minister Mohwasa highlighted several historic milestones, including the increase of the Old Age Pension to P1 400 and the substantial hike in brigade student allowances, which rose from P300 to P1 900.

He also noted that government had successfully reduced water and electricity tariffs by 30 per cent to ease the cost of living.

On the support for the creative industry, the minister said P200 million had been earmarked for the sector.

Additionally, he said, infants under one-year-old would receive a monthly allowance of P300 starting this April. Addressing long-standing labour issues, Mr Mohwasa said government had assisted former BCL employees to purchase mining houses while all outstanding payments owed to former staff would be settled soon.

He added that a joint committee involving former employees and the

liquidator had been established to oversee the process.

The minister further noted that the Labour Relations Act had been amended to prioritise employees during company liquidations.

Other labour wins, he said, included the introduction of paternity leave and the resuscitation of the Public Service Bargaining Council (PSBC), which had been dormant for years.

Under the public service, Minister Mohwasa announced that all Special Constables would soon be absorbed into the Police Force.

Similarly, he said all temporary cleaners and security guards were set to be offered permanent and pensionable positions.

He further indicated that the traditional Ipelegeng programme was replaced by Ikageng Public Works, under which allowances had been increased to P2 500, while focusing on upskilling participants to ensure future self-sufficiency.

On the legal front, the minister confirmed that Parliament had approved the establishment of Constitutional Courts, a move intended to anchor government's commitment to human rights.

Regarding the media, Mr Mohwasa stated that while government supported a self-regulatory industry, journalists must remain committed to professional ethics.

He also noted that news broadcasts had been expanded to include

various local languages to promote inclusivity.

Furthermore, he said the Botswana Meat Commission (BMC) had turned its fortunes around, significantly reducing the payment turnaround time for farmers to just seven days.

The minister explained that his ministry received the lion's share

of the budget primarily because P5 billion had been allocated to pay former soldiers who had been owed for several years.

Meanwhile, the budget debate followed the initial speech presented by Vice President and Minister of Finance, Mr Ndaba Gaolathe, on February 9. BOPA

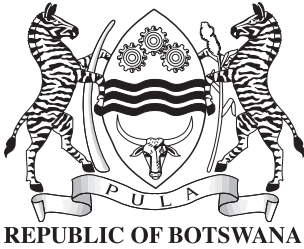

Pandamatenga farmers return to full operation

Pandamatenga Commercial Farmers Association executive member Mr Ryan Neal said they were compelled to return to full operation by the fact that Pandamatenga was the primary source of grain production in Botswana.

Pandamatenga commercial farmers have resumed ploughing operations following heavy downpours in January that left fields inaccessible and crops submerged in water.

In an interview, Pandamatenga Commercial Farmers Association executive member Mr Ryan Neal emphasised that this was a critical season to sustain national grain stability and financial viability for farmers.

Mr Neal said the fact that Pandamatenga was the primary source of grain production in Botswana compelled farmers to return to full operation to ensure a steady supply of harvest.

He said it was essential for the soil conditions to continue to hold optimal moisture, adding that if the soils became waterlogged it would affect the yields.

He assured that despite substantial damage to crops, farmers were working hard to ensure a good output.

Mr Neal said the unprecedented flooding struck when only 8 500 hectares of a total 40 000 hectares project area had already been planted.

He explained that assessment was ongoing, and noted that some farmers had to replant the whole fields while some would have to attend certain portions.

“The biggest damage was to the farms as they suffered top soil erosion, drainage damage, road damage as well as equipment damage. All these damages are being assessed by insurance companies,” he said.

Mr Neal pointed out that farming was a high risk undertaking requiring heavy capital investment, hence good yields were vital for farmers to remain solvent, and thereby retain their capacity to

service bank loans.

He pleaded with government to facilitate settlement of debts owed to farmers by BAMB as the 26 per cent debt was affecting their operations.

He revealed that this year,

farmers were diverting from planting sorghum heavily and gravitating toward sunflower to mitigate risks associated with delayed payments from BAMB.

He said farmers were flexible with their cropping plans, into which they easily incorporated high soil moisture crops like wheat, chickpeas, sunflower and mung beans. Mr Neal acknowledged the critical role played by the Pandamatenga commercial farms drainage system that was installed by government, noting that without it, the flood would have left a total calamity.

“Massive erosion occurred on farming areas and unfortunately the bridge along the A33 highway has insufficient capacity to handle that much water and it became a wall, blocking the flood waters.”

He suggested that during road repairs, the bridge be elevated to allow excess water to be released from the farms. **BOPA**

Botswana and Namibia sign cross-border connectivity deal

Namibia keeps repo rate unchanged at 6.5 per cent

The Bank of Namibia on Wednesday decided to keep the repo rate unchanged at 6.50 per cent, citing the need to safeguard the one-to-one peg between the Namibia Dollar and the South African Rand while supporting domestic economic activity. Governor of the central bank Ebson Uanguta announced at the first monetary policy meeting that the policy stance was taken to ensure orderly capital flows and maintain the currency peg arrangement. Commercial banks are accordingly expected to maintain the prime lending rate at 10.00 per cent. **Xinhua**

Financial inclusion project targets 370 110 households

Zambia and the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) on Wednesday launched a project to strengthen financial access and resilience for rural people in the southern African nation. The Financial Inclusion for Resilience and Innovation project is a US\$49.8-million, seven-year initiative targeting 370 110 rural households, or about 1.85 million people, across the country. It seeks to expand access to financial services for smallholder farmers, women, and youth, while improving livelihoods, enhancing climate resilience, and increasing the uptake of client-centric financial services. **Xinhua**

Ghana settles more local debt exchange interest payment

Ghana government has made an additional payment of GHC 10 billion (about US\$909.5 million) to service interest obligations under the Domestic Debt Exchange Program (DDEP). The statement from the Ministry of Finance said the payment covered Cedi-denominated DDEP coupons and represents the sixth settlement under the programme. “This settlement is in line with the restructuring memorandum and the government’s broader debt management and fiscal consolidation strategy.” **Xinhua**

Backyard gardening makes life easier for Bothang

Fifty-two-year-old Ms Keloetsetse Bothang of Gapanyane Ward in Kang has created a small garden sanctuary in her backyard. What began as a modest project to produce vegetables for home consumption in 2022, has since evolved into a thriving horticultural enterprise, supplying the local community and contributing to the school-feeding programme.

