MP opposes reduction of lpelegeng workers

FRANCISTOWN - The MP for Francistown West, Mr Ignatius Moswaane, has expressed concern over the decision to reduce the quota of Ipelegeng programme workers in the northern city.

Addressing a kgotla meeting at Monarch East on Wednesday, Mr Moswaane implored relevant authorities to review the decision with urgency, citing the potential negative impact on the lives of affected workers and their families, particularly at Gerald Estate, where the number of workers had been reduced from 98 to 28.

Mr Moswaane cited that cutting the number of Ipelegeng workers from 98 to 28 was a huge blow for the community, adding that the decision should be reviewed with the agency it deserved.

"The Ipelegeng programme was introduced to alleviate poverty and hunger among Batswana, and it has been a vital source of employment in many areas, including Francistown," said Mr Moswaane.

He explained that since the country was currently faced with difficult economic times, reducing the number of Ipelegeng workers was not a solution.

Instead, he said it would exacerbate poverty and hunger. "I strongly believe this is not in the best interest of our people," he said

The MP emphasised that the programme was a lifeline

for many residents and that its reduction would have far-reaching consequences.


He urged authorities to consider the impact of the decision on the community and to explore alternative solutions that would mitigate the effects of the economic challenges facing the country.

"I understand that the government is facing financial constraints, but I believe that reducing the Ipelegeng programme is not the answer. We need to find ways to support our people during these challenging times, not abandon them. I will continue to advocate for the review of this decision, and I hope that the relevant authorities will take our concerns into consideration," Mr Moswaane said.

He assured residents that government was working to address current challenges by finding solutions that would improve the lives of Batswana.

The Deputy Town Clerk-Operations of the City of Francistown Council, Ms Pedzani Mahama, explained that the decision to reduce the Ipelegeng programme quota was necessitated by good rains experienced in the past season, which allowed many people to engage in farming and food production.

However, Mr Moswaane countered that the rains had a devastating effect on many residents in Francistown, who were left homeless and hungry due to the floods. *BOPA*

Programme empowers nurses to deliver comprehensive care

GABORONE - The Ministry of Health (MoH) in collaboration with Botswana University of Maryland School of Medicine Health Initiative (BUMMHI) graduated 28 healthcare workers after successful completion of a rigorous in-service training for integrated health services.

The year-long curriculum, already in its third phase since its inception in 2015, marked the first ever successful graduation of healthcare professionals from the former Southern District Health Management Team (DHMT), the first district to complete Phase 3.

Developed to cut training costs incurred in the repetitive content of the multiple curricula for HIV training and passive hotel based workshops, the curriculum offers 37 courses fused to form one

single program for healthcare professionals.

The integrated programme was that one healthcare provider can provide most services to clients with minimal referrals, covering modules such as HIV testing, ARV prescribing, maternal and child care as well as palliative care among others.

In his keynote address at the graduation ceremony in Gaborone on Wednesday, Caretaker Commissioning Manager of Sir Ketumile Hospital, Dr Kagiso Ndlovu said the integrated programme would mean a nurse in Kanye could counsel a mother on antenatal care, screen her for TB and initiate HIV services in one seamless encounter

"For years, health training programmes have remained fragmented, however, the integrated curriculum marks a turning page," he said .

MoH Public Health Acting Director, Ms Eunice Ramonna, expressed gratitude to BUMMHI for its partnership which she affirmed had been instrumental in offering technical expertise for the implementation of the in-service training, enabling the ministry to strengthen healthcare provision.

Ms Ramonna lauded the integrated curriculum for its competency based training which utilises self-learning or mentorship model training, in turn evoking a learner to be self-directed and to develop a positive attitude even in service delivery.

"We welcome initiatives such as this integrated curriculum at the MoH as it is a sustainable model of training especially in these very difficult economic times," she said. **BOPA**

Prioritise gun safety - Mantswe

GABORONE - Poor handling of licensed firearms that end up being misused by unauthorised individuals has the potential to damage the country's reputation. Speaking at the 2025 arms quota raffle draw in Gaborone on Thursday, Botswana Police Service deputy commissioner, Mr Solomon Mantswe urged gun owners to acquire gun safes and practise all necessary precautions to help reduce crime, especially those involving illegal firearm uses.

