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# OLD Mines reduce production

LETLHAKANE - Orapa Letlhakane and Damtshaa Mines (OLDM) has announced several interventions, including production reduction and cost management strategies, to ensure Debswana’s resilience in the current volatile economic climate.

This was revealed by General Manager Mr Mogakolodi Maoketsa during a Boteti District council session on Wednesday.

Mr Maoketsa acknowledged the difficulties faced by Debswana over the past two years, largely due to a downturn in the diamond market. He cited several factors affecting diamond sales,

including ongoing geopolitical instability and competition from lab-grown diamonds.

The resulting economic strain has led to increased inventories of both rough and polished diamonds, instigating the decision to align diamond production rates with market demand. He also indicated that some processing plants would be placed under care and maintenance, assuring councillors that there would be no job losses. Employees from these plants are expected to be transferred to facilities in Orapa.

As the company implements austerity measures to navigate

these challenging times, Mr. Maoketsa reassured the council of OLD’s ongoing commitment to corporate citizenship, emphasizing their intention to continue supporting local communities as resources allow.

Over the past two years, OLD has invested in infrastructural

development projects, including the paving of one kilometre of road in Rakops, which connects the library to Maun Junction, at a cost of P4 million. Additionally, they have partnered with the Botswana University of Agriculture and Natural Resources to support the establishment of a community ranch in Khwee village.

In 2024, Debswana’s business partners also contributed significantly to community support, with investments exceeding P3 million. These initiatives included various small and medium-sized projects, such as drilling boreholes, constructing pre-schools, and undertaking larger projects like classroom blocks and teachers’ housing.

A recent commitment was made for the construction of three teachers’ houses in Makgaba by AMEC Wood, which is currently in the scoping phase and developing a list of potential bidders.

Furthermore, AMEC Wood previously launched a water project to address water shortages in Makgaba, Mosu, Mmea, and Mokubilo.

Mr Maoketsa highlighted that the company has effectively utilized its internal resources and employee support, noting that over 400,000 cubic metres of water have been distributed to Letlhakane village. **BOPA**

## Okavango District registers over 1 000 Malaria cases

GUMARE - Okavango District has recorded 1 088 Malaria cases since the beginning of malaria season from October 2024 to date.

This was said by the Coordinator of the Okavango District Health Management Team, Dr Bokwena Moali, when addressing the Okavango District Council special meeting recently.

Dr Moali said that 47 of the cases were complicated and one death recorded while eight cases involved pregnant women.

She said Malaria cases have been escalating in the Okavango District hence the district was in week eight of the Malaria outbreak although Malaria was declared an outbreak on March 21 2025 countrywide as it was experienced in other districts.

Dr Moali said that the health team was engaged in health education and distribution of bed nets to schools to curb the disease.

She said Indoor Residual Spraying was ongoing although the coverage was at 51.8 per cent at the moment which was not satisfactory.

Dr Moali said the Okavango DHMT has re-enforced its staff with personnel from other districts to address Malaria outbreak.

She said the challenges experienced were poor use of bed nets, people reluctant to spray and unsprayable house structures.

Dr Moali said the district also experienced limited test kits hence prioritised to test suspected cases and halted contact tracing.

She appealed to members of the community to seek testing as soon as they experiencing malaria symptoms which would help early administering of treatment of the disease. **BOPA**

## Chobe District approves P118m budget

KASANE - Chobe District Council has approved a budget of over P118 million for the 2025/2026 financial year.

Presenting the recurrent and development budget at a special full council meeting in Kasane on Wednesday the Finance and Works Committee Chairperson Councillor Percy Kasale stated that P112 415 552 was revenue support grant whereas P6 330 710 was estimated income from own sources.

He said this year’s recurrent budget had experienced a 12 per cent increase from last year while the revenue from own source had experienced a decrease.

Mr Kasale said the decrease was mainly from reduction of anticipated income from investment, sanitation fees on collection of clinical waste as primary health care service had been relocated to councils.

He said that the main sources of the council’s own funding included interest on investment at 24 per cent, sanitation fees at 17 per cent, staff housing rent at 15 per cent and trade licenses at six per cent with the remaining 38 per cent collected from other sources of income.

He expressed concern that the revenue from own source constituting only five per cent of the income for Chobe District Council. He said it was essential that the council embarked on

campaigns to assist in cultivating new sources of won revenue to ensure council was able to achieve its objectives to deliver services to Batswana.

