Drug supplies restore hope

GABORONE - Botswana has received a consignment of 36 tonnes of essential medicines procured from Dubai under the Unity Healthcare Fund.

The consignment comprise of over 82 life-saving medicines bought at over P43 million and will cover at least three months supply, while minimising the

risk of expired medicines and wastage.

Speaking at an event to mark arrival of the consignment in Gaborone on Saturday, Botswana Development Corporation (BDC) Caretaker - Managing Director, Mr Oteng Keabetswe disclosed that the purchase cost 10.9 per cent of the typical procurement price, which would had been over P400 million

under traditional channels.

"This move was not intended to cut off local medical suppliers," Mr Keabetswe clarified, noting that it was a well-planned intervention to ensure affordable healthcare for Batswana, especially during a period of urgent need.

The medicines include those for treatments of rising chronic conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, and various forms of cancer. Mr Keabetswe praised the leadership for prioritising the health and lives of the people, describing the collaboration between government and private sector as life-changing.

Speaking on behalf of the Minister of Health, the Minister of Justice and Correctional Services. Mr Nelson Ramaotwana, reaffirmed the

government's commitment to prioritising the health of Batswana.

"The delivery marks more than just the arrival of medical supplies, it signals renewed hope and a pledge to ensure that no citizen is left behind when it comes to accessing healthcare,"

Botswana battles NCDs despite HIV triumph

Botswana has made significant progress in its efforts to provide excellent healthcare, particularly in the fight against HIV/AIDS, despite having one of the world's highest adult HIV prevalence rates at an estimated 20.8 per cent.

This was according to Assistant Minister of Health, Mr Lawrence Ookeditse, who was speaking at a recent Private Sector Forum in Francistown themed: Innovating for Impact: Public-Private Collaboration in Addressing Emerging Health Challenges.

Mr Ookeditse said Botswana had exceeded the UNAIDS 95-95-95 targets ahead of schedule, with 95 per cent of people living with HIV knowing their status, 98 per cent of those on treatment and 98 per cent of those on treatment being virally suppressed.

However, the assistant minister noted that HIV remained the leading cause of premature death while co-infection with tuberculosis (TB) continued to strain the country's health sector.

The assistant minister told the forum that TB incidence was estimated at 143 cases per 100 000 people, with 42 per cent of cases linked to HIV.

He also highlighted the rise in Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) such as hypertension, diabetes, cardiovascular diseases and cancers, which he said currently account for 40 per cent of hospital admissions and deaths.

"This trend requires a shift from the status quo of healthcare delivery and mobilisation of new resources," he said.

In addition, he pointed out that the high prevalence of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) among young people was due to treatment interruptions and behavioural risk factors.

"While great strides have been made in healthcare, there are still pockets of discrimination in the workplace against people living with HIV. Some are denied promotions, training opportunities or even employment," he said.

He added that young women and girls were also at risk of HIV infection due to factors like gender-based violence (GBV) and cultural barriers.

In light of such challenges, the Nata/Gweta lawmaker called on the private sector to collaborate with government to fight HIV/ AIDS and other health issues.

He underscored the importance of establishing workplace wellness programmes for testing, TB screening, NCD checks as well as mental health support.

He added that adopting zero-discrimination policies and creating safe spaces for employees living with HIV would help champion human rights.

Earlier, Business Botswana Coalition on AIDS (BBCA) chairperson, Mr Frank Phatshwane urged the private sector to collaborate with government and other stakeholders to combat HIV/AIDS and other emerging health challenges, including GBV.

"It is part of your responsibility to make sure the workforce is healthy and productive enough," he said.

On one hand, National AIDS & Health Promotion Agency (NAHPA) senior research officer, Ms Matshelo Matlhaga presented on the national state of HIV/AIDS and acknowledged Botswana's successes, including exceeding the UNAIDS 95-95-95 target and reducing mother-to-child transmission to 1.18 per cent, which earned the country the WHO Gold Tier Certification.

Ms Matlhaga attributed the achievements to strong political commitment, community leadership and community-led action facilitated by Non-Governmental Organisation (NGOs), among others.

