Parliament passes Constitution (Amendment) Bill

The country's judicial landscape is poised to undergo a historic transformation following Parliament's approval of Bill No. 14 of 2025, a legislative overhaul that establishes a dedicated Constitutional Court as the final arbiter on the validity of laws and the protection of fundamental rights.

The Bill passed with a strong majority where of the 66 legislators in attendance, 50 voted in favour, 15 against and one abstained.

Initially gazetted in July 2025, the Bill seeks to amend the Constitution to remove constitutional jurisdiction from the High Court.

By establishing a dedicated court as the final arbiter on constitutional matters, the Bill aims to streamline the judicial process for constitutional disputes, strengthen judicial checks and balances and further ensure that constitutional matters are handled with dedicated expertise. **BOPA**

SDA Hospital to fill medical specialists vacancies

Shortage of medical specialists will soon be an issue of the past at Seventh Day Adventist (SDA) hospital, as the vacancies will be filled.

Speaking during a tour of the hospital recently, Mr Assistant Minister of Health, Lawrence Ookeditse said vacancies included medical specialists such as gynaecologist and dentist.

Regarding delayed salaries since 2025, Mr Ookeditse attributed

it to government shortfall, emphasising that agreed-upon payments should be honoured.

“When we made a commitment to pay salaries, it means salary becomes a right - it cannot be cut or delayed,” he said.

He highlighted the need for clear allocation of hospital subventions to ensure effective budget planning and avoid confusion between operational costs and specific funding.

The country expects improved drug availability, with current stock at 60 per cent.

Mr Ookeditse noted disparities in drug distribution but expressed hope that incoming consignments would help.

He commended the hospital’s oxygen plant and pledged ministry support, urging management to finalise compliance paperwork.

The plant could modernise the facility and benefit the country, he said.

Furthermore, he stated that as the government planned to increase funding for the facility,

the mission administration needs to be more transparent and accountable in managing the resources.

Mr Ookeditse emphasised fairness and accountability in resource use, staff training and benefits, promising a ministry team visit to address finance issues within two weeks.

He emphasised that SDA hospital should eliminate disparities among personnel, whether under the mission or ministry, especially considering arguments about public servants’ job security and mission staff benefits.

“No staff member should have to convert to Adventism to secure their position,” warned the Assistant Minister.

The assistant minister was responding to the hospital chief executive officer, Dr Richard Senyenjo who had earlier on made deliberations on the state of medical equipment, drug availability and staff welfare.

Forests underpin ecotourism and biodiversity' conservation

Forests underpin ecotourism and biodiversity conservation, both of which are critical pillars of the national economy.

In Botswana, forests and woodlands remain central to rural livelihoods and national development, Minister of Environment and Tourism, Mr Wynter Mmolotsi said this in Ntlhantle on Thursday during the International Day for Forests.

Mr Mmolotsi implored the public to ensure that forests remained the lifeblood of local communities and a foundation for Botswana’s sustainable future.

He said forests provided wood for household energy, grazing for livestock, wild fruits and medicinal plants that enrich diets, as well as timber and non-timber forest products that sustain local economies.

He said the theme, “Forests and Economies,” was a reminder of the role forests played, not only as part of natural heritage, but as a strategic asset that drove economic growth, resilience and sustainable development.

He called on the private sector, government, civil society and communities to strengthen partnerships, scale up efforts, and commit to building an economy that was green, resilient, and inclusive.

Mr Mmolotsi said the commemoration was not merely symbolic but was a decisive call to action, in a joint move to elevate the recognition of forests as drivers of economic development in Botswana, and that it was also intended to deepen partnerships between government, communities, and the private sector.

The objective, he said was also to inspire the youth to view forests as pathways to innovation, enterprise, and resilience as well as accelerate restoration efforts through sustainable land management and tree planting initiatives.

Minister Mmolotsi highlighted the importance of communities’ involvement in the preservation and conservation of forests.

“While the community is endowed with valuable woodland resources, it also faces localised land degradation that threatens ecosystem productivity,” he said.

Mr Mmolotsi stated that sustainable forest management was a matter requiring urgency.

He said selecting Ntlhantle as host of this year’s commemoration reflected the confidence in the community’s leadership, its accessibility, and the important role of its youth in driving long-term environmental stewardship.

He called on to the private sector, financial institutions, parastatals, and development partners to step forward as restoration ambassadors.

Minister Mmolotsi implored them not only to participate, but to institutionalise restoration within their corporate strategies, through investment in landscape restoration, support for community-based initiatives, integration of sustainability into value chains, and alignment with national environmental priorities.

“This is an opportunity to contribute meaningfully to climate resilience, while also advancing corporate responsibility, shared value, and long-term economic sustainability.”

By introducing fruit trees into our landscapes, we are deliberately linking environmental restoration with food security, improved nutrition, and income diversification,” he said.

The approach, he said reflected a practical and inclusive model of development, one that placed communities at the centre of sustainable resource management.

“Each seedling planted today represents a tangible investment in the future, supporting livelihoods, strengthening resilience, and contributing to a greener economy.”

He said forests were therefore, not only a conservation priority, but a cornerstone of sustainable development.

A representative of Food and Agriculture Organisation, Ms Carla Mucavi stated that globally, the contribution of forests to economies was both vast and indispensable.

Ms Mucavi indicated that according to FAO, an estimated 44 trillion US Dollars, more than half of the world’s Gross Domestic Product (GDP) depended on nature, including forests.

“This highlights just how deeply our economies are interconnected with the health of our natural systems,” she said.

She reiterated that forests provide essential resources for rural communities, including fuelwood, food, and income. They also supported biodiversity and contributed to the ecological balance that sustains agriculture and tourism.

However, she said Botswana was not immune to the challenges facing forests globally, noting that land degradation, unsustainable harvesting of forest resources, and the impacts of climate change continued to place pressure on the ecosystems.

Ms Mucavi stated that addressing the challenges required deliberate action, informed by science, and strengthened through partnerships.

Botswana targets 200 million people for digital reach

Botswana is looking to boost Bits economy by becoming a regional transport and logistics hub, leveraging its strategic location to connect with over 200 million people in the region.

President Advocate Duma Boko said this on Friday during the inaugural Presidential Business Roundtable and emphasised the need for the country to improve its infrastructure and efficiency to attract foreign investment and diversify its economy beyond diamonds, with a focus on digitalisation and private-sector-led growth.

“And if you take the strategic positionality of Botswana as a land-locked country, that connects us to over 200 million people, you realise that we are strategically located. This is a huge advantage for us,” he said during a forum under the theme: Towards Economic Transformation, A Private sector-led Growth Agenda for Botswana.

He said the country's position also placed an obligation to improve its infrastructure and public efficiency, noting that efficiency-seeking foreign direct investment is driven by conditions created by the country.

“We must openly acknowledge that one of the failures, perhaps even the folly of government, is this very issue of over-bureaucratisation. Government operates under a frozen crust,” he said.

Also, President Boko said the government was committed to creating an economy that is diversified beyond diamonds, with targeted growth in priority sectors such as tourism, agriculture, manufacturing, infrastructure, financial services and digitalisation.

He said digitalisation was the pivot point of the economy, where efficiencies will be generated.

Also, the President said it is where cost savings would come and also help to overcome the scourge of corruption.

“We want e-procurement. We want people to be able to access government services very easily, very quickly and affordably,” adding that such would obviate the need to crowd for services.

President Boko also added that the informal sector must be digitalised as well to become

part of the mainstream economy, adding that the government was committed to an export-led economy where the private sector is the main engine of growth.

The country, he said, envisages an economy where value-added industries dominate, enterprises start, grow, thrive and compete locally, regionally, continentally as well as globally and innovation and entrepreneurship are nurtured.

Noting that the roundtable was to identify where the concentration of structural bottlenecks was and address these boldly, adding that it was the beginning of a new partnership between government and the private sector, defined by trust,

action and resolve.

He said the business roundtable meeting comes at a time of significant economic pressure and transition, noting that the economy remained highly dependent on diamonds, which accounted for a substantial share of exports and government revenue.

However, President Boko said the sector is under pressure from weaker global demand and increased competition, especially from synthetic diamonds; thus, economic performance weakened.