“Chobe District Council must therefore reduce its reliance on the revenue support grant for government and come up with ways of raising its own revenue.”

Mr Kasale indicated that it was time the council actualised the special purpose vehicle that would operate as the council commercial wing with a purpose to raise income for the council.

He implored the political and administrative wings to exercise financial prudence when disbursing the limited resources.

Furthermore, he urged council to come up with a solid plan geared towards collecting debts owed across different votes especially service levy and market rentals.

Responding to the presentation, Chobe District Council Chairperson, Mr Johane Chenjekwa reiterated the need for council to exercise financial prudence when implementing projects.

He highlighted that council

should register a trading company that would explore opportunities presented by the Kasane-Kazungula redevelopment project instead of council sitting on the sidelines of this local economic cash cow.

Mr Chenjekwa indicated that Chobe District was an agronomy hub with Pandamatenga Commercial Farms contributing 47 per cent to the national annual crop production hence he ‘this should reflect through sustainable livelihoods of people of Chobe and entire growth of the district.’ **BOPA**

# Manganese Mine set to start operations

KANYE - The exploration of mining opportunities is a promising development for Botswana, potentially leading to local beneficiation, US Ambassador to Botswana Mr Howard Van Vranken stated during a visit to the Kgwakgwe Hill battery manganese project in Kanye on Wednesday.

Ambassador Van Vranken expressed enthusiasm for Botswana's mining initiatives, particularly the country's efforts to bring manganese minerals

to the global market. "I'm thrilled to be here at inception," he remarked, highlighting the positive collaboration between the US and Botswana in advancing such mining projects.

The Kgwakgwe project, spearheaded by Canadian mineral resource development company Giyani Metals, will produce high-purity manganese sulphate monohydrate. The initiative is expected to become one of the largest vertically integrated manganese projects in the world.

Giyani Metals, country

manager, Ms Elisa Modikwa thanked the US government for its support in enhancing private sector economic participation.

She noted that the US had facilitated introductions to various stakeholders to explore investment opportunities critical to the project's success.

Ms Modikwa emphasised that the US was one of the countries that required raw materials for its industries and expressed interest in Botswana's capacity to produce high-quality manganese.

She explained that the entire ecosystem for manganese production, from raw material to battery product, would be anchored in Kanye, featuring a processing plant for batteries on site. Furthermore, she revealed that a land lease agreement with the Kanye sub-Land Board would be effective for 25 years.

During the construction phase, the project is anticipated to create between 300 and 350 jobs, with operational employment expected to range from 200 to 250 positions.

Recruitment will be an ongoing process as different phases of the

## President visit promotes economic transformation

NACALA - The pressing need to steer Botswana away from its present status of being a consumer economy, and the need to simultaneously foster and drive inter-Africa trade, form the basis of President Advocate Duma Boko's visit to Mozambique.

Minister for International Relations Dr Phenyio Butale said in an interview yesterday that with Botswana's economy generally inert, strategic nation-to-nation partnerships were important vehicles on the back of which the country could ride in the bid to realise some of its critical aspirations.

Dr Butale said President Boko's visit to Mozambique was therefore in sync with government resolve to build a robust and vibrant economy that could be counted among the best both within and outside the continent.

"We want our economy jacked out of inertia, that is why we are in a hurry to industrialise," he said, also stating how the need to create sustainable jobs to address growing unemployment

compelled government to aggressively drive efforts to transform Botswana's economy.

Elaborating further on the anticipated outcome of Advocate Boko's visit, he said with Botswana and Mozambique enjoying long-standing, cordial bilateral relations dating back to the mid-1970s, the former stood to benefit from their enhancement in key sectors such as defence, energy, transport and logistics, and in infrastructure development.

He said Mozambique on the one hand had shown keenness to borrow a leaf from Botswana's book in the area of governance in light of the latter having distinguished itself as one of the world's most mature democracies.

In respect of the president's scheduled tour of the Maputo thermoelectric power plant, which forms part of his itinerary, Dr Butale said Botswana, like the bulk of the global population, was steadily stepping up efforts to tap into the green energy space.

He said the country was positioning itself and setting into motion processes to ultimately generate, through renewable energy, enough power for both local consumption and export.