The rapid growth of the project has since surpassed the capacity of Ms Bothang’s residential yard, which has now turned into a green oasis, prompting plans to relocate to a larger space to meet the rising demand.

For Ms Bothang, backyard gardening was born out of necessity but sustained by her deep love for nature.

She started with only a few beds of spinach, green pepper, onions and beetroot to feed her family. “I had no capital, I had to use the little money from my first sales to buy more seeds and gradually expanded,” she says as she explains her journey.

Her turning point came at a time when she was struggling to make

ends meet due to prolonged illness that forced her to close her sewing business which was supported through the poverty eradication initiative.

An eye condition had made it impossible for her to continue with the business, leaving her without a stable source of income.

It was through determination and passion that Ms Bothang rebuilt her life after years of ill

health and financial hardship.

“I had to turn to gardening to rebuild my life and provide for my children. As production increased, neighbours began buying from me and the demand kept growing,” she says.

Since people are now more conscious about their health and wellness, Ms Bothang says many have reduced their consumption of meat, thus creating a ready market for fresh vegetables.

On the other hand, restrictions on the slaughter of cloven-hoofed animals following the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease have also boosted demand for her produce.

Ms Bothang currently supplies about 90 bundles of vegetables to Mahutsane Primary School once a month under the school-feeding programme. She hopes to increase production and eventually supply Kang Primary School with at least 155 bundles per month.

“My plan is to expand production and reach more markets. Backyard gardening has great potential and can change lives if taken seriously.”

With the income Ms Bothang

generates from her backyard garden, she has now been able to cover expenses that she struggled to afford in the past.

“I am now able to stand on my own and support my family again. This garden has given me a second chance in life,” says Ms Bothang noting how the project has restored her dignity and gave her hope for the future.

Her efforts have also attracted support from development partners. In recognition of her contribution to household food security and community nutrition, the Botswana Red Cross Society recently donated a JoJo water tank, treated poles and shade net, which have enhanced her production capacity.

She admits that the journey has not been without challenges and that at some point, she once considered giving up.

“It has never been easy, but passion kept me going. Support from the community and non-governmental organisations also gave me the strength to continue.”

She encouraged aspiring entrepreneurs to venture into projects they are passionate about rather than following trends.

Ms Bothang also highlighted the growing role of small-scale horticulture in improving rural livelihoods and called on community members to make use of available space to grow own food and sustain their families.

As she looks into the future, she hopes to secure a larger piece of land where she can scale up production, supply more institutions and create employment for others in her community. **BOPA**

Tonota residents differ on Constitutional Court establishment

As the debate for and against the establishment of a Constitutional Court continues, Tonota residents are split on the direction that Botswana should follow in the matter.

Residents are torn between what should precede the other between establishing the court and reviewing the Constitution. A resident, Mr Ratshimo Ramahobo, says the establishment of the Constitutional Court must first be enshrined in the Constitution itself. Speaking at a kgotla meeting addressed by the Assistant Minister of Justice and Correctional Services, Mr Augustine Nyatanga on Tuesday, Mr Ramahobo argued that a provision must clearly state that a Constitutional Court would be created, otherwise it risked being deemed unconstitutional. “I’m not opposed to the Constitutional Court. My stance is that we should review the

Constitution first,” he said. “The constitution, in its current form, specifies the existence of a High Court, and my view is that there should be a provision in it that similarly provides for the existence of the Constitutional Court. If we establish a Constitutional Court without such mention, it would be an unconstitutional Constitutional Court,” remarked Mr Ramahobo. Mr Reuben Motswakae, another resident, expressed his support for the establishment of the court, deeming it long overdue. He pointed out that this apex court would act as a referee in case challenges arose regarding the impending constitutional review. “The Botswana Constitution was drafted before independence and has historically invaded upon human rights for individuals and communities alike. It merely acknowledged eight principal tribes in Botswana,” he noted. Accordingly, Mr Motswakae underscored the necessity of a Constitutional Court to address disparities and challenges stemming from the Constitution to protect human rights. Similarly, Messrs Oteng Thokoeng and Charlie Obotseng echoed the same sentiments. Mr Thokoeng stated that it was crucial to establish the Constitutional Court prior to undertaking any constitutional

review as it would act as a referee for the process, while Mr Obotseng mentioned its role in safeguarding the rights of the minority. Ms Seipone Radipitse also highlighted the need for a Constitutional Court and observed that it would protect those who have been marginalised, citing instances of unfair treatment towards groups like widows. She said widows often struggled with legal matters, which usually dragged on for extended periods before the courts, expressing hope that the Constitutional Court would provide speedy redress in such situations and spare them from undergoing undue suffering. Former National Assembly deputy speaker and former MP for Tonota, Mr Pono Moatlhodi, argued that government should set aside this significant initiative to prioritise the resuscitation of the healthcare sector instead. He suggested that the P275 million allocated for the associated referendum could be better spent on purchasing medication and addressing other essential needs of the healthcare sector. Mr Motshambisa Seganabeng shared similar views, asserting that while a Constitutional Court was beneficial, now was not the appropriate time for its establishment. He thus urged government to

reassess priorities to determine what should come first. A youthful resident, Mr Omphile Kgokong raised concerns about the rapid push for setting up a Constitutional Court at a time when the country was faced with serious financial limitations. Mr Kgokong stressed that unemployment had severely impacted the youth and therefore implored government to prioritise job creation over establishing what he considered the non-urgent Constitutional Court. Responding to the residents, Assistant Minister Nyatanga said the input of Batswana would be taken into consideration. Mr Nyatanga had earlier told residents that the Constitution of Botswana was drafted a long time ago and needed to be reviewed, hence it was important to establish the Constitutional Court. **BOPA**

Palapye Glass Project - The Art of Impunity

How Botswana's former government perfected a system where P380 million could vanish without consequence.

The final accounting arrived in Parliament on 10 February 2026, though the project itself had ceased to exist over a decade earlier. Responding to Serowe South MP Leepetswe Lesedi, the Minister confirmed the arithmetic that had long circulated in audit reports and court papers: P601.2 million expended on the Palapye float-glass project, P67.8 million recovered, P380 million realised as loss. The venture-conceived in 2007 as a joint enterprise between the Botswana Development Corporation and Shanghai Fengyue, stalled by 2011, liquidated in 2013, was now reduced to a line in the Hansard. The furnaces never fired. The glass was never produced. What remains unresolved is the question of consequence for those culpable, whether by omission or commission, directly or indirectly.