“Economic growth has been very slow, with projections indicating that the economy contracted slightly by around 0.4 per cent in 2025, largely due to the

downturn in the diamond sector,” adding that such represented real constraints on growth, jobs and opportunities.

This, he said, reinforced a clear message that the current growth model is no longer relevant and effective for Botswana, adding that the next phase of Botswana's growth must, therefore, be fundamentally different and private sector-led.

He said the Botswana Economic Transformation Programme (BETP) and the National Development Plan 12 (NDP 12) must now move decisively from a government-driven model to an economy led by a dynamic and competitive private sector, to realise the national vision..BOPA

Chobe primed as region economic hub

Delivering a keynote address at the Chobe Connect investor conference in Kasane on Monday, he said the theme: Driving Botswana's Economic Transformation Through Agribusiness, Tourism, Energy and Infrastructure Development, was fitting for Chobe as a premier destination for sustainable agro-industrial and tourism investment in Southern Africa.

He remarked that the Kazungula-Kasane corridor was hailed as the preferred high efficiency trade route for the SADC region, driving economic growth.

He underscored that the region was poised for significant economic transformation driven by infrastructure, agri-business and tourism.

Mr Gaolathe described Special Economic Zones as a cornerstone of the Botswana Economic

Transformation Programme (BETP) to unlock optimum economic growth through targeted industrialisation.

Mr Gaolathe said government, through BETP, focused on transitioning Pandamatenga from being a primary grain production hub into becoming a high-value agro-industrial and agro processing and packaging centre.

This overarching initiative, he said is aimed to drive economic growth and sustain livelihoods beyond Chobe localities by stimulating value chains.

He said Chobe's endowment with natural resources had sparked discussions amongst investors, industry leaders and financiers at the Chobe Connect 2026 to unlock the district's potential and align its development vision with potential execution.

“We must transition from policy

frameworks to productive outcomes in transforming the Chobe region and we remain committed to actively shaping the economy through multi industrial approaches.”

Mr Gaolathe indicated that Pandamatenga as an arable agriculture hub was characterised by a blend of commercial and subsistence farming with a total of 96 000 hectares, of which 40 000 hectares was currently under production. The VP said the Chobe-Zambezi Water Transfer Scheme was earmarked to transform Pandamatenga into a regional agricultural powerhouse by providing consistent water supply for irrigation to ensure year-round production. Chobe constituency MP Mr Simasiku Mapulanga advocated for several key development initiatives aimed at diversifying the regional economy. These initiatives, he said, included

the need to transition to solar energy to leverage the Chobe's abundant sunlight and reduce pressure and dependence on BPC grid.

Mr Mapulanga supported the cable car initiative within the BETP as a futuristic masterpiece poised to modernise Chobe.

Moreover, he emphasised the importance of establishing truck ports in Kazungula to streamline transport logistics and capitalise on the corridor's strategic traffic.

Kasane court president Kgosi Patrick Morwaga abuse highlighted Chobe's immense potential as a premier tourist destination, noting the diverse array of excursions available to captivate visitors.

Kgosi Morwaga abuse invited Chobe Connect 2026 delegates to explore Chobe region and visit all villages from Parakarungu to Pandamatenga to explore investment opportunities. BOPA

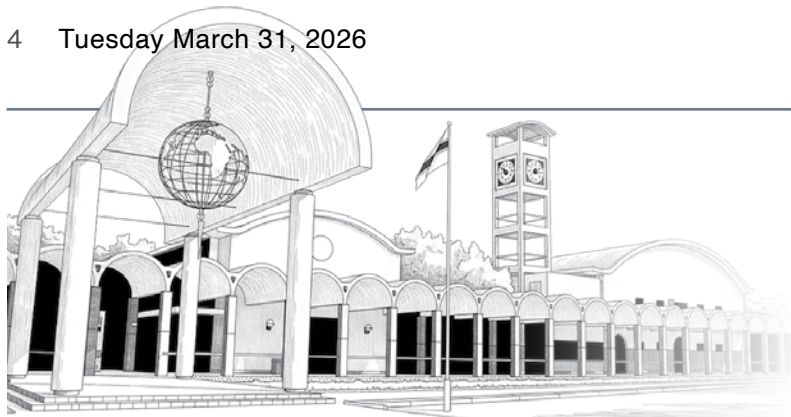

Gaolathe outlines strategy to grow agric. sector by 2028

Vice President and Minister of Finance, Mr Ndaba Gaolathe, has told Parliament that plans are underway to double agriculture's contribution to the economy for the sector to constitute six per cent of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by 2028.

Addressing Parliament recently, Minister Gaolathe said the transformation was a cornerstone of the twelfth National Development Plan (NDP 12) and the Botswana Economic Transformation Programme (BETP).

"The goal is to move the small livestock subsector away from subsistence farming and toward a high-growth and export-driven industry that creates jobs for women and youth," the minister said.

To facilitate the transformation, Minister Gaolathe presented the Botswana Livestock Commercialisation Project (BoLCoP) (Loan Authorisation) Bill, 2026 which he said focused on building climate resilience and securing national food systems through technologically-driven

MPs back tougher sentences for possession of human remains

GABORONE

Convicted offenders found in possession of human remains will soon face mandatory minimum of 20 years in prison, as Parliament moves to close legal loopholes that previously allowed ritualistic crimes to go under-punished.

That followed adoption of a motion by Lobatse Member of Parliament, Mr Kamal Jacobs, seeking to amend Section 201(A) of the Penal Code (No. 18 of 2018) to significantly increase penalties for the unlawful possession of human remains. Tabling the motion, Mr Jacobs stated that the amendment was long overdue and the proposed change would ensure that any person found in unlawful possession of human flesh, body parts, or remains committed a serious offense.

If amended, the section would provide that offenders face a minimum sentence of 20 years and a maximum of life imprisonment. Mr Jacobs argued that the Penal Code had historically been too vague on such offenses, which had contributed to recidivism.

"This lack of clarity has led to an increase in cases often linked to ritualistic practices," he said.

The MP highlighted that the motion was motivated by distressing data from the Botswana Prisons Service which show a sharp upward trend in such offenses where 23 cases were recorded in December 2023 and increased to

value chains.

The minister added that the Bill also sought parliamentary approval to raise a loan of US\$ 31.52 million (about P384 million) from the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) at an interest rate of 5.4 per cent.

He added that the loan would be augmented by US\$ 26.75 million (about P325.9 million) in grants, which would include the Adaptation Fund at US\$ 20 million (about P243.7 million), Global Environment Facility at US\$ 5 million (about P60.9 million) as well as the South-South and Triangular Cooperation (SSTC) at US\$ 1.75 million (about P21.3 million). Meanwhile, the Bill proceeded under a certificate of urgency because the loan had not yet matured, following its publication on 20 March, 2026.

Minister Gaolathe noted that government, through the Ministry of Lands and Agriculture, had worked closely with IFAD to ensure that the project provided rural households with the resources needed to transition into commercially viable and market-oriented undertakings. **BOPA**

51 in 2024 while 160 of them were recorded in December last year. Mr Jacobs emphasised that the motion aimed to curb ritual killings and illegal organ harvesting, while also addressing public outcry regarding missing persons and the discovery of mutilated bodies.

Debating the motion, Mahalapye West MP and Minister of Communication and Innovation, Mr David Tshere, underscored the need for researching the root causes of such crimes.

"The solution lies in understanding the 'why' behind the demand for human flesh," Mr Tshere said. He suggested that research could help address the issue more comprehensively. Furthermore, he noted that as the country transformed into a knowledge-based economy, it should focus on patenting and commercialising indigenous knowledge to provide ethical solutions for societal challenges.

Supporting the motion, Charleshill legislator, Mr Motsamai Motsamai expressed concern that ritual killings disproportionately affected low-income communities.

He argued that amending the code was a vital step in protecting the less privileged members of society.

Mr Motsamai also opined that the amendment would serve as a necessary and powerful deterrent against heinous acts, including human trafficking and ritualistic murder. **BOPA**

Fuel supply remains stable

Botswana's petroleum supply and national energy security are currently stable despite sharp increases in global crude oil prices triggered by escalating conflicts in the Middle East. In a recent statement delivered in Parliament, Minister of Minerals and Energy, Ms Bogolo Kenewendo, detailed the impact of geopolitical developments on international fuel markets and outlined the measures that government had taken to safeguard local supplies.