"As a country we are intent on harnessing the power of renewable energy and our goal is to have electricity production exceed local demand so that we can sell our surplus to other countries," he said.

As part of his engagements, President Boko is scheduled to hold official talks with President Daniel Chapo of Mozambique.

In addition to touring the SADC Humanitarian and Emergency Operations Centre in Nacala, Advocate Boko is also expected to visit different ports such as the Nacala and the Maputo ports.

He will also fly over Panto Techobanine port, an P89.2 billion (US\$6.5 billion) project meant to facilitate trade in the SADC countries of Botswana, Mozambique and Zimbabwe.

## Ipelegeng transitions into public works programme

KANYE - Ipelegeng programme, initially designed for temporary employment and providing basic livelihoods, is undergoing a transformation aimed at transitioning it into a more robust public works programme.

The Minister of Local Government and Traditional Affairs, Mr Ketlhalefile Motshegwa, addressed the Kanye District Council on Wednesday, outlining the goals and future direction of this revamped initiative.

Mr Motshegwa said the programme would shift from providing temporary jobs to empowering beneficiaries through engagement in basic infrastructure development and maintenance.

The aim was to align the programme with broader public works initiatives that focussed on sustainable development, he said.

He said his ministry emphasised the importance of decentralisation, enabling local authorities to create policies and strategies tailored to their specific development needs.

Mr Motshegwa reiterated that the process involved the transfer of responsibilities to local governments for service delivery, enhancing their role in community planning and development.

He added that ongoing discussions with various ministries aimed to integrate the transformed Ipelegeng programme into their budgets for infrastructure and development projects, citing that his ministry sought to leverage existing public works frameworks to maximise the programme's potential.

project unfold. "Even now, as the project progresses, we need staff, and we have recently advertised positions. We have appointed a finance manager who will begin next month," Ms Modikwa stated.

The project is set within a

438 km<sup>2</sup> licensed area that encompasses multiple tenements and spans an impressive 1 960 km<sup>2</sup>. Menzi Battery Metals, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Giyani, holds the license for this ambitious initiative. **BOPA**

Mr Motshegwa said the new programme would focus on equipping beneficiaries with practical skills through partnerships with vocational training centres and other institutions.

The capacity-building approach aimed to prepare participants for roles in construction, electrical work, and other infrastructure-related fields, he said, adding that beneficiaries of the revamped Ipelegeng programme would receive a wage increase to P2500, significantly higher than the previous structure.

Upon completion of the programme, he said, participants would be eligible for formal employment with a minimum wage of P4000, or the opportunity to start their businesses supported by government initiatives.

The ministry aims to begin implementing the new programme by the end of March 2025, with plans to present a proposal to the cabinet for approval.

The revamped Ipelegeng programme represents a strategic shift toward sustainable livelihoods and community development.

By focusing on skills development, formal employment, and entrepreneurial support, Mr Motshegwa said, the initiative sought to improve the quality of life for beneficiaries and foster local economic growth.

The integration of local policies and collaboration with various sectors is set to enhance the effectiveness of the public works programme, ultimately leading to equitable development outcomes. **BOPA**

# Youth Development Fund under review

GABORONE - The Youth Development Fund (YDF) is undergoing review as government has realised that it was not fit for purpose and needs to be assessed to be restructured to become more effective in empowering the country’s youth.

The Minister of Youth and Gender Affairs, Ms Lesego Chombo revealed this before the Parliamentary Committee of Supply on Tuesday while presenting her ministry’s budget proposals for the 2025/26 financial year.

She said they had noted that the YDF initially intended for out-of-school youth, had now been applied for by degree holders as a consequence of their unemployment, and that many applicants were not entrepreneurs but youth who sought funds to relieve their economic distress.

Ms Chombo said government would look into how the YDF could be tailor made to fund successful enterprises, structured in a manner that could lead to better results, address training and market access challenges and does not present a one size fits all approach.

In their contributions, Members of Parliament (MPs) buttressed the need for the YDF to be improved.

Specially Elected MP, Ms Bogolo Kenewendo said the YDF needed to be transformed to deliver better impact in the domestic economy, through leveraging some of the funds to create a multiplier effect.

She also called for the ministry to bring back the Botswana National Youth Council (BNYC) to the stature it had been before, its leadership elected by the youth not appointed by a minister, and also utilising BNYC youth centres across the country for networking.