Statistics he said indicated that from 2022 to date, a total of 16 shotguns and 13 rifles were been stolen. Mr Mantswe stressed that BPS would continue to work with both local and international stakeholders to implement best practices in managing arms and ammunition. He said that such collaboration ensured Botswana's efficient management of firearm acquisition and use.

"We also adhere to international agreements to which we are signatories, such as the Arms Trade Treaty, which sets

common standards to prevent illegal possession, misuse, and irresponsible arms transfers," he said. He said that it was BPS's responsibility to ensure firearms are entrusted only to responsible individuals.

This year, Mr Mantswe noted an increase in the number of firearm applications compared to last year. In 2025, a total of 20 250 people applied for shotgun permits, and 18 747 applied for rifles, up from 15 891 and 14 376 applications respectively in 2024.

He said that in 2024, a quota of 300 acquisition permits was issued for dispensation, and the same number would be allocated in this year's raffle, with 150 permits each for rifles and shotguns.

During the raffle draw, 135 applicants for shotguns and rifles will be selected, while 15 in each category will be reserved for special dispensations. Furthermore, Mr Mantswe said that through initiatives like arms raffle draw, BPS continued to aim to be an organisation that offered transparent services and upholds the highest ethical standards.

Govt sets six per cent agric. **GDP** target

GABORONE Government has set a minimum of six per cent target for the agricultural sector's contribution to the national Gross Domestic Product (GDP).

Officially opening the 2025 National Agricultural Show Friday in Gaborone, President Advocate Duma Boko said the target required Botswana to develop infrastructure to help achieve the six per cent goal.

He also said Botswana aimed to increase the cattle herd to five million in three years and focus on improving the agricultural sector.

The target, the President said were to be attained regardless of challenges facing agriculture in Botswana

"We set these targets fully alive of the circumstances we are in. Circumstances of climate vulnerability, circumstances of global economic shocks, the fact of the absence of a comprehensive agro financing framework, especially for small holder farmers, the reality of weak extension services. The fact of slow adoption of modern technologies, challenge of inadequate infrastructure, fragmented value chains, bio security threats, policy and institutional weaknesses, data connectivity gaps and demographic challenges," said President Boko.

He said government was the biggest player in the economy hence should work with the farmers to find structured ways of revamping the

President Boko said farmers should be able to produce enough to assist the national school feeding programme, health facilities and even the prisons, with fresh produce.

"We must focus on processing, we must focus on producing the best and volumes that will enable us to be self-sufficient and also to export," he said adding that farmers should inform the policy framework rather than let it be from the technocrats.

He encouraged farmers to make submissions to government and share ideas that could help with policy development and refashioning of institutions.

National Agricultural Show Committee chairperson, Mr Thapelo Setlalekgosi said the quality of produce had improved over the years, second to South Africa. He said in 2024 small stock producers had brought 460 animals last year and 1 000 this year while cattle breeders had 200 in 2024 and 305

He said they were challenged by pricing because 10 years ago, a heifer cost P4 000 and the price remained the same to date while employee wages increased.

Mr Setlalekgosi called for National structures of the Agricultural Show grounds to be revamped.

Representing the show Gold Sponsor, Absa chief executive officer, Ms Keabetswe Pheko-Moshagane said the launch of the National Agricultural Policy marked a progressive step toward establishment of modern, competitive and sustainable agricultural economy.

Ms Pheko-Moshagane said the policy aimed to drive an agricultural revolution through diversification, resilient and foster long-term ability by empowering communities and advancing national development.

She said it provided a roadmap for innovation, investment and inclusive role, ensuring that agriculture continued to play a role as a key driver of food security, employment and economic diversification.

As a partner in transforming agriculture as a driver of growth, Ms Pheko-Moshagane said they were committed to support the sector providing tailored financing, value chain support, risk management solutions as well as promoting financial literacy, digital inclusion and smart investment. BOPA

high level strategic briefing on Friday, President Boko declared that the proposed investment was testament of government's ongoing efforts to revive and revitalise Botswana's economy and transform it from a single commodity dependency.