The Documented Warnings

The Auditor General's report for the year ended 30 June 2012 recorded the investment in Fengyue Glass at P422 million, noting that "the Board approved additional funding amounting to P332 million to cover additional project costs". The report carried this finding: "The auditors were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence... because the financial

information of the joint venture company was not available."

The same report observed that "payments were not made directly to the EPC contractor but into the bank account of Fengyue Glass Manufacturing Botswana (Pty) Ltd," and that auditors were denied access to those records.

These were findings of the constitutional officer charged with safeguarding public funds. They did not result in publicly recorded disciplinary action against board members, executives, or ministerial overseers at the time.

The Parliamentary Special Select Committee of Inquiry, appointed in December 2011 and chaired by Abram Kesupile, submitted its report in 2012. The committee found the project was "premised on poor due diligence, doubtful technical project partner selection, a litany of project implementation violations, and doubtful and reckless project fund disbursement". A forensic audit referenced in committee proceedings revealed "hundreds of thousands of Pula in the bank accounts of key BDC executives and employees that could not be accounted for".

The Prosecutorial Gap

In July 2013, then Minister of Trade and Industry Dorcas Makgato-Malesu assured Parliament that "Government is not sitting idle... DCEC is investigating this matter." She confirmed that "some of the

files have been passed on to the DPP".

The investigation produced no prosecutions. In September 2020, Director of Public Prosecutions Stephen Tiroyakgosi informed the Public Accounts Committee that his office was "still awaiting evidence from Beijing" regarding a mutual assistance request sent in February 2012-eight years prior. No charges were laid against BDC executives, board members, or ministerial overseers. The DPP is not compelled by law to provide reasons for declining prosecution. The DCEC itself has acknowledged this pattern. According to Commonwealth Africa anti-corruption research citing DCEC annual reports, the agency referred multiple dockets to the DPP concerning the BDC allegations, yet "there were no cases sent for prosecution".

Liquidation and Recovery

The High Court in Lobatse granted a provisional liquidation order on 13 November 2013, with BDC lawyers stating that "the company has no sources of income. It is hopelessly insolvent and its liabilities far exceed its assets". Court papers noted that Fengyue Glass had "failed to submit PAYE, WHT and Income Tax returns and has many VAT returns outstanding," and that "the full extent of its liabilities are unknown, because the company has no reliable financial records and has never been subjected to an

compounds. Palapye's P380 million realised loss is not the primary driver of the current tightening, but it is emblematic of a period in which significant public resources were deployed without commensurate productive output.

The Continuum of Office

The project spanned multiple administrations. Conceived during Dr Festus Mogae's presidency, it escalated during Lt Gen. Dr Seretse Khama Ian Khama's. Trade portfolios during its active period included Neo Moroka, Dorcas Makgato, and Thapelo Olopeng.

Finance oversight during key phases was provided by Kenneth Matambo, who subsequently attempted to sue Parliament over the select committee report-a litigation dismissed by the Attorney General on grounds of parliamentary privilege.

No parliamentary finding has established that any of these individuals engaged in criminal wrongdoing in relation to Palapye. The public record does, however, document a consistent pattern: forensic findings of unaccounted funds, parliamentary findings of "reckless" disbursement, and no prosecutorial outcome.

Systemic Patterns

Reports from the Accountant General and Public Accounts Committee over the last decade have recurrently cited: "Delays in submission of financial statements," "Weak commitment controls," "Inadequate asset management," "Unreconciled balances". PAC Chair Taolo Lucas noted in 2025 that some cases "from as far as 2014 were still pending in 2025, with little progress to put issues to finality".

The Ombudsman's recent reports, while focused on service delivery, echo a broader institutional diagnosis: "systemic challenges," "failures in implementation." Palapye followed a comparable trajectory, findings issued, frameworks adjusted, enforcement uneven.

The Verdict of 2024

The Minister's February 2026 statement closes the legal dimension of Palapye. The arithmetic is settled: P380 million lost. What remains unsettled is the governance question. The Parliamentary Select Committee found "reckless" disbursement. The forensic audit found unexplained funds in executive accounts. The DCEC referred files to the DPP. The DPP awaited evidence for eight years, then silence.

Yet the final footnote to this saga may have already been written. In October 2024, the Botswana Democratic Party was removed from office after 58 years of uninterrupted rule. The electorate's verdict was delivered not in audit language but in ballots, an assertion, rendered at the polling station, that the architecture of in consequence had exhausted public patience. Palapye was not the sole cause of that electoral outcome. But it stands as the definitive case study of a system in which P380 million could vanish and no one would pay, a system that Botswana, by their vote, declared they would no longer tolerate.

annual financial audit".

Assets were eventually sold for P54.3 million in 2017, with Assistant Minister Biggie Butale informing Parliament that "the valuation report showed that the technical equipment to be sold was either used, incomplete, considerably deteriorated or out of any possible warranty". The land was separately sold for P50 million.

The Fiscal Context

The loss crystallises during a period of acute fiscal pressure. The International Monetary Fund's 2025 Article IV consultation noted that Botswana's "fiscal deficit increased further in fiscal year 2024/25, to 7.1 per cent of GDP," with public debt rising "to more than 30 per cent of GDP". The IMF projected that "unless additional fiscal consolidation measures are adopted, public debt could rise sharply".

This represents a marked shift from earlier decades. The 2024/2025 budget acknowledged "constrained fiscal space" and "rising debt servicing costs." When large capital outlays fail to generate returns, the strain

Legwale and Mkuha appeal 40-year prison sentence

A mistaken-identity murder stemming from witchcraft claims has left Ernest Legwale and Hamadi Mkuha fighting 40-year prison sentence each, with judges describing the

matter as a borderline case that could have attracted the death penalty. A Court of Appeal panel comprising Justices Isaac Lesetedi, Modiri Letsididi and Tshepo Motswagole, hearing the duo's appeal against both conviction and sentence on Thursday, observed

that even the trial judge had noted that the case rooted in the weight of traditional beliefs could have resulted in a death sentence. "This is an extreme case by all standards. It involves money and cold-blooded murder," Justice Motswagole said during the appeal hearing on Wednesday.