Meanwhile, the forum also highlighted the need for innovative condom distribution channels to ensure easy access. A decline in consistent condom use among people with non-regular partners was also noted. *BOPA*

Council intends to terminate Mindbloom contract

LETLHAKENG - Letlhakeng District Council letters of intent to terminate contract with Mindbloom have been issued.

The contractor was engaged by council to construct destitute houses in Sesung and Metsibotlhoko.

Addressing a full council meeting recently, Letlhakeng District Council secretary, Mr Tsholofelo Molaodi, the contractor disappeared with P8,321.40 mobilisation fee.

Mr Molaodi said despite multiple attempts by the council to contact

the contractor and enforce the contract were unsuccessful.

He further said the council would recover the mobilisation fee.

Mr Molaodi was responding to councillor, Mr Tshokodiso Raselepe of Sesung/Metsibotlhoko, who expressed concerns about the contractor, which received mobilisation fee and never reported for duty.

Regarding concerns raised by councillor, Mr Opaletswe Mogolwane of Letlhakeng South about delaying payments to Moleb, engaged by the council for maintaining Letlhakeng Primary School, Mr Molaodi said the contractor had been slow on site.

He said the contractor requested three Extensions of Time (EoT) and the project remained unfinished.

He further mentioned that the contractor delayed approving the valued work after site valuations due to misunderstandings over certain items, which contributed to payment delays.

Meanwhile, councillor Mr Julius Tshaila from Dutlwe/Tshwaane emphasised the need to provide benches in the waiting area of Dutlwe Clinic and maintenance of the clinic toilets. **BOPA**

North West District Council appeals for help

MAUN – North West District Council have appealed to

the business community to assist with the school feeding programme.

Following prevailing economic situation in the country, the council scaled down provision of some food commodities.

The council chairperson, Mr Itumeleng Kelebetseng made the appeal during a stakeholder meeting in Maun on Thursday, saying they needed P6 million to feed 39 primary schools in a term.

He highlighted that the council could not provide some food commodities due to insufficient budget.

He said failure to provide some food commodities would negatively impact the academic performance and overall wellbeing of the learners.

Some pupils especially from disadvantaged families, he said relied on food provided at the schools.

"A lot of our children come from under privileged families and in a way, feeding at school is the only way for surviving during school days and if the situation persists, they might end up absconding from schools hence the appeal," he said.

Mr Kelebetseng said government was making efforts, but could not manage alone.

He said the private sector was a key partner in developing district.

Furthermore, he said they had engaged the private medical practitioners in Maun, who pledged

to support the district health system as it tackled drug shortage crisis.

He said health professionals had donated some medical supplies worth P100 000, while some had promised financial support to purchase medication, which was in short supply.

The council secretary, Mr Thatayotlhe Balapi said lack of food provision affected learners who relied on the programme.

Failure to address the situation, he said some learners might spiral out of control and leave schools in search of food.

He acknowledged that a number of companies and organisations had already adopted some schools under the Adopt-A-School initiative aimed at cultivating community involvement in the children's education.

He said some companies were working with some schools to provide financial assistance, resources, while some had constructed and maintained classrooms in the delivery of quality education.

Some members of the business community appreciated the engagement and urged the council to make formal requests outlining what the feeding programme entailed so that they could share with other stakeholders.

They also proposed for establishment of a fund that would contribute some funds toward addressing community's needs.

Mr Ramaotwana noted that the consignment of essential medicines facilitated through the Unity Healthcare Botswana Partnership, was expected to ease shortages in hospitals and clinics across the country.

"We are affirming a solemn promise that the health of Batswana remains at the heart of our national development agenda. I have witnessed firsthand, the pain that medicine shortages bring to families, the uncertainty, the anxiety, the pressure on healthcare workers, this is why today's milestone is

across all necessary facilities.

Aviation industry catalyst for economic development

MAUN - The aviation industry remains a strong catalyst for economic development the region hence the need for Botswana to leverage on opportunities presented by the sector.

In a keynote address at the Aviation Pitso in Maun on Thursday, President Advocate Duma Boko highlighted the sector's value and emphasised the need to bolster the country's air transport infrastructure to ultimately boost tourism.