Ms Kenewendo congratulated Minister Chombo for being recently elected into a new role as chairperson of the Specialised Technical Committee on Gender Equality and Women Empowerment at the United Nations headquarters in New York, United States of America.

She said this could accord the minister to look at solutions from different stakeholders for Botswana to learn from as the country looks to achieve women empowerment and to fight the scourge of gender-based violence.

Molepolole South MP, Mr Shima Monageng called on government to revisit the founder of the Brigades Movement, the late Mr Patrick van Rensburg’s Education with Production philosophy, which he said could guide toward engaging communities in empowering the youth through production-oriented vocational training.

Mr Monageng lamented that government 14 years ago, had taken over brigades from the communities, which he said killed self-reliant community based training and cooperative enterprise ethos championed by Mr Van Rensburg.

He said the ministry needed to finance, train, mentor and monitor the youth into their YDF businesses and those who graduate toward self-sustaining businesses should become mentors to younger youth in their business startups.

Maun East MP, Mr Goretetse Kekgonagile said services provided to the youth should be decentralised and availed across

the country for ease of access.

Mr Kekgonagile said YDF funding needed to be varied, and the youth in areas such as the Ngamiland and Okavango villages, needed to be offered a higher amount than P100 000 as they are far from some amenities, which inflated startup costs.

He also stressed the importance of technical education and a revival of the brigades, stating that this would address vocational jobs and small enterprises being taken up by foreigners, while Batswana youth were untrained and unemployed.

Thamaga/Kumakwane MP, Mr Palelo Motaosane said YDF applicants were sometimes rejected without any clarity being offered. He said even those youth who were used to herding livestock and small stock or farming at their family land, were denied funding for what was already their passion, for technical reasons.

Mr Motaosane thus called for better and more innovative assessment of applicants. **BOPA**

# No plans to construct new border facility - Gaolathe

GABORONE - Several critical factors hinder government’s wish to open border facilities in strategic areas as it is a fact that cross-border movement is essential for socio-economic activities along the border line.

When answering a question in Parliament on Tuesday, the Vice President also Minister of Finance, Mr Ndaba Gaolathe said he acknowledged the challenges that may be faced by residents of Oliphant’s Drift, Ramotlabaki, and Phala Camp in accessing the nearest border post, being Sikwane.

Mr Gaolathe said the challenge

was not peculiar to residents of these villages alone but universal to all Batswana who might have to travel long distances from their homes to access border facilities.

He said the decision to open a border facility was guided by several critical factors including but not limited to the anticipated volume of cross-border traffic and trade activity in the proposed area.

Mr Gaolathe said they had to consider security implications and requirements for border control, bilateral agreements and mutual interests between neighbouring countries and the availability of

financial resources to establish and sustain the border facility.

“It is an open secret that government is currently grappling with serious budgetary constraints and should this fiscal position improve sufficiently, and other necessary conditions mentioned above also warrant the establishment of a border crossing facility in the Oliphant’s Drift, Ramotlabaki and Phala Camp area, government will engage the Republic of South Africa on the matter,” he said.

Mr Gaolathe highlighted that currently Botswana had 29 border

posts across the country, and these facilities required substantial financial resources for both development and recruitment expenditures.

He further said in some recent years, government incurred in excess of P300 million per year for the development of border posts and an additional P15 million in recurrent expenditure for their operation and maintenance.

“The establishment and maintenance of any new border crossing facilities would inevitably place additional pressure on an already constrained national

budget,” he said. He said due to constraints relayed above, there was no intention or plan to construct a new border crossing facility in Oliphant’s Drift, Ramotlabaki and Phala Camp area.

The MP for Kgatleng East, Mr Mabuse Pule had asked the minister to state if government had any intentions to construct a border crossing facility for the people in Oliphant’s Drift, Ramotlabaki and Phala Camp who currently struggled to cross at the Sikwane Border Post, and the implementation time-frame. **BOPA**

# Mbewe finalist for prestigious award

GABORONE - Attorney Njiramanda Mbewe-Boatey, a name synonymous with groundbreaking legal work in Botswana, has been shortlisted as a finalist for the WONE Global Awards 2025 in the category of ‘Leadership in Law’ at Singapore.