Legwale and Mkuha were sentenced by the High Court in 2024 for the September 10, 2015 murder of Thato Meswele in Oodi. The deceased was the younger sister

of Legwale's wife, Dimpho. Legwale had allegedly hired Mkuha and another person not before the court to murder his wife and mother-in-law, believing they were bewitching him. However, the attackers mistakenly killed the younger sister. "Your client is riding on someone's belief in witchcraft," Justice Motswagole said after listening to Mkuha's attorney, Mr Letlhogonolo Makgane, who reasoned that his client's sentence was unprecedented and without justification. "A 40-year sentence, in all honesty, is a slow death sentence; for a 56-year-old man to be sentenced to 40 years, he will die in prison," Mr Makgane submitted. He argued that, in comparable circumstances, courts typically impose sentences ranging between 25 and 30 years. He further submitted that the appellants should not receive equal punishment, stating that 'the perpetrator should get more than the hired hands.' Mr Makgane also argued that his client was convicted on double hearsay evidence which the court should not have relied upon, and that no evidence placed Mkuha at the crime scene in Oodi or linked him directly to the conspiracy. Counsel for the first appellant, Mr David Ndlovu, likewise told the court that the 40-year sentence was excessively severe and should only be imposed where strong aggravating circumstances exist. He argued that the case did not warrant such punishment and described the sentence as unusual in Botswana. On conviction, Mr Ndlovu submitted that the High Court erred in relying heavily on the evidence of a traditional doctor. He said the court should have treated the traditional doctor's testimony with caution, arguing that the traditional doctor allegedly triggered the chain of events by prophesying that Dimpho and her mother were bewitching Legwale, performing charms intended to kill them, and later cleansing Legwale. He further alleged that the traditional doctor assisted in disposing of the getaway vehicle and was in fact the mastermind behind the killing, having promised to eliminate those allegedly bewitching Legwale and later orchestrating the murder when that failed. "The court erred in finding that the traditional doctor was a credible witness," he said, adding that when first interviewed by the police, he denied everything but would later change his story to say that he knew the killers. The two accused persons and another not before court, on or about September 10, 2015, at or near Oodi, allegedly acted jointly and with common purpose to unlawfully assault Thato Meswele, inflicting injuries from which she died four days later, on September 14. Judgment in the appeal is expected on March 27. BOPA

Authorities dispose 1 900 expired medicines

GABORONE

Parliament has been informed that the Ministry of Health has disposed of 1 900 medicines due to expiration between 2015 and 2025.

Responding to a parliamentary question Wednesday, Assistant Minister of Health, Mr Lawrence Ookeditse said the medicines were disposed of to ensure compliance with Botswana Medical Regulatory Authority (BOMRA) regulations.

Mr Ookeditse said 347 were disposed of during 2019/20, another 347 in 2020/21 and 268 in 2021/22.

He said in 2022/23 they disposed of 342, 283 in 2023/24 and 313 in 2024/25.

He added that the expired quantities increased during 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 during the COVID-19 outbreak.

Mr Ookeditse further indicated the value of disposed doses due to expiration, which included P5,373 997.91 worth of medicines in 2017/19 while in 2020 destruction value stood at P10,185,638.40 and there was no destruction in 2021/22.

In 2023, he said the value of disposed doses was P1, 424 579.01 and P1, 092,373.17 in 2024.

He added that 1 9478 packs of 1 000 paracetamol 500mg tablets valued at P1,081,029 were also disposed of.

Chobe MP, Mr Simasiku Mapulanga had asked the minister to state the quality of medicines which were recommended to be disposed due to expiration between 2019 and 2025 and their estimated value as recommended by BOMRA. **BOPA**



Efforts underway to protect artistes interests

Minister of Sport and Arts, Mr Jacob Kelebeng said the ministry intended to table the Performer Protection Bill before Parliament to solidify the legal framework safeguarding the rights and welfare of performers across the country.

Plans are afoot to strengthen the creative industry's legal standing.

Answering a question in Parliament on Wednesday, the Minister of Sport and Arts, Mr Jacob Kelebeng, said that through National Development Plan 12 (NDP 12), the ministry intends to table the Performer Protection Bill before Parliament soon.

"This legislation is expected to solidify the legal framework safeguarding the rights and welfare of performers across the country," Mr Kelebeng said.

The minister also detailed the payment framework designed to ensure fair remuneration for the creative sector.

Minister Kelebeng confirmed that the Guidelines for the Procurement of Arts and Culture Products and Services have been in effect since 2018.

He noted that the guidelines were developed to implement Presidential Directive Cab I (B) of 2015.

Furthermore, the minister highlighted that following the COVID-19 pandemic, several fee

structures were revised upward to support the industry's recovery.

Notably, he said the minimum fee for groups, including traditional song and dance, choral and dikhwaere, was increased from P10 000 to P25 000.

He added that the current payment structures included P25 000 as a standard rate for performance groups and contemporary live bands,

P10 000 for Disk jockeys (DJs), one-man bands and contemporary backtrack bands and P5 000 for poets, *mmamogolokwane*, traditional instrument players and directors of eremonies. Minister Kelebeng emphasised that the figures represented minimum fees intended to guide procuring entities.

He noted that artistes may be paid

higher rates depending on the specific budget and scale of the event.

The minister's response followed a question from Kgatleng Central MP, Mr Mpho Morolong, who had sought clarification on whether formal guidelines existed to ensure that artistes were fairly and consistently compensated across different categories. **BOPA**

New UB structure prioritises research and academic efficiency

GABORONE

The University of Botswana is undergoing major transformation following the adoption of its 2020-2029 strategy, which aims to reposition the institution as a higher learning institution, Minister of Higher Education, Mr Prince Maele has said.

Responding to a question in Parliament on Wednesday, Minister Maele said a consulting firm was engaged to review the university's organisational structure and

performance management systems, owing to misalignment with the new strategic direction.

The minister said as a result, a comprehensive restructuring process was initiated in March 2020, focused on creating an organisational design that supported research, increased efficiency and channeled more resources towards academic functions.

He said the university's act and statutes had been under review by its council, adding that once the process was complete, the amendments would be published in the Government Gazette in due course.

He said the UB statues on the other hand were amended at the sole discretion of the University council, adding that the council had resolved that it shall be reviewing statues on an ongoing basis to ensure alignment with the new organisational structure and any new processes and procedures.

The minister further said the latest amendments to the University of

Botswana statutes were published to the university community on January 30, 2026, adding that its council was in place and had begun convening meetings. He said he was aware of the frustrations and disgruntlements regarding the restructuring process, saying he was however satisfied with the progress thus far and remained hopeful that the remaining process would be completed amicably by the target date of March this year.

He was answering the question from Maun West MP, Mr Caterpillar Hikuama, who had wanted an update on the restructuring process at the University of Botswana.