Minister Kenewendo said Brent crude oil prices had risen dramatically in recent weeks with average prices having surged 38.1 per cent from US\$69.37 per barrel in February 2026 to US\$97.23 per barrel by 26 March, 2026. She said daily prices climbed from US\$77.74 at the start of March to US\$107.81 on March 26, with peaks reaching US\$119.50 per barrel on March 9, levels not seen in four years.

The minister attributed the spike to attacks on shipping and energy facilities, threats to tanker traffic through the Strait of Hormuz, higher war risk insurance premiums, disrupted maritime routes, elevated freight costs and speculative trading.

While some international interventions, such as strategic reserve releases, provided limited relief, she said the overall market remained volatile. She indicated that following the latest update, Botswana's fuel reserves provided a reasonable buffer.

She said strategic stocks stood at 10.56 days of consumption, up slightly from 10 days the previous week, while commercial stocks increased to 24.1 days from 20.8 days previously. The total volume of fuel stocks held by importers and wholesalers, she said was 43.5 million litres, comprising 31.5 million litres of diesel and 12 million litres of petrol, a modest decrease from 46.8 million litres. An additional 32.2 million litres, including 12.8 million litres of diesel and 19.4 million litres of petrol, she said were in transit to Botswana.

However, she said the figures excluded product held at retail sites. Parliament heard that Botswana Oil Limited alone held 33.1 million litres, consisting of 8.9 million litres of ULP 95 and 24.2 million litres of diesel while government strategic storage capacity currently stood at 62.5 million litres, equivalent to approximately 18.9 days of prevailing national consumption.

Ms Kenewendo highlighted ongoing projects to bolster strategic reserves, including the Francistown depot which was being expanded by 60 million litres, while a new strategic storage depot was under construction at Ghanzi with 30 million litres capacity. Upon completion of the two projects, she said national strategic storage would increase to 152.5 million litres, equivalent to 46.2 days of cover. She added that plans were also underway for the Tshele Hills facility with a capacity of 187 million litres, which would ultimately bring the total strategic stock cover to 102 days.

To counter potential disruptions, she said government had implemented several proactive steps, including engagement with suppliers and strengthened supply planning, expedited leasing of coastal storage facilities in Mozambique and Namibia to diversify import routes, increasing monthly procurement volumes to build buffer stocks and continuous monitoring of global supply dynamics for early intervention.

"These actions aim to enhance resilience against logistical and geopolitical shocks," she said.

The minister noted that the drop in commercial stock volumes partly stemmed from higher international

prices, as traders had shifted from contract arrangements to more expensive spot selling, which included additional premiums, which had created financial pressure on local importers.

She further told Parliament that Botswana imports refined petroleum products and their prices had risen sharply, with Unleaded Petrol 95 (ULP 95) increased by nearly 60 per cent from US\$79.70 to US\$127.29 per barrel and diesel rose by 91 per cent from US\$91.18 to US\$173.93 per barrel, while illuminating Paraffin surged by 111 per cent from US\$90.97 to US\$191.87 per barrel. To protect consumers, she said pump prices had not been increased since the escalations began, adding the National Petroleum Fund (NPF) had been used to cushion the impact.

However, Ms Kenewendo warned that the fund was no longer in a position to continue absorbing such under-recoveries, meaning that future price adjustments may become necessary. She cautioned that the cost of importing fuel itself could evolve into a security of supply concern if the situation persisted.

The minister emphasised that government, through the Botswana Energy Regulatory Authority (BERA), continued to monitor international price movements daily.

She said while the global outlook remained challenging, current stocks and planned deliveries provided short- to medium-term stability.

Nonetheless, she said government was committed to safeguarding national energy security. Commenting on the statement, Leader of the Opposition, Mr Dumelang Saleshando, asked the minister to provide Parliament with expected dates for the completion of the Francistown depot expansion.

He recalled that the country faced fuel shortages in 2021 due to a regional crisis and noted that Botswana had yet to fully establish adequate strategic reserve depots.

Mr Saleshando further inquired whether government would develop an inter-ministerial response to protect citizens from fuel price hikes, warning that increases would affect food prices and taxi fares.

He asked if it would not be ideal for government to come up with a coordinated strategy to shield vulnerable sections of the economy and those at the margins from the impact of rising fuel prices. **BOPA**

Minister promises transparency in BCL inquiry

Minister for State President, Defence and Security, Mr Moeti Mohwasa, says the Presidential Commission of Inquiry into the closure of BCL Limited will operate with full independence, transparency and accountability.

Answering a parliamentary question recently, Minister Mohwasa said the commission was established to investigate the circumstances surrounding the liquidation of the copper-nickel mining giant, whose collapse devastated the economy of Selebi-Phikwe and affected thousands of Batswana.

He explained that the commissioners were appointed in strict accordance with the provisions of the Commissions of Inquiry Act.

He emphasised that great care was taken to select individuals of unassailable integrity with relevant expertise in judicial, administrative, legal, financial and environmental matters and who had no direct or indirect interest in the BCL liquidation.

"Appointments were thoroughly vetted for conflicts of interest. The Commission also reflects regional and professional diversity to reinforce public confidence," the minister said.

Mr Mohwasa stated that public sittings would be the default, with proceedings publicly noticed to allow Batswana to follow the process and a complete public record of evidence, submissions and exhibits would be maintained, subject only to lawful redactions for witness protection or national security reasons.

He added that witnesses and affected parties would have the right to legal representation and the Commission would operate free from any executive direction or control in its investigations, witness selection or final findings.

Mr Mohwasa revealed that the Terms of Reference (ToR) were drafted following rigorous consultations with legal, financial and environmental experts and were reviewed by senior counsel specialising in liquidation law and public inquiries.

The expansive ToR, which were published in the Government Gazette for public and parliamentary scrutiny, he said covered the lawfulness of all liquidation actions, conduct of directors and Cabinet members, allegations of corruption, fronting and tender irregularities, environmental disaster risks, as well as asset accounting and possible pilfering.

The minister confirmed that the ToR underwent expert legal review to ensure that they were comprehensive and capable of producing actionable recommendations.

Mr Mohwasa emphasised that the Commission enjoyed statutory independence under the Commissions of Inquiry Act, granting it the powers of a court of record, including the authority to summon witnesses, compel the production of documents and punish contempt. "The chairperson, retired judge Mr Wallis, brings unquestioned judicial independence to the role.

All government departments and public officers have been formally directed to cooperate fully without seeking political guidance.

The Terms of Reference explicitly authorise investigation into the actions of former Presidents, Cabinet members and senior officials," he added.

Again, Mr Mohwasa said

funding for the Commission would be administered independently by its secretariat, while the total budget was still being finalised due to detailed planning for an inquiry of such scale and complexity and would be made public once completed.

"Strong safeguards have also been put in place to protect witnesses from intimidation. The Commission may hold closed sessions, grant anonymity where a reasonable fear of reprisal is demonstrated and refer any interference to law enforcement for prosecution. Witnesses may also receive legal support at the Commission's discretion," the minister said.

Mr Mohwasa described the Commission as a watershed moment in the nation's commitment to accountability, transparency and justice. "The people of Selebi-Phikwe and all Batswana deserve answers about what happened to this strategic national asset, who was responsible and what lessons must be learned," he said.

He called on all stakeholders to cooperate fully and set aside partisanship in the national interest. He said the Commission was expected to begin public hearings in the coming weeks. MP for Selebi-Phikwe West, Mr Reuben Kaizer, had raised concerns regarding the commission's composition, operations and protections. **BOPA**

Government engages commercial banks for funding

Government has engaged several commercial banks to secure funding for immediate liquidity pressures and to finance critical projects planned for the 2026/2027 financial year.

Such engagements are driven by the need to ensure that government functions remained uninterrupted, development did not stall and aspirations of the people were not further delayed.

Presenting the several Loan Authorisation Bills to Parliament recently, Vice President and Minister of Finance, Mr Ndaba Gaolathe said it was within such context that government had to make decisions based on responsibility rather than convenience.

Minister Gaolathe said in light of current challenges, government took proactive steps to safeguard economic stability and ensure continuity in service delivery.