He said Botswana's strategic location offered it a unique opportunity to become a hub for air traffic in Southern Africa which called for achieving a high level of connectivity and opening of new pathways.

He said increasing traffic called for investing in infrastructure development and acknowledged that efforts were at an advanced stage to upgrade Maun International Airport with investment secured for that

"As a country, we have good qualities such as stable, credible and peaceful democracy which is highly rated and therefore attractive to foreign investment.

Some investors are highly thrilled to come here and as such we need to improve air transport as well as the service," he said.

He also emphasised the need to do more to position the tourism market by opening new pathways to leverage the 300 000 tourists that visit Maun airport in a year by increasing the numbers to over one million.

In a bid to make the aviation sector competitive, he said it was critical to resolve a number of challenges, among them late departure of aircrafts and visa issues, and called upon stakeholders to engage and provide ambitious ideas that could unlock the industry's potential.

"We need to resolve on existing challenges together and bring implementable strategies that will help propel industries to greater heights," he added.

The President hailed the Civil Aviation Authority of Botswana board for a job well done in transforming the organisation.

The board, he said revived the Authority into a high performing entity and wished the same could be done to Air Botswana to make it more profitable.

Minister of Transport and Infrastructure, Mr Noah Salakae said the Pitso reflected a collective commitment to elevating the aviation industry as an important pillar of national development.

Mr Salakae said conference gave participants, the opportunity to engage meaningfully and consult on the role they should commit to in positioning the country as a viable aviation and tourism hub.

The ongoing facilitation of 14 Bilateral Aviation Safety by Agreements, various government key stakeholders, he said was testimony to commitment, citing that once the process was concluded, that would go a long way in facilitating air connectivity with the rest of the world, further opening Botswana's skies to the

Moreover, he said an effective and stable financial system enabled traction and beneficial use of government projects and programmes to generate progress in welfare and improvement of livelihoods.

President Boko stated that the banking sector in Botswana had grown and continued to provide key services, alongside being innovative and adaptive to global developments both in the domestic economic and social context.

"There is no doubt that the banking sector has proved to be one of the fastest growing nonmining sub-sectors, ever agile in adopting modern technological service delivery innovations to improve customer reach and convenience," he said.

He further commended the role of Bank of Botswana in ably managing the foreign exchange reserves of the nation and implementing the exchange rate policy, noting that at their peak, the foreign exchange reserves amounted to almost 40 months of import cover as at December

This judicious management by the Bank, he said included development of appropriate policies and guidelines and the careful choice of portfolio mandates and managers.

Subsequently, the President indicated that with improvements the monetary framework and transmission capabilities, there were exclusive focus of the exchange rate policy toward maintaining price competitiveness of the domestic industry, particularly guarding against overvaluation that could undermine the domestic firms' capability to compete in export markets and against imports.

He said the current crawling exchange peg rate framework that enabled regular adjustments of the crawl rate in line with the difference in inflation in Botswana, and in the trading partner countries, helped in the maintenance of domestic industry competitiveness, adding that the framework was enabled by availability of a sufficient level of foreign exchange reserves.

President Boko said in order to remain effective, the Bank must continually strengthen its facilitation role, regulatory effectiveness and supervisory

He further implored BoB to come up with transformative ideas during implementation of the Botswana Economic Transformation Programme as the country was currently responding to economic shocks and challenges. BOPA

FNBB records P1.9 billion profit

GABORONE - First National Bank Botswana (FNBB) continues to balance strong financial results with social responsibility and deliver sustainable returns while creating meaningful impact for its clients and communities.

Announcing the bank's audited statements on Wednesday, FNBB acting chief financial officer, Mr Orapeleng Senwelo said the bank had recorded a significant P1.9 billion profit before tax for the year ended June 30.

Mr Senwelo attributed the strong performance, which represented a six per cent increase from the previous year, to the bank's disciplined approach to growth and its steadfast commitment to its clients, shareholders and the community.

The bank's financial highlights included net advances to customers which grew by 11 per cent to P20.6 billion, deposits closed at P26.5 billion, retail card swipes reached 18.1 million transactions, a 17 per cent increase as well as the e-wallet transactions which totalled 15 million.