Known for her remarkable legal contributions in gender-based violence (GBV) activism and human rights advocacy, along with her appointment to the Botswana’s National Gender Commission and work as chairperson of the Botswana Network on Ethics, Law and HIV/AIDS (BONELA), this nomination comes as a well-earned recognition of her exceptional work.

She added that growing up, she always knew that she wanted to stand up for people and be the voice of the voiceless.

“I also believe in justice,” she continued, reiterating the importance of making sure that no one was left behind when it comes to having their fundamental human rights protected, a testament of this being her De Beers sponsored mentorship initiative called Sewelo, a programme dedicated to empowering young women in Botswana by providing them with support and opportunities for personal and professional growth. “Growing up, I was surrounded by male lawyers.

Law is a profession that has always been predominantly practiced by men, but not only law, other professions too. I want to be a close female figure that I never had

for the girl-child,” said Mbewe, adding that through this initiative, she equips young women with the tools and knowledge necessary to navigate complex professional landscapes.

Speaking on some of the challenges she has faced as a woman in law, Mbewe reminisced on the moments when she had been dictated which cases to take on and which to avoid, simply because she was a female lawyer. She described them as times when she felt most taken for granted but it only fueled her determination to succeed.

“I was defiant,” she said, revealing that her defiance and the aggressive persona that she has had to channel in the court led to being misunderstood. “I may not seem like it at first, but trust me, I’m a blast,” she said.

Mbewe encouraged Batswana to support her journey to Singapore by recognising and investing in her work as human rights and anti GBV advocate, which includes engaging Mbewe Legal Practice for legal services. “The time for our flag to fly higher has arrived as we are the epitome of democracy. I am going to Singapore and I’m going to win that award for our country,” she said. **BOPA**

## Maele explains Labour Market Observatory

PARLIAMENT - The Labour Market Observatory (LMO) was established in November 2022 with a mandate to enhance the employability of education outcomes at all levels of the education pipeline.

Answering a question in Parliament on Tuesday, the Minister of Higher Education Mr Prince Maele said this was achieved through labour market performance analysis, monitoring, evaluation, and reporting, ensuring that macroeconomic policies and strategies are aligned with national development goals.

Mr Maele said the Chief Executive Officer of Business Botswana chairs the LMO and it includes high-level officials and experts from government, private sector, trade unions, civil society and development partners.

He said its outputs were expected to feed into the Cabinet Committee on Employment, chaired by the Vice President, and the National Employment Coordination Council (NECC) chaired by the Minister of Labour and Home Affairs, to inform national policies on employment and human resources development.

“This diverse composition ensures a multi-stakeholder approach to address labour market challenges. The instruments that aide the functionality of the LMO are; the Labour Market Information System, which is a statistical software developed by the International Labour Organisation (ILO) to support data management analysis, and reporting of labour market information, the LMIS Portal and the LMO Secretariat,” he said.

Mr Maele said Botswana launched the LMIS in August 2024 ahead of other SADC countries and had been used as a benchmark for the rest of Africa. He pointed out that the LMO has produced an analytical paper,

which would be presented to the Vice President, Minister of Labour and Home Affairs and the Minister of Higher Education as a tangible output on policy advisory.

Mr Maele said the full operationalisation of the LMO had been hampered by budget constraints since 2023, and as a result, its mandate had been limited to foundational activities such as data preparation, stakeholder engagement and the development of key tools like the LMIS platform.

He explained that the LMIS platform served as the statistical engine for education and labour market indicators, providing policy-makers with timely and accurate data to inform evidence-based decision-making.

He said the production of Botswana’s first analytical paper on the status of Botswana’s labour market, which utilised indicators extracted from the LMIS has demonstrated potential effectiveness of the tool in facilitating the LMO to collect, analyse and disseminate data on Botswana’s labour market.

The paper unveils significant labour market inefficiencies in the utilisation of the workforce, he said.

Mr Maele said some of the findings highlighted the urgent need for targeted policies to address unemployment, unlock potential of the workforce and ensure more equitable opportunities for all citizens.

He said these insights had equipped the LMO Governing Body with initial data-driven recommendations for policy brief formulation and facilitation of the NECC.

He said funding would ensure labour market research and business development intelligence and data resources are translated from raw data to policy-ready knowledge products for evidence-based policy-making.

Mr Maele said the analytical paper on the ‘Status of the Botswana Labour Market’ highlights pressing challenges, including severe workforce under-utilisation, gender disparities, and the prevalence of informal employment, and presents data-driven recommendations to address them.