Mr Hikuama had also asked the minister to state whether the University of Botswana Act and related statutes were revised and the dates of the revision, if any.

He had also wanted to know whether the Act and statutes were availed to the university community and public, if there was a university council and if the minister was satisfied with the entire restructuring. **BOPA**

Damaged cordon fences increase risk of FMD

GABORONE

The Ministry of Lands and Agriculture has acknowledged that cordon fences are frequently damaged or destroyed by veldt fires, with the risk heightened when surrounding areas are not adequately debushed.

Answering a parliamentary question on Wednesday, acting Minister of Lands and Agriculture, Dr Edwin Dikoloti, explained that the ministry undertook debushing along cordon fences as part of its maintenance programme.

"This facilitates patrols, prevents bush encroachment and helps protect the fences from veldt fires," Dr Dikoloti said.

However, he said resource constraints made it difficult to keep pace with maintenance, particularly for inter-zonal fences. He noted that internal self-assessments (DVS audits) and external evaluations had underscored Botswana's vulnerability to Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) due to damaged cordon fences. For instance, he said following a 2013 audit, the European Union suspended imports of beef from Zone 4a (Boteti) owing to a non-negligible risk of FMD linked to veldt fires.

"Faced with escalating challenges, including limited resources, persistent vandalism and wildlife damage, the ministry has adopted a multipronged approach to combating FMD. This combines technical and

social interventions to prevent the disease's spread," he said.

Key measures, he said included promoting the Herding for Health (H4H) model, which encouraged sustainable grazing practices and actively engaging communities in the maintenance of veterinary cordon fences. Dr Dikoloti further emphasised that community ownership of animal health programmes was essential for long-term sustainability.

He highlighted the crucial role of local authorities and Dikgosi leadership in mobilising communities and maintaining engagement.

Examples, he said included ongoing efforts in Mophato in Bobirwa and enhanced livestock herding in the Okavango, which had contributed to reduced stock theft and extended periods without FMD outbreaks in

those areas.

Also, he said the ministry planned to scale up these initiatives by leveraging programmes such as the Green Climate Fund (GCF)-supported Ecosystem-Based Adaptation and Mitigation in Communal Rangelands project, launched by the President in May last year.

He was responding to a question by Boteti West MP, Mr Sam Digwa, who sought clarification on whether the minister was aware that cordon fences were frequently destroyed by veldt fires, particularly when surrounding areas were not properly debushed.

Mr Digwa also wanted to know if there were measures in place to prevent such incidents and protect the critical infrastructure, as well as the assessment that had been made on the potential risk that the destruction of cordon fences posed to the beef industry, particularly regarding increased vulnerability to the spread of FMD from red zone to green zone areas. **BOPA**

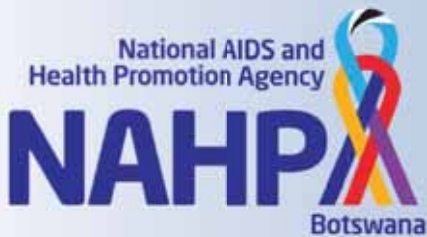

Boasa Integrated Farmers Association in Mabeleapudi would want to fully embrace the economic potential of Moringa tree. The economic spin-offs of this ambitious project abound and can bring about a ray of hope at a time when the country's economic lanscape is at its lowest ebb.

Upon realising Moringa's economic potential, the 48 member' association have a dream to plant the 'tree of life' over a huge chunk of land measuring 28 hectares at Selathamokowe/Taukome lands.

To date, the association has started the ball rolling by digging deep-down individual members' pockets to plough 10 of the 28 hectares with the view to aurgment hectorage planted in the near future.

Boasa Integrated Farmers Association have started the project with the help of Mr Hunter of Hunter Global Network, who was the brain behind the planting of Moringa trees at Gakutlo in the Kweneng district.

The upbeat Boasa Integrated Farmers Association Chairperson, Mr Gobonetse Seetswane, relayed in an interview with BOPA that the huge employment prospects lie ahead if all goes well.

To add cherry on top, the

expected economic spin-offs that will be derived from the multi-million project according to Mr Seetswane, will bolster the overall development of the little-known Mabele-a-pudi village located within the Serowe North constituency.

"Members of the association conceived the idea of ploughing Moringa tree as a business as far back as 2025 and we remain ambitious that we will become the beehive of Moringa production and its 17-level value chain ranging from seed propagation to products like oil, powder, tea, capsules and many others," he said of the high-value 'miracle tree'.

At full production, the multi-million mega project is expected to churn-out a staggering P5.6 million from the sale of Moringa trees and will supply far-flung places, including Europe, which has shown interest in the project.

Furthermore, Mr Seetswane indicated that together with the group he leads they have done fair share of research on Moringa and learned about the symbiotic relationship between the plant and humans and realized the tree's nutritional value and healing power.

Beyond providing food, he noted moringa leaves can be used as relish or Morogo, adding that every part of the Moringa plant is edible. "Moringa powder is used as a medicine in multiple ways that prevent and treat chronic diseases like inflammatory diseases, diabetes and cancer, among others," he said.

He said they have decided to plant the Moringa Oleifera variety, whose leaves can also be used to produce tea. "It boosts the immune system and improves digestive

health. It supports blood sugar regulation, heart and skin health while providing vitamins A, C and E," he said.

The saying that one should not despise small beginnings resonates well with Boasa Integrated Farmers Association's vision, which advocates for a full-blown professional company that will have a board of directors conducting its affairs, accountants, security personnel, transport and logistics, and many other professionals.

Mr Seetswane is worried, though, about the impassable road that leads to the farm, especially during the rainy season. It is his fervent prayer that the road could be maintained to a better standard sooner than later to ensure smooth production.

An elderly man, Mr Maruapula Tumelo from Molodi cattle post, near Tshimoyapula attests that Moringa leaves and powder have healing properties, having used the same, to treat his foot joint that was problematic in the past.

He attributed the improvement of his blood pressure to Moringa leaves. He advises people to normalize using Moringa and to plant the trees in their yards. Ms Mogametsi Tapologo, aged 47, attested that after drinking Moringa juice, one feels confident and energetic, describing the tree as a powerful remedy for numerous ailments.

The tree, also known as a wonder tree, has enormous value and incredible potential for protecting and nourishing hair and skin as well as treating swelling and stomach upset.