"In the same way that we recently partnered with Al Mansour Holdings through BDC, we now have another formidable agreement with Oman's sovereign wealth fund. This partnership spans a wide range of sectors, and they are ready to commit and invest," President Boko said.

He said some entities and key stakeholders would soon visit Oman to finalise the agreement and bring in the kind of Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) that would benefit the country.

President Boko said the strategic partnership would focus on key sectors critical to the nation's growth and development, ultimately improving the quality of life of the people of Botswana.

He thus raised the need for

the country to swiftly invest in infrastructure development in readiness for the deal.

"The resources that we are mobilising should position the country to develop world-class infrastructure," he said.

President Boko further commended BDC for stepping up to offer a platform for the realisation of economic transformation and mobilisation as well as deployment of finance for development.

He pleaded with various government ministries cohesively work together towards the facilitation of luring FDI into the country in order to power the economy and the society.

Meanwhile, on the sidelines of the Ninth Tokyo International Conference African on Development (TICAD 9), Vice President and Minister of Finance, Mr Ndaba Gaolathe held high-level meetings that advanced Botswana's economic diversification agenda.

The significant outcome was an agreement with Toyota Tsusho Corporation, the trading and investment arm of the Toyota Group, to prepare a Memorandum Understanding formalising a strategic partnership that will cover cooperation in green energy, mining, agriculture and water development.

Mr Gaolathe welcomed the commitment, describing it as a milestone that reflected a shared vision for transformative partnership.

He noted synergies in automobile parts manufacturing, linked to Botswana's drive for copper and base metals beneficiation and efforts to diversify the economy beyond diamonds.

The agreement with Toyota Tsusho, underscores Botswana's proactive approach at TICAD 9 to secure partnerships that drive investment, create jobs and accelerate transformation. BOPA

Botswana secures over P160 billion deal

GABORONE - In line with government's quest for sustainable partnerships and investments to drive inclusive growth and longterm development in pursuit of economic diversification and prosperity for all, government has secured over P160 billion from Qatar's Al Mansour Holdings.

'Reduced tariff can boost exports'

KANYE - The US government's recent decision to reduce reciprocal tariff rates from 37 per cent to 15 per cent has lowered barriers for Botswana's exports, particularly diamonds, which account for 99 per cent of the country's trade with the US.

In an interview with BOPA, economist Mr Sennye Obuseng said Botswana should capitalise on this significant tariff reduction in the short to medium term by boosting diamond exports.

He noted that no other commodity was currently viable for export to the US, emphasising that the 22 per centage-point drop was substantial and could increase consumer demand for Botswana's diamonds.

However, Mr Obuseng cautioned that lab-grown diamonds posed a growing threat. "The tariff barrier may have decreased, but competition from lab-grown diamonds remains strong," he said.

Mr Obuseng also highlighted Botswana's recent expansion of foreign exchange trading margins from 0.5 per cent to 7.5 per cent, a 1 400 percent increase.

This change could raise costs for locally produced goods with high import content, such as mining machinery, potentially affecting diamond prices, he said.

While the extent of this impact on diamonds is unclear, Mr Obuseng said it remained a concern.

Despite these challenges, he viewed the tariff reduction as positive, provided the labgrown diamond market does not further erode demand. He also noted the Ministry of Trade and Entrepreneurship's ongoing efforts to negotiate even lower US tariffs.

He explained that global trade governance recognised economic disparities between justifying differential tariffs.

"Fair competition between Botswana and the US is impossible due to technological and economic gaps. Concessions like lower tariffs help developing nations like Botswana access markets like the US," he said.

He added that Botswana's exports were negligible compared to those of major US trading partners like Mexico, Canada, and

Kelebonye thrives in ginger farming

GABORONE - A young farmer, Mr Isaac Kelebonye of Artesia Farm is one of the few to cut a niche into ginger farming.