The several Loan Authorisation Bills included the Standard Chartered Bank Botswana for P750 million, Stanbic Bank Botswana Limited facilities at US\$ 90 million (about P1.236 billion), Standard Chartered Bank Botswana at €200 million (about P3.174 billion), Standard Chartered Bank Botswana at €400 million (about P6.348 billion) and the Syndicated Loan of P216.67 million.

Under the Standard Chartered Bank Botswana Limited (Loan Authorisation) Bill of 2026, the minister highlighted that the financing was urgently required to address a backlog of outstanding government invoices.

"One of the key facilities that government has successfully secured is the € 400 million facility from Standard Chartered Bank Botswana, featuring an interest rate of 4.19 per cent and a 15-year tenure. This facility is supported by a guarantee from the World Bank Group through the Multilateral

Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA). In simple terms, this guarantee acts as an insurance mechanism on the loan," he explained. An important feature of such loan, he said was the five-year grace period, would provide the breathing space necessary to implement fiscal reforms. Mr Gaolathe added that proceeds would also be directed toward strategic infrastructure, particularly three major water projects and one key energy project, which were selected based on their readiness, inclusion in the 2026/2027 budget as well as alignment with the objectives of financing partners.

He indicated that key projects included the Kanye and Moshupa water supply distribution network rehabilitation at an estimated cost of P1 billion and was ready for procurement as well as the Molepolole water supply network rehabilitation and sanitation for a duration of 24 months and currently at the tender evaluation stage.

Another project is the Francistown (Mambo) Waste Water Scheme with a 36-month duration and was ready for procurement.

The North-West Transmission Grid Connection (NWTG II) is also among the key projects, which the minister highlighted as critical to the country's economic transformation and a high-impact initiative designed to expand power capacity in northern Botswana. Mr Gaolathe emphasised that the NWTG II project was formally included in the Botswana Economic Transformation Programme and the Botswana National Energy Compact, underscored by its importance to energy security and regional integration.

The minister indicated that all projects were slated for implementation during the 2026/2027 financial year and were expected to improve service delivery, stimulate economic activity and support long-term development. **BOPA**

DIS oversight structures operational - Mohwasa

Parliament has been informed that the Directorate of Intelligence and Security (DIS) oversight structures are operational. Answering a question in Parliament recently, Minister for State President, Defence and Security, Mr Moeti Mohwasa said it was public knowledge that since its inception in 2008, the DIS operated for a long time without external audit and it was only in 2018 that it opened its doors to the Auditor General for perusal of their books.

Previously, Minister Mohwasa said the DIS relied on oversight bodies including the Parliamentary Accounts Committee (PAC) to account for public resources at their disposal.

"Still, there was a challenge relating to effectiveness of such structures as some of them remained inactive owing to various reasons some of which are known to this House," the minister said. He said the oversight structures were now functional with the exception of the Parliamentary Committee on Intelligence and Security, adding that the committee would be operational as soon as consultations were completed.

He also indicated that updates relating to administration, institutional and oversight reforms within the DIS would be tabled before the Parliamentary Committee on Intelligence and Security which was the relevant body mandated to deal with such matters.

He reaffirmed government commitment to accountability, transparency and the rule of law across all its institutions which included the DIS. He said since the establishment of the DIS, a number of matters involving the Directorate had been adjudicated before the courts.

However, he said comprehensive and centralised records, especially those isolating and categorising judgments in which the courts had expressly found that the directorate acted outside its legal mandate, were not maintained in that precise form. Consequently, he said it was currently not possible without undertaking an extensive case by case review of all litigation involving the DIS to provide a definitive numerical figure.

Notwithstanding, he said, it was acknowledged that in certain instances the courts had made adverse findings regarding the conduct of the DIS, including determinations relating to the scope of its lawful authority. Such matters, he said, were treated with due seriousness and where appropriate measures were taken to ensure compliance with the law and to prevent recurrence.

With regards to the DIS involvement in procurement, Mr Mohwasa said the organisation had no legal authority to award, direct, determine, influence or cancel any procurement decisions.

"The entity rather shares security related intelligence with procurement authorities such as the Public Procurement Regulatory

Authority which would then take independent decisions regarding any government procurement," he said. Furthermore, he said any allegations of improper influence by the directorate must be reported to established oversight authorities such as the Directorate on Corruption and Economic Crime (DCEC). Minister Mohwasa said asset acquisitions by the DIS were guided by operational requirements and subject to internal controls and audit where appropriate. Where necessary, he said the DIS provided intelligence service to financial investigations, adding if and when such investigations had national security consequence with regards to a case involving the alleged stolen funds from Bank of Botswana.

He said not long ago, Parliament was informed that a holistic examination of the matter was being undertaken. Leader of Opposition and MP for Maun North, Mr Dumelang Saleshando had asked the minister to state reforms that had been made to the DIS to improve governance and oversight. Mr Saleshando also asked the minister to disclose whether or not government had since November 2024, undertaken any investigations into the DIS given the numerous complaints received against the organisation under the previous government. In particular, he called for disclosure of details on the DIS legal and operational conduct, the number of court judgments delivered against the DIS since its formation in which the court found that the directorate

acted outside its legal mandate. Furthermore, he asked for a list of all tenders awarded by government departments or agencies that were influenced, directed, reviewed or terminated as a result of direct or indirect intervention by the DIS or in any way influenced by the DIS. He also wanted to know a schedule of all immovable properties acquired by the DIS since inception for purposes not directly related to its core security operations including but not limited to the Tautona Lodge and an explanation of the decision-making process for such acquisitions to ensure transparency and value for money.

In addition, Mr Saleshando asked about DIS involvement in financial investigations and clarity on the role played by the DIS if any in the investigation or handling of the case involving alleged stolen funds from the Bank of Botswana. He wanted an explanation of how public resources allocated to the DIS were accounted for during any periods in which the organisation was not subject to audit by the Auditor General and a confirmation of whether the DIS would be included in the scope of the ongoing Forensic Audit.

Furthermore, he called for a detailed account of any specific administrative operations or oversight reforms that had been implemented or proposed since November 2024 to prevent recurrence of past abuses of the spy agency and to ensure that the DIS operated strictly within its mandate and under the rule of law. **BOPA**

Funds to secure delivery of essential public services

Vice President and Minister of Finance, Mr Ndaba Gaolathe, has tabled the Standard Chartered Bank Botswana Limited Loan Authorisation Bill No. 7 of 2026 in Parliament, seeking a P750 million facility to secure the continued delivery of essential public services.

Presenting the Bill recently, Minister Gaolathe emphasised that the loan was a temporary bridge designed to address immediate liquidity challenges and ensure that government obligations, including civil servant salaries and critical infrastructure projects, remained uninterrupted amid a constrained fiscal environment.

He said the P750 million facility had been contracted to finance critical budget and related expenditure, including eligible infrastructure projects, as well as to support the financing of fiscal deficits arising from approved budgetary allocations.

"In my previous addresses to Parliament, I have indicated that the Ministry of Finance undertakes cash management on a daily basis. This involves closely monitoring the balances in the Government Investment Account (GIA) and making difficult decisions on which obligations can be met at any given time," he said.

He explained that the resources would go directly towards sustaining the functioning of government and honouring existing commitments made to the nation.

"This is about ensuring that the essential services upon which citizens rely are not disrupted," he said.

He described the process as more than a routine administrative exercise, but rather a constant balancing act where priorities must be set under constrained conditions. Mr Gaolathe noted that SACU revenues, now the country's largest source of income, were received only on a quarterly basis.

"This means that in between these inflows, government obligations continue to accumulate. Suppliers must be paid, services must be delivered and commitments must be honoured," he explained.

However, he said when SACU revenues were eventually received, they often fell short of the total accumulated obligations.

"This recurring cycle places strain not only on government operations but also on businesses and citizens who depend on timely payments. It is precisely this reality that necessitates interventions such as the loan facility being sought," he said.

He added that the facility provided the breathing space the country urgently needed to keep government functioning while continuing to work towards restoring fiscal stability and economic recovery.

The minister said the financing arrangement, also from Standard Chartered Bank Botswana Limited, amounts to P750 million, with key terms including a fixed interest rate of 10.7 per cent, a tenure of five years with a 2.5-year grace period, an upfront fee of 1.5 per cent and an interest rate ratchet of 0.5 per cent.

He further said the ministry found the terms reasonable and aligned with current market conditions.

He highlighted the ratchet provision, which linked the cost of the loan to the country's credit ratings.