Traditionally, the plant is used to cure wounds, pain, ulcers, liver and heart diseases, cancer and inflammation. **BOPA**

Kenya receives 21 000 starter doses of injectable HIV prevention drug

NAIROBI

Kenya's Ministry of Health has received a consignment of 21 000 starter doses of Lenacapavir, a twice-yearly injectable drug for HIV prevention. Patrick Amoth, director general for health at the ministry, received the consignment on Tuesday in Nairobi, the Kenyan capital.

He said the first phase of the rollout of Lenacapavir, a long-acting injectable HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis, would

begin in early March. "The medicine works by blocking critical stages of the HIV life cycle, preventing the virus from establishing infection in the body.

Its greatest advantage is that it is administered only twice a year, offering six months of protection per dose," Amoth said, emphasizing that the medicine was designed for HIV-negative individuals.

He said the shipment represented a significant milestone in expanding access to

next-generation HIV prevention technologies across the region, as several African countries prepare to introduce the intervention.

Kenya expects an additional 12 000 continuation doses by April to ensure uninterrupted treatment for those who begin the injections.

Amoth said the ministry would implement a phased, evidence-driven rollout guided by epidemiological trends and health system readiness. Phase one will target 15 high-burden counties, followed by two additional phases

to progressively expand coverage nationwide, ensuring service preparedness, reliable commodity supply, and sustainable scale-up.

Kenya has been witnessing a sharp increase in HIV cases, with more than 20,105 new infections reported in 2025, according to the health ministry. The country's HIV prevalence stands at about 3.7 per cent, with about 1.34 million people currently on antiretroviral treatment.

"Of particular concern is the fact that 41 per cent of new HIV

infections occur among young people below the age of 24 years, underscoring the urgent need for novel prevention strategies," Amoth said.

Lenacapavir is expected to be offered at an estimated annual cost of about 7 800 shillings (about US \$60 US) per patient, a substantial reduction from the previous price of about 42,000 dollars. In July 2025, Kenya was selected among the first nine countries to introduce Lenacapavir. **Xinhua**

After their 2024 single titled *Digwabanyana*, Makwakwa A Mmino Traditional Group has released *Mathumpu*, an eight-track album that reaffirms how deeply Setswana culture is woven into the DNA of this Gaborone-based ensemble.

Richly layered with Setswana proverbs and everyday reflections of a typical Motswana, the album demonstrates expert songwriting and cultural insight. Formed from the merger of two iconic 1990s traditional dance groups, Mogwana and Ditholwana, Makwakwa continues to energise the music industry with vibrant cultural rhythms. Their earlier hits, including *Makwakwa ke ao*, *Nkopelele pina* and *Tsholetsa makgabe kgarebe* (the 2014 Song of the Year award winner) cemented their reputation as a true-to-type cultural ensemble. *Mathumpu* expands that legacy, blending Setswana with Kalanga, Shona, and Shekgalagari to celebrate indigenous languages and showcase African cultural unity.

The group’s publicist, also a member, Tshepo Molate, describes the project as more than music: “through this project, we aim to preserve and promote traditional rhythms, language, and messages that connect generations. Each song carries themes of unity, pride, resilience, hope, and behaviour change.” Molate emphasised that *Mathumpu* reflects hard work, passion, and commitment to keeping Tswana tradition alive in a modern world. Title Track – *Mathumpu*: led by Keromemang ‘Carrot’ Mothibamele, delivers a powerful call to end drug addiction, a growing societal challenge. In *Nka bona motho*, Tshepo ‘JohnP’ Molate, narrates the search of a bachelor longing for his soulmate. *Re bina Setswana* is a proud celebration of Tswana culture, fusing dikhwaere rhythms with borankana and enriched by Dr. Tawanda’s Shona flair while *Mmaonikisa* is a poignant tale of heartbreak and resilience, portraying a woman abandoned with children. *Tonki* is playful yet respectful ode to the donkey, a vital companion in African daily life. The track *Lenyalo* encourages married couples to honour their vows through challenges while *Le bo mang* introduces the group and affirms their pride in cultural roots. *Banyana sesadi* is closing tribute to women as life-givers and

nurturers. Makwakwa comprises nine members; Bakang Motlhajwa, Tshepo Gabathlokwe, Tshepo ‘JohnP’ Molate, Meshack Moraloki, Stiger Kgaodi, Mompoloki Ntlaboletsa, Keromemang Mothibamele, Tumelo Seroke, and Tebogo Kolobeng, representing diverse cultures across Botswana. Their performances are marked by high energy, breathtaking dance moves, and powerful stage

presence. Produced by music maestro Tawanda ‘Dr Tawanda’ Benson, *Mathumpu* sustains Makwakwa’s original punch while adapting to contemporary sounds. Since their debut album, *A le botshe* (2009), followed by *A palameletse* (2013) and *Le letse kae* (2016), the group has consistently evolved while staying rooted in tradition. Seventeen years since formation, Makwakwa has carried

Tswana culture beyond Botswana’s borders, reaching out in countries such as the USA and India. Their latest project, recorded at Mega Bass Studio in Mafikeng, South Africa, is now available on Spotify, Apple Music, Boomplay, Google Play, and TikTok. Lokgwabe community launches *Nama Online Radio*

The Lokgwabe community has taken a decisive step towards safeguarding its cultural heritage with the launch of *Nama Online Radio*, an initiative aimed at promoting and revitalising the Nama language.

There is a general fear among residents that the language is steadily losing ground to dominant languages.

The project answers government's call to preservation and broadcasting of indigenous languages through the establishment of community radio stations across the country.

For the people of Lokgwabe, the station is more than a communication platform, it is a cultural lifeline intended to restore pride in their identity and provide a voice for a community that has long felt marginalised in mainstream discourse.

Nama Development Trust chairperson, Nicholas Cooper, told *BOPA* that the online station was funded through the Cultural Survival Fund, an international non-governmental organisation based in the United States with a regional office in Cape Town, South Africa.

The fund had invited proposals for a 10-month indigenous radio establishment programme, for which the trust successfully applied. Now in its second month of operation, the station has already hosted a three-day intensive training workshop, facilitated by *Kaisames Radio Station* of Namibia.

The indigenous broadcaster was engaged to equip the project team with essential skills in broadcasting, ethical journalism and content production.

"The initial plan was to train 10 presenters, but the project scope provided for four presenters, a coordinator and a project officer who are responsible for the day-to-day running of the station," said Cooper.