He said these findings would be submitted in the first quarter of the 2025/26 financial year to the Minister of Labour and Home Affairs and Minister of Higher Education and will be escalated to the Vice President for further review and potential integration into the national policy frameworks to enhance employment outcomes and workforce development.

Mr Maele said the Ministry of Labour and Home Affairs was still establishing NECC and it would play a role in adopting and utilising the findings from the ILO for coordination efforts to address unemployment and ensure alignment between labour market needs and human resource development strategies.

“While these recommendations are being considered as ongoing policy discussions, their implementation remains contingent upon the approval of collaborative funding for the LMO’s operations and the establishment of collaborative mechanisms such as the NECC,” he said.

He said the Human Resource Development Council was fostering collaboration among government ministries, private sector, trade unions and development partners to ensure multi-sectoral support for LMO’s objectives. Lobatse MP Kamal Jacobs had asked the minister to state the mandate of LMO, and if the LMO Committee has been effective in collecting and disseminating data on Botswana’s labour market. **BOPA**

## North East district registers 10 CBOs

MASUNGA - The Principal District Officer Development, Ms Omphile Mogorosi, says there are 10 registered Community Based Organisations (CBOs) in the North East District Council (NEDC).

Briefing the full Council recently, Ms Mogorosi said the Matopi Conservation Trust goals encompass harvesting of fish for commercial purposes.

Ms Mogorosi said Wealth Creation Beneficiaries and the Matopi Conservation Trust’s recent agreement was finalised beginning of October 2024 and was at the early stages of operation with poor records management.

She stated that the fishing season was closed from end of December last year until February 2028 and highlighted that the beneficiary holds 60% of the shares while the Trust receives 40% of the benefits after fish harvesting.

“Subsequently, there would be packaging and branding to distinguish their product from other competitors,” she said. Ms Mogorosi said in mitigation, when the fish harvesting season begins, they would have the opportunity to generate funds, which will motivate them.

She said another trust, the Mantenge Conservation Trust in Kalakamati, which is in partnership with Department of National Museum and Monuments (DNMM), operates a campsite and guiding of tourists at Domboshaba Ruins, Cultural Heritage Site, Mantenge Well and Rock Paintings tourism sites.

She said the trust had challenges of having not registered with the

Master of the High Court resulting in a halt to their activities. On the other hand, Ntimbale Community Conservation Trust has activities that include Ntimbale Challenge Event and commercial fishing at the Ntimbale Dam.

The Patayamatebele Community Conservation Trust’s objectives include preservation of Baroma Cemetery where two priests were buried and the Mzilikadzi Fort Wall. “Their objectives include sustainable utilisation of fish resources at Dikgatlong Dam, operating a Campsite, Dam Tourism Activities and Sand Mining,” she said.

On the other hand, she said thousands of pilgrims visit Patayamatebele every year in October to partake in Spring Excursions, Rosary Walks, and Prayer Times.

However, they are not charged and advice was given to the Trust to develop a Campsite by the Church to raise funds. “The Trust has requested permission from the DNMM and the Botswana Tourism Organisation (BTO) to use Farm 77 and its existing buildings, and to manage all the tourism attractions in the village,” she said.

Ms Mogorosi said the DNMM granted permission to utilise the farm and were awaiting another permission from the BTO after the permission was verbally communicated to the Trust, which will be followed by a formal one.

There was yet another trust named Mazhibakufha Development Trust, whose objective is the running of a Cultural Village and Truck Inn it had been delayed due to the late completion of plans and submission to the council. **BOPA**



# Govt commits to regional integration

GABORONE - Government recognises the role of sustainable infrastructure in fostering economic growth and regional integration, says the Assistant Minister of Transport and

Infrastructure, Mr Keoagile Atamelang. Speaking during the Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link investor forum in Gaborone on Wednesday, Mr Atamelang, said government was pursuing other major railway projects which

included Mosetse-Kazungula-Livingstone Rail Link and the Trans-Kalahari Rail Project which aimed at enhancing regional integration. The projects, he said were at various stages of feasibility studies. On the Mmamabula-Lephalale

Rail Link, he said the project aimed at improving connectivity between Botswana and South Africa, providing a more direct and efficient route to the Richards Bay Port.