"Should the country experience a downgrade, the interest rate would increase by 0.5 percentage points. Conversely, if the country's credit rating improves, the interest rate would decrease by 0.5 percentage points," he explained.

He said such a feature created direct incentive for maintaining sound economic management, as improvements in the country's fiscal position and credit rating will

translate into lower borrowing costs for government.

Mr Gaolathe emphasised that it had never been government's intention to continuously rely on borrowing.

He said the clear and deliberate strategy was to pursue fiscal consolidation with the objective of reducing the structural budget deficit over time.

"Borrowing is not our destination, but a temporary bridge," he stated,

adding that the focus remained on restoring balance to the fiscus, strengthening revenue performance and ensuring that future financing was directed primarily toward productive investment and critical infrastructure projects that drove growth and supported economic diversification.

"This is about moving the country from survival to sustainability and ultimately prosperity," he said.

Debating the Bill, Nkange MP, Mr Motlalele Moalosi said he was not opposed to it, but was worried that government was not doing enough to collect revenue.

Mr Moalosi pointed out gaps in revenue collection efforts, noting that many retail giants still did not provide swiping machines, raising questions about whether they were paying the required taxes.

He urged the minister to hold the Botswana Unified Revenue Service (BURS) accountable and ensure that it fully executed its mandate.

He cited Ghana, where every business, from micro enterprises to large corporations, paid taxes, with officials conducting regular compliance checks from shop to shop.

Mr Moalosi further argued that the leakage in tax collection needed to be tightened to ensure that more money circulated within the country's economy.

He also expressed concern over government's proposal for additional programmes such as the revised Ipelegeng, which he argued would require more funding at a time when the country faced serious financial challenges.

He warned that such programmes could be stalled if the economy did not recover as expected. **BOPA**

Govt seeks to unlock private sector-led economy

Government is shifting to a new approach to business engagement, prioritising targeted and results-driven dialogue to unlock private sector-led growth and drive economic transformation, Vice President Ndaba Gaolathe has said.

“The intention is to shift from broad, unfocused engagements to targeted, evidence-driven interactions that confront constraints to growth and competitiveness,” he said at the inaugural Presidential Business Roundtable on Friday.

The new approach will ensure each engagement has a clear purpose, measurable outcomes, and a structured mechanism for follow-up, and the National Development Plan (NDP) 12 and the Botswana Economic Transformation Plan (BETP) would serve as the basis for reporting, ensuring every dialogue is anchored on data, measurable progress, and practical constraints requiring attention, Mr Gaolathe said.

He said bi-annual meetings would be convened, with the President providing high-level strategic oversight and ensuring reforms remained on course, while quarterly HLCC meetings

would be sector-focused, allowing deeper, solution-oriented discussions within each industry.

He said each sector would continue meeting between the bi-annual gatherings, maintaining momentum, monitoring progress, and ensuring issues were resolved in real-time and were not deferred.

“This proposed and strengthened model of engagement represents our commitment to a more agile, responsive, and accountable relationship with the private sector, one that accelerates economic transformation and delivers meaningful results for Botswana,” he said.

The current economic model, in which government identified and drove economic activity, has reached its limits, Mr Gaolathe said, adding that the country must reconfigure its economy to be decisively private sector-led.

He said NDP 12 and BETP assumed their full significance in this context, with the latter serving as a delivery mechanism designed to move from discussion to execution, from ambition to investment, and from intention to results. For a long time, the country has been recognised as strong in policy, planning, and disciplined thinking, but this strength had become a limitation, Mr Gaolathe said.

“We have analysed, refined, and consulted sometimes to the point of delay.”

Through NDP 12 and BETP, the country was forcing reform through execution by identifying and resolving constraints, adding that the shift was economic and structural, with educational reform strengthening TVET to

prepare a workforce that can power industries, build enterprises, and compete globally.

He said a private sector-led economy must be supported by a skills-led society.

World Bank country representative, Mr Liang Wang, said generating economic growth and restructuring the economy required productivity and job creation, with the private sector as the main driver.

Mr Wang noted that improving the business environment required sustained engagement between government and the private sector.

The inaugural presidential business roundtable was themed: Towards Economic Transformation: A Private Sector-led Growth Agenda for Botswana. **BOPA**

Trust generates over P20 million in 2025

Chobe Enclave Conservation Trust (CECT) has generated a total income of P20.3 million in 2025 accrued from several key investments and operational avenues.

Zambia economy grew by 3.8 per cent in 2025

LUSAKA

Zambia’s economy grew by 3.8 percent in 2025, unchanged from the previous year, according to preliminary data released by the Zambia Statistical Agency on Thursday. Speaking at a monthly press briefing in Lusaka, Statistician General Sheila Mudenda attributed the growth to strong performances in the agriculture, forestry and fishing sectors, which together accounted for 51.1 per cent of total growth. She said that arts, entertainment and recreation contributed 16.5 per cent, while accommodation and food services accounted for 15.5 per cent. Transport and storage contributed 15.3 per cent to growth, followed by manufacturing at 7.1 per cent and information and communication technology at 6.4 per cent. **Xinhua**

Zero-tariff move boosts confidence in trade ties

Participants at the China-South Africa trade forum held in Cape Town have expressed confidence in deeper bilateral trade cooperation following China’s zero-tariff measures for 53 African countries. South Africa’s Deputy Minister of Trade, Industry and Competition Alexandra Abrahams said China’s zero-tariff measures would allow African products to enter the Chinese market duty-free and were expected to attract more Chinese investment into Africa, particularly South Africa. On the outlook for bilateral trade ties, Abrahams noted that China had been South Africa’s largest trading partner for many years, while South Africa was China’s largest trading partner on the African continent. Russel Brueton, Chief Marketing and Innovation Officer of the Western Cape Tourism, Trade, and Investment Promotion Agency, stressed that China would remain a key market for local exporters. **Xinhua**

Tanzania to stabilise fuel supply with new measures

Tanzania’s Minister of Energy Deogratius Ndejemi on Tuesday directed the Petroleum Bulk Procurement Agency to ensure the timely distribution of fuel to major storage depots in a bid to stabilise supply across the country. The directive was issued during a high-level meeting in Dar es Salaam involving the Energy and Water Utilities Regulatory Authority and Tanzania International Petroleum Reserves Limited, which reviewed the handling and reception of imported petroleum products. Ndejemi also instructed the agency to establish an efficient fuel-offloading system to ensure equitable and timely supply to key depots nationwide. **Xinhua**

Road closure affects tourism businesses

Prolonged closure of Moremi Game Reserve road due to flooding has affected some tourism operations, resulting in some leaders calling on the relevant department to look for alternative routes.

The road is strategic to tourism sector and reports have indicated that the most affected were mobile safari operators as some were forced to cancel trip bookings.

Linking Maun and Kasane, it is mostly used by tourism operators and tourists visiting the Okavango Delta, Chobe National Park and Moremi Game Reserve and currently the continuous floods experienced in Khwai had worsened its condition.

This concern was raised when some councillors debated the North West District Council chairperson’s speech, noting that the majority of safari companies were operating in the Okavango Delta, which offered the premier

adventure to travellers and the poor road network could negatively hurt the tourism industry.

Our region is a home to several tourist attractions such as Moremi as well as the delta and closure of the road has hindered accessing these areas, which provide for excellent game viewing and unique ecosystem diversity,” said nominated councillor, Mr Segolame Marewa.

He called on the Department of Wildlife and National Parks (DWNP) to consider alternative routes leading to attractive sites to ensure continuity in the tourism sector, which he said was the cornerstone of the country.

This followed the announcement by the Ministry of Environment and Tourism through DWNP, to postpone the reopening of Moremi Game Reserve road initially scheduled for March 27.

According to the ministry, the decision was necessitated by ongoing rainfall that continued to affect road conditions within the reserve, making accessibility a challenge.

The ministry had promised to continue monitoring the situation and provide updates to the public as and when necessary.

Another nominated councillor, Mr Kebareeditse Ntsogotlho expressed concern about the deteriorating state of the roads leading to tourism destinations, saying the situation impacted negatively on the sector.

While he appreciated that the country was facing economic crisis, he proposed that the time had come for safari operators in the delta to reserve a certain amount to complement the government toward roads maintenance to support better access to parks and reserves. In other countries, the system he said was working wonders as the companies invested a certain amount toward national infrastructure, including roads leading to tourist destinations.