He noted that the primary objective of the radio station was to create a platform through which the Nama people could discuss issues affecting them in their own language and from their own perspective.

"Indigenous communities across the world often remain unheard because they are minorities and most public discourse is dominated by majority groups. This radio station is meant to give us a voice and ensure that our concerns reach both our people and policy makers," he said.

Although the station prioritises Nama, about 30 per cent of its programming is broadcast in Shekgalagari, Setswana and English, to accommodate the broader community and encourage inclusivity.

Cooper said years of cultural assimilation had resulted in many Nama people, particularly the younger generation, speaking less of their mother tongue in favour of more dominant local languages.

"Through the radio, we want to encourage our people to speak Nama again. Language carries

identity, history and pride. When people begin to speak it more frequently, they revive the spirit of the community," he said.

The station's programming also addresses youth development, human rights, climate change, gender issues and the preservation of cultural heritage. Content is carefully prepared to meet ethical journalism standards, a principle Cooper said was emphasised during training.

Nama Online Radio currently broadcasts live from 9am to noon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, with a second live session from 6pm to 9pm. A dedicated one-hour children's programme airs on Sundays and focuses on teaching the Nama language through educational content.

"So many children cannot speak Nama, so we are deliberately using radio as a learning platform to reach them at an early age," he said.

Evening programmes feature live interviews with relevant stakeholders on topical issues. Traditional leaders have already been engaged to discuss challenges such as stock theft and possible solutions for the district.

Cooper said listener feedback had been encouraging, noting that the project was still in its formative stages and that presenters would continue to receive training to enhance their professionalism and improve content quality.

Looking ahead, the trust plans to engage the Botswana Communications Regulatory Authority with the aim of transitioning from an online platform to a fully-fledged frequency-based community radio station once the 10-month project period ends.

"Online radio limits listenership because it requires smartphones and reliable internet access. Our long-term goal is to operate a community radio station that can be accessed by everyone while still maintaining our online presence," he said.

He welcomed government's commitment to community broadcasting and the dissemination of news in indigenous languages, describing the project as timely and aligned with national development priorities.

Beyond language preservation, the initiative is expected to create employment opportunities and open up a value chain that includes presenters, technicians, producers and administrative staff. It is also seen as a platform for nurturing local talent in music, poetry and storytelling, which Cooper said remained largely untapped.

"We want this station to inspire our people, uncover hidden talent and attract qualified journalists from within the community so that it becomes a permanent institution that promotes our language and culture," said Cooper.

He said *Nama Online Radio* represented a technological milestone and was a symbol of cultural resilience.

Its coming into being means that the Nama language would be heard, celebrated and passed on to future generations. **BOPA**



Toby and Abby Café breaks traditional culinary boundaries

What began as a small stall selling *lerotse* juice, *lerotse* porridge, *lengangale* and seed snacks has grown into a vibrant indigenous foods café.

Last week, Triple A Farm, based in Gakuto locality, officially expanded its operations with the launch of Toby and Abby Café in White City, Gaborone, along Kaunda Road.

The founder and managing director of Triple A Farm and the café, Lere Tapologo said the café was named in remembrance of her two sons, Toby and Abby, who died in a car accident in February 2020. She noted the painful coincidence that Kaunda Road where the café now stands was the same road that claimed their lives, a fact she only discovered after choosing the location.

"As we officially open our café today, may Toby and Abby Café stand as a beacon of community spirit, creativity and cultural achievement," she said.

Tapologo explained that the name Triple A was derived from the names of her children: Aobakwe, Atang and Ame.

"Some people thought this is a tuckshop. This is a café. Our mission is simple. We do not only want to serve coffee because it is a café or because people are hungry, we want to give people indigenous

food," she said.

She added that the business focuses on making indigenous food fashionable while maintaining their health benefits. Traditionally, foods such as *lengangale* were served plainly and attracted little interest, but the café has repackaged them to be visually appealing.

Tapologo said Toby and Abby Café was born from a powerful dream to create a one-stop destination where culture, community and culinary creativity thrive together.

"We did not want to sell just food. We wanted to tell a story through every bite and every sip, the story of the land that nourishes us, the hands that cultivate our food and the traditions that ground us, from agro-processing to the final plate," she said.

She emphasised that the café celebrated

sustainability and authenticity. She often labels her products 'authentic *bogobe jwa lerotse*' to distinguish them from modern city versions that include added spices.

Every ingredient, she said, represented a journey from farm to table, connecting rural producers with local consumers in ways that uplift communities.

Local collectors supply Triple A Farm with indigenous fruits such as brandy bush (*moretlwa*), sour plum (*moretologa*), milo and others. Ms Tapologo believes many people are now eager to reconnect with natural, traditional foods, and the café provides easy access to those tastes.

The café strictly sells indigenous beverages and foods, including *morula* nectar, *lerotse* juice, baobab drinks and *moretologa* juice, rather than products commonly found in large retail stores.

She said the café also served as a platform for other citizen-owned indigenous brands. Producers such as Secret Kalahari, which trades in donkey milk products, and Phatsima Innovations, which adds value to moringa and other indigenous products, are invited to sell their goods there.

"We want this café to be a one-stop shop where any Motswana who wants indigenous products can come and find everything from our land," she said.

Tapologo stressed that the business was not only about selling food, it was also about sustaining livelihoods, supporting farmers and cultivating change through investment in local produce, people and the environment.

She urged the nation to take indigenous foods seriously and embrace healthier alternatives, cautioning against snacks and foods high in refined sugars. She said Triple A Farm avoided harmful additives in its processing and took pride in producing healthy items such as its energy bars.

She acknowledged that the journey of Triple A Farm had been supported by stakeholders including the Local Enterprise Authority. Tapologo also noted that the café ensured its organic products met quality standards by testing them at the National Agricultural Research and Development Institute. **BOPA**

Premier league coaching carousel in full swing

As the race for the FNB Premiership title intensifies, so too are the winds of change continuing to blow through the league contenders' dugouts and technical setups.

With 19 of the expected 30 matches played this season, the traditional coaching merry-go-round has already taken centre stage.

The rumour mill is in full swing, with some coaches having already been shown the exit door by their respective clubs.

The

saying that a coach is only as safe as his team's last result holds true in many sports and the Botswana Premier League is no different.

When things go haywire, as they often do at some point in football, debate always arises over where to place the blame after a string of poor results.

While some point to players and bad influence, others look toward the coach.

There are arguments for both sides, but a team cannot change an entire squad mid-season; therefore, the axe usually falls on the coach.