He said it would reduce transit times and costs for bulk exports, contributing significantly to the growth of Botswana's mining and industrial sectors.

"Our vision is to develop a modern, efficient railway network that will support trade, foster industrialisation, create jobs, and improve the livelihoods of our communities," he said.

Moreover, he said the project would provide an alternative to the existing rail line that passes through Mafikeng, enhancing the resilience of the logistics network and reducing reliance on a single transport corridor.

"This improved connectivity is essential to supporting Botswana's growing mining and industrial sectors, while ensuring seamless access to global markets," Mr Atamelang noted.

Addressing potential investors, Mr Atamelang assured them that both the Botswana and

South Africa governments were fully committed to ensuring the successful delivery of the Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link.

"We understand that investors seek security and certainty when committing capital to long-term infrastructure projects. I want to assure you that both governments are fully committed to the successful delivery of this project," he said.

The assistant minister stressed that infrastructure projects of such magnitude required joint efforts between the public and private sectors thereby highlighting the crucial role of Public-Private Partnerships in achieving the projects.

"Governments alone cannot finance infrastructure of this scale. Therefore, we are strong proponents of Public-Private Partnerships to drive infrastructure development," he noted.

He thus noted that government was working on policy and regulatory reforms that would position Botswana as one of the most attractive destinations for infrastructure investment in Africa. **BOPA**

## Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link potential game changer

GABORONE - A new era of economic growth and regional integration is on the horizon for Southern Africa, with the development of Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link system.

Talking on the 'Transport Logistics as an enabler to the economy of Botswana' at Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link investor forum in Gaborone on Wednesday, Botswana Chamber of Mines CEO, Mr Charles Siwawa said the modern infrastructure project was set to transform trade and connectivity between South Africa and Botswana.

Such, he said would also create substantial value for Southern African Development Community (SADC) nations by improving intra-regional trade, lowering transportation costs and enhancing supply chain efficiencies.

The rail system, linking the mining Lephalale region in South Africa with Mmamabula in Botswana, is expected to play a pivotal role in the efficient movement of goods, including coal, soda ash, copper, manganese, and other vital exports, which are essential to the economies of both countries and the broader SADC region.

"This project will reduce transportation costs, improve supply chain efficiencies, and strengthen the region's competitive position on the global stage," he said.

Mr Siwawa also said one of the rail link's most anticipated benefits was the shift from road transport which was plagued by high costs and logistical challenges.

Mr Wilson Mogoba of Transnet South Africa noted that Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link was part of a broader plan to create a new logistics corridor, connecting the mines to the ports.

He said the project, costing approximately US\$1.125 million per annum in rail capacity for Botswana, was technically and financially viable.

However, he said neither Botswana Railways nor Transnet currently had the capital for such an undertaking, "and as such, private sector participation will be necessary for its successful implementation."

Botswana Railways Acting General Manager, Ms Chelesile Malele, emphasized the forward-thinking approach of the rail link.

"This project represents a significant step forward in addressing the challenges of regional transportation and trade.

By providing an efficient means of transporting goods across borders, it will play a crucial role in regional economic integration, positioning Botswana as a key hub for commerce and logistics," she said.

She also highlighted the environmental benefits of the project, noting that the rail system was designed to be a greener alternative to road transport.

She further reiterated that Mmamabula-Lephalale Rail Link system promised to be a game-changer for Southern Africa, enhancing economic integration, improving transportation efficiency, and paving the way for a more connected and prosperous future for the region.

Ms Malele reiterated Botswana Railways' essential role in the country's economic development.

The investor forum, which saw participation from various stakeholders, underscored the collective commitment to advancing rail connectivity in the region. Among the attendees were representatives from Eswatini and Transnet Rails, who recognised the project's potential to unlock investment opportunities and shape the future of transportation infrastructure in Southern Africa. **BOPA**

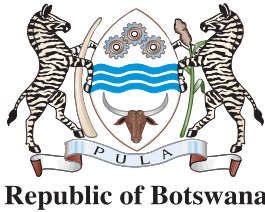

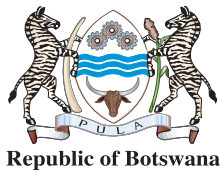

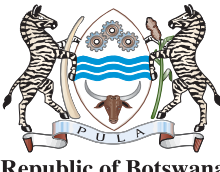

## BTA to host ITF World Tennis Tour Junior J30, J60

GABORONE - The Botswana Tennis Association (BTA) will host the ITF World Tennis Tour Junior J30 and J60 at the National Tennis Centre in Gaborone from April 7 to 19.