“I believe its high time we adopt the same system and relieve the government the burden,” he added, calling on tourism companies to come forth and prioritise upgrading

of the economic roads as they were crucial to ease access to tourism destinations as well as for connecting people, goods and services.

Mr Ntsogotlho further noted that hospitality facilities operating in Maun could do the same to boost the local council revenue collection because they relied on the council for services.

He also suggested that the council should apply for a concession in the delta and for a big portion of land in Maun where they could host big events like tourism expo, saying that could help in revenue collection.

Mr Ntsogotlho also urged Tawana Land Board to approach the issue of lease renewal with caution, saying there were concerns that some big concessions were under-utilised as investors only focused on small portions while the others remained idling.

Such big concessions, he said, could be zoned and allocated to locals interested in venturing into tourism projects to promote citizen participation in the industry.

“The board should not rush into renewing leases but look at factors such as the optimal use of the concession and beneficiation to the community living within the area,” he said.

However, in the chairperson’s speech regarding concessions, it was revealed that the land board continued to manage 38 tourism concessions across the region, supporting both consumptive and non-consumptive tourism activities.

While progress has been made in renewing some leases, challenges persisted and thus included ongoing legal disputes, non-compliance with lease payments, illegal land allocations and the absence of management plans in some concessions.

It was also highlighted that additionally, the increasing registration of matlotla and unauthorised land use changes within concession areas was a growing concern and that the cost of monitoring such areas also remained high due to their remoteness. **BOPA**



A moment with Seeletso

In the heat of the courtroom, where egos clash and justice hangs in the balance, a rising female lawyer is on a mission to fight for the voiceless and seek justice, especially for women and children. Relentless in pursuit, oozing confidence and determined to unravel the darkest of crimes, Ms Seeletso Ookeditse (41) is rising to be a force to be reckoned with in the male-dominated criminal legal landscape.

It is her fondness for homicide cases and a heart that beats for the girl child and women's rights that makes those standing against the poised demeanour taste of her tenacity.

Among those is the current Director of Public Prosecutions and her superior, Mr Kgosietsile Ngakayagae, whom they have stood in opposing axis in the courtroom, and her passion and poise were palpable.

"She is not an officer of the court, she is a human rights activist," one senior attorney remarked as she vehemently opposed bail in the State vs Selolwane case, where the accused allegedly assaulted a 13-year-old girl and paid a cover-up to the girl's mother.

Born in Tonota on the outskirts of Francistown in the Senwamadi family, the young Ms Ookeditse grew up thinking of being a teacher, a police officer, or a nurse.

But all changed when the Botswana General Certificate of Secondary Education results were released, and something within counselled her to apply for a Bachelor of Laws at the University of Botswana.

As she navigated lecture rooms between 2003 and 2009, Ms Ookeditse fell in love with justice and equity, thus perfecting her newfound craft.

It was, however, not without challenge as she had to watch her colleagues graduate in 2008, while she had to go back to school for a retake module, and graduate a year later.

Two months after completing her studies, she was called by the Directorate of Public Service Management, offering her a position as a State Counsel within the Attorney General's Chambers, thus being deployed at the Directorate of Public Prosecution was not her initial destiny.

"We were told that there was no space in Attorney General Chambers and were to wait at the DPP," and that wait had been for 17 years now, and she had moved up the ladder to be a Principal Prosecution Counsel and crisscrossing across courtrooms in search of justice.

Among those she found at DPP and provided mentorship was the DPP director, Mr Ngakayagae, and deputy director of the Directorate on Corruption and Economic Crime, Mr Thabo Malambane, among others.

She dealt mostly in cases against a person, which involved defilement, rape, robbery, and murder.

When her unit was disbanded, she found herself under the Sexual Offence Unit and later homicides, which include murder, manslaughter, robbery, and assaults.

"I still do rape cases because I was with the Sexual Offence Unit," she explained.

Of all the cases, Ms Ookeditse believes

rape victims were misunderstood and were often subjected to social stereotypes and victimised for what had befallen them.

"In most cases, people do not believe them, they are doubted, and their credibility is always questioned," she said.

Thus, when faced with such a victim, her tactic is simple. To sit down with the victim to try to understand them, assess the evidence, before presenting it before the court.

"As people, there are standards we have set for rape victims. People believe that for you to be raped, you must have behaved in a certain way. They will ask, why did you not scream? Why do you report late?" Adding that such shows that society lacks understanding of rape. Over the years, she has matured to understand that rape is a demeaning, dehumanising, and traumatic encounter that shatters the victim, sometimes even making it difficult for them to report.

'As people, there are standards we have set for rape victims. People believe that for you to be raped, you must have behaved in a certain way. They will ask, why did you not scream? Why do you report late?'

The society's lack of understanding of rape is evidenced by the State versus Goitsekgosi Mojadigo case, in which consent was obtained by deception, and the culprit was sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment.

She has handled cases involving serial rapist Tshepiso Letsididi, who was convicted in Mochudi and Mogoditshane Magistrate's Court for raping minor children.

Ms Ookeditse's desk is also seized with murder cases, and what motivates her in such cases is that she has to represent the deceased.

"When I get a murder case, I know I am the only voice of the victim. It is an opportunity for the victim to tell their story through me," she said, adding that the more graphic description of the scene, the more aggravating it is to get the accused not to escape punishment.

In all her cases, she has devised a strategy to have victims present in court whenever possible and such is to afford them an opportunity to see how she fights on their corners, and the more they come, the more it inspires her to put up a fierce fight.

"Some of the victims will even feel sorry for me when the case does not go our way," she said, which showed how they appreciate the efforts.

As for the victims and accused persons, her tactic is to afford them respect but not to fear them, and she will not budge under intimidation.

In fact, there is a case in which an accused person wrote to the Director of Public Prosecutions that Ms Ookeditse should not handle her cases, and upon assessment of the request with her superior, it was resolved that the accused had not made any case and does not even have the right

to cherry-pick prosecutors.

Although there had not been many cases of prosecutors being attacked, she believes more efforts should be made to protect prosecutors.

More often, she said she has met with people she prosecuted after having served their sentences, and they would often just greet each other and pass.

"The other job of a prosecutor is that you are an officer of the court; it is your duty to ensure that justice is done, to ensure that even accused persons receive a fair trial. We are not persecutors; we are prosecutors," she said.

Noting that their role is also to assist the court to balance the right of the victim and of the accused person, adding that in a poorly adjudicated case, the accused could be freed on appeal, thus the need to strike a

balance. In her legal journey, Ms Ookeditse believes cases involving children should be sped up, adding that withdrawal of cases of abuse by women was a grievous concern, as compelling them to give evidence would not yield much. In her opinion, the government should consider having a fund to assist women and children who are victims of crime, so that even if they lose a provider, there would be a fund to assist them.

As a mother, wife, daughter, and prosecutor, Ms Ookeditse finds striking a work-life balance key, noting that her family has been supportive.

"The rewarding part of my career is seeing justice done, and when it is done for a child and woman, it is the sweetest thing," she said, cautioning that sometimes the court, the media and judicial officers re-victimise victims. **BOPA**

Online system to ease aviation delays

Long delays, costly travel and inefficient manual processes have for years slowed down aviation licensing services, particularly for industry players operating outside the capital.

The Civil Aviation Authority of Botswana (CAAB) has introduced an online platform aimed at streamlining personnel licensing services and improving efficiency across the aviation sector.

Speaking during the launch and stakeholder engagement sessions in Maun recently, director of Flight Safety Oversight at CAAB, Mr Christopher Ferguson, said the system would enhance operational efficiency and significantly reduce turnaround times.

He said the AviateBW platform would allow stakeholders to register, apply for services and submit documentation online, marking a shift from manual processes to a fully digital system.

"The objective is to ensure a smooth transition and improve

how we deliver services to the aviation industry," he said.

For many stakeholders in Maun, accessing these services has often required travelling to Gaborone, a process described as both costly and time-consuming.

The introduction of the online system is expected to eliminate the need for such travel, allowing users to access services at their convenience.

CAAB technical team representative, Mr Aubrey Moeng, said the system had been designed to support all stakeholders, including facilitating examinations and managing documentation digitally.