Mr Senwelo also highlighted the bank's commitment to financial inclusion, noting a significant upsurge in the use of its CashPlus services. He said the CashPlus network, supported by 1 794 agents across every district in Botswana, processed 8.4 million transactions.

He added that the use of FNB Point of Sale (POS) machines also grew, offering clients free swipes for convenient and cost-effective banking.

For the financial year, he said the bank declared a final dividend of 15 thebe per share, following an interim dividend of 18 thebe per share, something he said had brought the total dividend payout to 33 thebe per share

FNBB chief executive officer, Mr Steven Bogatsu said beyond financial performance, the bank reached over 800 000 people through various financial literacy, education, arts, sport and community empowerment initiatives.

"Our purpose is to make meaningful growth for the people and businesses of Botswana," said Mr Bogatsu. He indicated that the CashPlus network had expanded to nearly 1 800 agents, serving over 400 000 clients nationwide, while the FirstPreneur programme had helped 146 entrepreneurs with mentorship and funding.


Meanwhile, FNBB economist, Mr Gomolemo Basele provided an economic outlook and reported that global conditions remained uncertain, with slower trade affecting many economies, including Botswana.

Locally, he said they projected that the diamond sector would face softer demand, which may weigh on growth.

He added that they also expected inflation to remain stable at around 3.2 per cent for the year, which was within the Bank of Botswana's target range.

Looking beyond 2025, he said they anticipated strong potential for growth through diversification into sectors like renewable energy, agriculture, manufacturing, finance and tourism.

"By building on these opportunities, Botswana is well-positioned to create a more resilient and inclusive economy for the future," he said. *BOPA*

Initial plans had been to refresh only the top blue layer of the running track, however, following a thorough assessment by the engaged consultant, it was discovered that the black layer beneath the surface had been compromised by water seepage during the initial refurbishment early this year.

This caused the black layer not to bond properly to the concrete base, raising concerns about the long-term durability and safety of the track, an aspect the BNSC did not want to leave hanging.

However, Nlisana further said to guarantee that athletes competed on a world-class track, the consultant recommended full removal and replacement of the black laver.

This, he said would ensure that the surface met the high standard required by World Athletics and provided the safest and

GABORONE - The National Stadium track refurbishment is said to be on the right track and expected to be delivered on the set date.

Botswana National Sports Commission (BNSC) has expressed confidence in the progress of the works and reassured the public that the project is firmly on schedule.

"We are pleased with the speed and quality of the work being done. We are confident that we will finish on time and hand over the stadium to the World Relays Gaborone 2026 secretariat well ahead of the event," said BNSC's Marketing and Communications Manager, Anderson Nlisana in a

The National Stadium was closed in July 2025, to undergo comprehensive upgrades to meet the World Athletics standards and to ensure that it is ready to host one of the most prestigious events on the global athletics calendar, World Relays, carrying over 1000 international elite

refurbishment, he said major works had been done on the stadium's floodlights. Nlisana said for the World Relays, the lighting was required

to function at about 2000 lux, significantly higher than what was needed for football matches or entertainment events. Furthermore, he said to meet

the requirement, each floodlight had been upgraded from 36 bulbs to 42, ensuring optimal visibility for athletes, officials, and broadcasters from around the world.

This, Nlisana noted would also ensure that the BNSC had met the minimum required lighting capacity for the auspicious event.

Nlisana acknowledged that the temporary closure of the stadium may have caused inconvenience to sport clubs, athletes, and event organisers who relied on the facility, but stressed that this sacrifice was necessary for the bigger ultimate goal.

"This is more than just maintenance, it is an investment in the future of Botswana sport. We are asking Batswana to rally behind us, to be patient, and to support this national project as we prepare to welcome the world in 2026," he said.

Meanwhile, tne Athletics Relays are scheduled for May 2026 and will bring together elite athletes from across the globe. Hosting the event will put Botswana on the international sporting map, attract visitors, boost local tourism, and inspire the next generation of athletes.

As the work continues, BNSC remains committed to ensuring that the stadium is ready to showcase Botswana's capability to host a world-class sporting event, one that the nation can be proud of.

Until then, the Botswana National Stadium will remain closed to all activities to allow contractors to complete the work safely and efficiently. BOPA