As the coaching merry-go-round continues to spin, one thing is clear: the FNB Premiership has become a high-pressure environment.

Currently, all the top three teams on the log have made notable changes in their dugouts midway through the campaign.

Interestingly, all the new gaffers at the centre of the carousel are European-born, which could be testament to the growth of the local game.

A notable change is the recent appointment of Dimitar Pantev at Jwaneng Galaxy, replacing Sean Connor, who parted ways

with the club amicably on February 12.

On the back of winning a league title with Gaborone United in the 2024/2025 season and an impressive CAF Champions League campaign, the well-travelled Pantev left Moyagoleele for Tanzanian giants Simba SC, only to be dismissed 60 days into the new job.

The Bulgarian tactician returns to Botswana at a crucial stage of the campaign, with Galaxy firmly in the title race and currently at the summit of the standings, tied with Gaborone United on 44 points, separated only by goal difference.

Similarly, Gaborone United (GU) have announced the appointment of Sean Connor as the club's new head coach on a two-and-a-half-year contract.

The Irish gaffer takes over from interim head coach Khalid Niyonzima, who oversaw 15 matches and suffered his first defeat last Saturday at the hands of Sua Flamingoes.

Connor is no stranger to the local football fraternity, having steered Matebele FC to the Orange FA Cup semi-final in his maiden Botswana season, and later guiding Jwaneng Galaxy to the FA Cup title and a CAF Confederation Cup spot.

The former Cape Town Spurs technical director is regarded as a highly experienced football manager and holds a UEFA Pro License, the

highest coaching qualification in European football.

Another dark horse in the title race, Mochudi Centre Chiefs, hired new head coach Miguel Corral Torreira, replacing club legend Pontsho Moloji.

The appointment of the 34-year-old Spaniard has been under the spotlight due to his relative inexperience.

Nonetheless, the reality of the side's revival is that the Spaniard has maintained an unbeaten record since taking over.

Torreira's side has won four of their previous four encounters and drawn one

Top seed Cerundolo exits Rio Open

Top seed Francisco Cerundolo retired from the Rio Open on Wednesday due to a lower back injury, ending his bid for a maiden ATP 500 title.

The world No. 19 was trailing fellow Argentine Thiago Agustín Tirante 6-2, 3-1 in their last-16 match at the Jockey Club Brasileiro when he stopped play to receive treatment from a physiotherapist before deciding he could not continue.

An official medical report was not immediately available.

"It's not good to win like this, especially with Fran, one of my friends. I knew that he was very tired from last week, so I had to improve myself on the court and focus on me," Tirante said.

Tirante will meet either Francesco Passaro or Alejandro Tabilo in the next round.

Cerundolo arrived in Rio in strong form after winning last week's Argentina Open without dropping a set, and he had beaten compatriot Mariano Navone 6-3, 6-4 on Tuesday.

His withdrawal opens up the

draw for Brazilian favorite and third seed Joao Fonseca, the world No. 38, who will face Peru's Ignacio Buse in the round of 16 on Thursday as he looks to recover from a slow start to the season in front of his home crowd.

Second seed Luciano Darderi of Italy and Argentine fourth seed Sebastian Baez were eliminated in the first round on Tuesday.

Darderi lost to Juan Manuel Cerundolo while defending champion Baez fell to Portugal's Jaime Faria. **Xinhua**

Jade from Goshwe to the World

When she raked in three gold medals at the Africa Aquatics Zone IV Championships in eSwatini last September, Jade Chilisa knew instantaneously that the path she has been walking since infancy had finally started paying off.

She had come into the competition as a debutante, but she walked away all decked in gold, having clinched the medals in the 50m backstroke, 100m breaststroke and the 50m fly.

In the course of securing the top spots, Jade also set two new Championship Records (CRs) of 28.62 and 1:10.05 for the 50m backstroke and the 100m breaststroke, respectively.

Jade's journey of conquering the waters began in an

unconventional way.

At just nine months of age, her parents decided to introduce her to the waters of a swimming pool as a way of training her for safety purposes.

Unbeknown to them, that act of love was a seed that would later sprout and blossom into something truly beautiful—a seed that has since begotten a potential world icon in swimming.

And because an apple does not fall far from the tree, the 12-year-old from Goshwe is following on the footsteps of her father, Will Chilisa,

whose achievements she has dwarfed already.

Jade's choice of swimming over other sporting codes came naturally.

The early introduction to water and the fact that she spends most of her time in the pool at home solidified her affinity to water.

Her late grandmother, who saw the swimming potential in her, also triggered ripples in the little girl's heart by tagging her along to different swimming galas.

The rest, as the adage holds, is now history.

Jade started participating in swimming competitions at Thornhill Primary School, and later transferred to a school in Pretoria, South Africa where competition is fiercer.

"The competition in Pretoria is tough, but I am enjoying the challenges; they force me to work extra hard," she said.

Her ambition is to someday make it to the Olympics, hence her working hard now.

Who knows, she might be Botswana's talisman to its first-ever Olympic swimming medal!

And worth noting is that Jade's achievements are not results of solo effort.

She has a robust support system, which includes her parents, fellow athletes and coaches.

Her mother, Refilwe Chilisa, has had the privilege of watching her grow, not only as a swimmer, but also as a disciplined and

determined young athlete.

"Jade is focused, hardworking and incredibly resilient for her age. She approaches every training session with purpose and understands that success in swimming comes from consistency and sacrifice," she said.

Chilisa is always in awe of Jade's competitive spirit, which is balanced with humility.

"Whether she is racing the 50m freestyle or pushing through the 800m freestyle, she gives her absolute best. She is goal-driven and is constantly working to improve her times. She always listens to her coaches and learns from every race," she noted.

For Chilisa, her daughter's admirable demeanour extends beyond the pool as the youngster is respectful, coachable, and maintains a strong commitment to her academics.

The mother is glad that her daughter understands that being an athlete also means being responsible enough to represent both her club and country with pride.

She believes that Jade has the potential to grow into one of Botswana's outstanding female swimmers.

"As her mother, I am most proud of her perseverance and the discipline she shows daily. She gives everything in every race, whether it's a sprint or a long-distance event," she said.

After all is said and done, Jade's resilience is astounding: the early mornings, the hard training, and the unwavering commitment to always improve will bear fruit.

And as things are, she is not just chasing medals, she is building character and edging Botswana closer and closer to the possibility of winning an Olympics medal in swimming.