He noted that the platform would improve data management and eliminate inefficiencies associated with manual systems.

The shift to a paperless system is also expected to remove the burden of repeatedly submitting documents, as information will now be stored and easily retrieved within the platform.

Industry players have welcomed the development, citing convenience and improved accessibility. Quality

officer at Helicopter Horizons, Ms Tsholofelo Batshidi said the system would significantly reduce operational costs while improving service delivery.

"It is user-friendly and allows us to access services at the comfort of our homes and offices," she said.

Ms Batshidi added that the system would make it easier to manage documentation and speed up processes that previously took

long to complete.

She also welcomed plans to establish a satellite examination centre in Maun, which will further improve access for aviation personnel in the region.

Head of training at Mack Air, Mr Obonolo Komane said the digital platform would address long-standing delays in processing applications and feedback, noting that issues such as lost documents

would be eliminated. Funded under National Development Plan II, the initiative forms part of Botswana's broader digital transformation agenda aimed at improving efficiency and service delivery.

As the aviation sector transitions to a digital system, stakeholders say the changes will not only improve convenience, but also mark a turning point in how services are delivered. **BOPA**

Kanye Sanitation project still faces challenges

Kanye sanitation project, which is at 98 per cent completion rate is still undergoing challenges, leading to the delay of its commissioning.

Dragging commissioning of the project is the backlog of its works which covers pump station eight and three mortars which broke down during the testing stage.

This was revealed by the Kanye Water Utilities Corporation Services Centre General Manager, Mr Monametsi Ramosu, when updating Kanye District councillors during a full council session recently.

"Pump station three had a dis-alignment and the area where waste will be deposited is also undergoing rehabilitation. Phase one of the project increased network with 145 kilometers, the system is quite a challenge," he emphasised.

An arrangement he said, had been made to cater for a spare mortar and pump. In addition, Mr Ramosu informed councillors that non-return valves used in the pump stations were of sub-standard and needed to be replaced in all the pump stations.

"Replacement of non-return valves has since commenced and expectation was to commission the entire sanitation project before end of April 2026," he said.

He indicated that a waste water specialist from South Africa engaged by Estate Management, was expected in two weeks and by end of April 2026 the project

would be functional.

Mr Ramosu further explained that post commissioning stage in April, members of the public would be encouraged to apply for to the sewerage system. The Ministry of Water and Human Settlement will continue working with WUC to ensure that any major defects be addressed by the ministry.

About the ongoing project of potable water, Mr Ramosu said there were instances that needed interconnection of new lines and old lines which were identified as additional works. He indicated that WUC had since decided to carry out some connection of services to the public.

When commenting, Councillor Shimane Thelo of Lotlhakane East called for a delegation that would visit the Minister of Water and Human Settlement to seek intervention on the project as they did not believe it would reach completion stage on the stipulated time, whilst Councillor Themba Stimela proposed a site visit to the sanitation project, expressing fear that in the next council session Estate Management would have left the site.

Councillor Mosekisi Rannkobana of Kgosong ward said he had long out cried of dire water shortage at Ntsweng ward, requesting water rationing dates for the ward. He also asked whether government would be able to secure funding to remunerate the waste water specialist.

In response, Mr Ramosu explained that commissioning of the project did not mean the contractor would vacate site immediately.

He assured councillors that WUC would only take over the project if it was fully complete.

When responding to Mr Rannkobana, he said the intention was to throttle other areas like Mmamokhasi ward that usually had water to divert supply to areas like Ntsweng.

He also explained that within the years 2026 and 2027, Kanye would be connected to prepaid.

Mr Ramosu also stated that phase two component of water reticulation covering Kanye and Moshupa which had been included in NDP 12, was awaiting funding. **BOPA**

Kweneng issues 100 hunting permits

Only 100 hunting permits have been issued from more than 5000 applications in the Kweneng district.

Those who qualified for the coming hunting season were selected through a raffle in Lekgwapheng Kgotla in Molepolole on Thursday.

Molepolole District Commissioner, who is also the Raffle Committee chairperson, Ms Segomotso Nkwane emphasised that hunting was regulated based on the number of species in the district or country and therefore those eligible to hunt would be those issued with permits.

She further said that hunting during these periods prevented certain species from becoming overpopulated, with controlled areas specifically permitted for hunting.

In Kweneng, hunting will be done in KW2 (between Tshwaane and Motokwe), KW6 (near Motokwe and Tsetseng), and KW 10 (between Boataname, Lephephe and Loologane) with the newly added area being KW14 (located between Molepolole and Lentsweletau)

Ms Nkwane stated that KW14 was added because there was a lot of conflict between humans and wild animals.

She said the community had over the years been complaining of baboons as they were causing havoc by damaging crops and other valuable property as well as

killing small-stock and poultry.

Therefore, Ms Nkwane said some animal species, such as baboons were included in the raffle to mitigate human-wildlife conflict that was prevalent in the area.

Giving raffle procedures, Senior Wildlife Warden, Ms Ruth Ntswaneng pointed out that hunting licenses, not the animals themselves, were purchased to show approval for hunting to law enforcement.

The animals to be hunted include duiker, hartebeest, gemsbok, eland, antelope, ostrich, steenbok and baboons.

This year's quota allows 24 animals in KW2, 26 animals in KW6, 41 animals in KW10 and nine animals in KW14. The hunting season runs from April 7 to October 27, 2026. **BOPA**

A funeral date for Gabriel 'Phunya' Modise, who passed on at the age of 44 is yet to be determined.

This is according to family spokesperson, Oduetse Mphahudi, who also stated that Modise would be buried in Gaborone.

His memorial service is scheduled for the Amphitheatre, Mass Media Complex at 2pm, with a themed dress code of white sneakers and headgear.

A Matsiloje native, Modise was celebrated in the theatre space, a theatre director who served as an artistic director at Tsoga Africa Theatre Works.

He was known for his passion and determination in shaping stories that would live on for generations.

His contribution to the arts was remarkable and impactful, earning him a reputation as a true icon in Botswana's creative community. Modise was dedicated to creating

a theatre industry in Botswana that promoted employment and addressed national concerns.

He directed notable productions among them, *The Briefcase*, which aimed to break down the complexities of the national budget speech and focused on social welfare issues affecting Botswana. Besides *The Briefcase*, he is also credited for *The Rising Son*, a play depicting the struggles of growing up in Botswana since 1966 and the challenges faced by African men. His other play, *Border Lines*, showcases the life of tribes along the Botswana-South Africa border, focusing on two brothers separated by the border.

The multi-talented Modise was a poetic storyteller whom some would remember in the award-winning Broadway production *PULA: The Musical*, where his narration of the play captivated audiences across the globe.

He was also a television presenter, renowned traditional song and dance artist and a soloist. Modise died March 28 after a short illness. **BOPA**

Kgoreletso fulfils lifelong dream

Dineo Kgoreletso, affectionately known as Dix in music circles, has long been celebrated across Kopong for her soulful voice at churches and funeral services.

Now, in her mid-fifties, the mother of three has fulfilled a lifelong dream with the release of her six-track gospel album, *Haufinyana*.

Produced at Noble Sounds, the album features standout tracks including the title song *Haufinyana*, *Wa Galalela*, and *Lerato la Jeso*.

For years, Kgoreletso's voice has been a source of comfort and inspiration, her presence felt wherever she sang.

Her journey in faith began in 2005 at St. John Apostolic Church before moving to St. Paul Apostolic Church.

Kgoreletso now fellowships at the City of Ebenezer Church, still in Kopong.

She explained that the album's title was inspired by hymn 138 from the Zion Christian Church (ZCC), a song she turns to in times of hardship.

"When things are tough, I hum *Haufinyana* and my problems are solved," she said.

Most of the songs on the album are drawn from hymn books, except *Lerato la Jeso*, which she composed in the studio.

"It was my way of appreciating the Most High for his love and for helping me persevere until I reached this point," she reflected.

Kgoreletso hopes her album will

remind listeners that true reliance on God brings redemption.

"God has taken me from the worst to the best. Without him, my talent might have died unknown," she said.

She viewed the project as a legacy piece that future generations could learn from, even as she worked toward a second album.

Despite financial challenges that delayed production for nearly two years, Kgoreletso remains determined.

She believes talent must be nurtured and sustained, and she encourages fellow gospel artists to unite rather than work in isolation.