Mr Kelebonye who was one of

the exhibitors at the just ended National Agricultural Show, said he began organic ginger farming in January and already the venture was showing great success.

He capitalised on the demand for ginger, which is steadily rising in Botswana and beyond.

Currently, selling to resellers at P1 300 at the show, he believed there was potential for ginger farming in Botswana.

He believed that ginger normally harvested in just four to eight months, was a viable new frontier for local farmers. From one hectare, he said farmers could harvest up to 30 tonnes.

"Ginger is good for Botswana's soils because it is a loose, organic crop that is easy to plant and does not require fertilizer," he said.

With his production permit just released, Mr Kelebonye revealed plans to expand into outside markets, noting that ginger farming was proving to be a profitable business with strong demand locally and beyond.

He supplies ginger to individuals, retail shops, and anyone interested in buying for resale. Prices range from P10, P20, and P50 packs, up to P1 300 for a bulk bag. From just one hectare, farmers can harvest up to 30 tonnes.

He added that ginger had many uses, as it could be crushed into powder for drinks, replanted as seed, or sold fresh. He said the business was simple and accessible, making it an ideal venture for anyone, including those new to farming.

Encouraging others to take up the crop, he said ginger had adapted well to Botswana's environment, comparing its success to that of

LEA trains SMMEs on tax compliance

MAUN - Submitting accurate tax returns and properly declaring income can help Small, Micro and Medium Enterprises (SMMEs) avoid legal complications from incorrect filings.

The Local Enterprise Authority (LEA) Maun branch manager, Mr Outlwile Ebutswe, stated during a LEA training session in Maun on Thursday that it was important to sensitise SMMEs about the importance of tax compliance, in order to strengthen and boost their businesses.

Mr Ebutswe said this was in recognition of the minimal contribution of SMMEs to tax revenue, despite the critical role taxation played in driving economic growth.

This initiative aims to empower small businesses to fulfill their responsibly obligations while supporting the country's development agenda, he said.

Botswana Unified Revenue Service (BURS), senior revenue officer, Mr Gaone Motsumi warned participants against underdeclaring income and turnover in an attempt to reduce tax liability.

"Some declare less income to avoid paying tax, but later records expose their dishonesty. Once BURS realises there is undeclared income, those individuals face heavy penalties and interest and consequently lose millions in tax unnecessarily," he said.

He also warned that avoiding tax returns was a criminal offence which could land one in prison once it was discovered that they had

not been paying tax when they were maintain their own files. eligible.

Mr Motsumi emphasised that taxation was key to national development and reminding participants that anyone who earned an income above P48 000 annually, must register for income

He further stated that all businesses regardless of whether they made a profit or not must, register for tax and additionally, anyone who withheld tax on payments such as rent, farming income, director's fees, or contract payments must also register and would be issued a Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN).

The training also shed light on the importance of proper loss reporting, meaning that losses incurred in a tax year can be carried forward for up to five years and used to offset future profits. This provision helps businesses manage their tax liabilities more effectively, providing relief during challenging periods while encouraging longterm financial planning and compliance.

A senior revenue officer from BURS in Maun, Mr Lazarus Kgolagano urged business owners not to rely only on consultants for record-keeping but to engage bookkeepers dedicated

"Avoid relying solely on consultants to keep your records, rather engage professional bookkeepers and always keep your own files. We have had cases where accountants disappeared with clients' records, leaving them unable to file their tax returns," warned Mr Kgolagano.

DM Environmental accountant, Ms Abaleng Senwedi, shared that many people tried various tricks to avoid paying tax, but training enlightened her that BURS could audit records from years ago and uncover any schemes.

She noted, "Many hide expenses under directors' costs thinking they will easily get away, but being truthful is the real gold in any business," said Ms Senwedi.

Meanwhile, tax compliance is not merely a statutory duty but a strategic business practice that contributes to national development and economic stability hence businesses must embrace their tax responsibilities, not only to avoid legal penalties, but to position themselves for future growth opportunities. By paying taxes honestly and on time, businesses help build the infrastructure and services that sustain their own success and the prosperity of the entire country. **BÔPA**