The BTA president, Oaitse Thipe, said the international event was expected to attract tennis players from Africa, America, Asia, and Europe.

He said they were expecting more than 80 players, with their parents and coaches and other stakeholders.

He said the tournament would help the players to earn points in both the J30 and J60, adding that this year, one of their international events had been upgraded to J60, which had increased the number of participants.

“These tournaments are really good for our players. They play and earn points while on home soil,” he said. Last year, Thipe said they hosted 10 weeks in total of international tournaments, which he said generated P1.5 million in hotel accommodation.

Their officials, he said, were able to learn more, adding that the BTA also managed to send some of their referees to the University of Pretoria for refresher courses.

He added that some of the referees had been upgraded to international white badges.

He said hosting international tournaments helped their officials gain more exposure, which would help them when they wanted to turn professional.

He further said hosting the event would help the country with sport tourism.

He said sport was a sector, which could generate a lot of money for the country’s economy. **BOPA**

interview.

As such, he called on the private sector to come on board because government could not do it alone.

Already, he said the University of Botswana had allowed them to use their facility as a warm up track, but regretted that they did not have a budget to refurbish it.

He said they would need around P8 million to resurface the track adding that expectations were that the UB would meet them halfway.

Also, he said they would need to train journalists on reporting track and field events, which

would also come at a cost.

Meanwhile, he said even though they would need a substantial amount of money to host the World Relays, he said they spent around P500 000 to prepare for the winning bid document.

He said they spent money on stationery, data, transport adding that those preparing for the document had to be compensated for their fuel and time.

While preparing the bid document, he said they had to provide information on how they would host the relays, adding that in some instances, they had to outsource services that BAA

could not provide.

“There were some videos that we had to submit, but as the BAA we do not have capacity to shoot and edit videos,” he said.

Theetso said they were expected to shoot videos from President Advocate Duma Boko, Minister of Sport and Arts, Jacob Kelebeng, and other stakeholders to confirm their support for the bid, which were to be shared with World Athletics.

“This then called for editing and packaging our product well so that the message could be clear, and that alone came with costs,” he said. **BOPA**

## ‘Hosting relays welcome development’

GABORONE - Winning the bid to host the World Athletics Relays next year is a welcome development for both the country and Botswana athletics.

This was said by Sunday Standard Sports Editor, Botlhale Koothopile in interview, adding that hosting would also give the Botswana Athletics Association (BAA) the opportunity to use the event to develop and grow athletics.

“It is a step in the right direction, both in the development of athletics and in Botswana’s economic diversification pursuits. For athletics, hosting this event just goes beyond bringing athletes

to compete here,” he said.

By virtue of hosting the relays, he said BAA would also have the opportunity to push for the development of facilities.

These developments, he said, would also put Botswana athletics in a good position to host more international events in the future.

“Also, leading to the World Relays, BAA can also push for more programmes from World Athletics to develop its grassroots development programmes as well as coaching and other technical areas for the benefit of athletics.

These can include, among many things, workshops for coaches and athletes with the help of expert coaches who will be in the country as well

as the development of our various technical officials and technical abilities to host quality competitions,” he said.

Koothopile said hosting the event would also serve as a good platform for the country to advertise itself as a tourism destination of choice as well as a good place for foreign investment.

“For the Botswana National Sport Commission and the Ministry of Sport and Arts, one can hope that they will take the opportunity when we are hosting to undertake research on how hosting sport events benefit the country,” he said.

The research, he said, should include among others, trickle-down effect of hosting on small

businesses, number of tourists coming into the country before, during, and after the event, as well as the impact of the event on hospitality and infrastructure development.

Meanwhile, since its inception in 2014, the World Relays will be held in Africa for the first time in 2026. Nasau, Bahamas has hosted the relays in 2014, 2015, 2017 and 2024. In 2019, they were held in Yokohama, Japan and were in Chorzow, Poland in 2021, while this year, they will be in Guangzhou, China where the world athletics body is expected to introduce the 4x100m mixed relays. Nasau, Bahamas will also have the opportunity to host for the fifth time in 2028. **BOPA**