Her advice to aspiring musicians is simple: perseverance, commitment, and hard work.

"Never say never. Showcase your talent and let the audience's response guide you," she urged.

With *Haufinyana*, Kgoreletso has transformed her reputation, carrying her voice and message of faith far beyond Kopong. **BOPA**

Venting sessions gain popularity

Venting sessions are slowly gaining popularity in Botswana. The sessions usually give individuals a platform to express their bottled-up emotions, be it stress or frustrations, aiming for relief.

In Botswana, 30-year-old Thompho Gadimang is championing the idea through her organisation, Majestic Honor Foundation that deals with mental health in general.

Registered in August 2025, the foundation provides venting sessions, counseling and psychotherapy.

Majestic Honor Foundation has so far carried out venting sessions in Maun, Kasane, Francistown and Gaborone.

These sessions are an entirely new initiative in Botswana and Africa as a whole. As such, many people are not yet aware of them," she said in an interview.

However, she said those who had the opportunity to attend had given a positive feedback, pressing the need for more sessions.

Her handle/username known as Majestic Honor on Facebook also has an engagement of one thousand to two thousand reactions and more than five hundred comments on each post shared on a daily basis which convey the need for these sessions.

Gadimang had been strategic

on how to go about her sessions, noting that that many people shied away from being labeled according to their experiences and what they were going through.

She has therefore, opted to use masks for participants to hide their face for anonymity.

"I want everyone to feel safe to express themselves without criticism, being ridiculed or judged to what society may consider as misfortunes. I came up with this concept of them being under the masks," she said.

Even though she is currently facing financial constraints, Gadimang continues to inspire and uplift lives, turning challenges into opportunities for positive impact.

"There were moments I wanted to give up. But even in those moments, I knew if I survive this, I will make sure no other person has to suffer in silence again. Majestic Honor Foundation

was born from that promise, she said.

Gadimang is an experienced moral education, guidance & counselling teacher with Diploma in Secondary Education from Molepolole College of Education. She is currently pursuing her degree in Psychology.

Drawing from her personal journey, she said Majestic Honor Foundation served as a place of refuge, healing, and transformation for many others.

Ntungamili rises to the occasion

Refusing to be swallowed up by those of other countries represented at the African Junior Championships (U18) in Cairo, Egypt, the Botswana flag swung with grace as Ntungamili Ragui once again engraved his name in the history books of tennis, stamping his authority by winning silver.

Ntungamili, the only Motswana competing, won a silver medal in the boys' singles after fighting bitterly for 3 and a half hours before narrowly falling to Peter Ogunsakin of Nigeria by 6-1, 6-7 (5), 3-6. In the boys' doubles, Ntungamili and his partner, Ali Missoum of Tunisia were crowned African Junior Champions after defeating Egypt's Mohamed Sherif and Mostafa Samih 6-3, 6-3 in the final.

Botswana Tennis Association vice president, Nonofo Othusitse said they were happy with the player's performance.

"It is no small feat to reach both finals at a continental

Championships as one comes head-to-head with some of the finest players who are also highly ranked," he said.

Othusitse said the two medals represent Ntungamili's continued growth at international events and also demonstrated the talent that he was.

"Not only did he secure the silverware but importantly, he secured critical points needed for his journey as he prepares for the junior Grand Slams," he said.

He said for the association, Ntungamili's success was a clear indication that it had a great deal of talent within its ranks.

It that regard, he said it was important for them to continue investing in grassroots development and also providing opportunities for players so that they could reach

their full potential

Othusitse said Ntungamili would remain in Egypt for three weeks, where he would also take part in the World Tennis Tour Juniors events.

He will compete in the ITF J300 from March 30 to April 3, as well as at the ITF J500 from April 6 to 11

"We are obviously having high expectations in terms of him achieving podium finishes at these events. We are also excited for him as he has now advanced to playing these top-tier events in the junior circuit," he said.

Othusitse said the ITF J200, J300 and J500 tournaments were critical, high-level events for juniors as they transition from junior tennis to elite professional tennis.

This, he said was because the

events gave players the opportunity to compete against the best international competition.

Through such events, players also raise ITF World Tennis ranking points which are key to them ultimately improving their world rankings in order to earn direct qualifications for the main draws of Junior Grand Slams such as the US Open and Wimbledon.

"This is indeed an exciting year for Ntungamili, and of course Botswana tennis. We are expecting these performances to drive tennis participation and development. We are expecting more resources toward tennis from all stakeholders so that we do not only sustain Ntungamili's performances but build a sustainable tennis ecosystem that will produce more Ntungamilis," he said. **BOPA**

Lefika relays produce provisional qualifiers

Lefika International Relays has set the tone for the coming World Athletics Relays by producing provisional qualifiers and national record.

Nigeria, Kenya and South Africa are in the 4x100m mixed relay qualifying bracket with Zimbabwe men's 4x400m setting a new national record of 3:00.69, shattering a 29-year-old record of 3:00.77, which was set in 1997.

Meanwhile, Botswana's 4x400m women's relay team's win on home soil, was a cherry on top.

The quartet of Naledi

Month, Kennekae Batisani, Lebitso Mokorofu and Karabo Mantswenyane clocked a Season Best of 3:38.27 to beat Kenya, which recorded 3:45.31 and Zambia with 3:57.33

Since Amantle Montsho, Botswana has failed to produce women who can compete at international meets.

Botswana Athletics Association (BAA) vice president technical, Kenneth Kikwe said in an interview that they were happy with the athlete's performance.

He said all the athletes ran well and were comfortable on the track more so that they were leading. However, he said more still needed to be done before the

World Athletics Relays planned for May 2-3. Already, he said they had a camp lined up before the world relays.

"The camp will be aimed at shaping the whole Team Botswana so that they perform on home soil during the world relays," he said.

As for the other relay teams, he said they decided to rest the 4x400m men's relay team of Letsile Tebogo, Bayapo Ndori, Lee Eppie and Collen Kebinatshipi to give others the opportunity to prove themselves.

"They were resilient and that alone demonstrated that we have depth in that department," he said. **BOPA**.

He called for urgent reflection and action to close the disparity. He commended sports administrators, parents, athletes, and sponsors such as Vunani for their continued support in developing women's sport, noting that stronger partnerships were key to increasing investment and rewards for athletes.

The assistant minister added that the awards went beyond recognition, serving as a platform for economic empowerment and contributing to the wider creative and service industries involved in sport.


The chief executive officer of Inside BW Women Sports, Kesego Kebelaele-Okie, also praised stakeholders for their support,

noting that the awards, now in their fourth year, continued to elevate the voices and achievements of women in sport.

She said gender inequality remained a challenge and urged corporates to invest more in grassroots programmes for young girls to strengthen future national teams and improve international competitiveness. "The stories of women in sport must continue to be told and celebrated, as they reflect resilience, excellence and determination in the face of challenges," she said.

The event concluded with a strong call for continued investment, collaboration and inclusivity in sport, as stakeholders reaffirmed their commitment to growing women's sport in Botswana and ensuring greater equality across all levels. **BOPA**

Tennis star Omphile Bothasitse and Oratile Nowe of athletics were standout winners at the 4th Annual Vunani Botswana Women Sports Awards after being crowned Sportswoman of the Year with

Disability and Sports Woman of the Year award respectively. They both walked away with P20,000 each on Friday night. The ceremony, held to celebrate excellence in women's sport, also honoured athletes, administrators, officials and media professionals across multiple categories. In other awards, Same Mohutsiwa received the Young Promising Athlete award. Grace Mmolai was named Coach of the Year, earning P10,000 for her outstanding work in developing athletes. The Female Team Kata in karate was named Team of the Year, taking home P25,000 for their performance and consistency. In administrative and special recognition categories, Game Mompe was named

Administrator of the Year for contributions to cycling, earning P10,000. Molefhi Obenne received the HeForShe Award alongside P5,000 for promoting gender equality in sport. Volunteer of the Year went to Gorata Kokole, who also received P5,000, while Gaone Poane was crowned Umpire of the Year, earning P10,000. The media fraternity was also well represented with Kabelo Dipholo of The Voice Newspaper named Sports Journalist of the Year, while Tiroyaone Keboi of Radio Botswana was recognised in radio and Tshegofatso Malepa of Botswana Television took the television award.
